Section 1003.495, Florida Statutes, is 2.4 created to read: 25 1003.495 Advanced Placement courses and teacher 26 27 training.--28 (1) The purpose of this section is to ensure that each Florida student receives a sufficient education for success 29 after high school and that all students have equal access to a 30 substantive and rigorous curriculum that is designed to 31

1 challenge their minds, enhance their knowledge and skills, and 2 prepare them for success in college and work. (2) For purposes of this section: 3 4 (a) "Advanced Placement course" means a course sponsored by the College Board that is offered for college 5 6 credit at the high school level and taught by an Advanced 7 Placement teacher. 8 (b) "Advanced Placement Vertical Team" means a group of teachers and educators from different grade levels in a 9 10 given discipline who work cooperatively to develop and implement a vertically aligned program aimed at helping 11 12 students from diverse backgrounds acquire the academic skills 13 necessary for success in Advanced Placement courses and other challenging courses. 14 (c) "Pre-Advanced Placement teacher training" means a 15 16 set of professional development resources and services 17 designed to equip middle and high school teachers with the 18 strategies and tools they need to engage their students in active, high-level learning, thereby ensuring that middle and 19 20 high school students develop the skills, habits of mind, and 21 concepts they need to succeed in Advanced Placement courses. 22 (3) By the 2007-2008 school year, each high school in 23 the state must offer at least four Advanced Placement courses, one each in English, mathematics, science, and a foreign 2.4 language taught by an Advanced Placement teacher. 25 (4) The State Board of Education shall establish 26 27 clear, specific, and challenging training guidelines that 2.8 require each teacher of an Advanced Placement course to have obtained recognized Advanced Placement teacher training 29 30 endorsed by the College Board. The State Board of Education 31

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1 may vary the quidelines based on the number of years a teacher 2 has taught an Advanced Placement course. (5) Funds to provide Advanced Placement and 3 4 Pre-Advanced Placement teacher training to Florida teachers 5 shall be provided annually in the General Appropriations Act. 6 This training shall: 7 (a) Provide Advanced Placement teachers and 8 Pre-Advanced Placement teachers with the necessary content 9 knowledge and instructional skills to prepare students for 10 success in Advanced Placement courses and examinations and other advanced course examinations and mastery of 11 12 postsecondary course content. 13 (b) Provide school administrators and counselors with professional development that will enable them to create 14 strong and effective Advanced Placement programs in their 15 16 schools. 17 (c) Provide teachers in the middle grades and high 18 school with Advanced Placement Vertical Team training and 19 other Pre-Advanced Placement professional development to prepare students for success in Advanced Placement courses. 2.0 21 (d) Support the implementation of an instructional 2.2 program for students in grades 6-12 which provides an 23 integrated set of instructional materials, diagnostic assessments, and teacher professional development in reading, 2.4 writing, and mathematics which prepares all students for 25 enrollment and success in Advanced Placement courses and in 26 27 college. 2.8 (6) In order to ensure that each student receives a sufficient education for success in college or work after high 29 school and that all students have equal access to a 30 substantive and rigorous curriculum that is designed to 31

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1 challenge their minds and enhance their knowledge and skills, 2 school districts must offer rigorous courses in grades 6-11 that prepare students for the demands of Advanced Placement 3 4 coursework. 5 (7) The State Board of Education shall: б (a) Seek federal funding through the Advanced 7 Placement Incentive Program and the Math and Science 8 Partnership Program to support Advanced Placement and Pre-Advanced Placement teacher training and the implementation 9 10 of an integrated instructional program for students in grades 6-12 in reading, writing, and mathematics which prepares all 11 12 students for enrollment and success in Advanced Placement 13 courses and in college. (b) Focus state and federal funding to carry out 14 activities that target school districts serving high 15 concentrations of low-income and underrepresented students. 16 17 (c) Provide a plan of communication which includes, 18 but need not be limited to, disseminating to parents materials 19 that emphasize the importance of Advanced Placement courses or 20 other advanced courses to a student's ability to gain access 21 to and to succeed in postsecondary education and materials 2.2 that emphasize the importance of the PSAT/NMSQT, which provide 23 diagnostic feedback on skills and relate student scores to the probability of success in Advanced Placement courses and 2.4 examinations. Such information shall also be disseminated to 25 students, teachers, counselors, administrators, school 26 27 districts, community colleges, and state universities. 2.8 (d) Annually evaluate the impact of the implementation of this section on the rates of student enrollment and success 29 in Advanced Placement courses, on high school graduation 30 rates, and on college enrollment rates. 31
