Senate Higher Education Appropriations – Budget Conforming Issues for 2012-13

- Bright Futures FAFSA:
 - Clarifies that annual submission is required.
 - Provides for an alternative form.
- Bright Futures Spring/Summer Cohort Pilot:
 - Clarifies that only two semester of funding are allowed.
- Bright Futures Award Alternatives:
 - Authorizes an additional supplement for upper division STEM fields.
- Bright Futures Time to Enroll:
 - Allows up to 2 years after high school graduation rather than 3 years.
- Bright Futures Gold Seal:
 - Limits Gold Seal to job-related career programs.
- Requires coalitions to maximize purchasing power for higher education institutions.
- Authorizes Oversight Responsibilities for Division of Florida Colleges Regarding Colleges with Potential Management and Academic Issues.
- Requires Boards of Trustees of Colleges and Universities to Conduct a Public Audit Overview During a Board Meeting if the Audit Contains Significant Findings.
- Requires the Auditor General to notify the Joint Legislative Auditing Committee of any audit review which indicates that a state university or state college has failed to take corrective action in response to a recommendation which was included in the two preceding audit reports. The committee may take appropriate action as required including further written documentation from the governing body, committee appearance and testimony, and financial penalties.
- Authorizes the BOG to approve transfer of unused budget authority from E&G Student and Other Fees Trust Fund.

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<u>Florida Polytechnic University – Creation Legislation</u> Senate Higher Education Appropriations Conforming Bill 2012

The bill:

- Creates the Florida Polytechnic University in statute. The new university is completely independent and autonomous. All laws governing a university will apply, including establishment of a board of trustees and a president.
- Requires Florida Polytechnic University to meet the milestones in the Board of Governor's motion by December 31, 2016.
- Requires the University of South Florida (USF) to allow current USF Polytechnic students to complete their degree at USF.
- Transfers real and personal property, licenses and associated revenues, existing contracts, unexpended balances, appropriations, allocations, and other funds of USF Polytechnic to Florida Polytechnic University.
- Requires USF to retain the current faculty and staff.
- Allows Florida Polytechnic University to decide on faculty and staff for the new institution.
- Requires USF to transfer Polytechnic-related foundation funds to a new Florida Polytechnic University foundation.
- Cancels all memorandums of understanding between USF and USF Polytechnic upon this act becoming law.
- Authorizes a university board of trustees to expend reserve or carry-forward balances from prior year operational and programmatic appropriations for legislatively approved fixed capital outlay projects authorized for the establishment of a new campus.
- Requires Florida Polytechnic University to transfer space at the Lakeland joint-use facility to Polk State College as new space becomes available on the new campus of Florida Polytechnic University.
- Authorizes the University of Florida to serve in an advisory/consulting capacity to the new university on certain issues.
- Corrects cross references.
