Supporting new Mental Health Clubhouse programs furthers the broader objective shared by DCF of ensuring that best-practice mental health and employment services continue to grow across the state for adults living with mental illnesses. Mental Health Clubhouses are active participants in the recovery-oriented system of care, a core DCF strategy. The Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSA) recognizes the Clubhouse model as a best practice.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

State funds will support members of four new Clubhouse programs which are either already open or will open between now and the end of FY 2023-2024: Academy at Bradenton (opened July 2022); MHA Glades Clubhouse in Palm Beach County (opened July 2022); Club Success in Polk County (opens February 2023); and Tampa Clubhouse in Hillsborough County (opens July 2023).

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Members of each of the four programs will be provided with hands-on skills training in areas such as technology, arts & graphics, videography, culinary & hospitality, customer service, and more to match to employer needs. Local businesses will be educated and recruited to provide employment to program-trained members.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Adults living with severe and persistent mental health illness.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Each of the 14 existing Mental Health Clubhouses in Florida receives approximately \$125,000 per year from DCF. This additional \$500,000 will ensure that the four new Clubhouse programs in Manatee, Hillsborough, Polk and Palm Beach counties receives the same level of state support to ensure Clubhouse training and employment programs help members secure and sustain employment in the competitive marketplace. Collective earnings by Florida Clubhouse members for the last three years 2020-2022 were \$7,309,585.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?
