Paragraph (b) of subsection (4) of section 7 489.517, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 8 489.517 Renewal of certificate or registration; 9 continuing education .--10 (4) 11 (b) Of the 14 classroom hours of continuing education required, at least 7 hours must be on technical subjects, 1 12 hour on workers' compensation, 1 hour on workplace safety, and 13 1 hour on business practices, and for alarm system contractors 14 15 and electrical contractors engaged in alarm system contracting, 2 hours on false alarm prevention. 16 17 Section 2. Section 489.518, Florida Statutes, is 18 amended to read: 19 489.518 Alarm system agents.--20 (1) A licensed electrical or alarm system contractor 21 may not employ a person to perform the duties of a burglar 22 alarm system agent unless the person: (a) Is at least 18 years of age or has evidence of a 23 24 court-approved declaration of emancipation. 25 (b) Has successfully completed a minimum of 14 12 hours of training, to include basic alarm system electronics 26 27 in addition to related training including CCTV and access control training, with at least 2 hours of training in the 28 29 prevention of false alarms. Such training shall be from a board-approved provider, and the employee or applicant for 30 31 employment shall provide proof of successful completion to the 2

1 licensed employer. The board shall by rule establish criteria 2 for the approval of training courses and providers and may by 3 rule establish criteria for accepting alternative nonclassroom education on an hour-for-hour basis. The board shall approve 4 5 providers that conduct training in other than the English б language. The board shall establish a fee for the approval of 7 training providers or courses, not to exceed \$60. Qualified 8 employers may conduct training classes for their employees, 9 with board approval.

10 (c) Has not been convicted within the last 3 years of 11 a crime that directly relates to the business for which employment is being sought. Although the employee is barred 12 13 from operating as an alarm system agent for 3 years subsequent to his or her conviction, the employer shall be supplied the 14 information regarding any convictions occurring prior to that 15 time, and the employer may at his or her discretion consider 16 17 an earlier conviction to be a bar to employment as an alarm system agent. To ensure that this requirement has been met, a 18 19 licensed electrical or alarm contractor must obtain from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and Federal Bureau of 20 Investigation a completed fingerprint and criminal background 21 22 check, including a check through the National Crime Information Center. Each individual subject to the background 23 24 criminal history check shall file a complete set of 25 fingerprints with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement for state processing and with the Federal Bureau of 26 27 Investigation for federal processing for each applicant for 28 employment as a burglar alarm system agent or for each 29 individual currently employed on the effective date of this 30 act as a burglar alarm system agent. 31

23	any local jurisdiction, or an alarm technician licensed by a

25	or training as licensure qualifications, is not required to
26	complete the training required for burglar alarm system

1 (e) A nonsupervising employee working as a helper or apprentice under the direct, on-site, continuous supervision 2 3 of a state-certified electrical contractor, a state-registered electrical contractor, a state-certified alarm system 4 5 contractor, a state-registered alarm system contractor, a б journeyman electrician licensed by any local jurisdiction, an 7 alarm technician licensed by a local jurisdiction that 8 requires an examination and experience or training as licensure qualifications, or a qualified alarm system agent is 9 10 not required to complete the training otherwise required and 11 is not required to be 18 years of age or older. Section 489.5185, Florida Statutes, is 2 amended to read: 3 489.5185 Fire alarm system agents.--4 (1) A certified unlimited electrical contractor or 5 licensed fire alarm contractor may not employ a person to б perform the duties of a fire alarm system agent unless the 7 person: 8 (a) Is at least 18 years of age or has evidence of a 9 court-approved declaration of emancipation. 10 (b) Has successfully completed a minimum of 14 18 11 hours of initial training, to include basic fire alarm system technology in addition to related training in National Fire 12 Protection Association (NFPA) codes and standards and access 13 control training, with at least 2 hours of training in the 14 prevention of false alarms. Such training must be from a 15 board-approved provider, and the employee or applicant for 16 17 employment must provide proof of successful completion to the 18 licensed employer. The board, by rule, shall establish 19 criteria for the approval of training courses and providers. 20 The board shall approve qualified providers that conduct training in other than the English language. The board shall 21 establish a fee for the approval of training providers, not to 22 exceed \$200, and a fee for the approval of courses at \$25 per 23 24 credit hour, not to exceed \$100 per course. required to complete the training required for fire alarm

(3) An applicant for employment as a fire alarm system 4 5 agent may commence employment, or an individual employed as a б fire alarm system agent on the effective date of this act may 7 continue employment, pending completion of both the training 8 and the fingerprint and criminal background checks required by 9 this section, for a period not to exceed 90 days after the 10 date of application for employment or 90 days after the 11 effective date of this act for individuals employed as fire alarm system agents on that date. However, the person must 12 work under the direction and control of a sponsoring certified 13 unlimited electrical contractor or licensed fire alarm 14 contractor until completion of both the training and the 15 fingerprint and criminal background checks. If an applicant or 16 17 an individual employed on the effective date of this act does 18 not complete the training or receive satisfactory fingerprint 19 and criminal background checks within the 90-day period, the 20 employment must be terminated immediately.

Section 489.529, Florida Statutes, is 23 24 amended to read: 489.529 Alarm verification calls required.--All 25 residential or commercial intrusion/burglary alarms that have 26 27 central monitoring must have a central monitoring verification 28 call made to the premises generating the alarm signal, prior 29 to alarm monitor personnel contacting a law enforcement agency for alarm dispatch. The central monitoring station must be 30 31 designed to make a second call to the premises generating the 11

alarm signal if the first call is not answered. However, if the intrusion/burglary alarms have properly operating visual or auditory sensors that enable the monitoring personnel to verify the alarm signal, verification calling is not required. Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004. б STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR $$\underline{SB}$$ 562 The committee substitute adds an additional background check for alarm system agents and fire alarm system agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation. It also requires that submission of a complete set of fingerprints with the Department of Law Enforcement and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
