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29 30 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 31 32 Section 1. Subsections (2) and (3), paragraph (a) of subsection (4), and subsection (7) of section 1009.53, Florida 33 34 Statutes, are amended to read: 35 1009.53 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program.-36 The Bright Futures Scholarship Program consists of (2) 37 three types of awards: the Florida Academic Scholarship, the 38 Florida Medallion Scholarship, and the Florida Gold Seal 39 Vocational Scholarship. Beginning with initial awards for the 40 2011 fall term, the Bright Futures Scholarship Program consists 41 of five levels of Florida Bright Futures Scholarships. 42 (3) The Department of Education shall administer the 43 Bright Futures Scholarship Program according to rules and 44 procedures established by the State Board of Education. A single 45 application must be sufficient for a student to apply for any of the three types of awards or for any of the five levels of 46 47 awards beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term. The 48 department must advertise the availability of the scholarship 49 program and must notify students, teachers, parents, guidance 50 counselors, and principals or other relevant school 51 administrators of the criteria and application procedures. The department must begin this process of notification no later than 52 53 January 1 of each year. 54 (4) Funding for the Bright Futures Scholarship Program 55 must be allocated from the Education Enhancement Trust Fund and must be provided before allocations from that fund are 56

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57 calculated for disbursement to other educational entities.

(a) If funds appropriated are not adequate to provide the
maximum allowable award to each eligible applicant, awards in
all three components of the program <u>or in all five levels of the</u>
<u>program beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term</u>
must be prorated using the same percentage reduction.

A student may receive only one type or level of award 63 (7) 64 from the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program at a time, but may transfer from one type or level of award to another 65 66 through the renewal application process, if the student's 67 eligibility status changes. However, a student is not eligible 68 to transfer from a Florida Medallion Scholarship or a Florida 69 Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship to a Florida Academic 70 Scholarship. A student who receives an award from the program 71 may also receive a federal family education loan or a federal 72 direct loan, and the value of the award must be considered in 73 the certification or calculation of the student's loan 74 eligibility.

75 Section 2. Subsections (1), (4), and (5) of section 76 1009.531, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

77 1009.531 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program;
78 student eligibility requirements for initial awards.-

(1) Effective January 1, 2008, In order to be eligible for
an initial award from any of the three types of scholarships or
for an initial award beginning with the 2011 fall term from any

96 (d) Be enrolled for at least 6 semester credit hours or97 the equivalent in quarter hours or clock hours.

98 (e) Not have been found guilty of, or entered a plea of
99 nolo contendere to, a felony charge, unless the student has been
100 granted clemency by the Governor and Cabinet sitting as the
101 Executive Office of Clemency.

102 (f) Apply for a scholarship from the program by high103 school graduation.

104 Each school district shall annually provide to each (4)105 high school student a complete and accurate Florida Bright 106 Futures Scholarship Evaluation Report and Key. The report shall 107 be disseminated at the beginning of each school year. The report 108 must include all high school coursework attempted, the number of credits earned toward each type or level of award, and the 109 calculation of the grade point average for each type or level of 110 award. The report must also identify all requirements not met 111 per type or level of award, including the grade point average 112 Page 4 of 20

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113 requirement, as well as identify the <u>types or levels of</u> awards 114 for which the student has met the academic requirements. The 115 student report cards must contain a disclosure that the grade 116 point average calculated for purposes of the Florida Bright 117 Futures Scholarship Program may differ from the grade point 118 average on the report card.

119 (5) A student who wishes to qualify for a particular type or level of award within the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship 120 121 Program, but who does not meet all of the requirements for that 122 type or level of award, may, nevertheless, receive the award for 123 that type or level if the principal of the student's school or 124 the district superintendent verifies that the deficiency is caused by the fact that school district personnel provided 125 126 inaccurate or incomplete information to the student. The school 127 district must provide a means for the student to correct the deficiencies and the student must correct them, either by 128 129 completing comparable work at the postsecondary institution or 130 by completing a directed individualized study program developed 131 and administered by the school district. If the student does not 132 complete the requirements by December 31 immediately following 133 high school graduation, the student is ineligible to participate 134 in the program.

Subsection (1) of section 1009.532, Florida 370 Statutes, is amended to read: 371 1009.532 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; student eligibility requirements for renewal awards.-372 373 (1) To be eligible to renew a scholarship from any of the 374 three types of scholarships or, beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term, from any of the five levels of 375 376 scholarships under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship 377 Program, a student must: Effective for students funded in the 2009-2010 378 (a) 379 academic year and thereafter, earn at least 24 semester credit 380 hours or the equivalent in the last academic year in which the 381 student earned a scholarship if the student was enrolled full 382 time, or a prorated number of credit hours as determined by the 383 Department of Education if the student was enrolled less than 384 full time for any part of the academic year. If, at any time during the eligibility period, a 406 student's grades are insufficient to renew the scholarship, the 407 student may restore eligibility by improving the grade point 408 average to the required level. A student is eligible for such a 409 restoration one time. The Legislature encourages education institutions to assist students to calculate whether or not it 410 411 is possible to raise the grade point average during the summer 412 term. If the institution determines that it is possible, the 413 education institution may so inform the department, which may 414 reserve the student's award if funds are available. The renewal, however, must not be granted until the student achieves the 415 416 required cumulative grade point average. If the summer term is not sufficient to raise the grade point average to the required 417 renewal level, the student's next opportunity for renewal is the 418

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419 fall semester of the following academic year; or

420 3. If a student is receiving a Florida Bright Futures 421 Scholarship, is a servicemember of the Florida National Guard or 422 United States Reserves while attending a postsecondary 423 institution, is called to active duty or state active duty, as defined in s. 250.01, prior to completing his or her degree, and 424 425 meets all other requirements for the scholarship, the student 426 shall be eligible to continue the scholarship for 2 years after 427 completing active duty or state active duty.

(c) Reimburse or make satisfactory arrangements to reimburse the institution for the award amount received for courses dropped after the end of the drop and add period or courses from which the student withdraws after the end of the drop and add period unless the student has received an exception pursuant to s. 1009.53(11).

438 Notwithstanding ss. 1009.53, 1009.534, 1009.535, and (1) 439 1009.536, a student who receives any award under the Florida 440 Bright Futures Scholarship Program, who is enrolled in a 441 nonpublic postsecondary education institution, and who is 442 assessed tuition and fees that are the same as those of a fulltime student at that institution \overline{r} shall receive a fixed award 443 444 calculated by using the average tuition and fee calculation as 445 prescribed by the Department of Education for full-time 446 attendance at a public postsecondary education institution at

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447 the comparable level. If the student is enrolled part-time and 448 is assessed tuition and fees at a reduced level, the award shall 449 be either one-half of the maximum award or three-fourths of the 450 maximum award, depending on the level of fees assessed.

451 (2) Notwithstanding ss. 1009.53 and 1009.5315, a student 452 who receives an initial award under the Florida Bright Futures 453 Scholarship Program beginning with the 2011 fall term, who is 454 enrolled in a nonpublic postsecondary education institution, and 455 who is assessed tuition and fees that are the same as those of a full-time student at that institution shall receive a fixed 456 457 award calculated by using the average tuition and fee 458 calculation pursuant to s. 1009.5315 as prescribed by the 459 Department of Education for full-time attendance at a public 460 postsecondary education institution at the comparable level. If 461 the student is enrolled part-time and is assessed tuition and 462 fees at a reduced level, the award shall be either one-half of 463 the maximum award or three-fourths of the maximum award, 464 depending on the level of fees assessed.

(d) The sum of the activity and service, health, and athletic fees a student is required to pay to register for a course shall not exceed 40 percent of the tuition established in law or in the General Appropriations Act. No university shall be required to lower any fee in effect on the effective date of

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475 this act in order to comply with this subsection. Within the 40 476 percent cap, universities may not increase the aggregate sum of 477 activity and service, health, and athletic fees more than 5 478 percent per year unless specifically authorized in law or in the 479 General Appropriations Act. A university may increase its 480 athletic fee to defray the costs associated with changing 481 National Collegiate Athletic Association divisions. Any such 482 increase in the athletic fee may exceed both the 40 percent cap 483 and the 5 percent cap imposed by this subsection. Any such 484 increase must be approved by the athletic fee committee in the 485 process outlined in subsection (12) and cannot exceed \$2 per 486 credit hour. Notwithstanding the provisions of ss. 1009.534, 487 1009.535, and 1009.536, that portion of any increase in an 488 athletic fee pursuant to this subsection that causes the sum of the activity and service, health, and athletic fees to exceed 489 490 the 40 percent cap or the annual increase in such fees to exceed 491 the 5 percent cap shall not be included in calculating the 492 amount a student receives for a Florida Academic Scholars award, 493 a Florida Medallion Scholars award, or a Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award. 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503 approval from the Board of Governors. The tuition differential 504 shall promote improvements in the quality of undergraduate 505 education and shall provide financial aid to undergraduate 506 students who exhibit financial need.

507 (b) Each tuition differential is subject to the following 508 conditions:

509 1. The tuition differential may be assessed on one or more 510 undergraduate courses or on all undergraduate courses at a state 511 university.

512 2. The tuition differential may vary by course or courses, 513 campus or center location, and by institution. Each university 514 board of trustees shall strive to maintain and increase 515 enrollment in degree programs related to math, science, high 516 technology, and other state or regional high-need fields when 517 establishing tuition differentials by course.

518 3. For each state university that has total research and 519 development expenditures for all fields of at least \$100 million 520 per year as reported annually to the National Science 521 Foundation, the aggregate sum of tuition and the tuition 522 differential may not be increased by more than 15 percent of the 523 total charged for the aggregate sum of these fees in the 524 preceding fiscal year. For each state university that has total 525 research and development expenditures for all fields of less 526 than \$100 million per year as reported annually to the National 527 Science Foundation, the aggregate sum of tuition and the tuition differential may not be increased by more than 15 percent of the 528 529 total charged for the aggregate sum of these fees in the 530 preceding fiscal year.

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531 The aggregate sum of undergraduate tuition and fees per 4. 532 credit hour, including the tuition differential, may not exceed 533 the national average of undergraduate tuition and fees at 4-year degree-granting public postsecondary educational institutions. 534 535 5. The tuition differential may not be calculated as a 536 part of the scholarship programs established in ss. 1009.53-537 1009.538. However, beginning with initial awards for the 2011 538 fall term under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program, the tuition differential shall be included in the calculation 539 for an award pursuant to ss. 1009.5315 and 1009.538. 540 541 Beneficiaries having prepaid tuition contracts pursuant 6. 542 to s. 1009.98(2)(b) which were in effect on July 1, 2007, and 543 which remain in effect, are exempt from the payment of the tuition differential. 544 545 7. The tuition differential may not be charged to any 546 student who was in attendance at the university before July 1, 547 2007, and who maintains continuous enrollment. 548 8. The tuition differential may be waived by the 549 university for students who meet the eligibility requirements 550 for the Florida public student assistance grant established in s. 1009.50. 551 552 9. Subject to approval by the Board of Governors, the 553 tuition differential authorized pursuant to this subsection may 554 take effect with the 2009 fall term. 555 Section 7. This act shall take effect July 1, 2010.

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
