A bill to be entitled

An act relating to traffic and pedestrian safety; creating s. 316.0756, F.S.; requiring a pedestrian crosswalk on a public highway, street, or road which is located at any point other than at an intersection with another public highway, street, or road to be controlled by traffic control signal devices and pedestrian control signals that conform to specified requirements; providing coordination requirements for such devices and signals; requiring, by a specified date, the entity with jurisdiction over a public highway, street, or road with a certain pedestrian crosswalk to ensure that the crosswalk is controlled by coordinated traffic control signal devices and pedestrian control signals; authorizing such entity to alternatively remove any such crosswalk; providing a declaration of important state interest; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 316.0756, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

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316.0756 Traffic control signal devices and pedestrian control signals at crosswalks other than at intersections.—

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(1) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, a pedestrian crosswalk on a public highway, street, or road which is located at any point other than at an intersection with another public highway, street, or road must be controlled by coordinated

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traffic control signal devices and pedestrian control signals
that conform to the requirements of Chapters 4D and 4E of the
most recent Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices and other
applicable Department of Transportation specifications. Traffic
control signal devices and pedestrian control signals at
crosswalk locations described in this section must be
coordinated according to all of the following requirements:

- (a) Vehicular traffic approaching the crosswalk is required to come to a complete stop before pedestrians are permitted to enter the crosswalk.
- (b) Traffic control signal devices at intersections adjacent to the crosswalk are taken into consideration as provided in the most recent Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices and other applicable Department of Transportation specifications.
- (2) By October 1, 2024, the entity with jurisdiction over a public highway, street, or road with a crosswalk described in subsection (1) which is in existence on July 1, 2020, shall ensure that such crosswalk is controlled by coordinated traffic control signal devices and pedestrian control signals as required under subsection (1). The entity with jurisdiction may alternatively remove any such existing crosswalk.
- Section 2. The Legislature finds and declares that this act fulfills an important state interest.
  - Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2020.
