14. Program Performance



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a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Placement of a Peace River Center CMST Counselor in the Polk County Sheriff's substations enables Sheriff's staff to divert behavioral health calls to our trained CMST crisis counselors for behavioral health intervention rather than law enforcement intervention. When appropriate, Deputies and CMST Counselors in the substations partner on behavioral health crisis calls. CMST Counselors would then follow-up post intervention to ensure linkage to appropriate services. When law enforcement utilize the CMST counselors to assist in assessment of mental health crisis situations, the Baker Act is avoided approximately 80% of the time. The CMST outreach has resulted in approximately 90% of those served not having a repeat Baker Act through law enforcement.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

- 1. Embed crisis counselors in law enforcement substations across Polk County.
- 2. Dispatched crisis counselors will work with on-scene deputies to assess and de-escalate crisis situations; work with deputies to identify if community based services can meet the individual's needs or if a Baker Act is necessary; link individuals to community-based services to divert/avoid a Baker Act.
- 3. Provide post crisis assessment follow up; provide follow up after discharge from an inpatient Baker Act stay within Polk County.
- 4. CMST completes post crisis event outreach for individuals whose Baker Act was initiatied by law enforcement engaging them in ongoing care and freeing up law enforcement resources.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Placement of CMST staff in the Sheriff's substations allows CMST staff to work closely with Deputies to assist in crisis intervention and follow up with individuals with mental health issues they may encounter in the community resulting in diverting arrests through addressing presenting crises, connecting individuals to appropriate community-based resources, alleviating further crises, and when necessary, facilitating the Baker Act process.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

PRC serves individuals of all ages who are in crisis or require follow up from a recent crisis situation. There are no restrictions on access to the CMST services so there are no barriers in terms of appropriate and equal access to care. There were 7,648 Baker Acts (BA) in Polk County with 22.75% associated with children for FY17/18 according the State Baker Act Annual Report (most recent published data). From FY11 to FY18 the total population of Polk County has grown by 9.89% while the growth in BA's for all ages has grown by approximately 109%. The number of Baker Acts associated with children (ages <18) has grown by approximately 139.5% (from 726 per year to 1,739 per year) with the adult population Baker Acts growing approximately 101.5% (from 2,932 per year to 5,909 per year). Involuntary examinations of individuals of all ages and specifically for minors have increased more rapidly than the population.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

This project enables PRC to be present in and work alongside deputies across Polk County related to Baker Act and Marchman Act calls, issues and follow-up. The goal is to reduce and divert individuals in our communities from law enforcement Baker Act actions by de-escalating on-scene situations, referral and linkage to outpatient community resources and services. A potential measure of success is a reduction of the percent of behavioral health related calls resulting in inpatient crisis stabilization unit or hospitalization use (Baker Act Rate).

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

If awarded funding, Peace River Center will work with our Managing Entity and DCF to develop any necessary and appropriate penalties if performance measures are not achieved.
