	a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?
	Junior Achievement is proud to receive extraordinary private sector support for its programming however with reasonable support from the state an additional 10,000 Florida Students, (including minority and students from under-served communities) will obtain the knowledge required to successfully navigate the world of work and the money management skills, to be on track to take control of their personal finances and future careers.
b.	What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?
	Junior Achievement will implement workforce programming in Florida schools. The programming comes directly from the Junior Achievement curricula and provides a specific emphasis on assisting at risk students and students from under-served communities. Focus will be on 5 of Junior Achievements most requested Work Force Readiness programs. JA Career Success, JA Inspire, JA It's My Job, JA Job Shadow and JA Be Entrepreneurial.
C.	What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?
	Junior Achievement provides workforce programming for students across Florida. This programming helps prepare students for high demand careers. JA provides a specific emphasis on serving minority students and students in under-served communities.

	10,000 students across Florida benefit from Junior Achievements Work Force Readiness programs with a specific emphasis on our a risk and under-served student population.
