I. Summary:

SB 108 will allow qualifying members of the Florida Retirement System to purchase credit for their prior military wartime service under more favorable conditions. Specifically, the bill will enhance the retirement benefits available to such members by enabling them to purchase up to 4 years of military wartime service under a previous repurchase formula discontinued by the Legislature in 1985. The bill will likely have a significant fiscal impact to the Florida Retirement System Trust Fund.

The bill contains a statement of public necessity as required by the State Constitution.

II. Present Situation:

Under the Florida Retirement System (FRS) members are authorized to purchase credit for certain other types of service to increase their retirement benefits. The cost for additional credit depends on the type of service claimed. Section 121.111, F.S., establishes general requirements governing the purchase of credit for military service. Currently, there are three primary methods by which military service may be claimed:

Wartime Military Service – If an FRS member was first employed in a covered position before January 1, 1987, the member may purchase credit for up to 4 years of active duty wartime service with the United States Armed Forces or allied forces. The period of military service must fall within the definition of "wartime" period as established in s. 1.01(14), F.S.¹ If one or more days of any period of active military service occurred during the dates identified as "wartime," the member may claim credit for the entire period (not to exceed 4 years). The formula for

purchasing credit under this provision is 4 percent of the member's first year's salary under the FRS for each year of service, plus annual interest (4 percent prior to 1975, and 6.5 percent thereafter) from the first year of covered employment for each year of service credit.

Military Leave of Absence – A military leave of absence occurs when a member leaves covered employment to serve in the military. To receive service credit under this provision the member must be honorably discharged and entitled to return to work under the provisions of the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Act. After the member returns to covered employment, he or she may receive credit for up to 5 years of active military service. If the military leave of absence occurs on or after December 3, 1974, the employer is responsible for payment of all employer contributions required during the period of absence.

Out-of-State Public/Federal Service – Under s. 121.1115, F.S., FRS members may elect to purchase credit for up to 5 years of out-of-state public employment. The service claimed must have been for periods of public employment in another state or for the federal government (including military service not otherwise creditable under the FRS). The formula for purchasing credit under this provision is 20 percent of the member's first year's salary under the FRS (a minimum of \$12,000), plus annual interest (6.5 percent) from the first year of covered employment for each year of service credit.

The 1985 Legislature amended ch. 121, F.S., to provide that any member whose initial employment under FRS was on or after January 1, 1987, could no longer purchase active military service as creditable service. The rational underlying this action was that the formula that determined the cost of purchasing this service did not fund the cost of the increased retirement benefit provided by including military service. Pursuant to Article X, Section 14 of the Florida Constitution, and ch. 112, F.S., retirement benefit improvements must be funded on an actuarially sound basis. Another consideration in the Legislature's decision to discontinue this repurchase option was a series of federal court rulings which increased the likelihood that the FRS would be required to subsidize both wartime and peacetime military service if either category was awarded.

In 1997, the Legislature revisited this issue and amended s. 121.1115, F.S., to allow FRS members to purchase their military service as out-of-state public service. The out-of-state cost formula is such that the purchase price covers the actuarial impact to the FRS of any service purchased under this provision, thereby transferring the cost from the retirement system to those members purchasing out-of-state service. However, the cost to purchase military service under the out-of-state provision is considerably higher than the cost to claim the service under the "wartime" provision.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill amends s. 121.111(2), F.S., to permit the purchase of wartime service as additional years of employment for members of the FRS employed after January 1, 1987. The bill effectively allows members to purchase up to 4 years of military service under the more favorable repurchase conditions of the "wartime" provision rather than the out-of-state provision. This would enable qualifying members to repurchase military service under the formula discontinued

by the Legislature in 1985. The intent of this bill is to allow affected members to purchase their military service under the less costly "wartime" provisions.

The bill also updates references to the Federal Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act and contains a statement of public necessity as required by the State Constitution.

The bill provides an effective date of July 1, 2015.

IV. Constitutional Issues:

A. Municipality/County Mandates Restrictions:

This bill will likely require counties and municipalities to implement an increase in the retirement contribution rates paid by these entities. To the extent this bill requires cities and counties to spend money or take action that requires the expenditure of money, the mandates provision of Art. VII, s. 18 of the State Constitution may apply. If those constitutional provisions do apply, in order for the law to be binding upon the cities and counties, the Legislature must find that the law fulfills an important state interest (included in section 3 of the bill), and one of the following relevant exceptions must be met:

- The expenditure is required to comply with a law that applies to all persons similarly situated; or
- The law must be approved by two-thirds of the memberships of each house of the Legislature.

This bill contains a statement indicating that the bill fulfills an important state interest and the bill applies to similarly situated persons (all employers who participate in the FRS), so it appears that this exception would apply.

This bill does not provide for the proper funding of this increased benefit and therefore does not comply with Article X, Section 18, of the Florida Constitution, requiring that any purchase in benefits must be funded on a sound actuarial basis.

B. Private Sector Impact:

The bill will enable an indeterminate number of qualifying FRS members to purchase up to 4 years of prior wartime military service under more favorable conditions.

C. Government Sector Impact:

The bill will require payroll contribution rate increases by the state and participating local entities to fully fund the benefit. In the absence of an actuarial impact analysis of this proposal, the fiscal impact of the bill is indeterminate.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

CS/SB 112 creates three special use license plates for recipients of the Combat Action Ribbon, Air Force Combat Action Medal, and the Distinguished Flying Cross medal. Revenue generated from the sale of these three special license plates will be deposited into the Grants and Donations Trust Fund and the State Homes for Veterans Trust Fund to support the State Veterans' Homes Program.

II. Present Situation:

Special Use License Plates

Current law provides for several types of license plates. In addition to plates issued for governmental or business purposes, the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) offers four basic types of plates to the general public:

- Standard plates;
- Specialty license plates;
- Personalized prestige license plates;
- Special use license plates.

Certain members of the general public may be eligible to apply for special use license plates if they are able to document their eligibility pursuant to various sections of ch. 320, F.S. Special use license plates primarily include special use military license plates as well as plates for the handicapped.

Currently, there are 15 special use license plates authorized in s. 320.089, F.S., available to military service members or veterans for the following types of service:¹

- Veteran of the United States Armed Forces;
- Active or retired member of the Florida National Guard;
- Survivor of the attack on Pearl Harbor;
- Recipient of the Purple Heart Medal;
- Active or retired member of any branch of the United States Armed Forces Reserve;
- Recipient of the Combat Infantry Badge;
- Recipient of the Combat Medical Badge;
- Recipient of the Combat Action Badge;
- Former Prisoner of War:
- Veteran of the Korean War:
- Veteran of the Vietnam War;
- Service member or veteran of Operation Desert Shield;
- Service member or veteran of Operation Desert Storm;
- Service member or veteran of Operation Enduring Freedom;
- Service member or veteran of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Special use license plates authorized under s. 320.089, F.S., are each stamped with words consistent with the type of special use plate issued. For example, a special use plate issued to a current or former member of the Florida National Guard is stamped with the words "National Guard." Additionally, a likeness of the related campaign medal or badge appears on the plate followed by the serial number.

Applicants for special use license plates in s. 320.089, F.S., are required to pay the annual license tax in s. 320.08, F.S., with the exception of certain disabled veterans who qualify for the Pearl Harbor, Purple Heart, or Prisoner of War plate, to whom such plates are issued at no cost.² The first \$100,000 of the general revenue generated annually from the issuance of special use plates is deposited into the Grants and Donations Trust Fund under the Veterans' Nursing Homes of Florida Act, as described in s. 296.38(2), F.S.³ Any additional general revenue is deposited into the State Homes for Veterans Trust Fund and used to construct, operate, and maintain domiciliary and nursing homes for veterans.⁴ For fiscal year 2013-2014 the total revenue from these plates was \$2,087,743.⁵

Currently, three special use license plates are established in the Florida Statutes to recognize combat service for current or former Army personnel.⁶ However, no special use license plate exists to recognize the awards for service in combat for current or former members of the Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard.

Distinguished Flying Cross

America's oldest military aviation award, the Distinguished Flying Cross, was created in the Air Corps Act by the United States Congress on July 2, 1926. It is a U.S. military decoration awarded to an individual recipient, an aviator, who distinguished himself by heroism or extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight. Eligibility is dependent on service after April 6, 1917 in an Air Corps of either the United States Armed Forces or Armed Forces Reserves. The medal is not limited to combat operations and may be awarded for achievement during times of peace. The Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps are authorized to use the "V" device, or "Combat V," which denotes that the medal was awarded for heroism.

Combat Action Ribbon

The Combat Action Ribbon recognizes members of the Navy and Marine Corps who rendered satisfactory performance under enemy fire while actively participating in a ground or surface engagement on or after December 7, 1941. Members of the Coast Guard who served while under the control of the Navy are also eligible for this award. The Combat Action Ribbon may also be awarded to individuals who faced direct exposure to the detonation of an Improvise Explosive Device and personnel who serve in clandestine or special operations. The Secretary of the Navy determines which operations meet the criteria for this award. However, only one award per operation is authorized.

Air Force Combat Action Medal

Created on March 15, 2007 the Air Force Combat Action Medal recognizes members of the Air Force who actively participated in ground or air combat on or after September 11, 2001. Nomination for the award is restricted to military members who:

- Deliberately go into the enemy's domain to conduct official duties, either on the ground or in the air, and have come under enemy fire by lethal weapons, and are at risk of grave danger; or
- While defending the base, have come under fire and engage the enemy with direct and lethal fire, and are at the risk of grave danger.

Members from other branches of the United States Armed Forces are also eligible for the award provided they served with a U.S. Air Force unit and meet the award criteria. Subsequent operations that qualify for the award are recognized on the medal through the use of a gold star device rather than issuing a second medal.⁹

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill amends s. 320.089, F.S., to create three special use license plates for recipients of the Combat Action Ribbon, Air Force Combat Action Badge, and Distinguished Flying Cross to purchase. The plate will be stamped with the words "Combat Action Ribbon," "Air Force Combat Action Medal," or "Distinguished Flying Cross" as appropriate with an image of the award, followed by the serial number. Revenue generated from the sale of these license plates will be administered in the same manner as the existing special use license plates in s. 320.089, F.S., and deposited into the Grants and Donations Trust Fund and the State Homes for Veterans Trust Fund to support the State Veterans' Homes Program.

The bill provides an effective date of July 1, 2015.

V. Fiscal Impact Statement:

B. Private Sector Impact:

A special use license plate would be available to a new group of registrants who are recipients of the Combat Action Ribbon, Air Force Combat Action Medal, or Distinguished Flying Cross. The cost for an eligible individual to purchase such plate will range from \$45-\$75.

C. Government Sector Impact:

According to the DHSMV, the initial startup cost to create and manufacture a special use license plate is 6,204. An initial order of 2,200 license plates would be made (2,200 x) 2.82 = 6,204 for each newly created plate and distributed to Tax Collector offices

statewide to meet public demand.¹¹ The total estimated cost to produce and distribute the three new special use license plates is approximately \$18,642.

The DHSMV also estimated 130 non-recurring programming hours will be needed to create one new special use plate at an estimated cost of \$5,200. According to DHSMV, this cost can be absorbed with existing resources. ¹² It is unknown if programming costs would increase for creation of additional special use plates.

Additionally, the bill could have a positive impact on the Grants and Donations Trust Fund and the State Homes for Veteran's Trust Fund with the sale of the three new special use license plates.

I. Summary:

SB 132 prohibits the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles from requiring a totally and permanently disabled veteran to provide a certificate of disability in order to renew a disabled parking permit.

II. Present Situation:

Disabled Parking Permits

Section 320.0848, F.S., authorizes the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles and its agents to issue disabled parking permits to persons with impaired mobility. Such permits may be issued for a period of up to 4 years to any person with a long-term mobility impairment. Similarly, persons with a temporary mobility impairment may be issued a temporary disabled parking permit for a period of up to 6 months. A fee may be charged for the permit. However, no person may be charged a fee more frequently than once every 12 months. An applicant for a disabled parking permit must submit either in person or by mail an application and certificate of disability to their local tax collector.

The disabled parking permit is a placard that can be placed in a motor vehicle so as to be visible from the front and rear of the vehicle. Each side of the placard must have the international symbol of accessibility in a contrasting color in the center so as to be visible. One side of the placard must display the applicant's driver's license number or state identification card number along with a warning that the applicant must have such identification at all times while using the parking permit.

A person applying for a disabled parking permit must be currently certified as being legally blind or as having any of the following conditions which would render the person unable to walk 200 feet without stopping to rest:

• The inability to walk without a brace, cane, crutch, prosthetic device, or other assistive device, or without the assistance of another person;

- The need to permanently use a wheelchair;
- Lung disease as measured within specified limits;
- Use of portable oxygen;
- A Class III or IV heart condition; or
- A severe limitation in the ability to walk due to an arthritic, neurological, or orthopedic condition.

The certification must be made by a physician, podiatrist, optometrist, advanced registered nurse practitioner, or physician's assistant, any of which must be licensed under one of various chapters of Florida Statute. However, provisions are made to encompass certification by similarly-licensed physicians from other states, as well. The certification must include:

- The disability of the applicant;
- The certifying practitioner's name, address, and certification number;
- The eligibility criteria for the permit;
- Information concerning the penalty for falsification;
- The duration of the condition; and
- Justification for any additional placard issued.

To renew a long-term disabled parking permit, the permit holder is required to recertify his or her eligibility for the permit by providing a certificate of disability issued within the last 12 months. Recertification of a disability is also required when obtaining a replacement for a disabled parking permit that has been lost or stolen. Long-term disabled parking permits do not require a renewal fee and the fee for obtaining a replacement permit is \$1.

Service-Disabled Veterans

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (USDVA) assigns disability ratings to veterans who suffer from service-related injuries and seek USDVA benefits. A veteran's disability rating ranges from 0-percent to 100-percent and is illustrative of the severity and impact of the injury or injuries suffered by the individual. The USDVA's rating schedule is intended to reflect the average losses in earning stemming from certain medical conditions. The USDVA determines the disability level for an eligible veteran, and Congress sets the compensation rates for veterans based on ratings.

In some cases, the degree of a veteran's service-connected disability is determined to be total and permanent. A total disability (100%) is one where there is present any impairment of mind or body which is sufficient to render it impossible for the average person to follow substantially gainful occupation.² The disability is classified as permanent and total when the total disability is reasonably certain to continue throughout the life of the disabled person.³ Federal law identifies a permanent total veteran disability as the permanent loss or loss of use of both hands, or of both

feet, or of one hand and one foot, or of the sight of both eyes, or becoming permanently helpless or bedridden.⁴ Further, diseases and injuries which are totally incapacitating are regarded as permanently and totally disabling when the probability of permanent improvement under treatment is remote.⁵

Disability ratings can change if there is evidence that a disability has improved, or if evidence indicates there has been a material change in a disability or that the current rating may be incorrect.⁶ The USDVA is authorized to reexamine veterans receiving compensation benefits at any time, with some exceptions. These exceptions include, among others, a disability that is established as static and in cases of veterans over the age of 55.⁷

FY 2014-2015 FDVA Total Budget








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
Florida Division of Emergency Management

Bryan Koon, Director

OVERVIEW

The Florida Division of Emergency Management ensures that Florida is prepared to respond to emergencies, recover from them, and mitigate against their impacts. The Division derives authority from Florida Statutes Chapter 252.

The State Emergency Response Team (SERT) is Florida's unified command body for emergency events. It is comprised of representatives from state agencies, Cabinet-level departments, the Florida National Guard, private sector partners, and non-profit organizations. The Governor serves as the head of the SERT, and is responsible for appointing the State Coordinating Officer (SCO).

DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

The Director is appointed by the Governor of Florida, and serves as the agency head. The Director oversees the day-to-day operations of the Division, including direct supervision of the functional areas tasked with Preparedness, Response, Recovery, Mitigation, and Finance and Administration. Director Bryan W. Koon was appointed in 2011 by Governor Rick Scott.

Finance and Administration

Finance and Administration is responsible for financial and administrative management of the Division of Emergency Management. The Finance Bureaus includes budget, finance, and procurement for the Division.








BUREAU OF MITIGATION

The Bureau of Mitigation administers several federal grant programs including the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program, Flood Mitigation Assistance Program, Severe Repetitive Loss Program, and the Repetitive Flood Claims Program.

Mitigation is an integral part of the Division. Mitigation programs work to reduce or eliminate the loss of life and property by lessening the impact of disasters. The Division strives to fortify Florida's infrastructure against the effects of future disasters through proactive structural enhancement and policy initiatives.

The Bureau works with county and municipal governments, non-profit organizations, other state agencies, and individuals throughout Florida to enhance the state's resistance to disasters.





BUREAU OF RESPONSE

Responding to disasters is the foremost priority of Florida's Emergency Management Team. The Response Bureau includes operations, logistics, infrastructure, and the domestic security functions. The Florida State Watch Office and the state meteorologist provide valuable information during both "blue sky" operations and emergencies. The Division has a Regional Coordination Team that includes seven regional coordinators and a manager, which provides support to local emergency management offices.

Division personnel, individual state agencies and Cabinet-level departments staff the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) with Emergency Coordinating Officers (ECO) and other support personnel to assist with the overall state response efforts. ECOs lead individual Emergency Support Functions (ESF) and work under the State Coordinating Officer when the state is under an Executive Order (EO).







BUREAU OF RECOVERY







The Recovery Bureau provides disaster assistance to individuals and families through state and federal disaster assistance, and carries out preliminary damage assessments of disaster-impacted areas. Once a financial impact has been determined, the Governor may request a federal declaration for assistance. If a declaration is granted, the Recovery Bureau then provides assistance to public entities and individuals as outlined in the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act.

The Division is responsible for facilitating the postdisaster rebuilding process through individual and public assistance programs and for maintaining a record of all state and federal recovery funds distributed. The Recovery Bureau facilitates disaster debris clean-up and provides applicants information to ensure compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act.

BUREAU OF PREPAREDNESS

In order to respond to a disaster and provide valuable information in a post-disaster environment, the State Emergency Response Team must maintain the highest level of training. The Division provides numerous training opportunities for emergency managers of all levels including statewide exercises based on real life scenarios.



The Bureau of Preparedness is responsible for the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan. Each year staff members meet with county emergency management officials to review and approve disaster plans. The Bureau also oversees the statewide radiological preparedness and regulation efforts and is legally tasked with implementing the federal Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act in Florida and supporting the State Emergency Response Commission.





2015 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES



HURRICANE LOSS MITIGATION PROGRAM

Amend F.S. 215.559

- Currently F.S. 215.559 Hurricane Loss Mitigation Program, the Legislature appropriates \$10 million annually to the Division to identify programs to mitigate against future disasters.
- Seven million dollars in funds shall be used for programs to improve the <u>wind resistance</u> of residences and mobile homes, including loans, subsidies, grants, demonstration projects, and direct assistance, educating persons concerning the Florida Building Code cooperative programs with local governments and the Federal Government; and other efforts to prevent or reduce losses or reduce the costs of rebuilding after a disaster.



HURRICANE LOSS MITIGATION PROGRAM

Amend F.S. 215.559

- The proposed legislation will amend F.S. 215.559 Hurricane Loss Mitigation Program to read to allow the Division to use the \$7 million for all types of mitigation programs that reduce the impact to residences and mobile homes, including loans, subsidies, grants, demonstration projects, and direct assistance, educating persons concerning the Florida Building Code cooperative programs with local governments and the Federal Government; and other efforts to prevent or reduce losses or reduce the costs of rebuilding after a disaster.
- An expansion of the mitigation programs to allow for flood mitigation will allow the Division to work with communities to make them more resistant to storm surge related to hurricanes.



REPEAL GENERATOR REPORT

Amend 252.35

- Currently F.S. 252.35 (2)(s) states that the Division must complete an inventory of portable generators owned by the State and local governments which are capable of operating during a major disaster.
- The proposed legislation will amend F.S. 252.35 (2)(s) to remove the requirement for the Division to maintain a list of portable generators owned by the state and local governments.
- Following the 2004/2005 hurricane seasons, the Division has developed partnerships with the private sector to identify generators that could be available during an event.
- The Division works with the private sector to encourage them to secure generators for their own use, thereby reducing the need for the state to provide the generators in a disaster.
