OSS serves as a central repository for best practices, training standards and compliance oversight in all matters regarding school safety and security

Our mission:

Support districts in providing a safe learning environment for students and educators

Primary goals of the office:

- Prevention
- Intervention
- Emergency Preparedness Planning

Office of Safe Schools

- Aims to ensure school districts and schools are in compliance with the law
- Currently has statutory authority for oversight
- Does not serve to sanction, but focuses on providing technical assistance and guidance



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SB 7026 Update

Florida Safe Schools Assessment Tool (FSSAT)

- As required by s. 1006.1493, F.S., this risk assessment tool is used by school officials at each school district and public school site
- Helps identify threats, vulnerabilities and appropriate safety controls

Status of Compliance with FSSAT

- School assessments were due by **August 1, 2018** for all districts school sites – all are completed
- District assessments were due by **October 31, 2018** – all are completed

FSSAT Third Party Consultant Review

- Contract with a third party consultant
- MGT Consulting Group selected
- Updates anticipated in early 2019

Physical Security of School Buildings

- \$98,962,286 for grants to schools to fund fixed capital outlay costs associated with improving physical security of school buildings as identified by security risk assessment (FSSAT)
- Average award of \$27,467 per school
- Grant guidelines issued by FDOE August 21, 2018
- Application submission deadline December 1, 2018
- Grants awarded no later than January 15, 2019

School Safety Specialists

Senate Bill 7026 provided a requirement for each district school superintendent to designate a school administrator as a school safety specialist for the district.

The school safety specialist is responsible for the supervision and oversight for all school safety and security personnel, policies and procedures in the school district.

School Safety Specialists

- Per a survey of school districts, all report implementing active shooter training exercises at their schools
- All districts have reported that their school safety specialist coordinates with local public safety agencies

Training for School Safety Specialists

- August 24, 2018 – Invitation to Negotiate (ITN) for active shooter training released
- November 28, 2018 – ITN closed
- January, 2019 – vendor contract anticipated
- Training dates will be scheduled to maximize participation
- Six FEMA Independent Study courses have been identified as prerequisites

Active Shooter Training and Drills

- All school districts have indicated that they have procedures for emergency situations to include active assailant drills
- Active shooter training ranges from videos for students to law enforcement-led courses for staff
- Districts report that drills are conducted with first responder agencies
- The law requires that drills for active shooter be conducted at least as often as other emergency drills

Implementation of Active Shooter Drills

- School districts are conducting their active shooter training drills either monthly, quarterly or once per semester
- Some plan on smaller drills on a monthly basis and more in-depth and intensive exercises each semester
- All school districts are working with local agencies and first responders in planning for a response in the event of an active shooter

Establishing Threat Assessment Teams

- As required by s. 1006.07(7)(a), F.S., each school board shall adopt a policy and establish threat assessment teams at each school to:
 - Include persons with expertise in counseling, instruction, school administration and law enforcement.
 - Make determinations of a student posing a threat of violence to himself/herself or others, exhibiting significantly disruptive behavior or need for assistance

Establishing Threat Assessment Teams

- All districts reported that school-level threat assessment teams have been established
- Training for threat assessment teams is ongoing
- Teams meet monthly or as needed

Safe-School Officers Assigned

S. 1006.12, F.S. - ... each district school board and school districts superintendent shall partner with law enforcement agencies to establish or assign one or more safe-school officers at each school facility within the district

Safe-School Officer – Survey Responses

3,647 – Number of school facilities, to include charter schools

2,337 – Number of SROs assigned to schools

471 – Number of school safety officers assigned to schools

688 – Number of Coach Aaron Feis Guardians assigned to schools

3,496 – Total number of safe-school officers assigned

Coach Aaron Feis Guardian Program

- Currently, 25 sheriffs throughout Florida have agreed to train volunteers as guardians
- Application requests total approximately \$9,307,862.04
- \$2,587,865.10 has been paid out based on sheriffs' offices invoices

Centralized Integrated Data Repository

In May 2018, FDOE established three work groups that consist of members from the Department of Children and Families, Department of Law Enforcement, Department of Juvenile Justice, and Agency of Healthcare Administration.

- **Workgroup 1 (User and Data Governance)**: responsible for identifying data and access controls within the centralized system.
- **Workgroup 2 (Technology)**: responsible for recommending a technical solution, implementation strategy, and the sustainability plan for the centralized system.
- **Workgroup 3 (Legal)**: responsible for recommending data sharing agreements, procedures, and user access form.

Centralized Integrated Data Repository

- The Legal Workgroup is currently conducting a review of state and federal statutes to determine the ability and limitations of data sharing
- FDOE is currently evaluating existing data systems to determine if a system can be expanded to support the Centralized Integrated Data Repository, prior to developing a new system

Social Media Monitoring Tool

- The purpose of this Social Media Monitoring tool is to help school districts monitor threats of violence against students, employees, and schools
- The system will scan social media to identify signs of bullying, self-harm, or threats of violence against students, employees, and schools
- FDOE issued an Intent to Award to Abacode, LLC on December 10, 2018 and is working to finalize the contract process

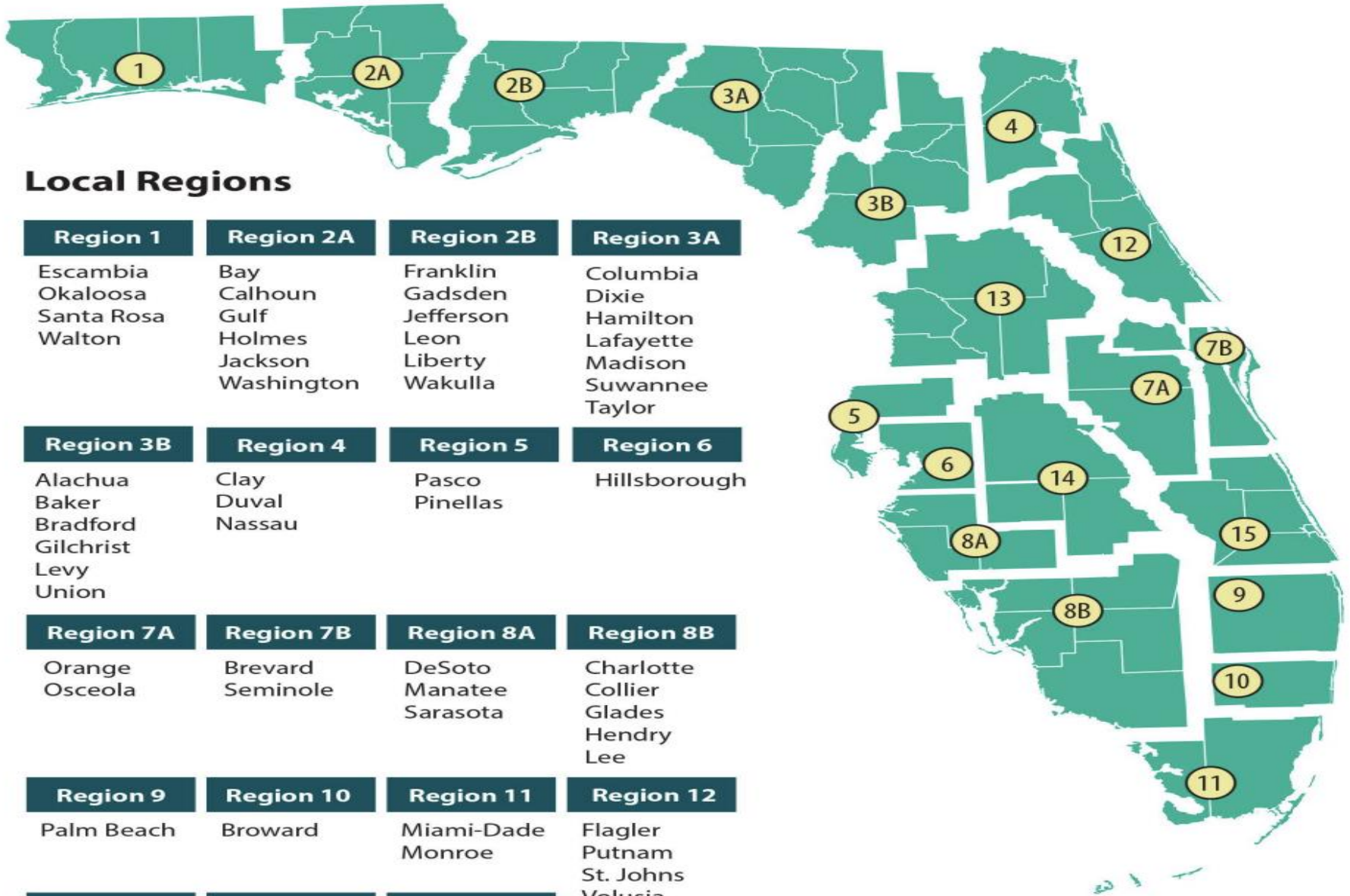

Youth Mental Health Awareness Training

- FDOE collaborated with the National Council for Behavioral Health (National Council) and Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).
- YMHFA, a program listed on SAMHSA's National Registry of Evidenced-based Programs and Practices Knowledge Network.
- FDOE collaborated with District School Safety Specialists and SEDNET representatives to facilitate and support districts' provisions of youth mental health training.
- FDOE collaborated with the National Council and established a 3 day YMHFA training program designed to train school district personnel in all Florida school districts as trainers.
- Since July 1, 2018, FDOE facilitated training for 295 nationally certified YMHFA trainers representing school districts in all 19 SEDNET regions throughout the state.
- FDOE collaborated with the National Council and established a 6 hour training option for school district personnel as "first-aiders."

Mental Health Assistance Allocation

- Plans must be focused on evidence-based mental health care treatment
- School districts shall submit approved plans, including approved plans of each charter school in the district, to the commissioner by August 1 of each fiscal year
- The department provided technical assistance to districts on June 1, 2018 and hosted regional meetings

Thank you Mr. Chairman for the opportunity to talk a little bit about the Pasco School District's School Safety Guard Program.

Pasco County Schools and the Pasco Sheriff's Office (as well as our municipal police departments) have historically had a strong relationship, and this relationship has only strengthened over the past year.

Pasco County Schools continues to partner with the Sheriff's Office and our municipalities to have the School Resource Officer model in our middle and high schools.

We elected to develop a School Safety Guard program in our elementary schools. The core concept of the School Safety Guard is based on three key functions: 1. safety and security of students, personnel, visitors and property; 2. mentorship; and 3. community relations. School Safety Guards are officially "guardians" under Senate Bill 7026 – but as more of a hybrid than a true guardian, as they are school employees hired for the specific purpose of school safety and security, not existing school employees who are given additional safety and security responsibilities. We envisioned the School Safety Guard as an "Officer Friendly" on our elementary campuses.

We hired for 49 positions in our elementary schools and 6 float School Safety Guards. In our first 3 days of advertising for School Safety Guards in May 2018, we received over 125 applications and had to shut the job advertisement down after only 2 ½ days. Subsequent job postings have also resulted in significantly more qualified candidates than we are able to hire.

Most of our applicants have been highly qualified, with extensive backgrounds in law enforcement, the military, Homeland Security, and other security professions.

Initially, we conducted interviews with a three person panel (one Sheriff's Office employee, one school based administrator, and one district based administrator). We interviewed the vast majority of our School Safety Guards with a Sheriff's Office employee as part of our interview panel.

Of our 55 School Safety Guards:

- 19 guards qualified for Veterans Preference
- 20 with previous Law Enforcement experience
- Majority have completed law enforcement training
- The School Safety Guards have an average of 21 ¼ years of related service

Over the summer of 2018, the School Safety Guards were trained by the Sheriff's Office much the same as deputies are trained, but they are not sworn law enforcement officers. This training included time in the classroom, time at the gun range, and in situation-based

exercises, including a simulated active threat and defensive tactics. Our district also felt that it was very important to teach the School Safety Guards about the student population they will serve, including students with special needs and students in poverty.

In addition to the School Safety Guards, the District hired our Director of School Safety and Security. This position fulfills the requirement that each district have a School Safety Specialist. Our director is a 24 year retired Marine Corps Veteran.

After a semester of having School Safety Guards as part of our school communities, we are very pleased. School Safety Guards have made a difference, both from a safety and security standpoint, and also in the lives of students. There have been situations where School Safety Guards have been the trusted adult to whom a student reports a child welfare concern. Overall, School Safety Guards are deeply embedded in their schools as a positive adult role model.
