2018 Legislative Session in Review Week 8 February 26 - March 2, 2018



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With one week left in Session, we are nearing completion of the budget conference

Dear Constituent and Friend,

process to match the House and Senate spending plans. These must match-up and balance before we send the budget to the Governor, who can either sign, line item veto, or veto entirely. As we wrap up the budget process, we continue to hear other legislation important to our state. Filed bills on the move:

SB 620: Disaster Preparedness Tax Exemption: establishes two 7-day periods during which items purchased to prepare and reduce the effects of disasters, like

hurricanes and tropical storms are exempt from state sales tax. The first period begins Friday, June 1, 2018, and ends Thursday, June 7, 2018, and the second period begins Friday, July 6, 2018, and ends Thursday, July 12, 2018. To help you prepare your disaster supply kit, exempt items include flashlights, radios, tarps, "tie-down" kits, fuel tanks, batteries, cell phone chargers, portable power banks,

food storage coolers, generators, reusable ice and carbon monoxide detectors. The bill now comes to the floor for a final vote. On the Senate Floor:

misdemeanor offenses that qualify an offender to participate, which creates more uniformity in who can participate. The requirements for completion of the diversion program include but are not limited to, community service hours, payment of restitution (if applicable) and participation in intervention services as indicated by an assessment

SB 1392: Prearrest Diversion Programs: requires the establishment of prearrest

diversion programs, civil citations or similar prearrest programs for adults and juveniles in each judicial circuit across the state. Each judicial circuit must specify the

officer. Currently, prearrest diversion programs are handled differently in different parts of the state, this program is voluntary for qualifying offenders and would not get rid of existing diversion programs. If an adult or juvenile does not successfully complete the prearrest diversion program, the arresting officer must determine if there is good cause to complete a formal arrest of the adult or juvenile for the original misdemeanor offense or, allow the individual to continue in the prearrest diversion program. In addition, a nonjudicial record of arrest for a misdemeanor offense of a juvenile who has successfully completed a diversion program will be expunged.

This bill spares primarily first-time offenders who commit minor crimes from the consequences of entering the criminal justice system. Implementation of prearrest diversion promotes public safety creates a positive impact in communities as data shows that most individuals receiving civil citations or other prearrest diversion services

do not reoffend and have no record that would prevent them from getting gainful employment. Session snapshots:
