Effective January 1, 2004, subsection (5) 12 of section 322.18, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 13 322.18 Original applications, licenses, and renewals; 14 expiration of licenses; delinquent licenses .--15 (5) All renewal driver's licenses may be issued after 16 17 the applicant licensee has been determined to be eligible by 18 the department. 19 (a) A licensee who is otherwise eligible for renewal 20 and who is over 79 years of age: Must submit to and pass a vision test administered 21 22 at any driver's license office; or 23 If the licensee applies for an extension by mail as provided in subsection (8), must submit to a vision test 24 administered by a physician licensed under chapter 458 or 25 26 chapter 459, or an optometrist licensed under chapter 463, must send the results of that test to the department on a form 27 2.8 obtained from the department and signed by such health care practitioner, and must meet vision standards that are 29 equivalent to the standards for passing the departmental 30 vision test. The physician or optometrist may submit the

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results of a vision test by a department-approved electronic 2 means. 3 (b) A licensee who is over 79 years of age may not submit an application for extension under subsection (8) by 4 5 electronic or telephonic means, unless the results of a vision 6 test have been electronically submitted in advance by the 7 physician or optometrist. 8 Section 2. (1) The Department of Highway Safety and 9 Motor Vehicles shall study the effects of aging on driving 10 ability. The purpose of the study is to develop a 11 comprehensive approach to licensing drivers. (2) Issues to be studied by the department shall 12 include the: 13 (a) Effective and efficient identification of drivers 14 at risk of being involved in a motor vehicle accident because 15 of functional limitations that effect their driving ability; 16 (b) Prevalence and effect of degenerative processes 17 affecting vision, hearing, mobility, cognitive functions and 18 19 reaction time; 20 (c) Implementation and effect of the department's 21 vision screening requirements and examination of new 22 technologies; (d) Availability and effectiveness of remedial 23 24 measures such as skills training, adaptive equipment, physical therapy and adjustment of driving practices that will allow 25 people to drive safely for as long as possible; 26 27 (e) Availability of alternative forms of 28 transportation for people who can no longer safely drive; and 29 (f) Effectiveness of existing public education

initiatives relating to at-risk drivers.

1	(3) The department shall report the results of the
2	study to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the
3	House of Representatives by February 1, 2004. The report shall
4	include findings of the study and recommendations for
5	improving the safety of at-risk drivers.
6	(4) The department shall appoint an advisory council
7	to participate in the study and to advise the department on
8	issues related to older at-risk drivers on an ongoing basis.
9	The council shall be known as the Florida At-Risk Driver
10	Council. Members of the council shall include representatives
11	of organizations involved with issues facing older drivers
12	including state agencies, medical professionals, senior
13	citizen advocacy groups, providers of services to senior
14	citizens, and research entities.
15	Section 3. Except as otherwise expressly provided in
16	this act, this act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

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21	The Committee Substitute differs from CS/SB 52 in the following ways:
22	An optician is not authorized to perform the required vision
23	test.
24	The study of the effects of aging on driving ability conducted by the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles must
25	include hearing as one of the subjects studied.
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
