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116 Conducting a review and evaluation of the management 1. 117 and functioning of the existing publicly supported mental health 118 and substance use disorder abuse systems and services in the department, the Agency for Health Care Administration, and all 119 120 other departments which administer mental health and substance 121 use disorder abuse services. Such review shall include, at a 122 minimum, a review of current goals and objectives, current 123 planning, services strategies, coordination management, 124 purchasing, contracting, financing, local government funding 125 responsibility, and accountability mechanisms.

126 2. Considering the unique needs of persons who are dually127 diagnosed.

128 3. Addressing access to, financing of, and scope of 129 responsibility in the delivery of emergency behavioral health 130 care services.

Identifying available mental health block grant funds that can be used to support the NSPL, Florida's 211 Network and 172 173 crisis response infrastructure within this state, including any 174 available funding through opioid settlements or through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. No. 117-2; the 175 176 Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, Pub. 177 L. No. 116-136; or other federal legislation. 178 13.
