I. Summary:

SB 64 designates the portion of I-295/E. Beltway 295 between Alta Drive and Pulaski Road in Duval County as "Officer Lance Christian Whitaker Highway" and directs the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to erect suitable markers.

The estimated cost to the FDOT to install the designation markers required under this bill is \$1,000. See Section V, "Fiscal Impact Statement," for details.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2019.

II. Present Situation:

Section 334.071, F.S., provides that legislative designations of transportation facilities are for honorary or memorial purposes, or to distinguish a particular facility. Such designations are not to be construed as requiring any action by local governments or private parties regarding the changing of any street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone number system listings, unless the legislation specifically provides for such changes.¹

When the Legislature establishes road or bridge designations, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is required to place markers only at the termini specified for each highway segment or bridge designated by the law creating the designation, and to erect any other markers it deems appropriate for the transportation facility.²

The FDOT may not erect the markers for honorary road or bridge designations unless the affected city or county commission enacts a resolution supporting the designation. When the

designated road or bridge segment is located in more than one city or county, each affected local government must pass resolutions supporting the designations before installation of the markers.³

Officer Lance Christian Whitaker

I. Summary:

SB 72 makes permanent the existing statutory obligation of the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to reimburse a county or another local governmental entity for the direct actual costs of operating the fire station at mile marker 63 on I-75/Alligator Alley, currently set to expire no later than June 30, 2019.

The fiscal impact of this bill is indeterminate. See Section V, "Fiscal Impact Statement," for details.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2019.

II. Present Situation:

Fire Station 63 on I-75/Alligator Alley

The Greater Naples Fire Rescue District currently provides fire, rescue, and emergency management services along I-75/Alligator Alley (the Alley). These services are provided at a facility located at the FDOT's rest area on the Alley at mile marker 63 (MM63).

Use of Alley Tolls to Fund Fire Station 63

Section 338.26, F.S., recites the Legislative finding that construction of the Alley, while facilitating connection between the east and west coasts of Florida, "has contributed to the

alteration of water flows in the Everglades and affected ecological patters of the historical southern Everglades." The Legislature therefore established a system of tolls on the Alley "to produce needed financial resources to help restore the natural resource values lost by construction of this highway." The statute sets forth the required uses of the fees generated from tolls for use of the Alley, which are deposited into the State Transportation Trust Fund. Fees must be used to reimburse outstanding contractual obligations and to operate and maintain the highway and toll facilities, including reconstruction and restoration.

Currently, related to the MM63 fire station on the Alley, the statute requires the fees to be used to reimburse a county or another local governmental entity for the direct actual costs of operating the MM63 fire station, which may be used to provide fire, rescue, and emergency management services to the public on the Alley. Reimbursement must be accomplished through an interlocal agreement, effective July 1, 2014, through no later than June 30, 2019.³

Fees may also be transferred to the Everglades Fund for certain environmental projects or may be pledged for revenue bonds or notes issued to pay for environmental projects in the area. Upon termination of the interlocal agreement for the fire station, the FDOT would be authorized to use the fees for the other required or authorized uses described above.

Toll Revenues and Expenses

According to the FDOT's 2017 Annual Report for its Enterprise Toll Operations,⁴ for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 through 2021-2022 the Alley will average \$36 million in gross toll revenue each year,⁵ with annual operating and maintenance expenses averaging \$10.2 million.⁶ The FDOT advises, as of December 31, 2018, outstanding bonds totaled \$17 million, with Fiscal Year 2019 debt service of \$8.4 million.⁷ The maintenance expenses include funding for rest area, safety, and lighting projects.⁸

The Interlocal Agreement for Fire Station 63

On May 9, 2014, the FDOT and the Board of Commissioners of Collier County entered into an interlocal agreement to provide the terms and conditions under which the FDOT would "provide funding to the County for the County's expenses in purchasing equipment, compensating County

employees, and otherwise providing fire, rescue, and emergency services utilizing the Fire Station."

The FDOT included the fire station in its construction project when it rebuilt the rest area at MM63, and the fire station opened in early 2015. 10 The fire station was built "for the exclusive use of the County for the duration of this Agreement." 11 The FDOT owns the fire station and leases it to the County. 12 However, under the agreement, "all equipment, personal property, vehicles, apparatus and supplies acquired by County with funding provided by DEPARTMENT...shall remain the property of County, notwithstanding any termination of this Agreement." 13

Funding in the Interlocal Agreement

For the term of the agreement, the FDOT agreed to provide a maximum of \$1,761,235 for direct actual capital costs and a maximum of \$1,498,100 for the county's direct actual costs of operating the fire station. ¹⁴ The County agreed to bear all expenses in excess of the FDOT's specified participation. ¹⁵ The agreed-upon funding includes various annual operating items such as hired paramedics and fire fighters; expenses for administrative and building maintenance; and expenses for bulk fuel and various types of search and rescue equipment. Capital costs include items such as vehicles, radios, and breathing air compressors. ¹⁶

Information regarding the FDOT's Adopted Five-Year Work Program reflects the following funding by specified fiscal year for the MM63 fire station.¹⁷

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill amends s. 338.26(3)(a), F.S., removing reference to the term of the interlocal agreement, thereby rendering permanent the FDOT's obligation to use Alligator Alley toll revenues to reimburse a local governmental entity for the direct actual costs of operating the fire station at MM63 on the Alley.

The bill also removes reference to use of the MM63 fire station by a "county or another" local governmental entity, leaving a local governmental entity, currently the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District, as the sole entity with permissive authority to use the fire station for provision of fire, rescue, and emergency management services to the public on the Alley.

The FDOT will be permanently obligated to continue funding the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District's direct actual costs of operating the MM63 fire station from the fees generated from tolls collected on the Alley. Under current law, the FDOT is authorized to use the fees for the other required or authorized uses described in the statute.

The Greater Naples Fire District will continue to receive funding, indefinitely, for direct actual operating and capital costs of operating the fire station, and thus will only have to expend funds for expenses above the costs agreed to in the interlocal agreement. The exact amount of such funding is unknown but will likely be based on an agreed-upon estimated schedule of expenses incorporated into a new interlocal agreement or extension of the current interlocal agreement, which expires on June 30, 2019.

VII. Related Issues:

The FDOT provided the following bond-related comments:

- An "open flow of funds," or the diversion of toll revenues to uses not associated with the debt, could negatively impact bond ratings.
- An open flow of funds "raises the risk evaluation and ratings due to the unpredictability of external influences changing the flow of funds over the term of a bond."
- "Legislative redirection of revenues could be interpreted as a negative change in structural protection because it is a flow of funds external to the debt on the tolled facility." ¹⁸

National rating agencies have given the most recent Alligator Alley bonds A+ or Aa3 ratings, with the outlook for the bonds being stable.¹⁹

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

The committee substitute (CS) for SB 76 amends s. 316.305, F.S., to rename the "Florida Ban on Texting While Driving Law" to the "Florida Driving While Distracted Law", and authorizes enforcement of a ban on driving while distracted as a primary offense punishable as a moving violation. Driving while distracted is defined to include a number of physical activities which cause driver distractions in addition to the handheld use of wireless communication devices while driving.

The CS allows for a statewide public education and awareness campaign, and allows law enforcement to issue verbal or written warnings leading up to full implementation of the law. In addition, the CS allows for the dismissal of first-time offenses under certain conditions, and if eligible, allows for the election to attend a distracted driving safety program to avoid penalties, costs, and points associated with a citation. It also requires that all penalties collected for a violation of the ban be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Emergency Medical Services Trust Fund of the Department of Health (DOH).

Due to the redistribution of penalty revenues, the bill will have an indeterminate fiscal impact to the General Revenue Fund, a number of state trust funds, the clerks of court, and municipalities. See Section V. Fiscal Impact Statement.

The CS takes effect July 1, 2019.

II. Present Situation:

Florida Ban on Texting While Driving Law

Section 316.305, F.S., is the "Florida Ban on Texting While Driving Law." It bans a person from operating a motor vehicle while using a wireless communications device¹ in specified ways. Enforcement is permitted only as a secondary action when an operator of a motor vehicle has been detained for a suspected violation of another provision of chapter 316, F.S., the "Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law," chapter 320, F.S., relating to motor vehicle licenses, or chapter 322, F.S., relating to driver licenses.

More specifically, the statute bans operation of a motor vehicle either while manually typing or entering multiple letters, numbers, symbols, or other characters into a wireless communications device or while sending or reading data on such a device for the purpose of non-voice interpersonal communication.² The ban does not apply to a stationary motor vehicle or to a motor vehicle operator who is:

- Performing official duties as an operator of an authorized emergency vehicle,³ a law enforcement or fire service professional, or an emergency medical services professional.
- Reporting an emergency or criminal or suspicious activity to law enforcement authorities.
- Receiving messages that are: related to the operation or navigation of the motor vehicle; safety-related information, including emergency, traffic, or weather alerts; data used primarily by the motor vehicle; or radio broadcasts.
- Using a device or system for navigation purposes.
- Conducting wireless interpersonal communication that does not require manual entry of
 multiple letters, numbers, or symbols, except to activate, deactivate, or initiate a feature or
 function.
- Conducting wireless interpersonal communication that does not require reading text messages, except to activate, deactivate, or initiate a feature or function.
- Operating an autonomous vehicle in autonomous mode.

Any person who violates the ban commits a noncriminal traffic infraction. A first violation is punishable as a nonmoving violation, and a second or subsequent violation within five years after the date of a prior conviction is punishable as a moving violation.

According to the HSMV, there were a total of 1,627 citations from both state and local law enforcement agencies for violation of s. 316.305, F.S. in calendar year 2017.⁴ Of those, 1,627

were for a first violation of the statute, and 27 were for a second or subsequent violation of the statute.

Drivers convicted of unlawful use of a wireless communications device that results in a crash will have six points assessed against their driver license,⁵ and drivers convicted of unlawful use of a wireless communications device within a school safety zone is assessed an additional two points.⁶

A user's billing records for a wireless communications device or the testimony of or written statements from appropriate authorities receiving such messages are admissible as evidence in any proceeding to determine whether a violation of the ban has been committed only in the event of a crash resulting in death or personal injury.

Texting While Driving Bans in Other States

As of April 2018, 47 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands ban text messaging for all drivers. In 43 States, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands texting laws are primary enforcement, and 4 States have secondary enforcement of texting for drivers.⁷

Hand-Held Device Bans in Other States

In 2016, there were 444 fatal crashes (with 486 fatalities) in the United States reported to have involved cell phone use as a distraction (14% of all fatal distraction-affected crashes). For these distraction-affected crashes, the police crash report stated that the driver was talking on, listening to, or engaged in some other cell phone activity at the time of the crash.⁸

There are negative implications associated with distracted driving - especially in conjunction with a crash. Survey research shows that self-reporting of negative behavior is lower than actual occurrence of that negative behavior. There is little reason to believe that self-reporting of distracted driving to a law enforcement officer would differ. The inference may be drawn that the reported occurrence of driver distraction during crashes is lower than the actual occurrence. Additionally, if a driver fatality occurs in the crash, law enforcement must rely on the crash investigation in order to report on whether driver distraction was involved, and they may not have information to indicate distraction.⁹

As of April 2018, using a hand-held device while driving violations are enforced as primary offenses in 16 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.¹⁰

Distracted Driving

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration defines distracted driving as any activity that diverts attention from the primary task of driving. ¹¹ Besides using electronic devices, distractions can also include adjusting a radio, eating and drinking, reading, grooming, and interacting with passengers. In 2016, distracted driving claimed 3,450 lives nationwide. ¹²

According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety research, it is not clear that banning hand-held cellphone use and texting reduces crashes. Even though research has documented that bans on hand-held cellphone use reduces overall cellphone use, crashes have increased in recent years, but overall cellphone use has not. The institute points out that drivers seem to be distracted by things other than cellphones, so prohibiting cellphone use alone does not appear to eliminate distracted driving. The institute concluded that broader countermeasures that keep drivers from becoming distracted or that mitigate the consequences of distracted driving, such as crash avoidance technology, may be more effective than cellphone bans.¹³

Both the District of Columbia¹⁴ and Ohio¹⁵ have distracted driver laws that encompass more than just the use of personal electronic devices.

Traffic Infraction Civil Penalties

Section 318.18, F.S., provides for penalties for traffic infractions and establishes a penalty of \$30 for a nonmoving traffic violation and \$60 for a moving violation. ¹⁶

Section 318.21, F.S., requires that all traffic infraction civil penalties be paid monthly as follows:

- One dollar from every civil penalty shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Child Welfare Training Trust Fund for child welfare training purposes.
- One dollar from every civil penalty shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Juvenile Justice Training Trust Fund for juvenile justice purposes.

• Of the remainder:

o Fifty-six and four-tenths percent: shall be divided if the violation occurred within a municipality, with 50.8 percent paid to that municipality and 5.6 percent deposited into the Fine and Forfeiture Trust Fund for use by the Clerks of the Circuit Court in performing court-related functions; shall be deposited into the Fine and Forfeiture Trust Fund for use by the Clerks of the Circuit Court in performing court-related functions if the violation occurred within the unincorporated area of a county; or shall be paid to a special improvement district of the Seminole Indian Tribe or Miccosukee Indian Tribe if the violation occurred there.

- Twenty and six-tenths percent shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the General Revenue Fund of the state, except that the first \$300,000 shall be deposited into the Grants and Donations Trust Fund in the Justice Administrative Commission for administrative costs, training costs, and costs associated with the implementation and maintenance of Florida foster care citizen review panels in a constitutional charter county.
- Seven and two-tenths percent shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit in the Emergency Medical Services Trust Fund.
- Five and one-tenth percent shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit in the Additional Court Cost Clearing Trust Fund for criminal justice purposes.
- Eight and two-tenths percent shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit in the Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Program Trust Fund.
- Two percent shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue and transmitted monthly to the Florida Endowment Foundation for Vocational Rehabilitation.
- o Five-tenths percent shall be paid to the Clerk of the Circuit Court for administrative costs.

Driver Improvement Schools

The HSMV has the authority to approve and regulate courses for driver improvement schools, including courses that use technology as a delivery method. ¹⁷ In determining whether to approve a course, the HSMV considers course content designed to promote safety, driver awareness, crash avoidance techniques, and other factors or criteria to improve driver performance from a safety viewpoint, including promoting motorcyclist, bicyclist, and pedestrian safety and risk factors resulting from driver attitude and irresponsible driver behaviors, such as speeding, running red lights and stop signs, and using electronic devices while driving. ¹⁸

In addition to regular course costs, an assessment of \$2.50 is collected for the driver improvement course from each person who elects to attend a course The course provider must remit the \$2.50 assessment to the HSMV for deposit into the Highway Safety Operating Trust Fund in order to receive unique course completion certificate numbers for course participants. The assessment fee is used to administer the program and to fund the general operations of the HSMV.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The CS renames the "Florida Ban on Texting While Driving Law" to the "Florida Driving While Distracted Law", and authorizes enforcement of a ban on driving while distracted as a primary offense. The CS provides for a period from October 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019, during which law enforcement officers have the authority to provide a verbal or written warning to those who are driving while distracted. After December 31, 2019 a uniform traffic citation may be issued for an infraction, which is punishable as a moving violation.

The CS expands the activities covered by the ban to include:

- Reading;
- Writing;
- Grooming;
- Applying beauty products;
- Interacting with pets and unsecured cargo;
- Using personal wireless communications devices; and
- Engaging in any other activity, conduct, task or actions which causes distractions.

The CS also defines "wireless communications device" as any handheld device that can receive or transmit text or character-based messages, record or view images, access or store data, connect to the Internet or a communications service, or allows text communications. To include, but not limited to:

- Cell Phone;
- Tablet;
- Laptop;
- Two-way Messaging Device; or
- Electronic Game

The term "wireless communications device" does not include, a safety, security, or convenience feature built into a motor vehicle that does not require the use of a handheld device.

The CS provides that in the event of a crash that results in a death or serious bodily injury, a user's billing records for a wireless communications device, or the testimony or written statement from authorities receiving such messages, may be admissible as evidence to determine whether a violation of the Florida Driving While Distracted Law has been committed.

The CS provides those who violate the ban and receive a citation for a first offense may elect to participate in a distracted driving safety program approved by the HSMV to have any penalties, associated costs, and points waived. The CS further provides those whose first citation is due to the use of a personal wireless communications device, may have the citation dismissed if they show proof of having purchased equipment that allows their personal wireless communications device to be used in a hands-free manner.

The CS also requires that all penalties collected for a violation of the ban on driving while distracted be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Emergency Medical

Services Trust Fund of the DOH. Currently, only seven and two-tenths percent of the penalties is deposited in this fund pursuant to s. 318.21(2), F.S.

The CS creates an unnumbered section of law which allows the HSMV, in consultation with the Department of Transportation to implement a statewide safety and public awareness campaign to prevent drivers from driving while distracted. The HSMV is authorized to contract with county, and local law enforcement agencies, safety councils, and public schools to assist with planning and conducting the statewide campaign.

The CS takes effect July 1, 2019.

Operators of motor vehicles who are driving while distracted will have an increased likelihood of being cited for a violation of the ban, with an increased likelihood of resulting penalties. In addition, with the first violation being changed from a nonmoving to a moving traffic violation, the base fine amount doubles from \$30 to \$60, along with 3 points being assessed against their driver license.

C. Government Sector Impact:

The Emergency Medical Services Trust Fund of the DOH will receive 100 percent of the driving while distracted civil penalty amount instead of the current 7.2 percent associated with the texting while driving civil penalty, and will have an indeterminate positive fiscal impact. The other current recipients will no longer receive any of the texting while driving penalty revenues, resulting in an indeterminate negative fiscal impact to the following:

- Child Welfare Training Trust Fund;
- Juvenile Justice Training Trust Fund;
- Municipalities;
- Circuit Court Clerks/Fine and Forfeiture Trust Fund;
- General Revenue Fund;
- Additional Court Cost Clearing Trust Fund;
- Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Program Trust Fund;

CS by Infrastructure and Security on February 19, 2019:

The CS changes the "relating to" clause of the bill to "an act relating to driving while distracted," and adds numerous provisions to the bill. The CS:

- Expands the bill to include multiple forms of driving distracted;
- Renames a section of statute Driving while Distracted prohibition;
- Renames a statute section citation title to "Florida Driving While Distracted Law";
- Defines the term "driving while distracted";
- Defines the term "wireless communications device";
- Allows law enforcement to issue citations to distracted drivers as a primary offense after December 1, 2019;

 Changes the first offense from a nonmoving violation, to a moving violation and provides an option to avoid points and penalties through participation in a distracted driving safety program;

- Allows that an operators first citation due to use of personal wireless communications device may be dismissed if they show proof of having purchased equipment that allows their personal wireless communications device to be used in a hands-free manner;
- Allows a user's billing records for wireless communications device to be admissible
 as evidence in the event a crash results in "death or serious bodily injury", current law
 allows admissibility when a crash results in "death or personal injury";
- Allows for use of wireless communications device in hands-free or voice operated mode:
- Provides for a warning period from October 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019;
- Provides that the HSMV may implement a safety and public awareness campaign;
- Directs all fines collected to be deposited in the Emergency Medical Services Trust Fund of the DOH.

Section 1. Section 316.305, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

316.305 Driving while distracted Wireless communications devices; prohibition.-

(1) This section may be cited as the "Florida Driving $\frac{Ban}{A}$ on Texting While Distracted Driving Law."

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- (2) For purposes of this section, the term:
- (a) "Driving while distracted" means the inattentive operation of a motor vehicle. Inattentive or distracted driving conduct includes reading, writing, performing personal grooming, applying a beauty aid or similar products, interacting with pets or unsecured cargo, using a personal wireless communications device, or engaging in any other activity, conduct, task, or action that causes distraction.
- (b) "Wireless communications device" means any handheld device that is designed or intended to receive or transmit textor character-based messages, to record or view images, to access or store data, or to connect to the Internet or any communications service, as defined in s. 812.15, or which allows text communications. The term includes, but is not limited to, a cell phone, a tablet, a laptop, a two-way messaging device, or an electronic game that is used or capable of being used in a handheld manner. The term does not include a safety, security, or convenience feature built into a motor vehicle which does not require the use of a handheld device.
 - (3) (2) It is the intent of the Legislature to:
- (a) Improve roadway safety for all vehicle operators, vehicle passengers, bicyclists, pedestrians, and other road users.
- (b) Prevent crashes related to the act of driving while distracted when operating text messaging while driving a motor vehicle.
- (c) Reduce injuries, deaths, property damage, health care costs, health insurance rates, and automobile insurance rates related to motor vehicle crashes.

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- (d) Authorize law enforcement officers to stop motor vehicles and issue citations as a secondary offense to persons who are texting while driving while distracted.
- (4) + (3) (a) A person may not operate a motor vehicle when driving while distracted while manually typing or entering multiple letters, numbers, symbols, or other characters into a wireless communications device or while sending or reading data on such a device for the purpose of nonvoice interpersonal communication, including, but not limited to, communication methods known as texting, e-mailing, and instant messaging. As used in this section, the term "wireless communications device" means any handheld device used or capable of being used in a handheld manner, that is designed or intended to receive or transmit text or character-based messages, access or store data, or connect to the Internet or any communications service as defined in s. 812.15 and that allows text communications. For the purposes of this paragraph, a motor vehicle that is stationary is not being operated and is not subject to the prohibition in this paragraph.
- (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to a motor vehicle operator who is:
- 1. Performing official duties as an operator of an authorized emergency vehicle as defined in s. 322.01, a law enforcement or fire service professional, or an emergency medical services professional.

I. Summary:

SB 116 modifies the type and degree of violation, from a misdemeanor of the first degree to a felony of the third degree, for a third or subsequent violation of the racing on highways statute within 5 years after the date of a prior violation that resulted in a conviction of the same statute.

II. Present Situation:

Drag racing is a type of illegal street racing and originated in California's Mojave Desert in the early 1930s. Unlike racetracks, illegal street racing is often done on public roads and results in spectators standing very close to vehicles involved in the race. Because of the dangers involved in street racing, many states have enacted laws regulating or prohibiting it.

Florida enacted its street racing law in 1971, now codified in s. 316.191, F.S., titled "Racing on highways." Section 316.191(2), F.S., provides that a person may not:

- Drive any motor vehicle, including any motorcycle, in any race,³ speed competition or contest, drag race⁴ or acceleration contest, test of physical endurance, or exhibition of speed or acceleration or for the purpose of making a speed record on any highway, roadway, or parking lot;
- In any manner participate in, coordinate, facilitate, or collect moneys at any location for any such race, competition, contest, test, or exhibition;
- Knowingly ride as a passenger in any such race, competition, contest, test, or exhibition; or
- Purposefully cause the movement of traffic to slow or stop for any such race, competition, contest, test, or exhibition.

The offense for violating one of the above provisions is a first-degree misdemeanor.⁵ The statute also requires the imposition of a fine of not less than \$500 and not more than \$1,000, and the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (HSMV) may revoke the violator's driver's license for one year, although a "hardship" hearing may be requested pursuant to s. 322.271, F.S.⁶

If the violator commits the unlawful racing violation within five years after the date of a prior unlawful racing violation that resulted in a conviction, the violator still commits a first-degree misdemeanor and must pay a fine of not less than \$1000 and not more than \$3,000. However, the violator's driver's license is revoked for two years, and a "hardship" hearing may be requested pursuant to s. 322.271, F.S.⁷

If the violator commits a third or subsequent unlawful racing violation within five years after the date of a prior unlawful racing violation that resulted in a conviction, the violator still commits a first-degree misdemeanor and must pay a fine of not less than \$2000 and not more than \$5,000.

However, the violator's driver's license is revoked for four years, and a "hardship" hearing may be requested pursuant to s. 322.271, F.S.⁸

Also, the court must be provided with a copy of the violator's driving record in any case charging a person with a violation of the statute. The statute authorizes a law enforcement officer to immediately arrest violators and take them into custody, and authorizes the court to enter an order of impoundment or immobilization of the motor vehicle as a condition of incarceration or probation. The statute requires the impounding agency to release the motor vehicle under certain conditions related to: stolen vehicles; vehicles purchased after an offense; situations where the family of the violator has no other means of transportation; and vehicles operated solely by the employees of a violator or any business owned by the violator. The violator of the violator.

The statute requires the owner or person leasing or renting the vehicle to pay costs and fees for the impoundment or immobilization, unless the impoundment or immobilization order is dismissed.¹¹

The statute provides that any motor vehicle that was used in unlawful racing may be impounded for 30 business days, if the person who is arrested and taken into custody for the unlawful racing is the registered owner or co-owner of the vehicle. The law enforcement officer shall notify the HSMV of the impoundment.¹² Additionally, any motor vehicle used for unlawful racing by a person within five years after the date of a prior conviction of that person for unlawful racing may be seized and forfeited as provided by the Florida Contraband Forfeiture Act, if the owner of the vehicle is the person charged with unlawful racing.¹³

The statute specifies that it does not apply to licensed or duly authorized racetracks, drag strips, or other designated areas set aside by proper authorities for such purposes.¹⁴

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill modifies the type and degree of violation, from a misdemeanor of the first degree to a felony of the third degree¹⁵, for a third or subsequent violation of the racing on highways statute within five years after the date of a prior violation that resulted in a conviction of the same statute.

The bill also provides that this conviction for a felony of the third degree is to be punishable pursuant to s. 775.084, F.S., in addition to being punishable under ss. 775.082, and 775.083, F.S. Under s. 775.084, F.S., if the court determines that the defendant is:

• a habitual felony offender, the court may impose a sentence for a term not exceeding ten years;

• a habitual violent felony offender, the court may impose a sentence for a term not exceeding ten years, and such offender shall not be eligible for release for five years;

- a three-time violent felony offender, the court must impose a sentence for a term not exceeding fifteen years; and
- a violent career criminal, the court must impose a sentence for a term not exceeding fifteen years, with a mandatory minimum term of ten years.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

In Florida, a "heavy truck" is defined as any motor vehicle with a net vehicle weight of more than 5,000 pounds that is designed or used for the carriage of goods. Most motor vehicle registrations are renewed during the primary registrant's birth month; however, since 1983 the registrations of all heavy trucks have been required to be renewed in December.

The committee substitute (CS) to SB 234 changes, effective September 1, 2020, the date of registration renewals for heavy trucks in the 5,001 to 7,999 pound weight classification that are registered to natural persons from December to the registrant's date of birth. The Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (HSMV) is directed to develop a methodology to prorate heavy truck registration renewal fees to implement this transition to birth-month registration periods, which must give customers the option to renew their registrations on their dates of birth in 2021 or 2022.

Currently, the surviving spouse of a deceased registered owner of a motor vehicle who requests a registration certificate and transfer of the registration license plate from the deceased spouse to the surviving spouse must submit an application and present the decedent's death certificate to the HSMV or tax collector's office. Similarly, a death certificate is required in order to transfer a vessel title from a deceased title owner in the event there is not a probated last will and testament or letters of administration.

The CS allows electronic file of death records maintained by the Department of Health, in lieu of a death certificate, to be used for a motor vehicle registration or vessel title transfer.

The CS has a non-recurring positive impact on state revenue. See Fiscal Analysis for more details.

II. Present Situation:

Registration of Heavy Trucks

Motor vehicles subject to registration under s. 320.08, F.S., can be renewed at a HSMV service center, a tax collector's office, or via the HSMV's Virtual Office website. Heavy trucks are a category of motor vehicle that must be registered and renewed. A "heavy truck" is defined as:

Any motor vehicle with a net vehicle weight of more than 5,000 pounds, which is registered on the basis of gross vehicle weight in accordance with s. 320.08(4), and which is designed or used for the carriage of goods or designed or equipped with a connecting device for the purpose of drawing a trailer that is attached or coupled thereto by means of such connecting device and includes any such motor vehicle to which has been added a cabinet box, a platform, a rack, or other equipment for the purpose of carrying goods other than the personal effects of the passengers.¹

Heavy trucks in the 5,001 to 7,999 weight range can renew their registration for 12 or 24 months.² Most motor vehicles are renewed during the primary registrant's birth month;³ however, since 1983 all heavy trucks have been required to be renewed in December.⁴ Some specific examples of heavy trucks that fall into the 5,001 to 7,999 gross vehicle weight (GVW) classification are the Chevrolet Silverado, Ford F-250, Ford F-350, Nissan Titan, Dodge Ram, and GMC Sierra.⁵

Approximately 11.4 percent (87,324) of heavy trucks in the 5,001 to 7,999 GVW classification are registered to businesses that do not have a birth month.⁶ Approximately 88.6 percent (678,676) of heavy trucks in the 5,001 to 7,999 GVW classification are registered to individuals who likely have a birth month other than December.⁷ Based on transaction volume, 84 percent of the renewal transactions in fiscal year 2017-2018 occurred in person in tax collector offices, causing more customers to come into the offices in December.⁸ Additionally, individuals who own both a heavy truck and another classification of vehicle, vessel, or trailer, must renew during their birth month and again in December.

Heavy trucks weighing 5,001 to 5,999 pounds have a registration renewal fee of \$60.75,9 while heavy trucks weighing 6,000 to 7,999 pounds have a registration renewal fee of \$87.75.10

A registrant of any motor vehicle registered in Florida can renew his or her registration any time during the three months preceding the date of expiration of the registration period.¹¹

Transfer of Registration and Title from a Deceased Person

The surviving spouse of a deceased registered owner of a motor vehicle who requests a registration certificate and transfer of the registration license plate from the deceased spouse to the surviving spouse must submit an application¹² and present the decedent's death certificate to the tax collector's office or the HSMV.¹³ The surviving spouse must also provide a marriage certificate (unless the name of the surviving spouse is on the death certificate) and proof of identity.¹⁴

If a surviving spouse does not bring an original copy of the deceased spouse's death certificate to the tax collector's office or the HSMV, the registration certificate and license plate cannot be transferred into the name of the surviving spouse. Instead, the surviving spouse must leave the office, retrieve the death certificate, and make another trip back to the tax collector's office or HSMV to produce the document.

The new owner or surviving owner of a vessel who wants to transfer the title from a deceased title owner must submit an application along with the original certificate of title and the decedent's probated last will and testament or letters of administration appointing the personal representative. If the probated will and letters of administration are unavailable, the surviving owner may provide a copy of the decedent's death certificate, a copy of the decedent's last will and testament, and an affidavit by the decedent's surviving spouse or heirs affirming rights of ownership may be accepted by the HSMV.¹⁵

If the new owner or surviving owner of a vessel does not bring the decedent's probated last will and testament or letters of administration, the individual must bring a copy of the decedent's death certificate. If the individual does not have a copy of the death certificate, he or she will not be able to transfer the title and will have to make a return visit to the tax collector's office or the HSMV in order to produce the document.

Currently, tax collectors are unable to print death certificates within their offices. After consulting with the Department of Health (DOH), the HSMV and the tax collectors have identified certain death records maintained by the DOH and available electronically to tax

collectors that would enable tax collectors to verify, in lieu of a death certificate, the status of the deceased vehicle or vessel owner.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Registration of Heavy Trucks

Effective September 1, 2020, the CS amends s. 320.055, F.S., changing the date of heavy truck renewals for trucks weighing 5,001 to 7,999 pounds and registered to natural persons, from December to the registrant's date of birth. Businesses registering heavy trucks weighing 5,001 to 7,999 pounds would continue to register their vehicles in December. Similarly, all owners of heavy trucks weighing 8,000 pounds or more would continue to register their vehicles in December.

The CS provides that in order to implement the change in renewal dates, the HSMV must develop methodology to prorate registration renewal fees for applicable motor vehicles. The methodology will give customers the option to renew their registration on their date of birth in 2021 or 2022. Customers whose dates of birth occur in the months of January through June may choose to renew for one to 18 months, and customers whose dates of birth occur in the months of July through December may choose to renew for seven to 24 months. The CS specifies that proration is limited to the renewal of an unexpired registration or a registration that has been expired for no more than 30 days.

The methodology that HSMV is currently reviewing to minimize the fiscal impact based on prorating the registration is a monthly prorated cost of \$5.06 for each month over or under the traditional 12 month renewal period for a heavy truck with a GVW of 5,001 to 6,000, and a monthly prorated cost of \$7.31 for each month over or under the traditional 12 month renewal period for a heavy truck with a GVW of 6,001 to 7,999.¹⁶

Transfer of Registration and Title from a Deceased Person

Effective July 1, 2019, the CS amends ss. 320.0609 and 328.01, F.S., allowing for the utilization of an electronic file of death record maintained by the DOH in lieu of a death certificate for a motor vehicle registration or vessel title transfer.

The CS provides technical and conforming changes in ss. 320.07 and 320.0705, F.S.

After September 2020, heavy truck registrants will have the option to renew their registration on their date of birth in 2021 or 2022. Customers whose dates of birth occur in the months of January through June may choose to renew for 1 to 18 months, and customers whose dates of birth occur in the months of July through December may choose to renew for 7 to 24 months.

C. Government Sector Impact:

The CS includes a methodology that prorates the applicable motor vehicle registration renewal fee and transitions heavy truck owners with trucks weighing between 5,001 and 7,999 pounds to a new renewal period based on their birth month.

The Revenue Estimating Conference (REC) met on January 18, 2019, and considered a similar provision prorating registration renewals for specified motor vehicles. In calculating the fiscal impact, the REC assumed customers would elect to maximize the duration of the renewal period, effectively paying more for a longer renewal period. The REC calculated there will be a positive, non-recurring impact of \$1.6 million in revenue (\$416,439 to the General Revenue Fund and approximately \$1.2 million to the State Transportation Trust Fund) for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

The HSMV estimates that 459 hours will be required for programming and implementation. These hours are estimated to have a fiscal impact to the HSMV of \$25,305 in FTE and contracted resources. However, all expenses will be absorbed within existing resources.

The HSMV and the tax collectors may incur expenses related to public awareness and education efforts relating to the changes in heavy truck registration renewal dates. However, all expenses will be either offset by reducing the number of additional inperson customer trips to tax collector offices in December or absorbed within existing resources.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

The committee substitute (CS) to SB 252 authorizes the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (HSMV) to collect, for the Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation, a voluntary contribution of \$1 or more per applicant through the motor vehicle registration application form.

The CS removes the requirement that the HSMV application form for motor vehicle registration and renewal of registration include language for a voluntary contribution of \$1 or more per applicant through the motor vehicle registration application form for the Auto Club Group Traffic Safety Foundation, Inc.

The CS has an insignificant fiscal impact.

II. Present Situation:

Motor Vehicle Registration Voluntary Contributions

The application form for motor vehicle registration provides a voluntary contributions section that allows applicants the opportunity to make a donation by checking a box on the form.¹

¹ Sections 320.02(16), F.S., provide motor vehicle registration applicants with 21 options for voluntary contributions.

The Florida Statutes specifically authorize which organizations can receive a voluntary contribution. Section 320.023, F.S., establishes the requirements for organizations seeking to establish a voluntary contribution on motor vehicle registration application forms. It requires:

- A request for the particular voluntary contribution being sought, describing the proposed voluntary contribution in general terms;
- An application fee², not to exceed \$10,000 to defray the department's cost for reviewing the application and developing the voluntary contribution checkoff, if authorized;
- A marketing strategy outlining short-term and long-term marketing plans for the requested voluntary contribution; and
- A financial analysis outlining the anticipated revenues and the planned expenditures of the revenues to be derived from the voluntary contribution.

This information must be submitted to the HSMV at least 90 days before the next regular session of the Legislature convenes.

Section 320.023, F.S., also establishes a threshold for discontinuation of the voluntary contribution and oversight for organizations approved for a voluntary contribution on motor vehicle registration application forms. It requires:

- The HSMV include any voluntary contributions approved by the Legislature on the motor vehicle application form;
- The HSMV must discontinue the voluntary contribution if:
 - o Less than \$25,000 has been contributed by the end of the 5th year; or
 - o Less than \$25,000 is contributed during any subsequent five-year period.
- That any voluntary contribution, or any interest earned from those contributions may not be used for commercial or for-profit activities or for general or administrative expenses;
- That an organization submit their audit's to the HSMV for review to determine if any
 voluntary contribution, or any interest earned from those contributions were used for
 commercial or for-profit activities or for general or administrative expenses;
- The HSMV is provided the authority to examine all records pertaining to the use of funds from the voluntary contributions authorized; and
- All organizations that operate under the Solicitation of Contributions Act, as provided in Chapter 496, F.S., must do so before funds may be distributed.

Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation

The Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation was founded in 2013³ to promote and increase community awareness of childhood cancers and disease and the need for research and development of medical treatments for children through the dissemination of information to the general public; to use funds to support such activities; and to make grants, loans or other distributions. The Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation is named after Bella

Rodriguez-Torres, who passed away at the age of 10 from pediatric cancer. Their mission is to help children with cancer maintain a love for life. As of September 2017 the Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation has served families in 44 states and 11 countries, having surpassed \$4 million in donations. To date, donations have been used for on-going research, memorial support, compassionate use, and in-treatment support.⁵

Pediatric Cancer Research

According to the National Cancer Institute, cancer remains the leading cause of death from disease among children. The most common types of cancer diagnosed in children ages 0 to 14 years, are:

- Leukemia;
- Brain and other central nervous system (CNS) tumors; and
- Lymphoma.⁶

Pediatric cancer death rates have declined by 65 percent from 1970 to 2016;⁷ however, even when long-term survival is achieved, many survivors of childhood cancer may experience long-term adverse effects from the disease or its treatment. Research is needed to develop treatments for childhood cancer that are more effective and safe for children.⁸

Pediatric cancer is relatively uncommon, representing less than one percent of all new cases of cancer diagnosed in the United States each year. This presents a major challenge in conducting pediatric cancer research, as clinical trials are increasingly restricted to smaller numbers of patients who are defined by the molecular characteristics of their tumors, rather than where the tumors originated in the body, collaboration among children's cancer centers and a strong national clinical research program will continue to be essential to ensure that trials enroll sufficient numbers of participants to produce meaningful results.⁹

Securing adequate funding to support pediatric cancer research and clinical trials is a challenge. In 2017, pediatric cancer research awarded by the National Institutes of Health totaled approximately \$220 million, ¹⁰ which represented only 2.5 percent of the total funding allocated

for research.¹¹ Florida received a fraction of the total amount awarded for pediatric cancer research with only \$10,256,609 awarded to Florida-based institutions in 2017.¹²

Auto Club Group Traffic Safety Foundation, Inc.

Effective October 1, 2011, Tampa-based AAA Auto Club South and Dearborn, Michigan-based, The Auto Club Group, affiliated and combined operations. ¹³ The enterprise is known as The AAA - Auto Club Group and provides membership, travel, insurance, and financial services to members in 11 states and two United States territories, which include Florida. ¹⁴

The Auto Club Group Traffic Safety Foundation, Inc. was founded in 2010, as a nonprofit corporation under s. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code¹⁵, as a unit of the AAA – The Auto Club Group. In 2013 a \$1 voluntary contribution check-off on an application form for an original, renewal, or replacement driver's license or identification card was added for the Auto Club Group Traffic Safety Foundation, Inc. Funds received by the foundation were to be used to improve traffic safety culture in communities through effective outreach, education, and activities in the state designed to save lives, reduce injuries, and prevent crashes.¹⁶

The AAA – The Auto Club Group is winding down the operations of the Auto Club Group Traffic Safety Foundation, Inc., and plans to dissolve the entity with an effective date no later than January 1, 2020.¹⁷

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The CS authorizes the HSMV to include language permitting a voluntary contribution of \$1 or more per application to the Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation on the form for motor vehicle registration. Such contributions will be distributed by the HSMV to the Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation.

The CS notwithstands s. 320.023(1) and (2), F.S., which covers the application process and \$10,000 application fee to establish a voluntary checkoff on the motor vehicle registration application, and the requirement that if the voluntary contribution is not approved by the Legislature, the application fee would be refunded to the applicant.

I. Summary:

SB 404 creates the Florida Strategic Fuel Reserve Task Force (task force) within the Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM) to develop a recommended strategic fuel reserve plan for the state to respond to private and public fuel needs in the event of an emergency or disaster. The FDEM must provide administrative and support services relating to the functions of the task force.

The Governor, President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Representatives must each appoint three persons to sit on the nine member task force. The task force must elect a chair and vice chair and submit a recommended strategic fuel reserve plan to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by April 30, 2020. The task force terminates on June 30, 2020.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2019.

II. Present Situation:

Florida Division of Emergency Management

The FDEM administers programs to rapidly apply all available aid to impacted communities stricken by emergency. The FDEM is responsible for maintaining a comprehensive statewide program of emergency management to ensure that Florida is prepared to respond to emergencies, recover from them, and mitigate against their impacts. In doing so, the FDEM coordinates efforts with and among the federal government, other state agencies, local governments, school boards,

and private agencies that have a role in emergency management.² The FDEM is organized by functional area to include the bureaus of Mitigation, Preparedness, Response, and Recovery.

State Emergency Response Team

The State Emergency Response Team (SERT) serves as the primary operational mechanism through which state assistance to local governments is managed.³ To facilitate effective operations, the SERT is organized into 18 groups called Emergency Support Functions (ESF).⁴ Each ESF focuses on a specific mission area and is led by a representative from the state agency that best reflects the authorities, resources, and capabilities of the ESF.

Emergency Support Function 12 – Fuels

The purpose of ESF 12 (Fuels) is to promulgate the policies and procedures to be used by partner agencies in responding to and recovering from shortages and disruptions in the supply and delivery of transportation fuels, electricity, natural gas, and other forms of energy and fuels that, impact or threaten, significant numbers of citizens and visitors. The primary agencies providing leadership to ESF 12 are the Public Service Commission and the FDEM. Partner agencies in ESF 12 include, but are not limited to, the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Florida Department of Health, Florida Department of Management Services, Florida Department of Transportation, Florida National Guard, Florida Petroleum Council, Florida Petroleum Marketers Association, Florida Propane Association, Florida Trucking Association, and other industry trade groups and associations.⁵

Operations in ESF 12 involve close coordination with private sector providers of energy and transportation fuels such as propane, fuel oil, diesel fuel, and gasoline. The FDEM is primarily responsible for monitoring and coordinating with private sector suppliers of such fuels to ensure that adequate supplies of other energy and transportation fuels are available and deliverable for normal community functioning.⁶ Energy planners from the FDEM Bureaus of Response and Preparedness work alongside ESF 12 prior to an emergency or disaster to develop and maintain plans and procedures to ensure an adequate supply of fuels to support emergency response and recovery operations.⁷

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill creates the Florida Strategic Fuel Reserve Task Force within the FDEM to develop a recommended strategic fuel reserve plan for the state to respond to private and public fuel needs in the event of an emergency or disaster, as defined in s. 252.34, F.S. The FDEM must provide administrative and support services relating to the functions of the task force.
