Senate Amendment

Delete lines 54 - 98

and insert:

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3. Adopt bylaws or policies that require youth athletes who are suspected of sustaining a concussion or head injury in a practice or competition to be immediately removed from the activity. A youth athlete who has been removed may not return to practice or competition until the youth receives written clearance to return from a physician who is licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459, certified by the American Board of Neurological Surgery or the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery, certified in Orthopaedic Sports Medicine by the

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American Board of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, certified in Neuromuscular Medicine, Spinal Cord Injury Medicine, or Sports Medicine by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, certified in Clinical Neurophysiology, Neurodevelopmental Disabilities, or Neuromuscular Medicine, or a physician licensed under chapter 460, certified by the Academy of Chiropractic Orthopedists, the American Board of Chiropractic Orthopedics, or the American Chiropractic Neurology Board, or certified as a Chiropractic Sports Physician, stating that the student athlete no longer exhibits signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with a concussion or other head injury. Before issuing a written clearance to return to practice or competition, a physician may:

- a. Delegate the performance of medical care to a health care provider who is licensed or certified under s. 464.012, s. 458.347, s. 459.022, or s. 468.701, with whom the physician maintains a formal supervisory relationship or established written protocol that identifies the medical care or evaluations to be performed, identifies conditions for performing medical care or evaluations, and attests to proficiency in the evaluation and management of concussions; and
- b. Consult with or use testing and the evaluation of cognitive functions performed by a neuropsychologist licensed under chapter 490.

Section 2. Paragraphs (e), (f), and (g) are added to subsection (2) of section 1006.20, Florida Statutes, to read: 1006.20 Athletics in public K-12 schools.

- (2) ADOPTION OF BYLAWS.-
- (e) The organization shall adopt guidelines to educate

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officials, administrators, coaches, and student athletes and their parents or guardians of the nature and risk of concussion and head injury.

- (f) The organization shall adopt bylaws or policies that require the parent or guardian of a student who participates in interscholastic athletic competition or who is a candidate for an interscholastic athletic team, before the student participates in a competition, practice, or other activity, to annually sign and return a consent form that explains the nature and risk of concussion and head injury, including the risk of continuing to play after a concussion or head injury has occurred.
- (g) The organization shall adopt bylaws or policies that require student athletes who are suspected of sustaining a concussion or head injury in a practice or competition to be immediately removed from the activity. A student athlete who has been removed may not return to practice or competition until the student receives written clearance to return from a physician who is licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459, certified by the American Board of Neurological Surgery or the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery, certified in Orthopaedic Sports Medicine by the American Board of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, certified in Neuromuscular Medicine, Spinal Cord Injury Medicine, or Sports Medicine by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, certified in Clinical Neurophysiology, Neurodevelopmental Disabilities, or Neuromuscular Medicine, or a physician licensed under chapter 460, certified by the Academy of Chiropractic Orthopedists, the American Board of Chiropractic Orthopedics, or the American Chiropractic Neurology Board, or

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certified as a Chiropractic Sports Physician, stating that the student athlete no longer exhibits signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with a concussion or other head injury.
