A bill to be entitled

An act relating to fines and forfeitures; amending s. 316.660, F.S.; requiring a county or municipality that receives more than a specified percentage of its total annual revenue for the prior fiscal year from fines and forfeitures collected from traffic citations to remit such excess revenue to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Crimes Compensation Trust Fund; amending s. 932.7055, F.S.; prohibiting certain proceeds deposited into a designated special law enforcement trust fund by a county or municipal agency from exceeding a specified percentage of the total annual revenue for the prior fiscal year of the county or municipality that oversees the agency; requiring the agency to remit excess proceeds to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Crimes Compensation Trust Fund; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Subsection (3) is added to section 316.660, Florida Statutes, to read:

316.660 Disposition of fines and forfeitures collected for violations; reporting requirement.—

(3) A county or municipality that receives more than 5 percent of its total annual revenue for the prior fiscal year from fines and forfeitures collected from traffic citations shall remit any revenue in excess of that amount to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Crimes Compensation

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Trust Fund.

Section 2. Paragraph (a) of subsection (5) of section 932.7055, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

932.7055 Disposition of liens and forfeited property.-

- (5) (a) <u>1.</u> If the seizing agency is a county or municipal agency, the remaining proceeds shall be deposited <u>into in</u> a special law enforcement trust fund established by the board of county commissioners or the governing body of the municipality. Such proceeds and interest earned therefrom shall be used for school resource officer, crime prevention, safe neighborhood, drug abuse education and prevention programs, or for other law enforcement purposes, which include defraying the cost of protracted or complex investigations, providing additional equipment or expertise, purchasing automated external defibrillators for use in law enforcement vehicles, and providing matching funds to obtain federal grants. The proceeds and interest may not be used to meet normal operating expenses of the law enforcement agency.
- 2. The amount of the remaining proceeds deposited into the designated special law enforcement trust fund by each county or municipal agency may not exceed 5 percent of the total annual revenue for the prior fiscal year of the county or municipality that oversees the agency. The agency shall remit any excess proceeds to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Crimes Compensation Trust Fund.

Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2016.
