An act relating to art therapy; creating s. 491.017,

F.S.; providing definitions; prohibiting use of the
title "art therapist" except by certain individuals;
providing a penalty; creating the Board of

Professional Art Therapists; providing membership
requirements; providing requirements, with exception,
for licensure as an art therapist; providing
requirements for practice as a registered art therapy
intern; requiring the board to establish fees for
licensure applications, licensure, and license
renewal; providing grounds for disciplinary action;
requiring rulemaking; providing applicability;
providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 491.017, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

491.017 Practice of art therapy.-

- (1) DEFINITIONS.—As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Accredited art therapy program" means a college or university art therapy program that is approved by the American Art Therapy Association.
- (b) "Art therapist" means an individual who is trained in and provides art therapy as defined in this section.
- (c) "Art therapy" means the integrated use of psychotherapeutic principles, art media, and the creative process by an art therapist for:

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- 1. Clinical mental health diagnoses.
- 2. Clinical mental, physical, and emotional goals for a patient, including, but not limited to:
  - a. Coping with symptoms, stress, and traumatic experiences.
  - b. Addressing cognitive abilities.
- c. Identifying and assessing a client's needs in order to implement therapeutic intervention to meet developmental, behavioral, mental, or emotional needs.
  - 3. Increasing awareness of self and others.
- 4. Promoting developmentally appropriate academic and social interaction.
  - (d) "Board" means the Board of Professional Art Therapists.
- (e) "Clinical professional art therapy" means the professional practice of art therapy, for compensation, by providing a service to an individual or group using the application of art therapy principles and methods to diagnose, prevent, treat, and ameliorate psychological, emotional, or mental conditions.
- (f) "Credentialing body" means the Art Therapy Credentials Board, Inc.
- (g) "Supervised practice" means the practice of clinical professional art therapy as part of an internship, practicum, or graduate work to fulfill the requirements for licensure as an art therapist under the supervision of a licensed art therapist or a social worker, marriage and family therapist, mental health counselor, or psychotherapist licensed under this chapter, as approved by the board.
  - (2) USE OF TITLE.—
  - (a) An individual may not, for or without compensation, use

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the professional designation of "art therapist" or otherwise hold himself or herself out to the public as an art therapist, either directly or through a governmental or private organization, entity, or agency, unless the individual holds a master's degree in art therapy from an accredited art therapy program or holds credentials as a Registered Art Therapist from the credentialing body.

- (b) An individual who violates this subsection commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.
- (3) BOARD OF PROFESSIONAL ART THERAPISTS.—There is created within the department the Board of Professional Art Therapists.

  The board shall consist of five members appointed by the Governor with the advice of the State Surgeon General. Three members must be licensed as art therapists, and two members must be consumer members. The board shall adopt rules to implement and enforce this chapter.
  - (4) LICENSURE.-
- (a) An individual applying for licensure as an art therapist must:
- 1. Hold a minimum of a master's degree in art therapy and have at least 700 hours of supervised practice from an accredited art therapy program. A master's degree in art therapy must include at least 60 credit hours in graduate level courses, 24 credits of which must include the following topics:
  - a. History of art therapy.
  - b. Theory of art therapy.
  - c. Techniques of practice in art therapy.
  - d. Application of art therapy in different treatment

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settings.

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- e. Art therapy assessment.
- f. Ethical and legal issues in art therapy practice.
- g. Cultural and social diversity in art therapy practice.
- h. Art therapy practice standards.
- i. Group art therapy.
- 2. Complete the supervised practice requirement for licensure as an art therapist. An applicant must provide:
- a. Evidence of successful completion of credentials as a Registered Art Therapist from the credentialing body, which includes 1,000 hours of supervised practice under a licensed or credentialed art therapist.
- b. Evidence that the applicant has passed the Art Therapy Credentials Board Examination administered by the credentialing body or another related art therapy credentialing examination.
- $\underline{\mbox{3. Complete a clinical experience requirement. An applicant}}$  must provide:
- a. Evidence of successful completion of at least 3,000 hours of postgraduate experience and successful completion of 100 hours of supervised practice under a licensed art therapist or an art therapist certified by the credentialing body as an Art Therapy Certified Supervisor; or
- <u>b. Evidence of successful completion of a doctoral internship.</u>
- 4. Submit a set of fingerprints to the department on a form and under procedures specified by the department for the purpose of a criminal background check, along with payment in an amount equal to the costs incurred by the department for the criminal background check.

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(b) The board shall waive the requirements for the practice of licensed clinical professional art therapy under this chapter if, on or before December 31, 2016, the applicant provides the board with documentation showing current credentials by the credentialing body.

- (c) An individual may practice professional art therapy as a registered art therapy intern under the supervision of a licensed art therapist for a limited period, to be determined by the board, if the intern has a master's or doctoral degree in art therapy which meets the educational requirements of this section.
- (5) FEES.—Along with the application requirements under subsection (4), an applicant for licensure as an art therapist shall submit an application fee. The board shall establish, by rule, fees for licensure application not to exceed \$200 and reasonable licensure and license renewal fees.
  - (6) DISCIPLINARY ACTION. -
- (a) An individual licensed under this chapter or an applicant for licensure under this chapter may not engage in unprofessional conduct. For purposes of this subsection, the term "unprofessional conduct" includes, but is not limited to:
- 1. Failure to keep a written record for each patient, which includes patient history, examination results, and the course of prescribed treatment.
- 2. Performing services that have not been authorized by the patient or his or her legal representative.
- 3. Performing a procedure or prescribing therapy that, by the general standards of art therapy practice, would constitute experimentation on a human subject without first obtaining full,

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- 4. Sexual harassment of a patient.
- 5. Engaging in sexual misconduct, as defined in s.

  394.4593, with a patient while such patient is under the care of the licensee.
  - (b) If the board shows, by a preponderance of the evidence, that a licensee or applicant for licensure has engaged in unprofessional conduct, the board may take disciplinary action against such licensee or applicant as follows:
    - 1. Provide a warning or reprimand;
  - 2. Enforce an administrative penalty, as determined by rule;
  - 3. Revoke or suspend an existing license or deny an application for licensure; or
  - 4. Take such action as determined in a negotiated agreement between the board and a licensee or applicant for licensure.
  - (c) In addition to or in lieu of disciplinary action
    provided in paragraph (b), the board may require that a licensee
    or applicant for licensure:
    - 1. Submit to care, therapy, or counseling;
  - 2. Practice only under the supervision of a specified individual;
  - 3. Complete a continuing education course, as determined by the board, to remedy a specified deficiency; or
    - 4. Limit the scope of his or her practice.
- (d) The board shall adopt rules for the administration of
  this section and to determine under what circumstances a license
  may be reinstated after a licensee has undergone disciplinary
  action.

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(7) EXEMPTIONS.—

- (a) This section does not restrict an individual licensed or certified as a professional under any other law of this state from engaging in the profession or practice for which he or she is licensed or certified if he or she does not represent, imply, or claim that he or she is a licensed art therapist.
- (b) Licensure as an art therapist under this section is not required for:
- 1. A professional artist-in-residence, mental health counselor, physician, psychologist, psychoanalyst, registered nurse, marriage and family therapist, social worker, rehabilitation counselor, or any other professional licensed by this state when such professional acts within the scope of his or her profession, consistent with his or her training, and without representing himself or herself as a licensed art therapist under this section.
- 2. A student, intern, or trainee pursuing studies in art therapy at an accredited institution of higher education if such student, intern, or trainee performs, as part of a course of study and under the supervision of a licensed art therapist, activities that would otherwise require licensure as an art therapist.
  - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2015.
