Construction of a new, 108,134 gsf workforce training building designed to double the number of students trained in the fields of math, science, technology, and various healthcare programs (such as nursing, respiratory therapy, etc) from ~4,500 to ~9,000. Fill large gaps in regional and statewide workforce needs, especially in nursing and other health sciences. Provide a highly-trained and skilled workforce in high-demand, high-skilled, high-wage healthcare areas. The Florida Center for Nursing estimates that 1,000 nurses alone will be needed annually for the next 10 years.

14. Program Performance



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a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

In 2023-2024, program and facility planning for the construction of a new, 108,136 gsf building to house workforce classrooms and labs designed to double the number of students served from ~4,500 to ~9,000. Fill large gaps in regional and statewide workforce needs, especially in nursing and other health sciences. Provide a highly trained and skilled workforce in high-demand healthcare areas. Jobs will be created during construction, and program grads will be placed into high-demand, high-skilled, high-wage jobs. In total, this is a three-year project.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

In 2023-2024, program and facility planning for the construction of a new, 108,136 gsf building to house workforce classrooms and labs designed to double the number of students served from ~4,500 to ~9,000. In total, this is a three-year project. The State of Florida previously provided \$25 million in state funding for the purchase of land on which this and other buildings will be constructed. Jobs will be created during construction and program grads will be placed in high-skilled, high-demand, high-wage jobs upon graduation.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Creation of jobs during the construction phase. Training and placement of grads in high-demand workforce jobs, especially healthcare and related occupations. Placement rates are currently greater than 90%, with a 100% passage rate on nursing licensure exams. Employers will be supported by more well-trained graduates prepared to immediately enter the workforce in workforce occupations experiencing shortages.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

College students, high school dual enrollment students, workers returning to refresh or enhance skills, economically disadvantaged persons, and jobless persons. The number of students served is expected to double from ~4,500 to ~9.000.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improved quality of education, improved economic self-sufficiency, increased economic activity, and addressed employer need. Measured by the number and rate of program enrollments, completions, graduates, placement, wages of graduates, and reinvestments by graduates back into the local/regional economy.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Seminole State College has standard performance clauses in all of its contracts which ensure that work will be completed in accordance with the workplan and list of deliverables, including provisions relating to the payment and withholding of funds as necessary. It is not anticipated that additional penalties will be needed.
