720	(d) Except as stipulated by the board, the exemptions in
721	this subsection do not apply to any person licensed under this
722	section whose license has been revoked or suspended by the board
723	or whose license or certification in another jurisdiction has
724	been revoked or suspended by the licensing or certifying
725	authority in that jurisdiction.
726	(e) This subsection may not be construed to exempt a
727	person from meeting the minimum standards of performance in
