Process for Reporting and Calculating FTE Prior to 2013-14

- All instruction provided by a district reported
 - □ FTE assigned for instruction up to 900 hours
 - Instruction above 900 hours reported but not assigned FTE for funding purposes
 - FLVS Part-Time instruction is not included in the 1.0 cap per student
- Data Edits
 - □ System Edits to ensure compliance with instructions
 - Staff Analysis of data
- Aggregate FTE by school and district for funding calculations



2013-14 Process for Reporting and Calculating FTE

(Chapter Law 2013-45, LOF)

- All instruction provided by a district reported
 - □ FTE assigned to all instruction including those courses in excess of 900 hours
 - ☐ FLVS Part-Time instruction is included in the 1.0 cap per student
- System Edits to ensure FTE is reported per instructions
- Merges all FTE for each student using a <u>common</u> student identifier
- FTE for each student is **prorated** to 1.0 based on the proportion of each course to total FTE
- FTE aggregated by school and district for funding purposes

July

October, February, June

- Modifications for school districts and FLVS reporting:
 - Defining changes needed for processes and computer code
 - Reprogram existing reporting systems
 - Testing the new computer code



Implementation: Matching FTE Using Common Student Identifier

- Each student has a common student identifier
- Communication among districts
 - Contact list for student identifiers established so student identification matching issues are resolved quickly
- 2012-13 data was analyzed
 - Matching issues were identified and sent to districts for resolution
- New 2013-14 reports available to identify matching issues
 - Students with same identifier in multiple districts
 - Students with same demographics but different student identifier
 - Exception report for student identifiers with high or low FTE that may indicate a matching problem

Florida Virtual School (FLVS) Mission Priorities

FLVS shall give priority to:

- Students who need <u>expanded access</u> to courses in order to meet their educational goals, such as <u>home</u> <u>education</u> students and students in <u>inner-city</u> and <u>rural</u> high schools who do not have access to higher-level courses.
- Students seeking <u>accelerated access</u> in order to obtain a high school diploma at least one semester early.








2012-13 FLVS Math Completions by Course

Global Tuition Rate Comparisons







State University System Enrollment Projections for Distance Learning

Non-Traditional FTE will be 24% by 2015-2016



Traditional FTE will decrease by 2015-2016


The State University System's Hybrid and Distance FTE is Expected to Grow by 34% and 36% by 2015-16 Compared to 3% Decrease in Traditional FTE


"Online" vs. "Traditional"

- Classroom courses are no longer "traditional"







Online Learning

- Expands access to higher education, degree production, and employment opportunities
- Improves teaching: faculty development,
 better tools, and support, rigorous assessment
- Helps institutions become more efficient



The Future

- The percentage of online credit hours is increasing by ~2% a year; within 8 years UCF may be half online
- Online learning serves as a laboratory for new delivery models (MOOCs, mastery-based, more starts per year, analytics, further increasing student success)

UF President Bernie Machen Florida Senate Appropriations Committee October 9, 2013



Background

UF Online created by SB 1076 to increase access to H-E, reduce its cost

Requires high-quality, fully online, four-year programs for qualified undergraduates

Florida students pay 75 percent of regular tuition (out-of-state students pay market rates)

Provides \$10 million to UF for startup costs and \$5 million for operations annually



Oversight

UF Online overseen by Florida Board of Governors five-member advisory board

Board monitors progress; reports on implementation; and advises on release of funding to university

Last week, full BOG approved UF comprehensive business plan



Implementation

UF Online Executive Director Betty Phillips to start in January

UF to offer five degree programs in January; two more in September

- Business Administration
- Criminology and Law
- Environmental Management
- Health education and behavior
- Sports Management
- Biology
- Psychology

Thirty degree programs to be offered by 2018-19 reflecting workforce needs and student demands



Future Goals

Modest expectations for January enrollment due to accelerated timeline

In ten years ...

- ~ 310,000 credit hours
- ~ 24,000 online students
- ~ \$76 million in revenues



Quality

We will maintain UF's rigorous admissions standards and quality

Online students will earn the same diploma as residential students

We will draw on extensive experience with online graduate degree programs to create new programs

We will help faculty make transition with financial, technological and teaching support
