


- Composed of Four Divisions: Florida Highway Patrol, Motorist Services, Administrative Services, and Information Systems Administration.







Revenue Distributions





MOTORIST MODERNIZATION PROJECT

- Staged re-engineering and redevelopment effort of the motorist systems and processes to better serve and support our customers.

 - Phase III Licensing and Business Systems Support



FHP – DIGITAL IN-CAR CAMERA SYSTEMS

- Purchase 2,142 in-car camera units for FHP pursuit vehicle fleet.
- Procure Managed Service Solution for infrastructure that includes:
 - Unlimited video cloud storage
 - In-car camera hardware and video processing units
 - Auto redaction capabilities
 - Ability to share videos securely with internal and external entities
 - Options for technology refresh
 - Means to off-load or access videos remotely
- LBR Request: \$3.6 million



FHP TRAINING AND DORM FACILITY

- Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) Training Academy located at Florida Public Safety Institute (FPSI).
- Ensure adequate space to meet FHP training requirements and provide needed squarefootage to house FHP recruits and in-service lodging for FHP officers.
- LBR Request: \$12 million



FLORIDA LICENSING ON WHEELS PROGRAM

- The FLOW program is an integral part of our community outreach initiatives.
- Foster's partnerships with various agencies and providers to bring driver and motorist services to the communities/venues that show the greatest needs.
- Our 13 FLOW mobiles and a staff of 30 serve the entire state.
- LBR Request: \$423,854



FHP Recruitment and Retention

- Over the last 5 years, we have seen a upward trend in resignations.
- Over the last calendar year, more than 50% of FHP members resigned to take employment with other law enforcement agencies.
- The main reason is the starting salary at other law enforcement agencies is greater than the hiring rate for the Patrol of \$33,997. The FHP hiring rate hasn't been increased since 2005.
- We anticipate submitting a supplemental budget issue requesting salary increases for sworn officers.











STATE, FEDERAL AND TOLLS FORECAST




State Federal Aid Turnpike Tolls (Non-Turnpike)



TRENDS 5 YEAR HISTORY AND 5 YEAR FORECAST OF STATE REVENUES







First Some Perspective ...

While we are already seeing the early signs of decline in the viability of the motor fuel tax, what I will be speaking about today is primarily longer term problem. But since America relies so much on the gas tax for transportation funding it is appropriate that we begin to take "an early look" today.

The Motor Fuel Tax

- The motor fuel tax has been the primary source of funding for transportation for close to 100 years
 - It's simple and efficient, but
 - It's probably doomed to fail in the future!
- What's the problem?
 - It's a tax on fuel consumed; not miles driven
 - With continuing increases in fuel efficiency, and a coming shift to all electric vehicles, tax revenue will be decreasing while travel is increasing
- A notable policy contradiction: Transportation Funding is based on the taxation of a commodity that our nation is aggressively trying to discourage the use of: GASOLINE
 - Dramatically higher CAFE standards 54.3 MPG by 2025
- That's great for climate change and reduced dependence on foreign oil, but...
- It's an impending disaster for transportation funding if we stick to our current funding systems <u>over the long term</u>

The Trend Has Already Begun

- Average new car fuel efficiency increased 22% between 2008 and 2014
 - Has held relatively steady over the last year or so with lower gas prices
- The trend will accelerate as automakers try to achieve compliance with aggressive CAFE standards by 2025
- Perhaps the biggest impacts will come when fully electric vehicles become more viable and less costly
 - Expected to occur in the early-to-mid 2020's
 - Recent unprecedented "pre-order" of Tesla 3 suggests it could even be sooner



U.S. Energy Information Administration (EIA) Forecasting

- EIA Produces Annual 25-year forecasts of future energy consumption, including all forms of motor fuel
 - Most recent estimates May 2016
 - Projections extend from 2016-2040
- Most recent EIA national estimates used as benchmark in this analysis
 - Official national VMT growth forecast
 - Baseline "reference case" assumptions on changing average fuel efficiency by vehicle category
 - Actual estimates of motor fuel consumption


Estimated Light Vehicle Fuel Efficiency (MPG)





The Future Emergence of Electric Vehicles

- Battery performance increases and prices are coming down
- Bloomberg Energy estimates EV performance and price point will be comparable with ICE vehicles by around 2023
 - Estimates 35% of worldwide new auto sales will be fully electric vehicles by 2040
 - Higher than assumed by EIA
- Tesla 3 reaches this pivot point by end of 2017
 - 225 miles between charges
 - \$35,000 price
 - Over 400,00 people have already pre-ordered; won't get delivery until early 2018
- We Created 2 Additional Scenarios Of EV Penetration
 - Bloomberg forecast
 - More aggressive EV Penetration




Estimated Light Vehicle Fuel Efficiency (MPG)





Approximate State and Federal Fuel Tax Revenue 2015 Dollars; Assumes Nominal \$0.45/Gal. Combined Average Tax








How Much Might Increased Fuel Efficiency Hurt?




Florida VMT Trends and Projections




Estimated Florida Annual VMT and Fuel Sales Assuming No Change in Fuel Efficiency




Estimated Florida Annual VMT and Fuel Sales Assuming "EIA Ref. Case" MPG




Estimated Florida Annual VMT and Fuel Sales Assuming "High E.V. Sales" MPG




Approximate Florida Fuel Tax Revenue 2016 Dollars; Assumes Nominal \$0.355 / Gal. FL tax rate

Fuel Efficiency Scenario

Potential Solutions

- Keep raising the gas tax to overcome both inflation and increased fuel efficiency
 - FL gas tax alone will likely be over \$1.00 per gallon to do that by 2040
 - Increasing share of drivers will not be using fuel perhaps 1/3
- In the <u>short term</u>; Consider looking for additional sources of transportation revenue to supplement the gas tax
- Most logical <u>long term</u> solution is to shift from a "per gallon" basis to a "per mile" basis of revenue generation – some form of direct Road User Charging
 - Still 10-15 or more years out;
 - Many challenges which will need to be overcome
