A bill to be entitled

An act relating to natural hair braiding; amending s. 477.013, F.S.; redefining the term "hair braiding"; defining the term "mechanical devices"; amending ss. 477.0132 and 477.019, F.S.; conforming provisions to changes made by the act; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsections (9) and (10) of section 477.013, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

477.013 Definitions.—As used in this chapter:

- (10) (9) "Natural hair braiding" means the braiding, extending, locking, twisting, wrapping, or weaving or interweaving of natural human hair by hand or by use of mechanical devices for compensation without cutting, coloring, permanent waving, relaxing, removing, or chemical treatment and does not include the use of hair extensions or wefts.
- (a) The term includes, when such acts are incidental to the braiding, extending, locking, twisting, wrapping, or weaving of the hair, the use of natural or synthetic hair extensions, natural or synthetic hair and fibers, decorative beads, and other hair accessories and the minor trimming of natural hair or hair extensions.
- (b) The term is not limited to any particular cultural, ethnic, racial, or religious hair style and does not include the application of dyes, reactive chemicals, or other preparations to alter the color of the hair or to straighten, curl, or alter the structure of the hair; or the use of chemical hair joining

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agents, such as synthetic tape, keratin bonds, or fusion bonds.

(c) As used in this subsection, the term "mechanical devices" means clips, combs, crochet hooks, hairpins, scissors, needles, thread, and hair binders.

(9) (10) "Hair wrapping" means the wrapping of manufactured materials around a strand or strands of human hair, for compensation, without cutting, coloring, permanent waving, relaxing, removing, weaving, chemically treating, braiding, using hair extensions, or performing any other service defined as cosmetology.

Section 2. Section 477.0132, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

- 477.0132 <u>Natural</u> hair braiding, hair wrapping, and body wrapping registration.—
- (1) (a) Persons whose occupation or practice is confined solely to <u>natural</u> hair braiding must register with the department, pay the applicable registration fee, and take a two-day 16-hour course. The course shall be board approved and consist of 5 hours of HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases, 5 hours of sanitation and sterilization, 4 hours of disorders and diseases of the scalp, and 2 hours of studies regarding laws affecting <u>natural</u> hair braiding.
- (b) Persons whose occupation or practice is confined solely to hair wrapping must register with the department, pay the applicable registration fee, and take a one-day 6-hour course. The course shall be board approved and consist of education in HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases, sanitation and sterilization, disorders and diseases of the scalp, and studies regarding laws affecting hair wrapping.

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(c) Unless otherwise licensed or exempted from licensure under this chapter, any person whose occupation or practice is body wrapping must register with the department, pay the applicable registration fee, and take a two-day 12-hour course. The course shall be board approved and consist of education in HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases, sanitation and sterilization, disorders and diseases of the skin, and studies regarding laws affecting body wrapping.

- (d) Only the board may review, evaluate, and approve a course required of an applicant for registration under this subsection in the occupation or practice of natural hair braiding, hair wrapping, or body wrapping. A provider of such a course is not required to hold a license under chapter 1005.
- (2) <u>Natural</u> hair braiding, hair wrapping, and body wrapping are not required to be practiced in a cosmetology salon or specialty salon. When <u>natural</u> hair braiding, hair wrapping, or body wrapping is practiced outside a cosmetology salon or specialty salon, disposable implements must be used or all implements must be sanitized in a disinfectant approved for hospital use or approved by the federal Environmental Protection Agency.
- (3) Pending issuance of registration, a person is eligible to practice <u>natural</u> hair braiding, hair wrapping, or body wrapping upon submission of a registration application that includes proof of successful completion of the education requirements and payment of the applicable fees required by this chapter.

Section 3. Paragraph (b) of subsection (7) of section 477.019, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

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477.019 Cosmetologists; qualifications; licensure; supervised practice; license renewal; endorsement; continuing education.—

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(b) Any person whose occupation or practice is confined solely to <u>natural</u> hair braiding, hair wrapping, or body wrapping is exempt from the continuing education requirements of this subsection.

Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2019.
