Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

contact order; providing an effective date.

- Section 1. Paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of section 903.047, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
  - 903.047 Conditions of pretrial release.
- (1) As a condition of pretrial release, whether such release is by surety bail bond or recognizance bond or in some other form, the defendant shall:
- (b) Refrain from any contact of any type with the victim, except through pretrial discovery pursuant to the Florida Rules of Criminal Procedure. An order of no contact shall be effective immediately upon the order of the court and enforceable until the originating offense is resolved or the order is modified by the court. For the purposes of this section, unless modified by the court, an order of no contact shall include the following prohibited acts:
  - 1. Refusing to vacate the dwelling that the parties share;
- 2. Going to, or being within 500 feet of, the victim's residence, school, place of employment, or a specified place frequented regularly by the victim and any named family or household member;
  - 3. Committing an act of violence against the victim;

4. Committing any other violation of the order through an intentional unlawful threat, word, or act to do violence to the victim;

- 5. Telephoning, contacting, or otherwise communicating with the victim directly or indirectly, unless the order specifically allows indirect contact through a third party;
- 6. Knowingly and intentionally coming within 100 feet of the victim's motor vehicle, whether or not that vehicle is occupied;
- 7. Defacing or destroying the victim's personal property, including the victim's motor vehicle; or
- 8. Refusing to surrender firearms or ammunition if ordered to do so by the court.
  - Section 2. This act shall take effect October 1, 2014.
