10	Section 1. Subsections (41) and (42) are added to section
11	327.02, Florida Statutes, to read:
12	327.02 Definitions of terms used in this chapter and in
13	chapter 328As used in this chapter and in chapter 328, unless
14	the context clearly requires a different meaning, the term:
15	(41) "Commercial parasailing" means providing or offering
16	to provide, for consideration, any activity involving the towing
17	of a person by a motorboat when:
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18	(a) One or more persons are tethered to the towing vessel;
19	(b) The person or persons ascend above the water; and
20	(c) The person or persons remain suspended above the water
21	while the vessel is underway.
22	(42) "Sustained wind speed" means a wind speed determined
23	by averaging the observed wind speed rounded to the nearest whole
24	knot over a 2-minute period.
25	Section 2. Section 327.375, Florida Statutes, is created to
26	read:
27	327.375 Commercial parasailing
28	(1) This section may be cited as the "Amber May White Act."
29	(2) A person may not operate or give permission for the
30	operation of a vessel engaged in commercial parasailing unless
31	the owner has obtained an annual license from the commission at a
32	cost of \$50. All license fees collected shall be paid into the
33	Marine Resources Conservation Trust Fund to recover the
34	associated costs of regulating commercial parasailing. The
35	license must be available for inspection when the vessel is
36	engaged in commercial parasailing. Proof of insurance, as
37	required in subsection (3), must be provided to the commission
38	before a license may be issued.
39	(3) The owner of a vessel engaged in commercial parasailing
40	must obtain and carry a policy from an authorized insurer or an
41	eligible surplus lines insurer, insuring against an accident,
42	loss, injury, property damage, or other casualty caused by or
43	resulting from the commercial parasailing activity. The insurance
44	policy must provide coverage for a minimum of \$500,000 per person
45	and \$1 million per event. The deductible for the insurance policy
46	may not exceed \$5,000 per event. Proof of insurance must be kept
47	at any location where a person offers or agrees to conduct

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48	commercial parasailing activities and must be on any vessel
49	conducting parasailing activities. This proof of insurance must
50	be posted on the vessel in plain view and available for
51	inspection whenever commercial parasailing activities are
52	conducted. A person engaging in commercial parasailing activity
53	must provide to each parasail rider upon request a copy of the
54	certificate of insurance, including the insurance carrier's name
55	and address and the insurance policy number.
56	(4) A person engaged in commercial parasailing must meet
57	the following requirements:
58	(a) Commercial parasail operators shall launch riders only
59	from and recover riders only to the vessel.
60	(b) A person may not operate a vessel engaged in commercial
61	parasailing on the waters of this state unless the person in
62	charge of or in command of the vessel has a current and valid
63	license issued by the United States Coast Guard authorizing that
64	person to engage in carrying passengers for hire. The license
65	must be appropriate for the number of passengers carried and the
66	displacement of the vessel. The license must be carried on the
67	vessel and be available for inspection while commercial
68	parasailing activities are conducted.
69	(c) A person may not operate a vessel for commercial
70	parasailing unless an observer 18 years of age or older is
71	present in the vessel at all times to monitor the progress of any
72	tethered parasail rider and parasail equipment. The observer
73	shall be attentive to the parasail rider or riders and equipment
74	and may not have any other duties while the rider or riders are
75	in the water or suspended above the water.
76	(d) A person may not operate any vessel engaged in
77	commercial parasailing unless:
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78	1. All riders wear an appropriate floatation device
79	approved by the United States Coast Guard, other than an
80	inflatable device, which is in serviceable condition and of the
81	proper size;
82	2. The vessel is in full compliance with all requirements
83	of the United States Coast Guard governing crewing and equipment
84	carriage for passenger-carrying vessels as specified in the Code
85	of Federal Regulations or as otherwise specified by the United
86	States Coast Guard in the vessel's certificate of inspection; and
87	3. The vessel is equipped with a functional VHF marine
88	transceiver.
89	(e) No more than two persons may be tethered to the towing
90	vessel and ascend above the water at any time.
91	(f) A person may not operate a vessel towing a commercial
92	parasailing rider on any waters of the state less than 2,500 feet
93	from the shore. The restriction applies to the entire commercial
94	parasailing apparatus, including the vessel, towline, and rider.
95	(g) A person may not operate a vessel towing a commercial
96	parasailing rider so that the vessel, towline, or rider comes
97	within 400 feet of:
98	1. An anchored vessel;
99	2. A person in the water; or
100	3. A structure, bridge, power line, wharf, pier, dock,
101	buoy, platform, piling, channel marker, or other similar object.
102	(h) Commercial parasailing is prohibited when there is a
103	sustained wind speed of 18 knots or higher in the area of
104	operation.
105	(i) Towlines used for commercial parasailing must be a
106	double braided, low-stretch type and may not exceed 700 feet in
107	length.
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108	(j) Commercial parasailing is prohibited from one-half hour
109	after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise.
110	(k) Each passenger and parasail participant shall be given
111	a safety briefing before leaving the dock or before the parasail
112	activity commences. This briefing should include a basic
113	description of the parasail activity and emergency procedures as
114	defined by the parasail equipment manufacturer.
115	(6) A person who violates this section commits a
116	misdemeanor of the second degree, punishable as provided in s.
117	775.082 or s. 775.083.
118	Section 3. Section 327.50, Florida Statutes, is amended to
119	read:
120	327.50 Vessel safety regulations; equipment and lighting
121	requirements
122	(1) <del>(a)</del> The owner and operator of every vessel on the waters
123	of this state shall carry, store, maintain, and use safety
124	equipment in accordance with current United States Coast Guard
125	safety equipment requirements as specified in the Code of Federal
126	Regulations, unless expressly exempted by the department.
127	(b) No person shall operate a vessel less than 26 feet in
128	length on the waters of this state unless every person under 6
129	years of age on board the vessel is wearing a type I, type II, or
130	type III Coast Guard approved personal flotation device while
131	such vessel is underway. For the purpose of this section,
132	"underway" shall mean at all times except when a vessel is
133	anchored, moored, made fast to the shore, or aground.
134	(2) <u>A</u> No person may not shall operate a vessel on the
135	waters of this state unless said vessel is equipped with properly
136	serviceable lights and shapes required by the navigation rules.



137	(3) The use of sirens or flashing, occulting, or revolving
138	lights on any vessel is prohibited, except as expressly provided
139	in the navigation rules or annexes thereto.
140	Section 4. This act shall take effect October 1, 2008.

164	launch platform; providing certain requirements for a
165	vessel used for commercial parasailing; requiring a person
166	engaged in operating a vessel for commercial parasailing

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167 to possess a license to engage in carrying passengers for 168 hire; requiring a minimum age for a person to monitor the 169 progress of an airborne parasail rider and equipment; 170 prohibiting a person from operating a vessel engaged in 171 commercial parasailing unless certain conditions are met; 172 prohibiting a person from operating a vessel towing a commercial parasailing rider in certain waters or within a 173 certain distance of specified objects; providing 174 circumstances in which commercial parasailing is 175 176 prohibited; providing requirements for tow lines; 177 providing times of the day in which commercial parasailing 178 is prohibited; requiring each passenger and parasail 179 participant to be given a safety briefing; providing a criminal penalty; amending s. 327.50, F.S.; revising 180 equipment requirements for vessel safety; providing an 181 182 effective date.
