House Memorial

A memorial to the Congress of the United States, urging Congress to abolish the United States

Department of Education.

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Education, formed in 1979, represents an intrusion by the Federal Government into an aspect of society for which there is no constitutional authority, and

WHEREAS, the Tenth Amendment to the United States

Constitution states that "The powers not delegated to the United

States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States,

are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people," and

WHEREAS, the United States Constitution gives Congress no authority to fund or operate education and, therefore, under the Tenth Amendment, education should be entirely a state and local matter, and

WHEREAS, the Framers of the United States Constitution never envisioned that Congress or the President of the United States would become involved in funding schools or mandating policy for the classroom and, for more than 200 years, the Federal Government left education to state and local governments and families, those who are in the best position to oversee it, and

WHEREAS, since the formation of the United States

Department of Education, its budget has continually increased
with American taxpayers spending virtually billions of dollars
on the department, and

WHEREAS, there is a growing awareness that parents, not distant government employees, should have more power over the education of their children and that the way for Congress to improve American education is to step aside and let the states and local authorities create successful ways of addressing education issues, challenges, and problems, NOW, THEREFORE,

36 Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the United States Congress is urged to abolish the United States Department of Education, thereby returning authority and responsibility for education to the states, local governments, and families.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be dispatched to the President of the United States, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the Florida delegation to the United States Congress.
