**a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?**

The Election Law program will serve students, election officials, and voters.

**b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?**

The Election Law Program will rely on objective, nonpartisan, evidence-based analysis to develop ways of protecting the integrity of the electoral system, ensure adequate access to all eligible voters, and reinforcing public confidence in electoral outcomes and the accuracy of the electoral process.

**c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?**

The election law program will provide an academic and scientific analysis of election law, and election operation best practices with at least three positive results. The program, because of the non-partisan and academic approach will help prevent misunderstandings by the general public. The program would study and endorse various processes (equipment, ballot design, anti-fraud measures) used by election officials and thus those various processes would have an indicium of legitimacy.

**d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?**

The Election Law program will serve students, election officials, and voters.

**e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?**

The Election Law Program will track the number of students who take affiliated courses and participate in collaborative workshops; the number of articles, reports, studies, and other work product materials produced; and attendance at distinguished lectures and other events. The program will rely on feedback from legislators, election administrators, and other officials concerning its publications, workshops, and other offerings. The program will track its impact through measures such as opportunities to testify before county, state, or federal legislators; opportunities to assist state or county election administrators; presentations to the FSASE, NASS, USEAC, or other election-related entities; and reports submitted to such bodies.
