4. Project/Program Description:

The Girl Matters: Continuity of Care Model is a research-based, highly-effective intervention with successful documented outcomes that improves public safety and saves money. This program saves the State of Florida and estimated \$1.3M per year for every 30 girls diverted from residential lock-up. This calculation is based on the latest DJJ budget report (submitted October 2016) which shows non-secure residential per diem at \$247 per day, or \$44,460 per six months (average stay for girls is 6-9 months). Based on a data analysis of the FL DJJ Positive Achievement Change Tool, Assessment (PACT), girls on the First Coast region (Duval, Clay, Nassau, Baker, St. John's Counties) reported greater risk factors than girls statewide in every category-physical and sexual abuse, mental health needs, self-mutilation, suicidal ideation and attempts, and family risk factors. 11. Program Performance:

a. What is the specific purpose or goal that will be achieved by the funds requested?

The goal of the Girl Matters: Continuity of Care program is to slow down the conveyor belt of girls going deeper in the justice system and shut the revolving doors of girls who cycle in and out of the justice system due to unaddressed mental health needs through a multipronged approach that promotes the health and wellbeing of girls, reduces recidivism rates, and provides alternatives to incarceration.

b. What are the activities and services that will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

1) Individualized Assessment Services- Each girl that is referred will receive a complete intake assessment which includes psychosocial assessment and family strengths and needs assessment. The care manager completes the PAT assessment to determine risk domains. The care manager develops care plans with girls/families, prioritizes needs, and develops strategies to address needs. Assessments may also include Juvenile Assessment and Intervention System Assessment (JAIS), diagnostic assessments as needed, and ongoing feedback surveys. 2) Care Management and Coordination of services- Each girl has access to a 24 hour support line whenever she feels unsafe, needs support, or is in crisis. Each care plan details the interventions to meet the individual needs of girls based on assessment. (Email for more information)

d. What are the direct services to be provided to citizens by the appropriations project?

The following summarizes the types and amount of serves to be provided to system-involved girls aged 11-18 and their family members: •Diversion Groups (estimated 24 groups per year/90 girls served annually):

Psychoeducational group for girls who are court ordered by the State Attorney's Office to attend diversion for first time misdemeanor offenses. Groups are designed to improve communication skills and education girls/caregivers about available resources. In addition, girls and families are offered the opportunity to continue individual therapy sessions when needed. •SAVVY Sister enrichment groups in detention (facilitated twice)

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weekly 104 groups per year /150 girls annually): The SAVVY Sister (Safety, Action, Values, Victory, Yes I Can) groups are conducted twice weekly in 2-hour sessions with girls in detention. Two separate groups are held at the detention center based on the ages of girls (11-14 and 15-17). (Email for more information)

e. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The Policy Center seeks to sustain the implementation of Girl Matters: Continuity of Care to provide intensive girl-centered care management and crisis intervention services to an estimated 300 underserved girls (and their caregivers) aged 11-17 years old, living on the First Coast, who are in diversion, on probation, in detention, or are returning to the community from residential placement in order to reduce risk factors leading to deeper system involvement.

- f. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?
 - •Services provided to an estimated 300 girls and their caregivers who are underserved and are at risk of deeper involvement in the justice system •Increase in access and quality of mental health services (e.g. satisfaction with groups, knowledge of resources and confidence to access services, useful information/lessons)
 •Girls reporting increase in quality of life indicators (e.g., safety, social supports, relationship to therapist, self-reported positive changes) •Reduced symptomology after six months for girls receiving individual therapy with consistent group attendance •Reduced involvement in the Juvenile Justice System. The Policy Center has a research team that has developed proven processes for measuring and documenting program performance.
