## **CCPS Hurricane Irma Overview**

- Expectation was to open 10 shelters
- 100% of the schools CCPS could use as shelters were opened
- 28 (54%) schools were opened in 29 hours
- 20 (40%) schools within the storm surge area were unable to open
- 3 (6%) schools not opened due to waste water package plants
- 180% increase of opened shelters prior to Hurricane Irma, CCPS had never opened more than 10 schools as shelters or refuges
- Over 17,000 people stayed in CCPS shelters or refuges
- Majority were pet shelters first for CCPS

### Prior to the Storm – Facility Preparation and Planning

#### **CCPS** staff prepared for the storm, some examples include:

- Traveled school to school with dumpsters collecting potential missile hazards such as coconuts, wood and other debris on campus grounds and roofs
- Removed playground sunshade
- Installed all hurricane shutters
- Removed football field goal posts, banners, windscreens, tennis nets, batting cages, kicking nets, back-stop nets, and discus cages
- Stored all sporting equipment and loose playground equipment



## **Prior to the Storm – Preparation and Planning**

#### **CCPS** staff prepared for the storm, some examples include:

- Notified students of the cancellation of ACT testing for Saturday, September 9, 2017
- Received permission from state to delay Annual Financial Report (AFR) as well as the budget
- Cancelled Special Board meeting on September 11, 2017
- Cancelled/rescheduled regular board meeting on September 12, 2017 (post storm also rescheduled Board Work Session from September 17, 2017)
- Started regular communications with parents, staff, and community members



## Prior to the Storm - Preparation and Planning

#### Tuesday 9/5

- Cabinet meeting and iForum met to discuss and plan for hurricane
- Decision was made to close schools for 9/7 and 9/8

#### Wednesday 9/6

- All Principal meeting included shelter training
- At that time, 10 schools were set to open as shelters
- However, all Principals told they need to be available for shelter openings and pre and post storm support



### **Prior to the Storm – Preparation and planning**

#### Thursday 9/7

- iCAST with Principals, Facility Managers, Nutrition Service Managers.
   Created a system for quick reporting on schools post storms
  - Principals Do you have power, are the roads clear, can you open?
  - Facility/Nutrition Reporting power, food delivery, equipment damage, food loss, dumpster pick up needed
  - Reviewed processes for providing post storm photographic evidence for damage
- Radio check for all principals/cabinet from homes and schools
- Governor closed schools Friday 9/8 and Monday 9/11
- National Guard arrived and set up at Barron Collier High School
- Emergency Command Center (ECC) at Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Administrative Center set up for post storm recovery











# **Post Storm: Administrative Functions**

- Revised processes to track and monitor disaster recover: FEMA, Property Insurance including all documentation to maximize returns and minimize CCPS expenses
- Process payroll during the storm and post storm
- Training for all principals and other managers for entering payroll and handling all personnel hours
- Held an all principal debriefing meeting to capture the information related to serving as the primary shelters for the community





# Post Storm: Getting Ready for Students

### **All Schools**

- All classrooms and spaces were assessed and any needed repairs were completed or are underway
- Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) assessment is being completed by a contractor at each school site
- Cleanup of grounds is still in progress, disposal of waste and other items will continue on each campus
- All classrooms and spaces have been cleaned in the preparation of the reopening of schools
- School campuses will take time to recover and return to our usual status of operation
- Athletic facilities and playground equipment inspected

# **Academic Impacts**

- Due to school closures, traumatic experiences/recovery, adjustments to the academic calendar, a number of assessments, curriculum guides, and student activities have been adjusted
- Assessment considerations have been requested from the Florida Department of Education:
  - Extensions to state testing windows
  - Dispensation (1 year) from sanctions for one school under state oversight
  - Exclusion from NAEP and early calibration of state assessments
  - No issuance of school grades ("P" only) if school drops a letter grade or more in 2017-18

As a result of the effects of Hurricane Irma and a weather event on August 28th, Collier County Public Schools (CCPS) students have missed welve (12) instructional days. Students last attended school on September 6th with a planned return date of September 26th, Over half of our schools served as shelters.

A number of our students are facing extreme personal challenges due to Hurricane Irma, most significantly in the Everglades City, Immokalee and Golden Gate areas. These personal losses, compounded with the loss of school days, will most likely have consequences that may manifest themselves in psychological and cognitive under-performance. We have communicated with Lee County Public Schools to align the below and attached requests.

Collier County Public Schools (CCPS) is requesting the following:

- Extensions of state assessment windows as detailed on the attached chart (grade-level and subject-level specific)
- All English Language Arts (ELA) writing assessments be held during the state make-up writing window during the first week in April
- Waive all CCPS schools from early calibration administration, as well as NAEP test administrations
- Schools be assigned a "points only" (P) school letter grade for the 2017-18 school year in the event that the
  earned school letter grade is lower than that received in 2016-17
- The statutory requirements for mandatory retention at the 3rd grade be held in abeyance for the 2017-18 school year
- . Dispensation of potential sanctions for Village Oaks Elementary, the one (1) CCPS school under state oversight.

CCPS will not be submitting the uniform district assessment calendar to the FDOE by October 1, 2017, pending decisions on the above requests. The assessment calendar item is scheduled for the October 10, 2017, CCPS Board meeting acenda.

Thank you for your consideration during this difficult time. While we have made significant strides in the last several days, the recovery for our community will be significant and ongoing.

# **Fiscal Implications**

- CCPS Estimated Hurricane Irma costs more than \$10,000,000
- Districts need support for sheltering the population
  - Storm Hardening and Generators
  - Disaster Response Units and Other resources
- Increase capital insurance funding from \$100 to \$150/Full Time Equivalent
- Senate should address needs of most impacted Districts with capital allocation for repairs, hardening, shelter readiness
- Funding advance to Districts pending FEMA reimbursement at 75%

  - School safety




# **Financial Support**

Mental Health Supports in Schools

- Limited by Florida being ranked 49<sup>th</sup> in funding within the country
- Limited financial resources to fund mental health professionals (e.g., school psychologists)
- Available government and foundation grants require sustainability of funding - limits a school district's ability to apply and/or to maintain grant programs/services implemented


### Mental Health in Schools


- Children's mental health difficulties are associated with:

### Anxiety and Mood Disorders in 13-18 Year Olds







Children's' Statewide Involuntary Examination Increased Almost 50% in Five Years


Involuntary Examinations for 15 Fiscal Years for Children Only


### Hypotheses

  - Lessening of the stigma of mental illness

 Priority for schools to provide targeted and/or intensive general education academic, behavior, and social-emotional interventions for children to benefit from instruction

### School Professionals Supporting Student Emotional Needs

### Licensed and/or credentialed and qualified professionals



#### **School Counselors**

- •Respond to general needs of students providing prevention
- •Short-term solution based counseling during a life crisis (e.g., death, deportation, displacement, divorce, drugs)
- •School Counselors' professional credentials differ from licensed mental health counselors



#### School Psychologists

- Provide a range of psychological and behavioral assessments
- •Make available prevention, intervention, crisis response
- Deliver short-term solution based mental health counseling
- •Credentials of some school psychologists may not include the training to conduct therapeutic counseling



#### School Intervention Therapists (Social Workers)

- Provide long-term therapeutic counseling to students demonstrating a significant emotional/behavioral disability
- •Conduct psychosocial group intervention with these students (e.g., coping with stress, interpersonal skills, hygiene)
- •Provide case-management services; linking with local mental health resources

- National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI) of Collier through Health Under Guidance Systems (H.U.G.S.) provides assessments and referral services, and provided the Mental Health First Aid course to CCPS staff
