- (I) A master's degree in emergency preparedness or management, business or public administration, communications, finance, homeland security, public health, criminal justice, meteorology, or environmental science may be substituted for 2 of the years of experience required in this sub-subparagraph but not for the required supervisory experience.

The director shall coordinate emergency management activities, services, and programs within the county and shall serve as liaison to the division and other local emergency management agencies and organizations.
- Section 2. A county emergency management director who does not satisfy the training or certification requirements of section 1 of this act as of July 1, 2024, shall have until June 30, 2026, to complete such requirements.
 - Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2024.
