II. Summary of Amendments Contained in Message:

Senate Amendment 1 is the substance of CS/SB 1198 (by Senator Bogdanoff), relating to prescribing and dispensing controlled substances, with some modifications to address technical errors and make a few substantive changes. Some of the major features of CS/SB 1992 include requiring certain physicians to register as controlled substance prescribing practitioners, exempting certain physicians from following statutorily-specified standards of practice for prescribing controlled substances, and exempting certain clinics from statutorily-required registration as pain-management clinics. An example of a substantive change to the bill is that a physician licensed under any of several specified chapters who prescribes more than a 30-day supply of any Schedule II, III, or IV controlled substance over a 6-month period to any one patient for the treatment of chronic nonmalignant pain must register as a controlled substance prescribing practitioner.

Senate Amendment 2 changes the original effective date of the act (October 1, 2012) to upon becoming a law.
