Two different salary schedules

- Grandfathered salary schedule means the salary schedule or schedules adopted by a district school board before July 1, 2014.
- Performance salary schedule means the salary schedule or schedules adopted by a district and applies to those employees hired after July 1, 2014, or employees who choose to move from the grandfathered salary schedule.

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Salary factors for those on the grandfathered schedule

- In determining the grandfathered salary schedule for instructional personnel, a district school board must base a portion of each employee's compensation upon performance demonstrated under s. 1012.34, F.S., and shall provide differentiated pay based upon district-determined factors including:
 - School demographics
 - Critical shortage areas, and
 - Level of job performance difficulties.



Definitions

- Adjustment means an addition to the base salary schedule that is not a bonus and becomes part of the employee's permanent base salary and shall be considered compensation.
- Supplement means an annual addition to the base salary for the term of the supplement as long as the employee continues his or her employment for the purpose of the supplement.

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Salary *adjustments* based on *performance* for those on the performance salary schedule

- Salary adjustments, for those employees on the performance salary schedule, shall be established as follows:
 - an employee rated as highly effective must be greater than the highest annual salary adjustment available to an employee of the same classification through any other salary schedule adopted by the district.
 - an employee rated as effective must be equal to at least 50 percent and no more than 75 percent of the annual adjustment provided for a highly effective employee of the same classification.



Salary *supplements* based on *assignment* for those on the performance salary schedule

- In addition to the salary adjustments, each district school board shall provide for salary supplements for activities that must include, but are not limited to:
 - Assignment to a Title I eligible school.
 - Assignment to a school that earned a grade of "F" or three consecutive grades of "D"
 - Certification and teaching in critical teacher shortage areas.
 - Assignment of additional academic responsibilities.

1012.731, F.S., The Florida Best and Brightest Teacher Scholarship Program

(1) The Legislature recognizes that, second only to parents, teachers play the most critical role within schools in preparing students to achieve a high level of academic performance. The Legislature further recognizes that research has linked student outcomes to a teacher's own academic achievement. Therefore, it is the intent of the Legislature to designate teachers who have achieved high academic standards during their own education as Florida's best and brightest teacher scholars.

(2) There is created the Florida Best and Brightest Teacher Scholarship Program to be administered by the Department of Education. The scholarship program shall provide categorical funding for scholarships to be awarded to classroom teachers, as defined in s. 1012.01(2)(a), who have demonstrated a high level of academic achievement.

(3)(a) To be eligible for a scholarship, a classroom teacher must have achieved a composite score at or above the 80th percentile on either the SAT or the ACT based on the National Percentile Ranks in effect when the classroom teacher took the assessment and have been evaluated as highly effective pursuant to s. 1012.34 in the school year immediately preceding the year in which the scholarship will be awarded, unless the classroom teacher is newly hired by the district school board and has not been evaluated pursuant to s. 1012.34. (b) In order to demonstrate eligibility for an award, an eligible classroom teacher must submit to the school district, no later than November 1, an official record of his or her SAT or ACT score demonstrating that the classroom teacher scored at or above the 80th percentile based on the National Percentile Ranks in effect when the teacher took the assessment. Once a classroom teacher is deemed eligible by the school district, including teachers deemed eligible in the 2015-2016 fiscal year, the teacher shall remain eligible as long as he or she remains employed by the school district as a classroom teacher at the time of the award and receives an annual performance evaluation rating of highly effective pursuant to s. 1012.34.



1012.731, F.S., The Florida Best and Brightest Teacher Scholarship Program

(4) Annually, by December 1, each school district shall submit to the department the number of eligible classroom teachers who qualify for the scholarship.

(5) Annually, by February 1, the department shall disburse scholarship funds to each school district for each eligible classroom teacher to receive a scholarship as provided in the General Appropriations Act. A scholarship in the amount provided in the General Appropriations Act shall be awarded to every eligible classroom teacher. If the number of eligible classroom teachers exceeds the total appropriation authorized in the General Appropriations Act, the department shall prorate the per-teacher scholarship amount.

(6) Annually, by April 1, each school district shall award the scholarship to each eligible classroom teacher.

(7) For purposes of this section, the term "school district" includes the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind and charter school governing boards.

(8) This section expires July 1, 2017.



Eligibility Requirements / New Classroom Teachers

- Submission to the school district of official ACT report with a composite score at or above 80th percentile; or
- Submission to the school district of official SAT report with a composite score at or above 80th percentile.
- No evaluation rating requirement.



Eligibility Requirements / Current Classroom Teachers

- Submission to the school district of official ACT report with a composite score at or above 80th percentile; or
- Submission to the school district of official SAT report with a composite score at or above 80th percentile.
- Once a classroom teacher is deemed eligible by the school district, including teachers deemed eligible in the 2015-2016 fiscal year, the teacher shall remain eligible as long as he or she remains employed by the school district as a classroom teacher at the time of the award and receives an annual performance evaluation rating of highly effective pursuant to s. 1012.34, F.S.



Deadlines for Eligibility

- Eligible teachers submit ACT or SAT official score reports to school district by November 1.
- School districts, charter schools and Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind provide number of eligible teachers to the Department by December 1.
- Department disburses funds prescribed in the legislative General Appropriations Act to each school district for eligible teachers by February 1.
- Each school district, charter school and Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind provides payment to each eligible teacher by April 1.



Eligibility Comparison




2015-16 Best and Brightest Eligible Classroom Teachers




Distribution of Eligible Teachers in 2014-15 by Title 1 School






Distribution of Eligible Teachers in 2014-15 by School Grade
