I. Summary:

SB 824 removes the provision prohibiting a student from being eligible for initial award from any of the scholarships under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program if the student was found guilty of, or entered plea of nolo contendere to, a felony charge, unless the student had been granted clemency.

The fiscal impact is indeterminate. See Section V.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2021.

II. Present Situation:

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

The Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program (Bright Futures program) was established in 1997¹ as a lottery-funded scholarship program to reward a Florida high school graduate who merits recognition for high academic achievement and who enrolls in a degree program, certificate program, or applied technology program at an eligible Florida public or private² postsecondary education institution. The Department of Education (DOE) is responsible for issuing awards for the Bright Futures program annually.³

The Bright Futures program consists of the following awards:⁴

- Florida Academic Scholarship (FAS);⁵
- Florida Medallion Scholarship (FMS);⁶ and
- Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship (FGSV) and Florida Gold Seal CAPE Scholarship.⁷

Florida Academic Scholarship and Florida Medallion Scholarship

Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the FAS or the FMS awards must meet the following initial eligibility requirements depicted in the table below.⁸

Type	16 High School Course Credits	High School Weighted Bright Futures GPA	College Entrance Exams by High School Graduation Year (ACT/SAT)	Service Hours

FMS	(two must have substantial laboratory) 3 - Social Science 2 - World Language (sequential, in same language)	3.00	25/1210	75 hours

Students who have demonstrated academic merit through a recognition program may be eligible for the FAS or the FMS awards without having to meet one or more of the requirements.⁹

The FAS award recipients receive an award equal to the amount necessary to pay of 100 percent of tuition and applicable fees and an additional stipend for textbooks as specified in the General Appropriations Act (GAA).¹⁰ The FMS award recipients receive an award equal to the amount necessary to pay of 75 percent of tuition and applicable fees.¹¹

A student may receive an FAS or FMS award for a maximum of 100 percent of the number of credit hours required to complete an associate degree program, a baccalaureate degree program, or a postsecondary career certificate program.¹²

Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship

Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the FGSV award must meet the following initial eligibility requirements:¹³

- Achieve the required weighted minimum 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses;
- Take at least 3 full credits in a single Career and Technical Education program;
- Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in the career education courses;
- Complete 30 service hours; and
- Achieve the required minimum score on the ACT, SAT, or Florida Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (P.E.R.T.) exams depicted in table below:¹⁴

The FGSV award may be funded if a student is enrolled in a career education or certificate program.¹⁵

Florida Gold Seal CAPE Scholarship

Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the FGSC award must meet the following initial eligibility requirements:¹⁶

- Earn a minimum of five postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications that articulate for college credit; and
- Complete 30 service hours.

The FGSC award may be funded if a student is enrolled in a career education or certificate program. Upon completion of an eligible associate in science degree program, a FGSC Scholar may also receive an award for a maximum of 60 credit hours toward an eligible baccalaureate degree.¹⁷

Student Eligibility Requirements for Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

In order to be eligible for an initial award from any of the scholarships under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program, a student must:¹⁸

- Be a Florida resident.¹⁹
- Earn a high school standard diploma²⁰ or a high school equivalency diploma.^{21,22}
- Be accepted by and enroll in an eligible Florida public or independent postsecondary education institution.
- Be enrolled for at least 6 semester credit hours or the equivalent in quarter hours or clock hours.
- Not have been found guilty of, or entered a plea of nolo contendere to, a felony charge, unless the student has been granted clemency²³ by the Governor and Cabinet sitting as the Executive Office of Clemency.²⁴
- Apply for a scholarship from the program by high school graduation.²⁵

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

SB 824 amends s. 1009.531, F.S., to remove the provision prohibiting a student from being eligible for initial award from any of the scholarships under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program if the student was found guilty of, or entered plea of nolo contendere to, a felony charge, unless the student had been granted clemency.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2021.
