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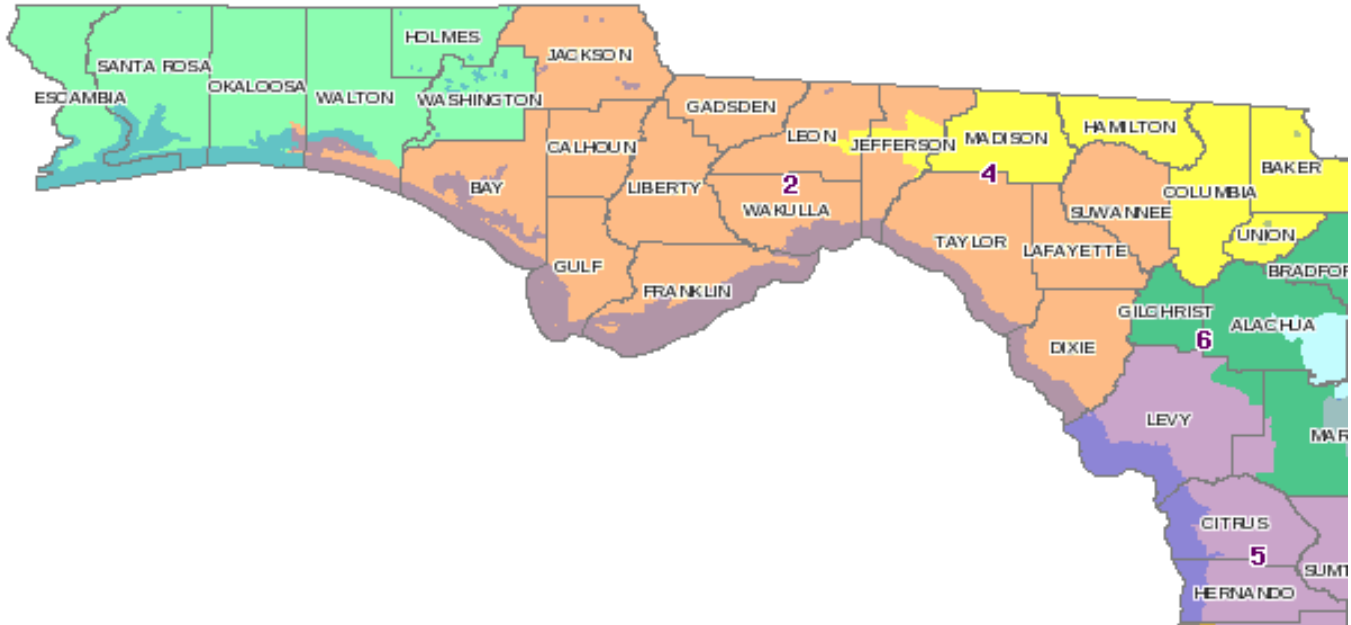
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This packet includes a map of the Panhandle region for each plan listed above, along with a description of the plan, a table of Census statistics, comments or testimony from the author of the map, and comments from the professional staff of the Senate Committee on Reapportionment.

The following statistics are reported for northwest Florida districts and for the share of each county in such districts: total population, voting age population, Black voting age population (and percentage), and Hispanic voting age population (and percentage). For these reports persons who identified themselves as both Black and Hispanic are counted in both categories.

FL2002 CON – Current Congressional Districts



Description:

Current District 1 includes Escambia, Santa Rosa, Holmes, Washington, most of Okaloosa, and most of Walton County. As of the most recent census, that district is underpopulated by 2,187 people, or -0.3%.

Current District 2 includes a small portion of Okaloosa, the beach portion of Walton, Bay, Jackson, Calhoun, Gulf, Liberty, Franklin, Gadsden, most of Leon, Wakulla, Taylor, Lafayette, Suwannee, Dixie, and part of Jefferson County. That district is now overpopulated by 41,174 people, or 5.9%.

Current District 4 includes a small portion of Leon, part of Jefferson, Madison, Hamilton, Columbia, Baker, Union, Nassau, and a large part of Duval County. It is currently overpopulated by 48,073 people, or 6.9%.

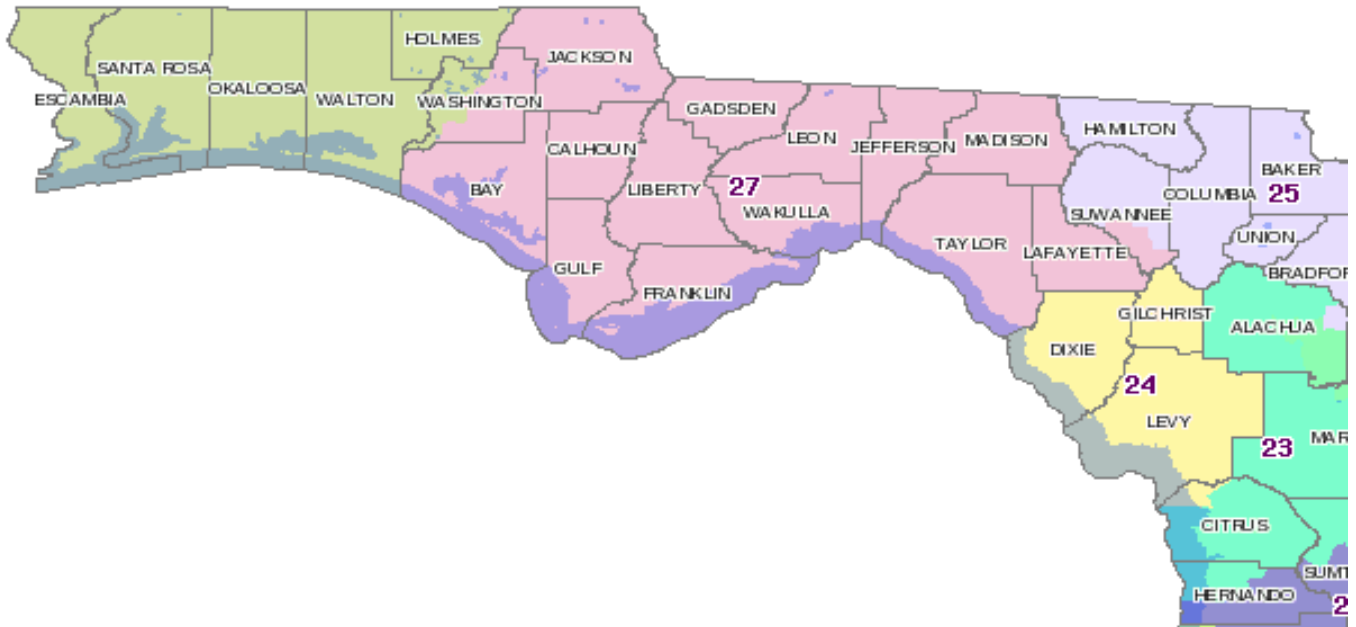
Current District 6 includes part of Duval, Bradford, most of Alachua, Gilchrist, part of Levy, part of Marion, and a small portion of Lake County. This district has seen substantial growth and is now overpopulated by 116,382 people, or 16.7%.

Public Testimony and descriptions by submitter:

- In public testimony at the Panama City hearing, Mr. Kelley said, *“I would ask you to consider that due to the unique nature of our geography that our interests have more in common horizontally across northwest Florida than we do vertically. In other words, Pensacola Beach, Ft. Walton Beach and Panama City Beach, they all have something in common, and despite what our friend from Daytona Beach says, you know, we are kind of proud of this stretch of beaches, and if you are not familiar with northwest Florida along I-10 is mostly agricultural and rural interests. And I believe in looking at the populations that our region should be drawn horizontally.”*
- At the Panama City hearing, a constituent named Candice Harbison testified, *“It has been very confusing for the people of Bay County to have been split up into various districts. Unless there is a really good reason for it, a county should be kept intact.”*
- At the same hearing, Beth Oltman testified, *“I do wish that we would hold -- keep all of Bay County together. As Bay County has changed throughout the years we now have our airport, we are growing economically. We have our beach, we care so much about our education system. We have many of us are moving into this area from other parts of the country and are very proud*

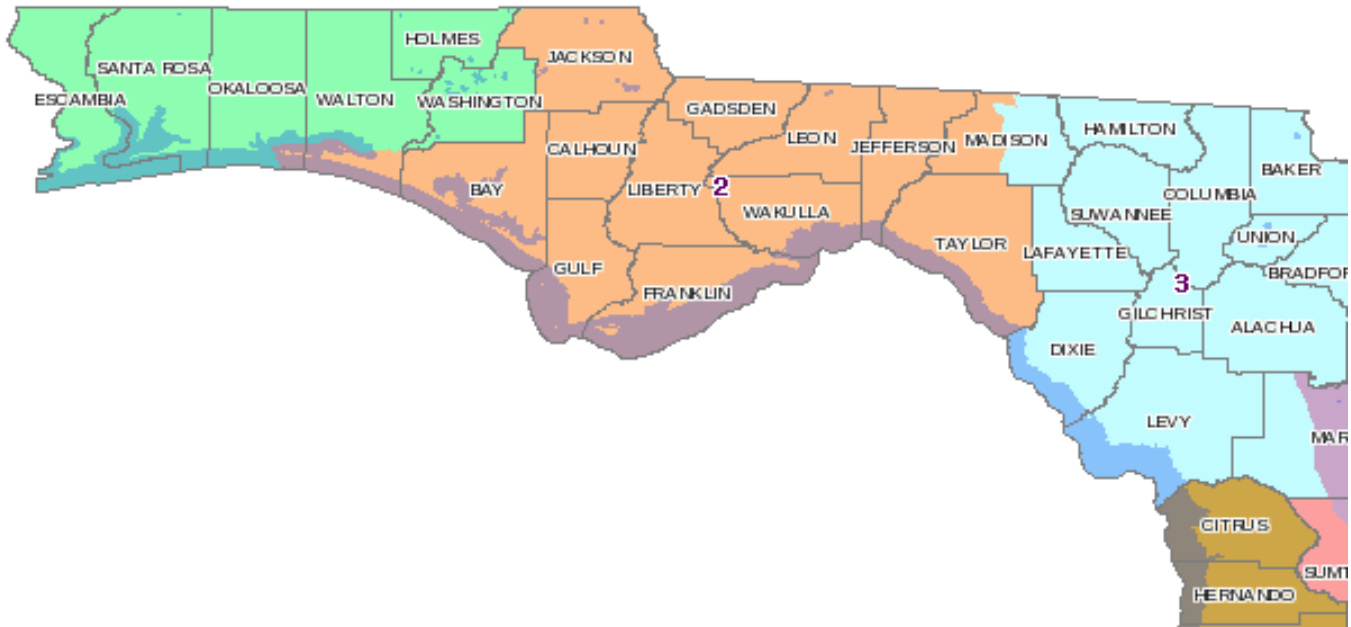
to call this home. So I, too, wish to ask that all of Bay County stays together, even though I love Marti and Jimmy and Don, all of you, I sincerely hope that we can expedite this entire situation and keep Bay County whole so we keep our power and grow continually.”

- *“Without these horizontal areas of it we would be leaving off the large expanse of the state that is rural and agricultural, and we appreciate the continued focus on that through the state, and also this redistricting process.”-Jerry Davis, Pensacola*

Comments from Professional Staff:

- The map has a population deviation of almost 7%.
- The portion of District 24 in Dixie, Levy, Gilchrist, and Levy counties is not contiguous with the larger portion of the district in Duval, St. Johns, Flagler, and Putnam Counties.
- The two Panhandle districts (26 and 27) follow county boundaries. Only Washington and Suwannee Counties are divided.

Public Testimony and Descriptions by Map Author:

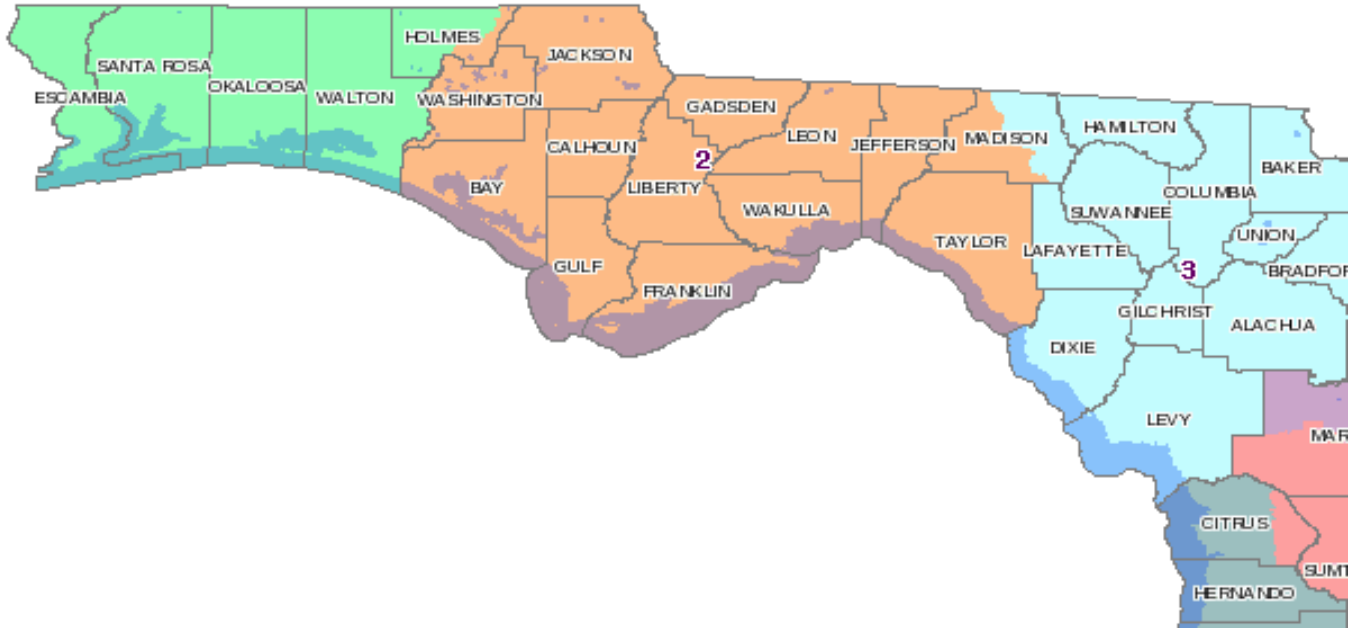
- *"We really thought this out and were totally colorblind,"* said Dr. David Bradford, a political-science professor at Brevard Community College who tasked six of his summer-school students with drawing a congressional map for the state. —Orlando Sentinel, September 18, 2011
- *"Having grown up in the rural areas in the Florida here, north Florida and living along the coast, I see a need to keep the issues separate. That we have coastal issues that are needed to be done by Representatives who are familiar with the coast, and then we have the rural areas that need to be represented by people that have an interest and need in the rural areas."*—Jim Anders, Panama City
- *"I am just here to ask you to as you move through this process, to consider the rural counties. We -- it works well for us that we are all in districts where we can partner together and have a stronger voice when we are partnered together. We are limited in our resources. It is to our benefit that we are able to join together and work as a stronger, a stronger voice, and so I just ask that as you move forward you keep that in the back of your mind, that we have a voice, too, and we have to kind of group together, but that works for us."*—Kristy Terry, Panama City
- *"Without strong voices from rural Representatives it is very easy for rural concerns to be overrun by large market needs and political power. We need to maintain coverage by two Representatives with a mutual focus on rural needs. Third, and last, two-mile wide, 200 long winding districts with multiple environments, rural, big city and beach, make it very difficult for a Representative or a Senator to stay closely connected to their constituents and deliver a focused message."*—Art Kimbrough, Panama City
- *"I think that the tourism, the financial, the retail interests of the south Santa Rosa County, south Escambia County, and if it stretches far enough to get over into south Okaloosa County, all of those people have the same interest and everything and they are very diverse from our, the interest of the rural north of the county."*—David Radcliffe, Pensacola

Comments from Professional Staff:

- The boundary between Districts 1 and 2 resembles the current boundary, with District 2 picking up additional territory in coastal Walton and Okaloosa Counties to balance the population of District 1.

- In contrast with the current districts, Leon County is entirely contained in District 2 and the westward extension of current District 4 is removed.

- His stated intent was to follow county boundaries and “not splitting consolidated communities.” He also stated that he tried to “find bits of pieces of population that were needed in rural areas where you can go for miles and only pick up one or two individuals.”
- Several speakers at public hearings around the state commented both in favor and against Mr. Libby’s maps.

- The two Panhandle districts (1 and 2) follow county boundaries. Only Holmes and Hamilton Counties are divided.
- District populations are equalized to within 1 person.

HPUBC0065 – Matthew Boyle



Description:

- This map is an example of following county lines in a manner that minimizes district perimeters.
- District 1 consists of Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton, and most of Holmes. The submitter split Holmes County because it “created the shortest total district boundary between 1 and 2.” Population: 696,343. Deviation: -1
- District 2 includes the remainder of Holmes, Washington, Jackson, Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Franklin, Liberty, Gadsden, Leon, Wakulla, Jefferson, Taylor, and a portion of Madison. The submitter split Madison County because “it offered the most square lines, and thus the most compact lines.” Population: 696,345. Deviation: 1.
- District 5 consists of Dixie, Levy, Gilchrist, Marion, most of Alachua, Putnam, and the submitter took about 10,000 people from Sumter County. The submitter’s rationale was that “the population density was high enough that it required negligible impact on lines.” Population: 696,336 Deviation: -8.

Public Testimony and Descriptions by Map Author:

- This individual spent four months working on his plan, which we received in late September. He included a detailed rationale for his choices in drawing the lines the way he did. He said his first guiding principle was the Voting Rights Act and his second was Fair Districts Florida, which he called *“horribly unclear and, thus, confusing. For example, section(a) sounds great on paper, but it is impractical to create 27 districts with an equal number of Republicans and Democrats, and, short of this proposal, districts will favor one party or another. Further, section(b) is very unspecific. Which political boundaries have preservation priority? What exactly constitutes a geographical boundary? Can we not cross Lake Okeechobee because it is a geographical boundary? In short,*

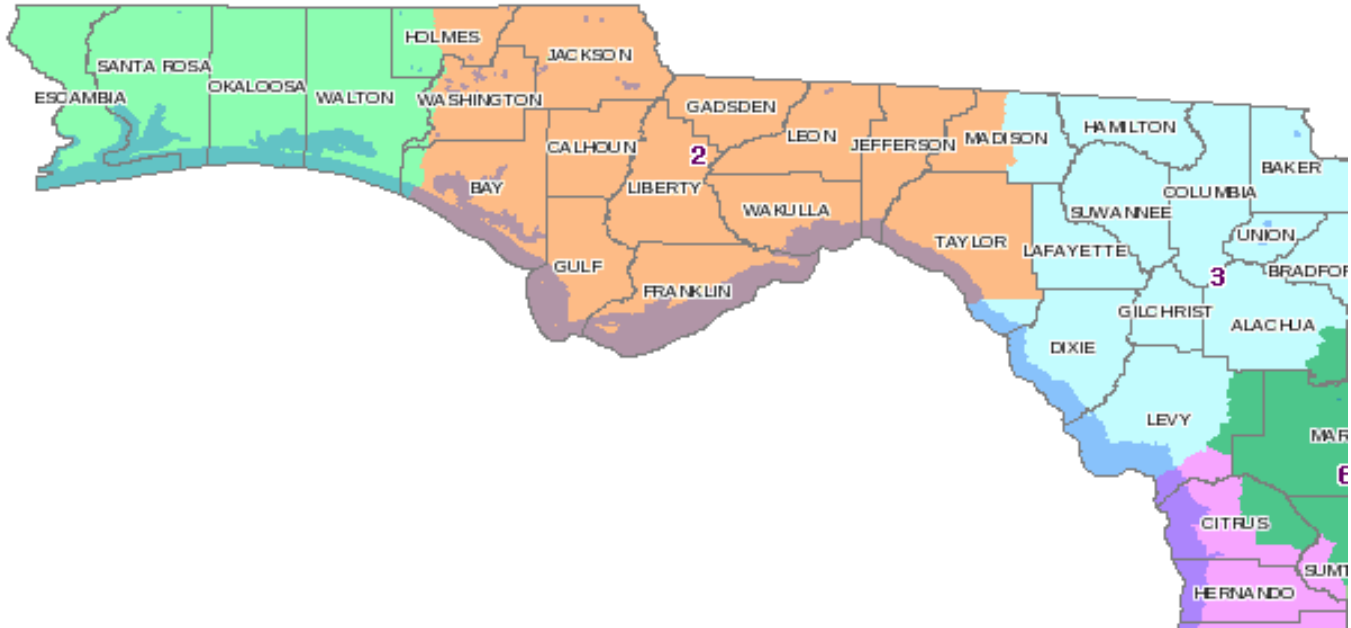
“though I researched FDF and read legal opinions about its likely enforcement, my map has been drawn without clear expectations of how the law will be enforced.”

- His stated priorities were:
 - “1. Split as few counties as possible. I preferred splitting one county three ways versus splitting two counties two ways.*
 - 2. Split no cities except where splitting the city is necessary to avoid further county splits.*
 - 3. Aim for the shortest possible district boundaries. This principle was especially important when I did have to split counties and cities*
 - 4. Build districts without looking at political numbers.*
 - 5. Keep population deviations within 10 of the ideal. Unfortunately, I had two deviations of +11 and one of +12.”*

Professional Staff Comments:

- The two Panhandle districts (1 and 2) follow county boundaries. Only Holmes and Madison Counties are divided. Within Holmes County, the district line does not follow Bonifay municipal boundary.
- The total populations deviation among northwest Florida districts is about a dozen.

SPUBC0068 – Bruce King



Description:

- The submitter explained in a detailed report that basis of his congressional, senate, and house plans was a grid. He first created a senate plan, which he broke down into house districts, which he then reconfigured into Congressional districts.
- District 1 consists of Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton, and portions of Holmes, Washington, and Bay Counties. Population: 696,347. Deviation: 2.
- District 2 consists of the remainder of Holmes, Washington, and Bay counties, all of Jackson, Calhoun, Gulf, Franklin, Liberty, Gadsden, Leon, Wakulla, and Jefferson counties, and portions of Taylor and Madison counties. Population: 696, 346. Deviation: 1.
- District 3 consists of the remainder of Madison and Taylor, all of Hamilton, Suwannee, Lafayette, Dixie, most of Levy, all of Gilchrist, Columbia, Union, Baker, Bradford, most of Alachua, most of Clay most of Putnam, and portions of St. Johns, Flagler, and Volusia. Population: 696,346. Deviation: 1.

Public Testimony and Descriptions by Map Author:

Mr. King writes:

“The 27 Congressional Districts have a target population equivalent to 4 and 4/9 House districts. One therefore starts with four contiguous House districts and adds an incremental unit of population (69,635) to come up to the Congressional district target population.

Distributing the incremental unit to all Congressional Districts is simplified by first dividing the state into three equal regions each containing 40 House districts. The boundaries selected to define the regions across the state with two parallel easterly divisions selected to make the boundaries as straight as possible. Next, nine Congressional districts in each region are identified by provisional starter boundaries using four contiguous House districts.”

Comments from Professional Staff:

- Districts built on the grid framework do not follow county lines.
- Building congressional, senate, and house districts with the objective of using common borders may conflict with redistricting standards.
- The population deviation among northwest Florida congressional districts was 4 persons.
- Mr. King said:

“I have some concerns with scoring a plan on average compactness. For example, if you visually look at a state-wide plan (vs. a blow up of a section), the prominent features that stand out are the big (by area) rural districts - and these are very irregular in shape since their role is to "fill in" the space between the population centers. These districts probably have the worst score of shape or compactness. And since their average population density is the lowest, they should have the lowest weighting in an overall evaluation of a state-plan plan for shape and compactness.... I learned that balancing a state-wide grid is certainly a slow, tedious process! (and rebalancing is to avoided at all costs!)”

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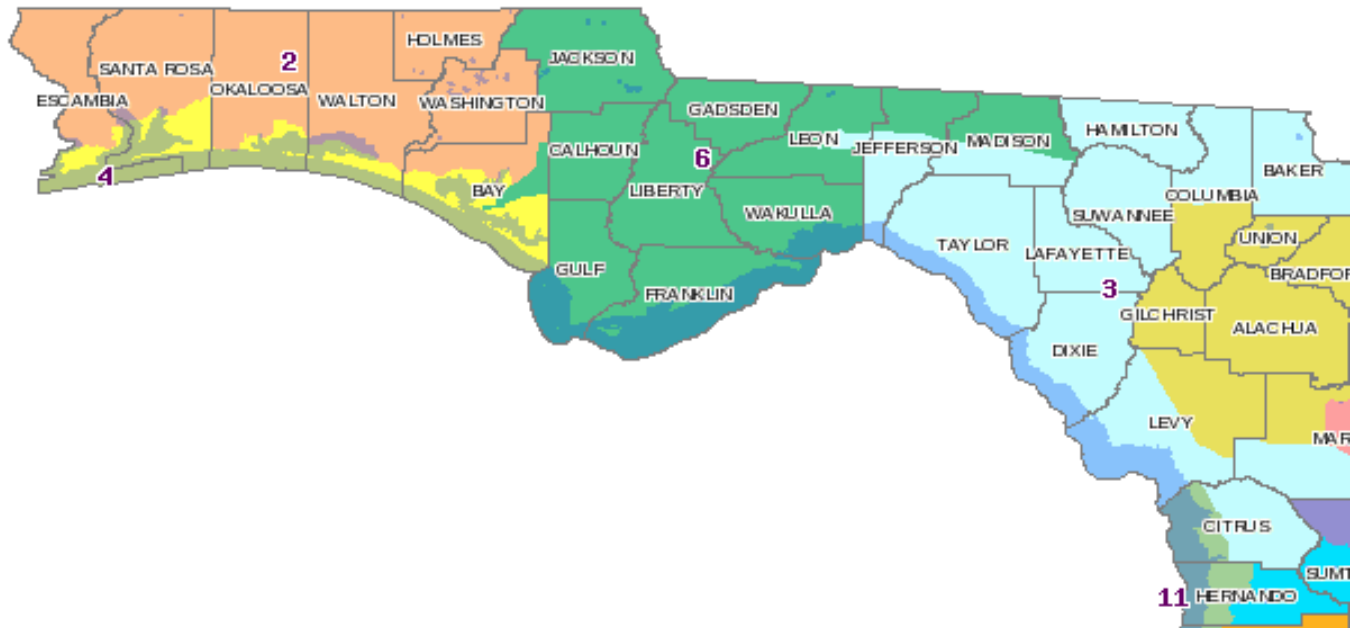
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This packet includes a map of the Panhandle region for each plan listed above, along with a description of the plan, a table of Census statistics, comments or testimony from the author of the map, and comments from the professional staff of the Senate Committee on Reapportionment.

The following statistics are reported for northwest Florida districts and for the share of each county in such districts: total population, voting age population, Black voting age population (and percentage), and Hispanic voting age population (and percentage). For these reports persons who identified themselves as both Black and Hispanic are counted in both categories.

Description:

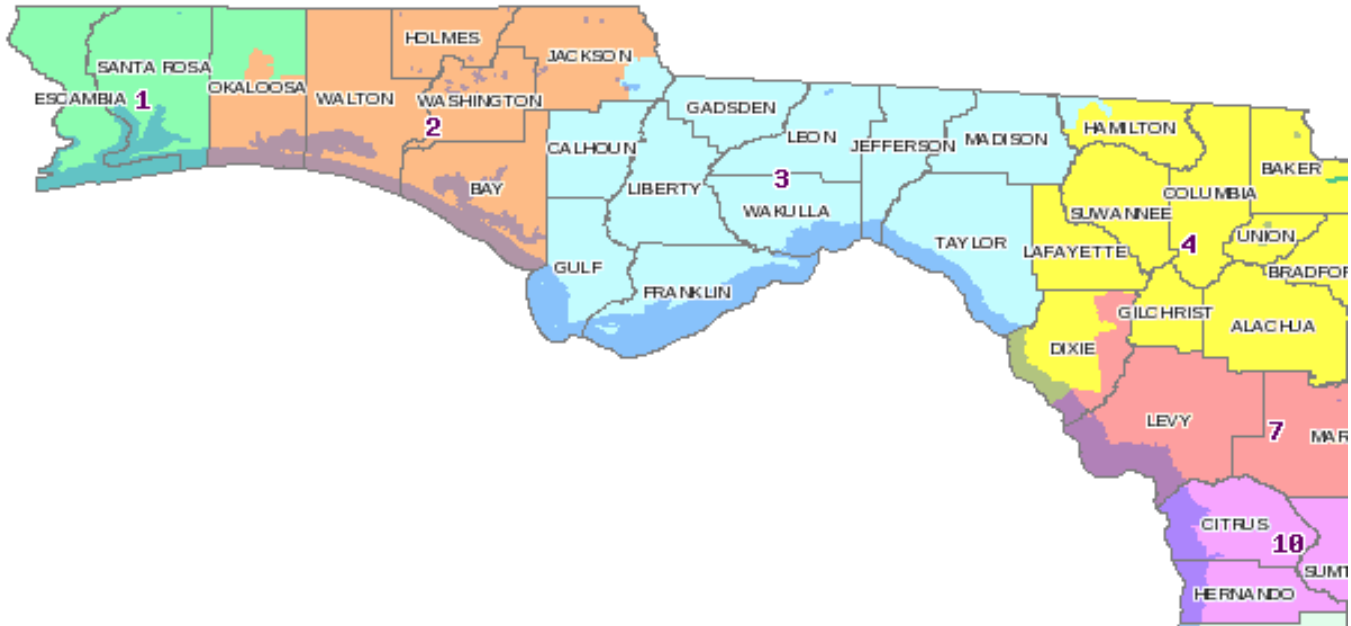
- This is the current district map for the Florida Senate, drawn in 2002. This plan divides the western portion of the Florida Panhandle along a north south boundary stretching from the Alabama border to Jackson and Bay Counties. District 2 begins in the northern two thirds of Escambia County and runs to Jackson County with borders along the edge of Calhoun and in Bay County. District 4 runs south of District 2 along the coast to Bay County. District 6 continues from the borders of Districts 2 and 4 in the west over the Panhandle stopping at Jefferson County in the south, Tallahassee in the middle and Madison County in the north. District 3 stretches eastward from Tallahassee through to Baker County and also splits southward, traveling as far down as Citrus County. District 14 is partially encircled by District 3. It contains parts of Columbia, Levy, Putnam and Marion Counties, and all of Alachua, Bradford and Union Counties.

Description:

- In this plan, District 1 begins at the Alabama border and continues through to Okaloosa County where it leaves the southern half of the county, starting just south of I-10, and the municipality of Crestview for District 2. District 2 takes that remainder of Okaloosa County as its western boundary, continues to the eastern border of Bay County in the south and all but the eastern most portion of Jackson County in the north. District 3 continues through the Panhandle to the eastern Taylor County line and just past the Madison County line into a portion of Hamilton County, where it contains a portion of the municipality of Jennings. District 4 takes the rest of Hamilton County and pushes south and east, collecting all of Alachua, Bradford, Columbia, Gilchrist, Lafayette, Suwannee and Union Counties, the western portions of Dixie, and all but a tiny sliver of Baker County. District 7 runs south of District 4 from the remainder of Dixie through Marion and into the northern part of Lake County.

Public Testimony and Descriptions by Map Author:

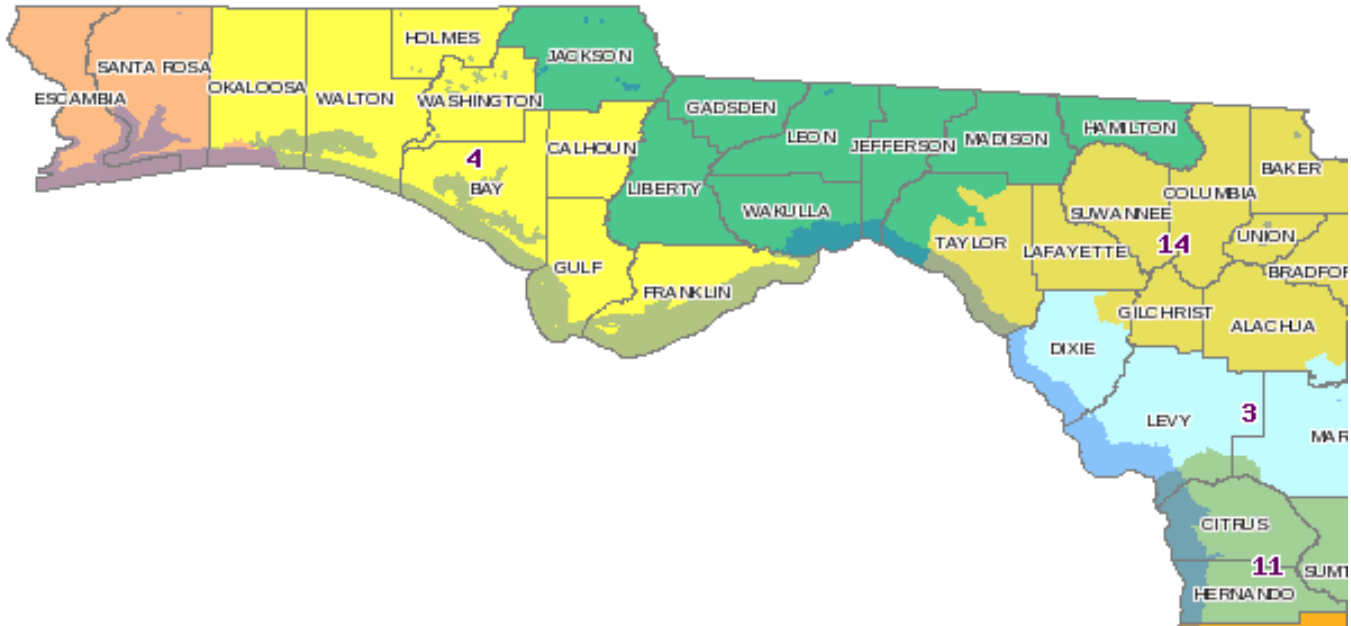
- Though Mr. Libby participated in the Public hearing in Jacksonville, it was to comment on his Congressional Map. His Senate map was not submitted until after the conclusion of the public hearings.

Comments from Professional Staff:

- This plan is a representation of the public testimony requesting vertically drawn districts in the Panhandle that follow county lines. Ellen Roston, Barbara Goggins, Jeff Bergosh, David Nelson, and many others testified that they wanted districts to follow along county lines as much as possible. Other public submissions such as those by Ryan Terrell and Bruce King also draw districts with vertical line divisions.
- In this map, the five Panhandle districts are all within a single person of the ideal population for a district giving them a 0.0% deviation from the ideal mean.
- Orientation of the division of Districts 1 and 2:
 - This map represents the suggestions received supporting division along county lines. The result is fewer elongated districts and fewer county splits.

- Ellen Roston and Barbara Goggins in the Pensacola meeting both stated Escambia has little in common with Bay County, while Jeff Bergosh and David Nelson pointed out the shared infrastructure between Escambia and Santa Rosa Counties.
 - Commissioner Lynn Laird argued in the Pensacola meeting that Escambia County was large enough that it should have a senator who was a resident of the county.
 - Many, including Albert Perez and Gayle Jacobson at the Fort Walton meeting, also pointed out how following county lines as opposed to creating horizontal districts would create more compact districts.
- County Divisions: The map follows county boundaries with the exception of Okaloosa, Jackson, Baker, Dixie and Lake Counties. Since the population deviations of the districts is so close to the ideal mean there would seem to be some flexibility to increase or decrease populations in the districts to eliminate some of these divisions.
 - Municipal Divisions: Likewise, there are several municipalities divided in this plan. Splits such as the ones in Jennings in Hamilton County and MacClenny in Baker County could potentially be corrected.
 - There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 3, where the African American voting age population is 28.9%. This could potentially be increased by including portions of Jackson or Hamilton Counties in District 3.
 - Plan HPUBS0056 by Ryan Terrell offers a map that keeps all of Escambia and Santa Rosa together. His plan achieves a higher African American VAP in his central Panhandle district but does not follow county lines as effectively.

HPUBS0056 - Ryan Terrell



Description:

- District 2 begins at the Alabama border and continues through Santa Rosa County and into the southwestern portion of Okaloosa County. It includes parts of Fort Walton Beach, but excludes all of the city of Destin. District 4 contains the remainder of Okaloosa County, all of Holmes, Washington, Calhoun, Gulf, and Franklin Counties. District 6 moves east from there to the eastern borders of Hamilton and Madison Counties and the western portion of Taylor County, including the municipality of Perry. District 14 includes the remainder of Taylor County, the northeast corner of Dixie County, all of Baker, Bradford, Columbia, Gilchrist, Lafayette, Suwannee and Union Counties, and all but the southeast corner of Alachua County. District 3 runs south of District 14, grabbing the remainder of Dixie County, the majority of Levy and Marion Counties, the southern half of Putnam County, and the northern half of Lake County.

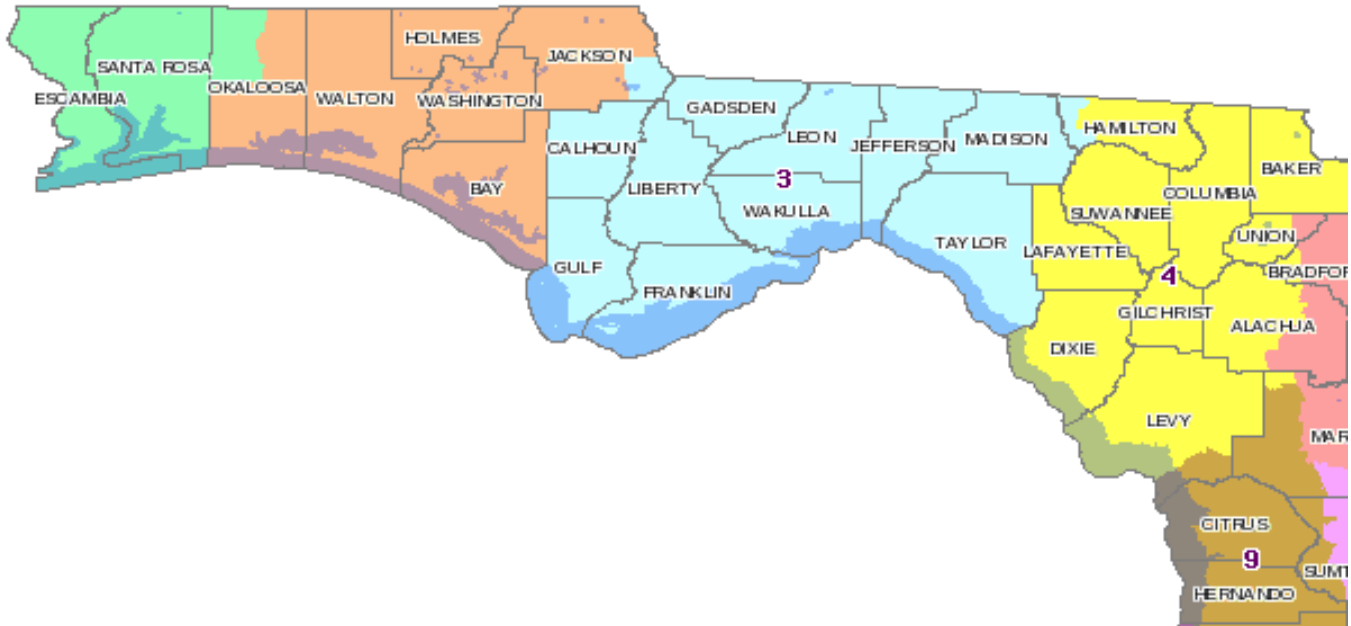

Comments from Professional Staff:

- This plan is a representation of the public testimony requesting vertically drawn districts in the Panhandle that follow county lines. Additionally, this map reflects public testimony by individuals such as Martin Luther King III at the Gainesville public hearing and Clorissti Mitchell at the Pensacola meeting. Both individuals expressed concerns about minority voting access in the Panhandle.
- In this map the five districts in the Panhandle are all within 0.2% deviation of the ideal population for a district, providing some flexibility for moving around populations.
- Orientation of the division of Districts 2 and 4: This map mirrors the suggestions in public testimony received suggesting division along county lines. This results in less elongated districts that have fewer county splits, but does not differentiate the rural and beach communities of interest.

- County Divisions: The map has relatively few county splits in the Panhandle, dividing only Alachua, Dixie, Okaloosa and Taylor. Putnam, Levy and Lake are divided by District 14.
- Municipal Divisions: The map also effectively avoids the division of municipalities, splitting Fort Walton Beach but encapsulating others.
- There is one of the more effective publicly submitted maps at preserving minority access in the central Panhandle. The African American voting age population in District 6 is 30.5 percent.

SPUBS0066 – Bruce King



Description:

- District 1 begins at the Alabama border and continues through to the northwest quarter of Okaloosa County, stopping in Crestview. District 2 takes that remainder of Okaloosa County as its western boundary and continues to the eastern border of Bay County in the south and all but the eastern most portion of Jackson County in the north. District 3 continues through the Panhandle to the eastern Taylor County line and just past the Madison County line into a portion of Hamilton County. District 4 takes the rest of Hamilton County and pushes south and east. It includes all of Baker, Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist, Lafayette, Suwannee and Counties, the western halves of Bradford, Union, and Alachua Counties, including the majority of Gainesville. District 4 also encompasses all but southern most portion of Levy County and a small piece of northern Marion County east of I-75. District 7 takes the remainder of Union, Bradford and Alachua, as well as portions of Marion Putnam, and Clay Counties.

Public Testimony and Descriptions by Map Author:

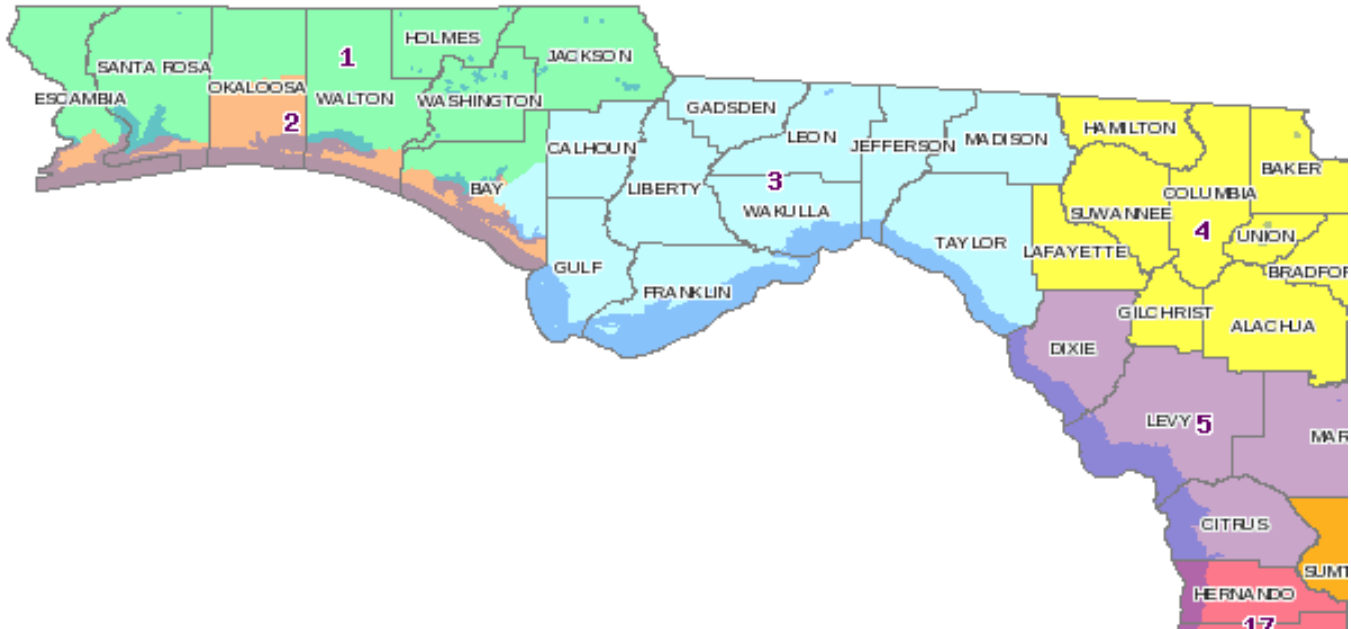
- Mr. King submitted comments with his plans explaining how he began by drawing Senate districts, then divided those into House districts, and then used those House districts to draw Congressional districts. This map corresponds with SPUBH0067 and SPUBC0068.
- Other points by Mr. King:
 - *“The districts were defined starting on the northern border, going from west to east, and then moving south. For the panhandle region, this involved starting with county based units and continuing until population of the evolving district boundary was just below the target population. Next voting districts (VTD-level) are used to get a closer approach to the target, using the undo button when the target is exceeded. Finally the block-level is used, including the “lasso assign” button, to migrate a smooth boundary as the target population is approached. At the final step, the border was magnified to the finest scale where block boundaries become visible, then the population is “fine tuned” by exchanging several blocks between either sides of the boundary until the district population is within the target value by an acceptable increment. Finally the utility scans for contiguity and completeness are made, corrected, and rebalanced if necessary. The changes were then saved and the completed district locked. Thus the just completed*

- boundary is not changed when one starts to form the next district.”*
- *“For the urban areas where minority populations are more concentrated, the choice of the district boundaries were made to maximize the number of majority minority Senate districts. For non-minority Senate districts, any concentrated areas of minorities are not split between adjacent Senate districts, so that when the House districts are made from the Senate districts, majority minority House districts are also maximized.”*

Comments from Professional Staff:

- This map is a representation of the public’s desire to have compact districts as reflected in the comments of Joe Cain and Dorothy Johnson in the Tallahassee hearing and Gail Jacobson of Fort Walton Beach along with many others. However, his map splits a number of counties that other maps do not, suggesting that following political boundaries was of a lesser focus. Many members of the public also expressed an interest in keeping counties whole such as Charles Parrish in Tallahassee, including some who also favored compactness like Dorothy Johnson.
- In this map the five districts in the Panhandle are all within 10 people of the ideal population for a district, giving a near 0% deviation from the ideal mean and some flexibility for moving around populations.
- Orientation of the division of Districts 1 and 2: This map mirrors the suggestions in public testimony received suggesting division along county lines. This results in less elongated districts that have fewer county splits, but does not differentiate the rural and beach communities of interest.
- County Divisions: The map follows county boundaries with Okaloosa, Jackson, Hamilton, Bradford, Union, Alachua, Levy and Marion, Putnam and Clay being the exceptions. Since the population deviations of the districts is so close to the ideal mean, there would seem to be some flexibility to increase or decrease populations in the district to eliminate some of these divisions
- Municipal Divisions: The map divides Gainesville in Alachua County as well as Crestview in Okaloosa County. There was public testimony, such as that from Fred Pratt in Gainesville, specifically asking that Alachua County in general and Gainesville specifically not be divided.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 3. The African American voting age population in District 3 is 28.9 percent. This could potentially be increased by including portions of Jackson or Hamilton Counties in District 3.

HPUBS0007 – Henry Kelley



Description:

- This plan divides the western portion of the Florida Panhandle along a north-south boundary stretching from the Alabama border to Jackson and Bay Counties. District 1 begins in the northern two thirds of Escambia County and runs to Jackson County with borders along the edge of Calhoun and in Bay County. District 2 begins in the southern third of Escambia and follows the beach communities along the coast, briefly moving north to near I-10 and then moving back south in Walton County until it reaches Bay County. District 3 begins at the borders of Districts 1 and 2 in the west and continues over the whole of the Panhandle with its eastern boundaries at the eastern borders of Madison and Taylor Counties. District 4 continues eastward, picking up all of Alachua, Baker, Bradford, Columbia, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Lafayette, Suwannee and Union Counties. District 5 contains all of Dixie, Levy, and Citrus Counties, and includes the majority of Marion County.

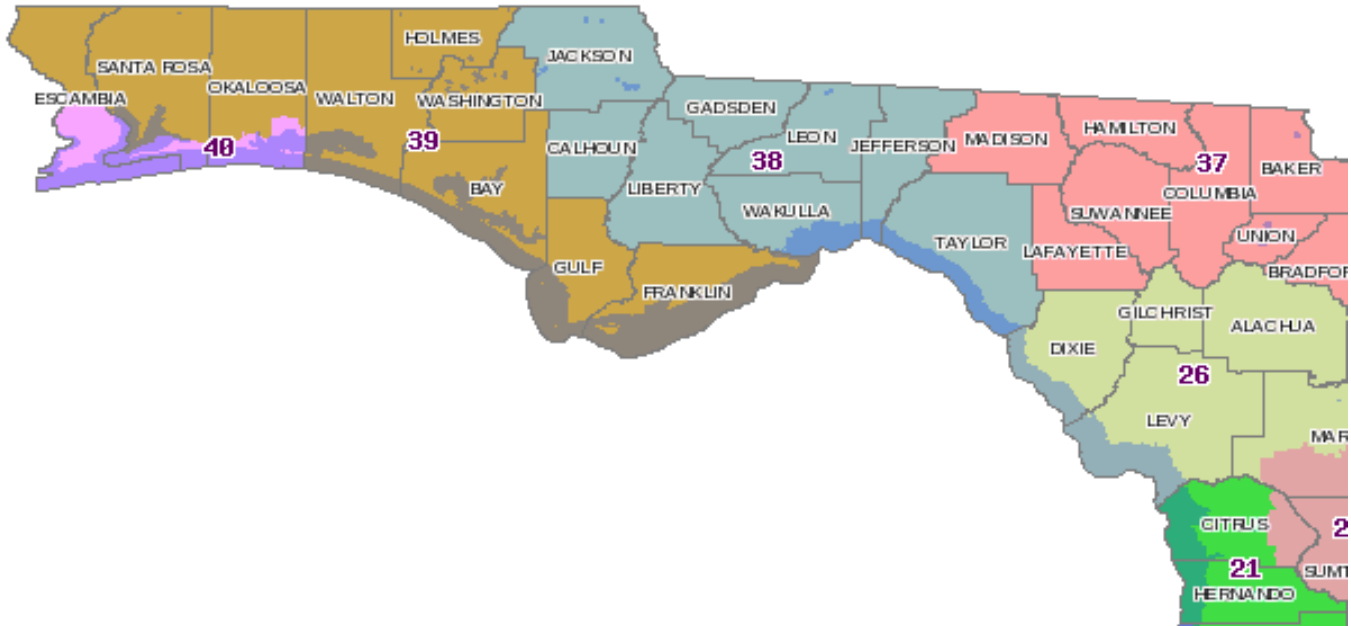
Public Testimony and Descriptions by Map Author:

- *“Now, a few particulars for the northwest Florida area. As I said, I have drawn the maps several times, and particularly as we look at the Senate and House Districts, and as we look at the maps, one of the things that the Fair District Amendments does say that the media has made a lot of comments on is the use of geographic boundaries. But Amendments V and VI also say existing political boundaries, and I would ask you to consider that due to the unique nature of our geography that our interests have more in common horizontally across northwest Florida than we do vertically. In other words, Pensacola Beach, Ft. Walton Beach and Panama City Beach, they all have something in common, and despite what our friend from Daytona Beach says, you know, we are kind of proud of this stretch of beaches, and if you are not familiar with northwest Florida along I-10 is mostly agricultural and rural interests. And I believe in looking at the populations that our region should be drawn horizontally, both within the Florida House Districts and within the Florida Senate Districts.”*

Comments from Professional Staff:

- This plan is a representation of the public testimony requesting horizontally drawn districts in the Panhandle that divided the rural and beach communities of interest to give each their own representation. This is reflected in public testimony as well as maps drawn by David Kulcsar, Keith Laytham, and Peter Cracchiolo.
- In this map, the five districts in the Panhandle are all within 0.4% of the ideal mean.
- Orientation of the division of Districts 1 and 2:
 - The map makes use of a number of bays and other bodies of water as geographic boundaries between the districts and completely encapsulates Panama City, Panama City Beach, Destin, Fort Walton Beach and Gulf Breeze, keeping the tourist related communities from Escambia to Bay County together. This gives the more agricultural communities of the Northwest Panhandle their own district.
 - This map represents the public testimony asking to keep the division between north and south in the Panhandle and separate beach and rural communities.
 - Jerry Davis, Goodwin, Livingston, Don Richards, and others at the Pensacola meeting suggested that the north and south of the Panhandle have two distinct main industries, agriculture in the north and tourism in the south, that have distinct needs best addressed by having separate representation for each.
 - Suzanne Harris in the Fort Walton meeting pointed out that bays along the coast and the Federal land north of Freeport in Okaloosa provide effective boundaries to divide the beach communities and the inland rural areas.
- County Divisions: As stated earlier, because Districts 1 and 2 run horizontally they split 4 counties. Districts 3 and 4 use almost exclusively whole counties, except where District 3 cuts into Bay County. District 5 splits only Marion County.
- Municipal Divisions: This map divides the city of Pensacola into two separate districts. Portions of the municipality of Calloway in Bay County are also divided into two districts.
- Minority access: There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 3. Under this plan the African American voting age population in District 3 is 28.8 percent. This could potentially be increased by including portions of Jackson County in District 3.
- Alternate Plan: Plan HPUPS0058 by Keith Laytham offers a similar north-south division, but creates a less elongated district that does not include the beach communities of Bay County.

HPUBS0028 - David Kulcsar

- This plan divides the western portion of the Florida Panhandle along a north-south boundary. District 40 begins in the southern half of Escambia County, includes all of Pensacola, follows along the Gulf of Mexico through the south end of Santa Rosa County, and ends in southern Okaloosa County. It includes the municipalities of Fort Walton Beach, Destin, Valparaiso, and a portion of Niceville. District 39 contains the remainder of Escambia, Santa Rosa and Okaloosa Counties, and includes Holmes, Washington, Bay, Gulf, and Franklin Counties. District 38 continues east to the eastern borders of Jefferson and Taylor Counties. District 37 includes all of Madison, Hamilton, Suwannee, Lafayette, Columbia, Baker, Union, Bradford, and Nassau Counties, as well as the western portion of Clay and Duval Counties. 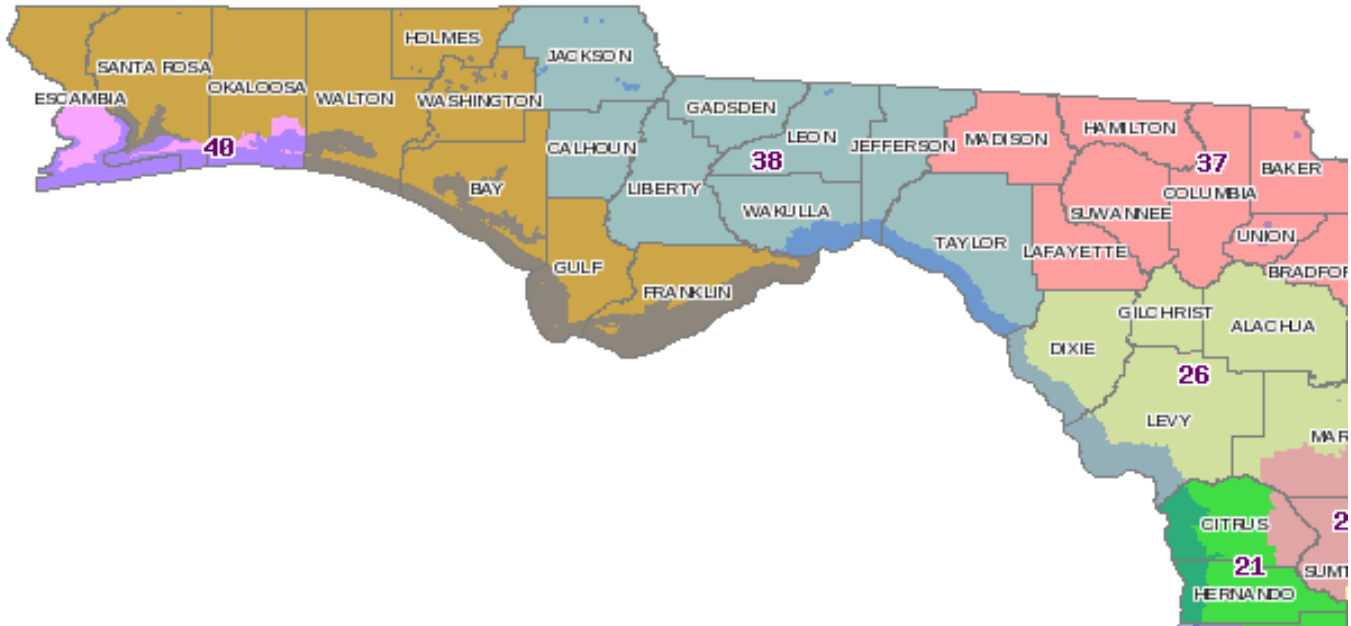

- In this map, the five districts in the Panhandle are all within a 1.6% deviation of the ideal population. This is a significantly larger percentage than any of the other complete maps of the Panhandle submitted by the public, but still well below the + or – 5% threshold.

- Orientation of the division of Districts 40 and 39: This map represents the public testimony received asking for there to continue be a division between north and south in the Panhandle, keeping separate beach and rural communities. However, this results in the two districts splitting county lines.
- This map reaches further east with its first four districts than the majority of other Senate maps, coming into contact with Jacksonville.
- District 39 covers an exceptionally wide range of territory from Escambia to Franklin County; a total distance of over 230 miles from tip to tip.
 - A number of individuals, including Linda Story in Jacksonville and Lonnie Hawkins in Pensacola, expressed concern over especially long districts, pointing out the travel time required for a member across a wide territory.

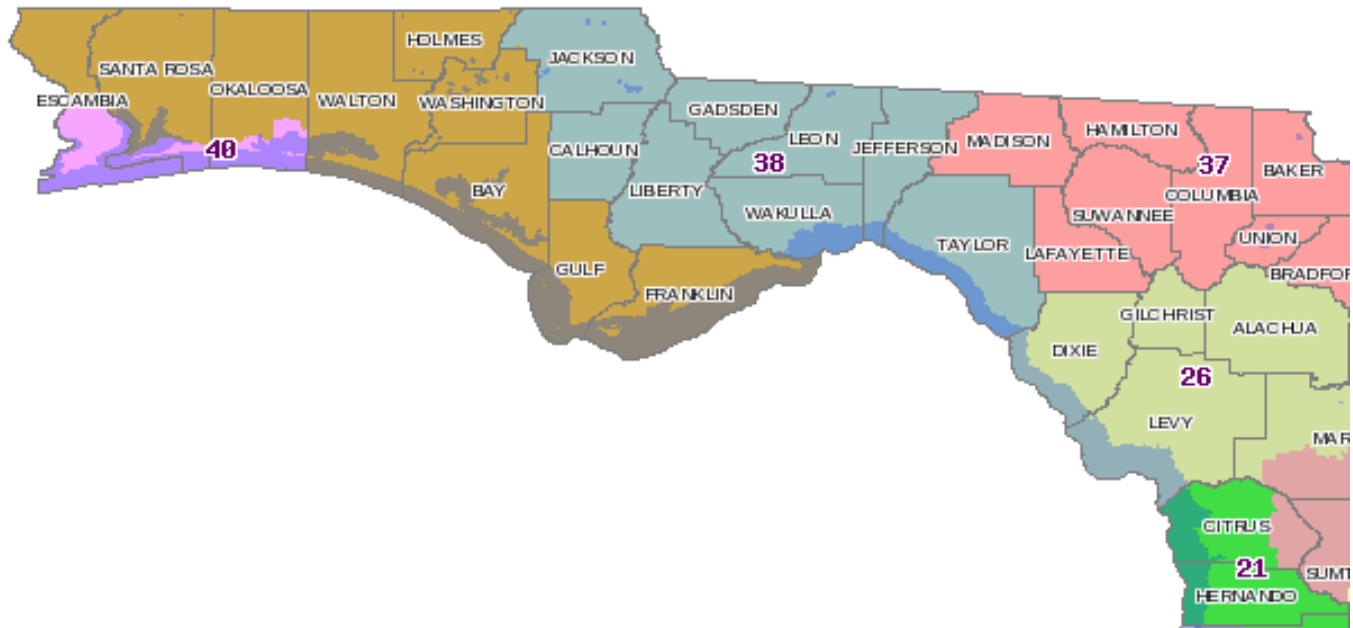

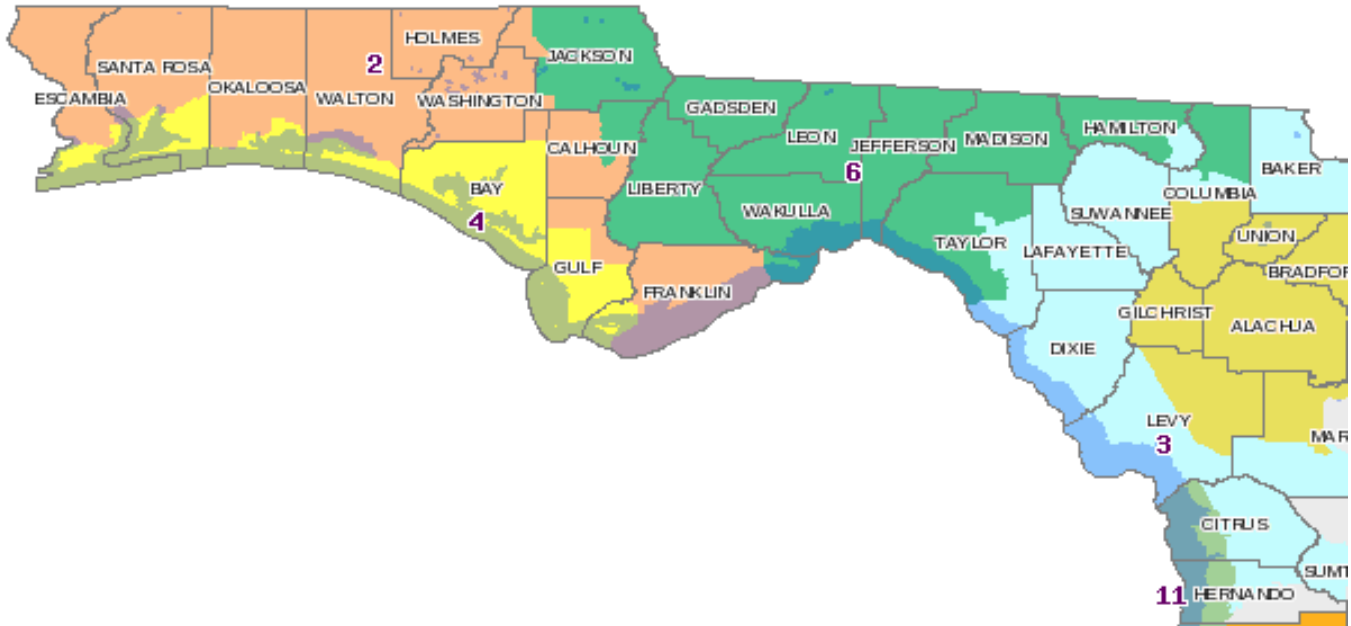

Comments from Professional Staff:

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- This plan is a replica of HPUBS0034 in the Panhandle.

- In this map, the five districts in the Panhandle are all within a 1.6% deviation of the ideal population. This is a significantly larger percentage than any of the other complete maps of the Panhandle submitted by the public but still well below the + or – 5% threshold.
- Orientation of the division of Districts 40 and 39: This map represents the public testimony received asking for there to continue be a division between north and south in the Panhandle, keeping separate beach and rural communities. However, this results in the two districts, splitting county lines.
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- Municipal Divisions: The map keeps the beach communities from Pensacola to Destin intact, but does split the municipality of Niceville in Okaloosa County. The map also splits Jacksonville/Duval County.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 38. Under this map the African American voting age population is 29.2 percent in District 38. This could potentially be increased by including additional portions of Madison County in District 38.

Description:

- District 2 and 4 begin on the state line, dividing Escambia Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton, Bay, Gulf and Franklin Counties between them. District 2 also includes Washington County and portions of Jackson and Calhoun Counties. District 6 takes the entire Panhandle east, with its eastern boundary in Taylor and Columbia Counties, and along the Suwannee River in Madison and most of Hamilton Counties. District 3 takes the remainder of Taylor, Columbia, and Hamilton Counties along with all of Baker, Suwannee, Lafayette, and Dixie Counties. It also includes portions of Levy, Marion, Citrus, Sumter and Hernando Counties. District 4 is partially encircled by District 3, and contains Columbia, Union, Bradford, Alachua, the remainder of Levy, and parts of Marion and Putnam Counties.

Comments from Professional Staff:

- This plan is a representation of the public testimony requesting horizontally drawn districts in the Panhandle, preserving the rural and beach communities of interest. This is reflected in public

testimony by Jerry Davis, Goodwin, Livingston, Don Richards and others at the Pensacola meeting as well as maps drawn by David Kulcsar, Keith Laytham and Henry Kelley.

- In this map, the five districts in the Panhandle are all within 0.1% deviation of the ideal population for a district giving some flexibility for moving around populations.
- Orientation of the division of Districts 2 and 4: This map represents the public testimony received asking for there to continue be a division between north and south in the Panhandle, keeping separate beach and rural communities. However, this results in the two districts, splitting county lines.
- This map reaches further south in its first four districts than the majority of other Senate maps, coming into contact with Hernando County.
- District 2 covers an exceptionally wide range of territory from Escambia to Franklin County a total distance of over 230 miles from tip to tip.
 - A number of individuals, including Linda Story in Jacksonville and Lonnie Hawkins in Pensacola, expressed concern over especially long districts, pointing out the travel time required for a member across a wide territory.
- County Divisions: This map splits a large number of counties including Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton, Bay, Gulf, Franklin, Jackson, Calhoun, Taylor, Columbia, Hamilton, Levy, Marion, Citrus, Sumter, and Hernando Counties.
- Municipal Divisions: Pensacola in Escambia County, Niceville in Okaloosa County, Blountstown in Calhoun County, Cottondale in Jackson County, Fanning Springs and Cheifland in Levy County, Ocala and Belleview in Marion County, Crystal River in Citrus County, Brooksville in Hernando County, and Wildwood in Sumter County are all split in this plan.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 6. Under this map the African American voting age population is 29.9 percent in District 6. This could potentially be increased by including additional portions of Calhoun County in District 6.

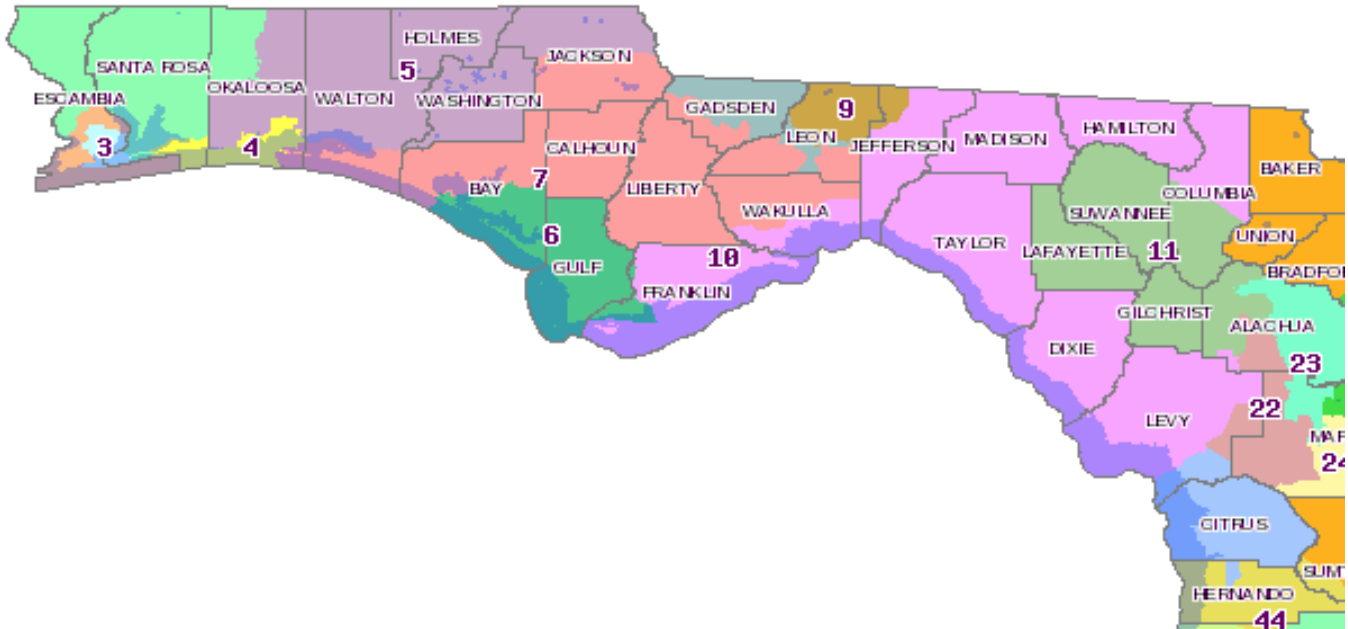

- This is the current district map for the Florida House, drawn in 2002. District 1 contains the northern portions of Escambia, Santa Rosa and Okaloosa. District 2 wraps around the outskirts of Pensacola and District 3. District 4 continues along the coast from there into Destin. District 5 takes the remainder of Okaloosa as and continues through to the northern half of Jackson. District 7 stretches south of District 5 and runs to Tallahassee. District 6 takes up the remainder of Bay County, the majority of Gulf County and Apalachicola in Franklin County. District 8 runs from west Tallahassee to the Georgia border in Gadsden County. District 9 runs from northeast Tallahassee to the Georgia border in Leon County. District 10 follows along the coast from Franklin County and then splits running to Columbia County in the north and Levy County in the south, encircling District 11. District 11 contains the remainder of Columbia as well as Suwannee, Lafayette Gilchrist and part of Alachua Counties.

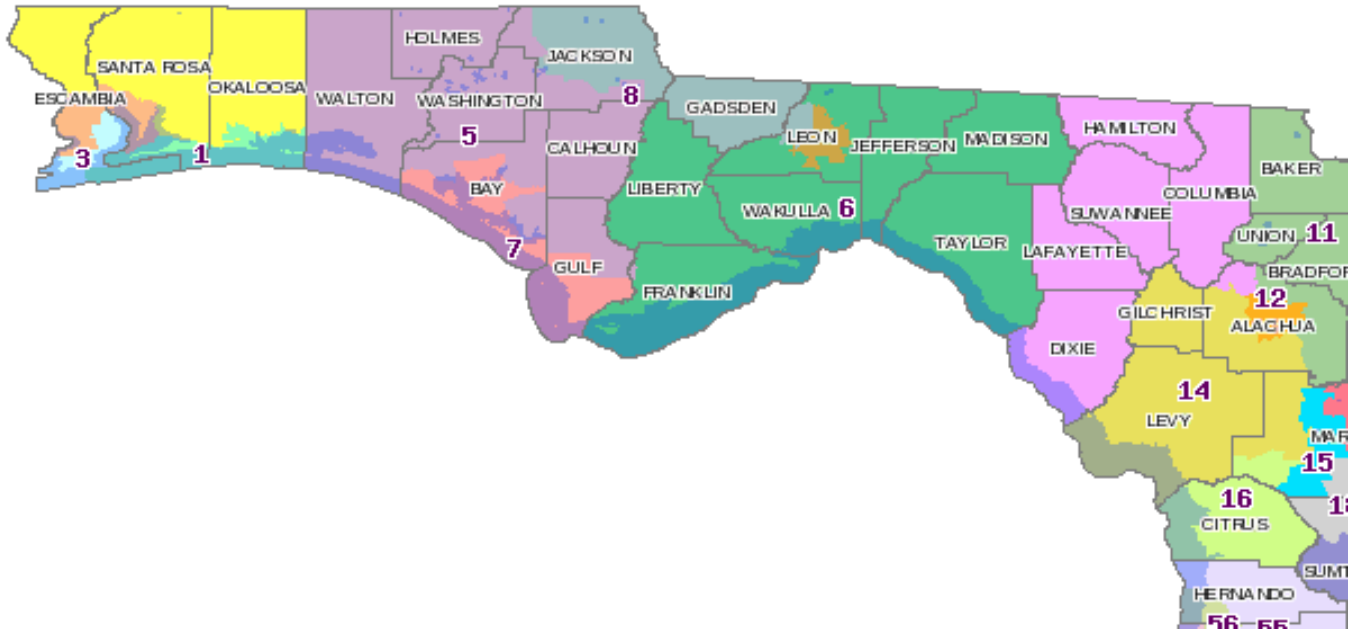

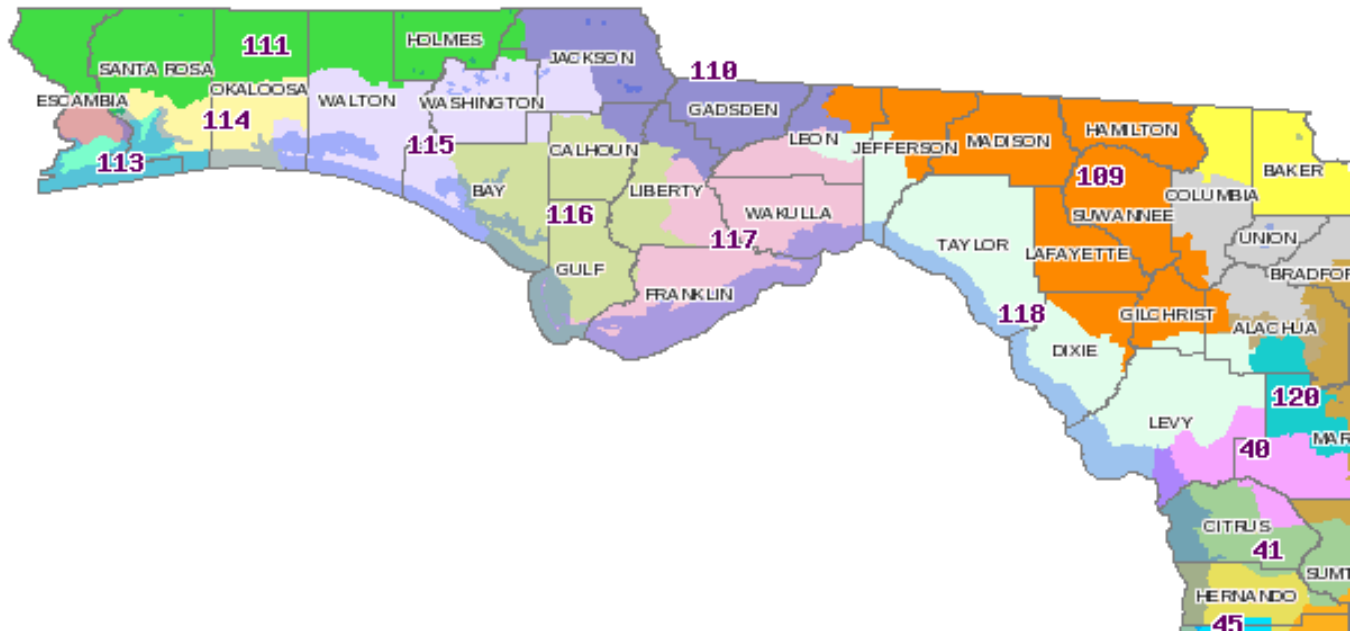

Comments from Professional Staff:

- In this map, the ten districts in the panhandle are all within a 2.2% deviation of the ideal population, larger than other public plans but still but still well below the + or – 5% threshold.
- The map creates a number of districts that run along the coast, collecting the beach communities.
- County Divisions: This map consistently follows county boundaries. Some county splits could be reduced in Leon and Santa Rosa Counties.
- Municipal Divisions: The map divides a number of municipalities including Valparaiso in Okaloosa County, Calloway in Bay County, Grand Ridge in Jackson County and Tallahassee in Leon County. All divisions but the one Tallahassee could likely be avoided.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 8. The two districts with the highest VAP are District 8 (38.1%) and District 9 (30.4%), but the two split the African American population in Tallahassee. Moving population from one district to another, instead of splitting it, could increase the minority access in this plan.

District 114 includes the remainder of Santa Rosa County and most of the southern part of Okaloosa County. District 115 runs from Destin through Walton County and contains parts of Bay, Washington, Calhoun, and Jackson Counties. District 116 contains the eastern portion of Bay and parts of Calhoun, Liberty and Gulf Counties. District 110 runs along the northern border of Florida and includes parts of Jackson, Calhoun, Liberty and Leon Counties and all of Gadsden County. District 117 takes a small portion of Gulf, nearly all of Franklin, all of Wakulla, and parts of Liberty and Leon, including parts of Tallahassee. District 118 takes another part of Tallahassee and Leon County and part of Jefferson County. It runs along the coast taking in all of Taylor County and parts of Dixie, Levy, Gilchrest and Alachua Counties. District 109 contains the remainder of Leon as well as Jefferson, Madison Hamilton, Suwannee, Lafayette, the remainder of Dixie and Gilchrist and part of Alachua Counties.

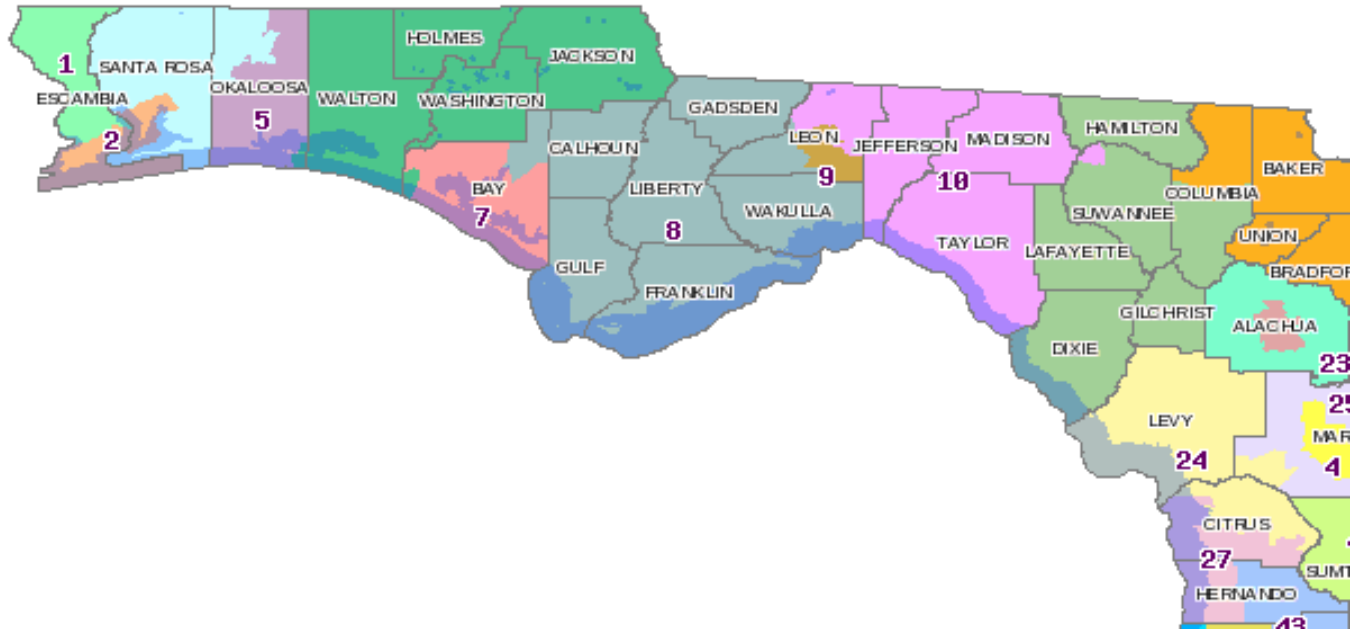

Comments from Professional Staff:

- In this map, the ten districts in the panhandle are all within a handful of individuals of the ideal mean giving them nearly a 0% deviation of the ideal population. This leaves some flexibility in altering the plan.
- The map creates a number of districts that run along the coast, collecting the beach communities.
- County Divisions: This map follows few county boundaries.
- Municipal Divisions: The map divides a number of municipalities including Niceville in Okaloosa County, De Funiak Springs in Walton County, Chipley in Washington County, Cottondale and Marianna in Jackson County, Tallahassee in Leon County, and a number of municipalities in Alachua. All divisions but Tallahassee could likely be avoided, especially considering that the plan's districts are currently so close to the ideal mean.

- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 110. The African American voting age population in District 110 is 30.3%. The remaining African American community in Tallahassee is split between Districts 117 and 118. This could be changed by including portions of Districts 117 and 118 in District 110 to keep the African American community whole and increase minority access.

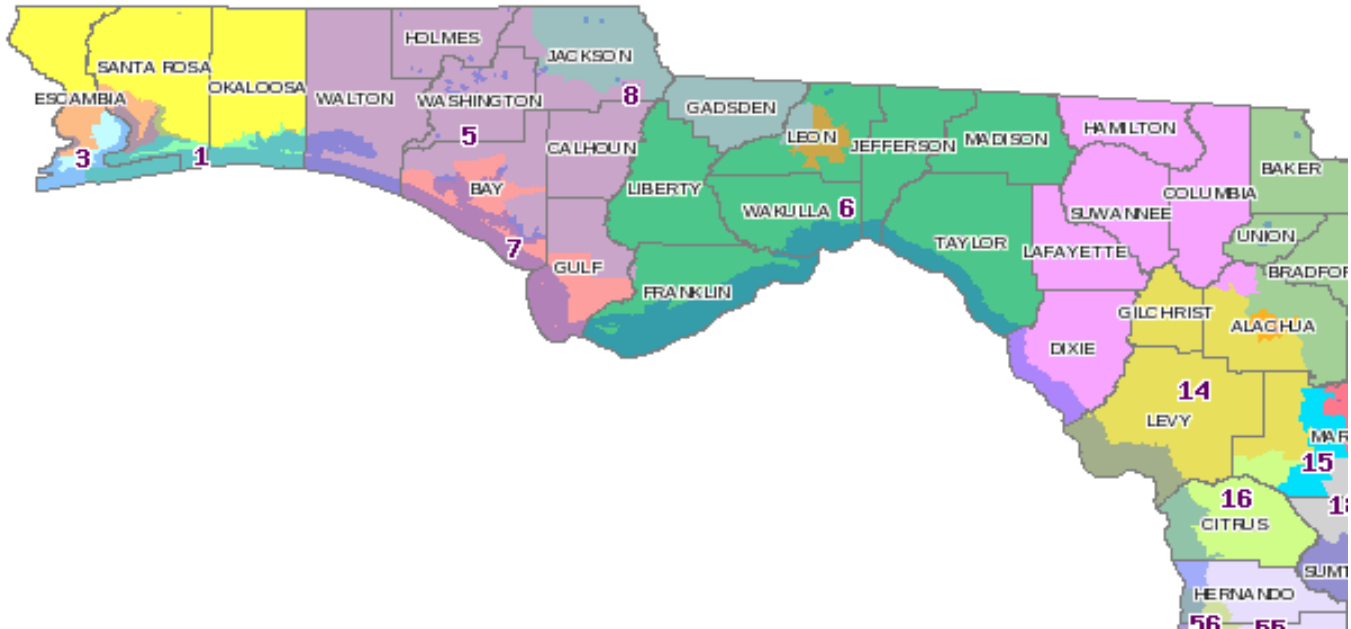

- County Divisions: This map consistently follows county boundaries. Some county splits could be reduced in Bay and Suwannee Counties.
- Municipal Divisions: With the exception of Crestview in Okaloosa and Tallahassee in Leon County, the plan does an excellent job of avoiding municipal divisions.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access for the African American community in Tallahassee. No district in the area contains above a 37% African American population. Combining some portions of these districts together could significantly increase the access for African Americans in the combined district.

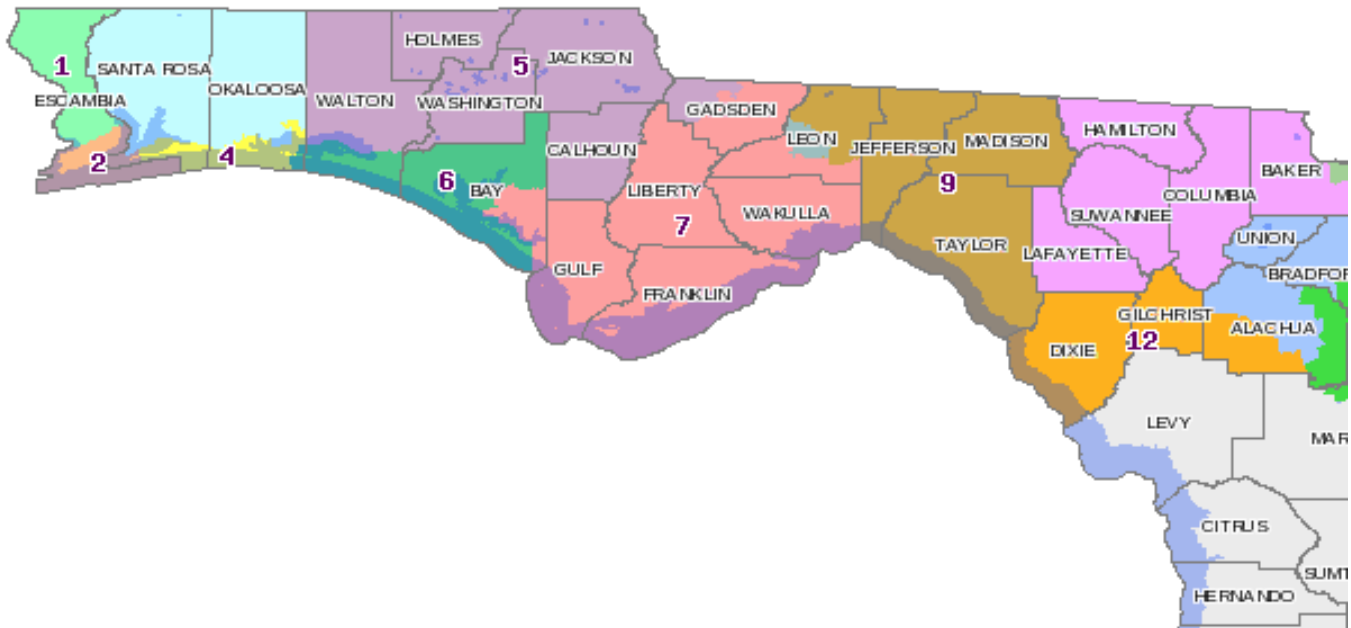

Comments from Professional Staff:

- This plan is nearly identical to HPUBH0045.
- The plan has a few minor completeness and contiguity issues that could easily be fixed.
- In this map, the ten districts in the panhandle are all within a 2.2% deviation of the ideal population, larger than other public plans but still well below the + or – 5% threshold.
- The map creates a number of districts that run along the coast, collecting the beach communities.
- County Divisions: This map consistently follows county boundaries. Some county splits could be reduced in Leon and Santa Rosa Counties.
- Municipal Divisions: The map divides a number of municipalities including Valparaiso in Okaloosa County, Calloway in Bay County, Grand Ridge in Jackson County, and Tallahassee in Leon County. All divisions but Tallahassee could likely be avoided.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 8. The two districts with the highest VAP are District 8 (38.1%) and District 9 (30.4%), but the two split the African American population in Tallahassee. Moving population from one district to another, instead of splitting it, could increase the minority access in this plan.

HPUBH0018 – Henry Kelley



Description:

- District 2 begins at the Alabama border and includes the southern portion of Escambia County. District 1 contains the remainder of Escambia County. District 3 contains the northern portion of Santa Rosa and Okaloosa Counties. District 4 runs along the coast and contains the remainder of Santa Rosa and most of the remainder of the coastal region of Okaloosa County. District 5 contains all but the southernmost part of Walton County and all of Holmes, Washington, Jackson, Calhoun and part of Gadsden County. District 6 runs along the coast east of District 4 until it reaches the city of Destin. District 7 takes the remainder of Bay County and runs east from 5 and 6 until it reaches Tallahassee in the north and the Jefferson County border in the south. District 8 is made up of the majority of Tallahassee. District 9 contains the remainder of Leon County and continues east to the eastern border of Madison and Taylor counties. District 10 includes all of Lafayette, Suwannee, Hamilton, Columbia and Baker Counties.

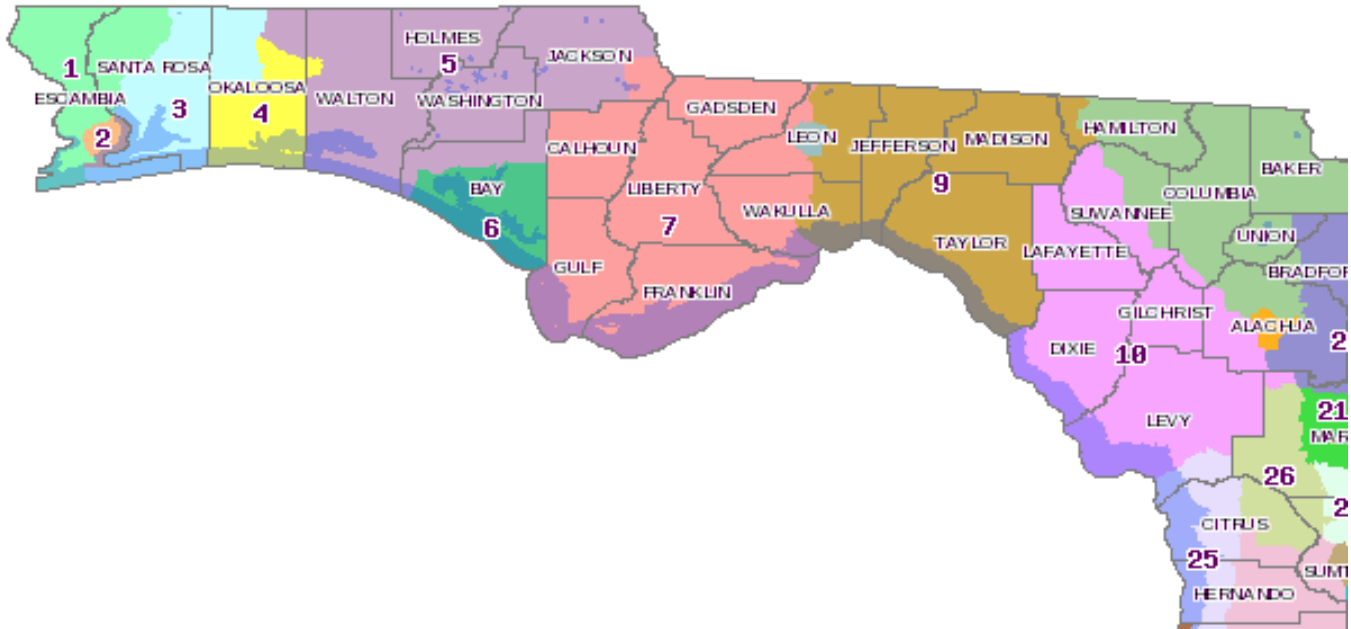

Comments from Professional Staff:

- In this map, the ten districts in the Panhandle are all within a 1% deviation of the ideal population.
- The map creates a number of districts that run along the coast, collecting the beach communities.
- County Divisions: The coastal districts created by the map for the most part do not follow county boundaries.
- Municipal Divisions: Portions of Niceville in Okaloosa County, Destin in Bay County, Gretna in Gadsden County, and Tallahassee in Leon County are divided. With the exception of Tallahassee, these divisions are likely avoidable.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 8. Under this map the African American voting age population is 38.1% in District 8.

SPUBH0067 – Bruce King



Description:

- District 1 begins at the Alabama border and includes part of Escambia and Santa Rosa Counties. District 2 contains the remainder of Escambia County around Pensacola. District 3 includes the remainder of Santa Rosa and the northwestern quadrant of Okaloosa. District 4 includes the southern half of Okaloosa and a small part of Walton County along I-10. District 5 stretches east through the northern part of Bay County and the western part of Jackson County. District 6 contains the remainder of Bay County around Destin. District 7 continues east from 5 and 6 until it reaches Tallahassee. District 8 is made up of the majority of Tallahassee. District 9 continues east to the eastern border of Taylor county and up into a small portion of Hamilton County. District 10 runs east and south into part of Suwannee, Columbia, Alachua, Levy and Marion Counties and includes all of Lafayette and Dixie Counties. District 11 takes the remainder of Hamilton, Suwannee and Columbia as well as all of Baker and parts of Union, Bradford and Alachua.

Public Testimony and Descriptions by Map Author:

- Mr. King submitted comments with his plans explaining how he began by drawing Senate districts, then divided those into House districts and then used those House districts to combine together to draw Congressional districts. This map corresponds with SPUBS0066 and SPUBC0068.
- Other points by Mr. King:
 - *“The Senate Plan forms the basis for creating the House Plan. 40 districts are converted into 120 House districts by dividing each Senate district into three House districts. The boundaries between the districts are inserted to assure that the population in each district is within a small margin of the target population and to make all districts as compact as possible. Where appropriate, boundaries are also selected to maximize the number of majority minority House districts.”*
 - *“The map for the House Plan is shown on page 6. The numbering of the House districts is based on the numbering of the corresponding Senate district. Senate district 1 becomes House districts 1, 2, and 3; district 2 becomes House districts 4, 5, and 6.....and district 40 becomes House districts 118, 119, and 120. The Senate districts share common boundaries with the House districts as well as a similar degree of compactness.”*

Comments from Professional Staff:

- In this map, the ten districts in the panhandle are all within a handful of individuals of the ideal mean giving them nearly a 0% deviation of the ideal population. This leaves some flexibility in altering the plan.
- The districts in this map have very simple geometric shapes suggesting that they are fairly compact. Compactness is strongly emphasized in this map.
- County Divisions: There are divisions of a number of counties in the map. These are mostly unalterable as a result of the shapes of the districts created. The plan’s author appears to be willing to split counties and cross political boundaries in order to create districts that appear geometrically compact and are divisions of the Senate Districts he drew in SPUBS0066.
- Municipal Divisions: The map divides Crestview in Okaloosa, Panama City Beach in Bay, Tallahassee and Live Oak in Suwannee.
- There is a possibility that this map does not effectively promote minority access in District 8. Under this map the African American voting age population is 38.1% in District 8.
