SENATE SECRETARY: All unauthorized persons will please leave the Chamber. All Senators and guests in the gallery, please silence all electronic devices. All Senators, please indicate your presence.

A quorum is present, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: The Senate will be in order. Senators and guests in the gallery, please rise for an opening prayer to be given this afternoon by the Senator of the 4th District, Senator Bean.

SENATOR BEAN: Thank you, Mr. President, good afternoon, Senators. Let's go to the Lord in prayer. Heavenly Father, it is the Florida Senate again, and again, Father, we say thank you for all of our blessings, of family, of friends, of colleagues in a state abundant in beauty and resources.

We ask that you comfort Floridians who are carrying a burden of sickness, worry or sadness. We also say thank you for our challenges, for we know they are opportunities to better serve, to better ourselves, our state and those that we serve, and what an

opportunity that stands before us.

We ask your blessing on this body as it starts its journey of redistricting and a blessing on the hands, all of our hands that draw new lines. Give us the spirit to fight for what is right and the strength to endure and the guidance we so desperately need in our consultations.

Granted that we all may seek to do your will and the benefit of the people of Florida. We beseech you to look favorably upon our state and bless its people as they go about their callings and vocations. In all of our doings keep us mindful that we must answer for our actions, not only to whom we represent, but ultimately to you.

Finally, we thank you for the freedoms we enjoy and ask for the wisdom to uphold them. Please continue to bless the men and women who project them, who have protected them and those families and men and women who have made the ultimate sacrifice for those freedoms. All of these things we ask in your name and everybody say together, Amen.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Thank you, Senator

Bean. Please remain standing for the Pledge of Allegiance to be led today by the Senator of the 37th District, Senator Flores.

(Brief pause.)

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PRESIDENT GARDINER: Madam Secretary, please read the proclamation.

SENATE SECRETARY: To the honorable members of the Florida Senate and the Florida House of Representatives. We, Andy Gardiner, President of the Florida Senate, and Steve Crisafulli, Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives, by virtue of the authority vested in us in Article III, Section 3(c), Florida Constitution, and Section 11.011, Florida Statutes, do hereby jointly proclaim, one, that the Legislature of the State of Florida is convened in special session pursuant to Article III, Section 3(c), Florida Constitution, and Section 11.011, Florida Statutes, at the Capitol in Tallahassee, Florida, beginning at 12:00 p.m. on Monday, October 19th, 2015, for a period of 19 days ending at 3:00 p.m. on Friday, November 6th, 2015.

Two, that the Legislature is convened for

the sole and exclusive purpose of considering a joint resolution establishing remedial Senatorial districts for this state.

filed and received by the Florida Department of
State this 5th day of October, 2015, by Ken

The reading of the proclamation, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: We will now proceed to the reading of the Bills filed within the call. The Secretary will read each Bill the first time by number, introducer, and title; and announce the President's reference.

SENATE SECRETARY: Senate Joint Resolution 2-C, by Senator Galvano. A Joint Resolution of Apportionment. President's reference the Senate Committee on Reapportionment.

The reading of the Bills, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Thank you. Before we go on to the business of the time, Senator Gibson, you are recognized.

SENATOR GIBSON: Thank you, Mr. President.

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For a moment of silence.

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PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senators, if we can have your attention. All rise.

SENATOR GIBSON: Members, as we get or
Senators as we get ready for putting together
our budget, many times the numbers kind of take
precedence over the people, and not all the
people, but the people in our economic drivers,
and one of those drivers that we talk about a
lot are our ports, and certainly the economic
benefit of ports is tremendous, but so are the
people who make those ports work.

Those who load the cargo, those who sail on the ships to make sure the cargo gets to and from its destination, and 33 of those individuals are lost at sea and presumed lost to us. And so I have asked with the President's permission that we remember those folks and their families in a moment of silence.

Many lived in my district. They left from the port in my district and their families are in my district and they were hard working, many of them Floridians, who impacted our lives on a daily basis. So will you join me in a moment of silence for the crew members of the El Faro.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Please bow your heads.

(Brief pause.)

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Thank you, Senators. We will now continue with the order of business.

Are there reports of committee?

SENATE CLERK: On the desk, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Read the report.

SENATE CLERK: Dear President Gardiner, the Committee on Rules met on October 8th, 2015, and after due consideration respectfully recommends a revision to Rule 14 as follows. Rule 14 seal and insignia. 14.1, seal and insignia, one, there shall be an official seal of the Senate. The seal shall be the size of a circle of two and one half inches diameter, having a center thereof a fan of the 1513 Spanish flag, the current Florida State flag, the current United States flag, the 1564 French flag and the 1763 flag of Great Britain, that have flown or presently fly over Florida. Above the disk containing the words In God We

Trust arched above a gavel, quill and scroll.

At the top of the field of flags shall be the words Seal, at the bottom shall be the date 1838. The perimeter of the seal shall contain the word Senate and State of Florida.

Two, there shall be an official Coat of Arms for the Senate. The Coat of Arms shall contain a fan of the 1513 Spanish flag, the current Florida State flag, the current United States flag, the 1564 French flag and the 1763 flag of Great Britain that have flown or presently fly over Florida above the great seal of Florida. At the base of the Coat of Arms shall be the words The Florida Senate.

Three, all versions of the Senate seal, the Senate Coat of Arms, official Senate stationery, calling cards and facsimiles thereof may be used only in connection with official Senate business.

The change of vote sheet are attached hereto and by reference made a part of this report. Sincerely, David Simmons, Chair.

The reading of the report, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator of the 10th District, Senator Simmons, you are recognized to add additional comments.

SENATOR SIMMONS: Thank you,

Mr. President. At the request of the President and Leader Joyner the Rules Committee reviewed the Senate seal at its last meeting and recommends a change.

There is no record of why the flags now on the seal were chosen, but they may have been suggested by Mr. Patrick's 1947 book entitled Florida Under Five Flags.

There have been 16 flags that have flown over Florida or parts of Florida, and the flags on the current rule appear to presume to represent sovereign nations. However, our research established that the Confederacy was never legally a sovereign nation.

The committee therefore recommends replacing the Confederate flag with the current flag of the State of Florida. I think it is most appropriate that if we are going to have a seal for the State of Florida, that the flag of the State of Florida be on that seal.

The revision also revises the ambiguous reference to five flags by specifying the actual historic and current flags that will appear on the seal. Mr. President, I move the

1 report.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Other questions of Senator Simmons? Are there questions? Are there questions? Are there questions? Seeing none. I apologize, the Senator of the 7th District, Senator Bradley, you are recognized for a question.

SENATOR BRADLEY: Thank you,

Mr. President. I confess, I didn't realize

this was on, that we were going to be

discussing this today. I thought we were only

going to be dealing with redistricting. So,

you know, this is -- this is a very emotional

controversial issue and I understand that, and

I have talked to some of my colleagues about

the issue, and are we -- I guess my procedural

question for the Rules Chairman is, are we

looking to do this today with finality?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Simmons, you are recognized.

SENATOR SIMMONS: Yes.

SENATOR BRADLEY: All right, well --

PRESIDENT GARDINER: And Senator Bradley, if I just add a little bit to that. So the intent to address this now, again this is strictly within our rules and future

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legislators have at any time the opportunity to change the rules of the Florida Senate.

The reality is is that it will take time to address this if it is the will of the Senate to pass this, to get out, to get some of these seals changed throughout the Capitol. So we wanted to give the Sergeant's office the opportunity to resolve that matter.

So that is -- that is why it came up today and if it is by two-thirds, then it would be the intent to start that process.

You are recognized.

SENATOR BRADLEY: Thank you, Mr. President, and I certainly don't quarrel with the fact that this -- because you have to change all of the seals and we want to, if we are going to do so need to do it before session, I don't quarrel with that. I just, I confess, I didn't realize that we were dealing with it today and perhaps I missed something.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Yes, I understand.

SENATOR BRADLEY: Was there any discussion of alternative seals other than simply retaining the seal as it with one flag being removed? And I say that because, you know, I

am proud to be a student of history myself and if you look at all of the flags on the seal I think you would find that there were things that occurred in the name of some of those flags that history has now looked upon as being abhorrent and terrible, that may be a discussion to have about what occurred, you know, in the name of other flags on there.

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I just would like to have a discussion because I think -- I think symbols are important, and I would like to have a discussion about what the seal is going to look like, because it seems like the only alternative is the current seal or the current seal without one flag. And the idea of perhaps having another seal altogether I think at least is worthy of discussion and I don't know at what time that discussion should have, but I just don't want this moment to pass without at least saying at least from my perspective that I think it is important that we have a discussion about what our seal is going to look like and perhaps have other alternatives than just two.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Okay. Well, we are

actually in questions. So I will take that as a question and I will defer to Senator Simmons, but I believe that this is a unanimous recommendation of the Rules Committee to make this change. And Senator Simmons, would you like to add something to that?

SENATOR SIMMONS: Certainly,

Mr. President. And I appreciate your thoughts,

Senator Bradley. This is simply a replacement

of one of the flags. There are five flags that

are on the seal, and the replacement of the

Confederate flag with the flag of the State of

Florida.

We have the flag of the United States of America there, and it is most appropriate that it be replaced with the flag of the State of Florida. And the fact of it is the committee did have the opportunity to -- to review all other kinds of options and the one that was proposed that I submitted that seemed reasonable, that continues with the history since the early 1970s, of the state of Florida was to take the five flags and replace one of the flags, and the rationale that I had, and this is just my personal view, is to staff

thoroughly researched this issue, and in <u>Texas</u>

<u>versus White</u>, which is an 1869 decision by the

United States Supreme Court, it dealt with the
issue of the validity of the -- of the

Confederacy and took -- and made the ruling
consistent with -- with President Lincoln's

statements in his first inaugural address that
he made, and that is when this Union was made
it was made as a perpetual Union, and when

Texas and all of the other states were
incorporated into the -- into the United States
as a new member and a political body, it was
final.

The Union between Texas and the other states was as complete as perpetual and dissoluble as the Union between the original states.

There was no place for reconsideration or revocation, except through revolution or through consent of the states. The fact of it is that there are several other cases that specifically deal with this issue, one involving Tennessee and various other states, I think including Alabama. The decisions have been unanimous that in fact if we are going to

have a seal we should be dealing with sovereign nations that are in fact legitimate sovereign nations.

And so for the state of Florida, for me, it is most appropriate as a person who researches these kind of issues and believes in what we do for the seal of the State of Florida to have those sovereignties that were in fact legitimate sovereignties of this state on a seal, and it seems to me most appropriate to have on a seal for the State Senate a flag of the State of Florida. And so those are the reasons for doing this.

There are a multitude of other reasons
that other people have that are legitimate, and
I look at this and say that in order to deal
with this matter appropriately, the best thing
to do is what the unanimous decision of the
Rules Committee members was and that is in fact
to replace one flag.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Additional questions, additional questions? Senator Gibson for a question.

SENATOR GIBSON: Thank you, Mr. President.

And Senator Simmons, didn't we in the

committee, I believe I made the request actually, make copies of the seal to pass to each member so that we could see the seal in its current form and the committee could understand the flag that -- the flag that was going out and the flag that would potentially go in and we had question and discussion about that copy?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Simmons, let's do this. You know, we are here to move forward on the redistricting. I think that there are some questions, and Senator Bradley, it was our intent, and again, not to blindside anybody, we want to make sure everybody has an opportunity to fully understand the issue before us.

So Senator Simmons, why don't we temporarily postpone this rule change right now and I would encourage the members that were not on the Rules Committee to visit with Senator Simmons and visit with John Phelps who made the recommendation. And again, I apologize, it was not our intent to catch people off guard.

I know everybody came up here with the intent to talk about redistricting and this

popped up, but we will respect that request and 1 we will TP that at this time. 2 Okay, if we could, let's just move on. 3 Are there motions relating to committee 4 5 reference? 6 SENATE CLERK: None on the desk, 7 Mr. President. 8 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there messages 9 from the Governor and other executive 10 communications? 11 SENATE CLERK: None on the desk, Mr. President. 12 13 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there messages 14 from the House of Representatives? SENATE CLERK: On the desk, Mr. President. 15 16 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator of the 10th 17 District, Rules Chair Simmons. You are 18 recognized for a motion. We have the 19 concurrent resolution from the House here, 20 Senator Simmons. 21 SENATOR SIMMONS: Mr. President, I move 22 that the House Concurrent Resolution 1-C be 23 taken up in instanter. The concurrent 24 resolution allows each House to determine its 25 respective schedule of sitting dates and times

1 for adjourning and reconvening.

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PRESIDENT GARDINER: Without objection show the motion adopted.

Please read the concurrent resolution the first time by title and the second in full.

SENATE CLERK: The Honorable Andy

Gardiner, President. I am directed to inform

the Senate that the House of Representatives

has adopted HCR 1-C and request the concurrence

of the Senate, Bob Ward, Clerk.

The reading of the resolution, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there questions? Are there objection? All in favor of the concurrent resolution, say yea?

(Chorus of yeas.)

PRESIDENT GARDINER: All opposed. vote the concurrent resolution is adopted.

Senators, Senator Galvano will outline the schedule of the committee meetings for the Committee on Apportionment.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. Good afternoon, Senators.

Mr. President, if you will, I am just going to recap a little bit of where we have been, how we got here and then what to expect over the

As all of you recall and you may have read most recently in the memo that I sent to the President and the Senators on Friday, we, myself and Chair Oliva had reached an agreement with regard to an initial base map drawing process.

That process took place and included the map drawers from the Senate, map drawers from the House of Representatives, together with legal counsel who before they went in to draw, created and suggested based on the status of the law given all of the opinions up to this date and the wording of the Constitution, methodologies by which the map drawers should draw the maps.

It was important to me that we had multiple opportunities or multiple choices within the process, because this is not an

exact science. Two methodologies were proposed, six maps have come out, those were the ones that were released last Wednesday that you all have probably seen at this point.

Today at 2:00 p.m. we are going to have a meeting of both the Senate Committee on Reapportionment and the House Select Committee on Redistricting. The purpose of this meeting is to give the map drawers the opportunity to explain the base maps, give the Senators on the committee as well as the House members on the committee, as well as any Senator who is not on the committee, and I believe House members who are not on the House committee will also be invited an opportunity to hear from the map drawers and engage in question and answers.

We also have on the agenda the opportunity for the public to be there, and so we intend to truly vet through where we are at least at this point in the process with regard to the products that have thus far come out.

On Wednesday at 9:00 a.m. the Senate

Committee on Reapportionment will then

reconvene to workshop the products that have

thus far come out, to further analyze, have

question and answer, and to consider at that point any amendments or alternative proposals that have come into the cue.

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It is then my intention, Mr. President and Senators, to reconvene again on Friday with the hope that we would then come together as a committee to pass out a Senate map. In order to facilitate timing the amendment deadline for that Friday meeting will be 5:00 p.m. -- 6:00 p.m. on Thursday.

Amendments, if you are making them are under the same conditions that were established for the Congressional districts. The amendment has to be a whole map. Be prepared to explain who was involved in the creating or drafting of the amendment, be able to justify a non-partisan purpose for the amendment. Be prepared to provide a functional analysis for any impact on minority voting rights.

And then with regard to the procedure, and I will make another note here, the process thus far has been taking place on the Senate side and has been recorded, and as far as going forward on the amendment process, if you are having any discussion with our staff about

moving lines, and I don't want to be overly broad about this, because there was a lot of discussion about process and generalities that take place, but if you are actually moving a line and creating a product that is going to either amend a map or require a vote, then that process will be recorded.

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It is then our intention to reconvene here a week from tomorrow for special order. The amendment deadline for special order will be 5:00 p.m. on Monday. So that at least explains where we are going over the next week until we get to the special order calendar and then we will determine at that point whether we move to a third and pass a map out or if we need additional time on the floor.

I also am prepared to have a committee meeting on Monday if by Friday we cannot reach some sort of consensus among the members of the committee.

And so, Mr. President, that is the schedule for the next week and a half, and I will take any questions or move into a series of motions.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there questions?

Senator Latvala for a question.

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SENATOR LATVALA: Yes, Senator Galvano, what opportunities — we have seven members out of 40 that are on the special committee. What opportunities will there be prior to the resolution coming to the floor for the other members of the Senate to ask questions, to make comments, because I would assume that once the committee comes out with a plan, if the last session on maps was any indication, there is going to be a certain standing to that map?

And so I am just wondering when is the rank and file members of the Senate going to have an opportunity to ask questions in a public forum, public setting or make suggestions or make observations?

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano, you are recognized.

SENATOR GALVANO: First, I would note that in the congressional process we amended the map twice here on the floor after it was amended in committee. Having said that and directly to your question, we can begin today. I am

inviting all of the members or any member that wishes to attend the joint meeting today to do so.

You are welcome to attend the meeting on Wednesday, as well as the meeting on Friday.

Many of you have served on committees with me.

I am going to be as open as I possibly can in terms of the ability to ask questions even if you are not on the committee.

With regard to amendments, do not wait until Thursday or up against the amendment deadline. You have opportunities now to begin looking at what you might consider to be an amendment and to do so.

Senator Braynon has already put forth a map that I assume will become his amendment.

So there is opportunity beginning right at this moment, Senator Latvala, and I am happy to assist in any way that I can as is Jay Ferrin.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Latvala for a follow up.

SENATOR LATVALA: Thank you. With regard to the more global issues, let's take, for example, issues like numbering. Let's take, for example the issue of what happens to a

sitting member who is in the middle of a four year term who's district doesn't change, which I have seen a Supreme Court decision that says that in that event the term doesn't end.

But when is -- when is the committee planning on having a conversation about how that will be determined?

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. That will -- the numbering will

be determined once we determine what the map,

itself, will be. If you look at the memo I

sent on Friday, my message was simply this,

that we are going to go back through and number

the districts based on those areas that have

the most commonality with the existing map.

In other words, the numbers were not challenged, the Plaintiffs have not challenged them, no one else has challenged them. The consent order and the consent that was entered into made reference to the elections that were up in 2016.

And so it is the position of the Senate

Committee on Reapportionment that the numbers

will be put back in as close as possible to the

existing districts once the map has been

determined.

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As far as having to run again, it is the Senate Committee on Reapportionment's position that if you are in a four year seat and you have that, that number, you are not going to have to run again. At the end of the day the entity that determines who is qualified to serve in the Florida Senate is the Florida Senate. And so that is the position we are taking.

We have substantial legal support for it.

Is it absolutely black and white, no, I cannot represent that to you, but we will be taking that position.

SENATOR LATVALA: Thank you.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: President Gaetz, you are recognized for a question.

PRESIDENT GAETZ: Thank you very much,
Mr. President. Chair Galvano, thank you for
your good work. My question has to do with the
full and open public disclosure that the joint
agreement between the House and the Senate and
your direction imposes on all of us.

We have to fully and openly and appropriately disclose all of those who may

have had influence on or have directed us in any way in the development of an amendment or a map.

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My question, sir, is when you are taking public testimony from individuals who may or may not be cat's paws for someone else, something we found to be the case retroactively in the original redistricting, will they be required to do as legislators do, and that is to fully and openly disclose who has been involved in the development of their testimony? And, if so, will you be using sworn, will those individuals be sworn in, or how will you ensure the full and open testimony?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano, you are recognized.

SENATOR GALVANO: Yes, thank you,

Mr. President, and thank you for your question.

We have invited any member of the public or

anyone who wants to propose a map to come

before the committee. It is my intention that

the committee will be thorough in its analysis

of a proposal that comes to it from an outside

source.

I have not determined yet whether we would

go into a sworn testimony position with someone from outside the Senate submitting a map.

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I will point this out though, that different than the congressional litigation that we were just in, there is an opportunity for discovery following this session which would give us an opportunity to look further into the background and motives and influences that may exist or may not exist.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: President Gaetz for a follow up.

PRESIDENT GAETZ: Thank you,

Mr. President. Will you ask individuals who

come before the committee to testify to

represent that their testimony is of their own

making or ask them to identify groups or

individuals who have assisted them in the

development of their testimony, amendments or

proposed maps?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano of the 26th for a follow up.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. Yes, and that occurred the last

committee -- committee hearing as well. Where

it gets tricky is where maps are submitted

after we have adjourned legislatively and before the hearing, but again with the opportunity for discovery maybe that may be different.

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PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Clemens for a question.

SENATOR CLEMENS: Thank you,

Mr. President. You had indicated earlier that

the -- I am sorry, Senator Galvano, Mr. Chair,

you had indicated earlier that the Senate

Committee on Reapportionment had decided that

the -- that a Senator who's district did not

change appreciably would not have to run again.

When did the committee make that decision?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator of the 26th,

Senator Galvano.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. The decision and the position

that I have taken as Chairman of the committee

is based on the advice of counsel and the idea

that we have not received a challenge with

regard to the numbering or the terms, and also

it is consistent with the consent judgment that

was entered into between the Plaintiffs and the

Legislature, which is specifically worded.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Clemens for a 1 2 follow up question. 3 SENATOR CLEMENS: Thank you, 4 Mr. President. Just so I want to be clear, so 5 it was a decision made between you and legal 6 staff? This wasn't a committee decision, is 7 that correct? 8 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano for a 9 follow up. 10 SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you, 11 Mr. President. We have yet to convene our 12 committee. It is the legal position that we 13 are taking. 14 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Clemens for a 15 follow up. 16 SENATOR CLEMENS: Thank you, 17 Mr. President, a different question. 18 Galvano, today and then also in your memo you 19 indicated that Senators and the public will be 20 able to submit alternative maps and any 21 testimony regarding those maps for 2.2 consideration on Wednesday at your meeting. 23 Is there a deadline for that to happen if 24 the public wants to submit a map? When do they

kind of have to have it to staff in order to be

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able to -- to have it viewed at the meeting on Wednesday?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano, you are recognized.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. If we were going to take up a

vote on Wednesday, the amendment deadline would

be 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday. I would use that as

the benchmark.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator of the 34th District, Senator Sachs for a question.

SENATOR SACHS: Thank you, Mr. President.

And thank you, Chair Galvano for all you have done. Suggestion attorney to attorney. Either when folks come and give testimony as to maps and they are not part of the Senate or the House, either one, they should be placed under oath so that that way if a discovery process ensues later in litigation, at least we would know that we have some -- they have some legitimacy behind their testimony that it was their map.

Or two, when somebody submits a map, it is in writing, and maybe it could be at the very bottom of that form, a little note that says or

a little paragraph that says that these are the people who have assisted me in drawing this map, and that -- and their signature, and that way we have it on record that if somebody from the public submits a map that at least they are disclosed and transparent, and who helped them if anybody or any group to draw the lines of that map.

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Just a suggestion, I think that it would go far in lending your process to a transparent one and one that may not have to be, you know, in the throws of discovery and litigation later on after we conclude.

And the second issue, if I could, I am going to go into a second question, if that is okay, Chair Galvano. When I was in the original redistricting committee, it seems like years ago, but it wasn't that long ago, we had a Lottery system for the numbers.

Is what you are saying, and this is a direct question, is what you are saying that the staff will assign a number to a newly designed or a newly drawn district that is close to a previous one and that is how that newly drawn district will get its new number?

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. I am going to start backwards.

SENATOR SACHS: Okay, good.

SENATOR GALVANO: The committee, that will be part of the committee process with the assistance of staff when we determine what the map will look like. The current numbers that you see on the base map are what the staff calls place holders, and they were not achieved by any particular methodology, but in order to be consistent with whatever the challenges were, what the consent order said and what we believed the case law to say, we are going to go back and look geographically and identify districts and numbers based on what I call commonality.

With regard to your first issue, a great suggestion. I intend to talk with legal counsel and make sure that they have a discussion also with House counsel so we can all be on the same page going forward.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator of the 34th District, Senator Sachs.

SENATOR SACHS: Thank you, sir. And Chair Galvano, I think that that would be, and again,

I am thinking about legal counsel as well, just a little notation on the bottom of the page that says these are the groups, and that should also be for the House, for their testimony as well. It should be one form for both Houses to make it a lot easier for the court to decide.

Thank you, sir. Thank you.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: The Senator of the 35th District, President Margolis, you are recognized.

PRESIDENT MARGOLIS: Mr. Chairman. I reviewed the six -- the six -- the maps that I got regarding my district and certainly the Democratic district also. And I find that about a half a dozen of the cities in all of the -- in all of the maps have been -- have been divided, some in two, some in three, but the district that I represent now is divided up into all kinds of little quarters and things that -- that we were trying to overcome.

That is why we are doing the redistricting and I just really wonder how that is going to be treated as we go forward.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano, you are recognized.

SENATOR GALVANO: Yes, thank you,

Mr. President. And this afternoon, President

Margolis, we are going to have an opportunity

for the map drawers to go through and discuss

the drafting of the maps that you have just

referenced. And to refer back to the

methodologies that were provided by legal

counsel.

With regard to the methodologies, you had really two. One involved the effort to keep as many counties whole as possible and keep as many districts within a county as possible.

The other was to minimize county splits and those are different, though may sound the same.

With regard to the cities, based on the case law that has led us up to this point, the court has put priority on the counties, and one of the reasons is that city lines change.

There is annexations and other things that take place, but there is more of a comfort level with county lines.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Gibson for a question.

SENATOR GIBSON: Thank you, Mr. President. Going back to the testimony and who signs on

the bottom of a map that is submitted, the groups and all of that, and so there is no confusion to our public constituencies, a map doesn't technically come into play unless a member uses a map submitted to the public system by someone or some group of people.

It doesn't come into play unless a member actually uses that map to amend the maps that -- or to amend any of the maps or the map that we come up with at the end, or not so much at the end but in committee. So there is no -- this seems to be a confusion that if somebody submits a map they submit it before the amendment deadline, someone other than a Senator, and it goes as an amendment and that is not the case, correct?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano, you are recognized.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you, Mr.

President. Senator Gibson, thank you for that,
that clarification. Absolutely an amendment to
be considered has to be submitted by a member,
and I think once that submission takes place
then that will actually get into addressing
some of President Gaetz's concerns and some of

Senator Sachs' concerns. So thank you, I am 1 2 glad you made that clarification. 3 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Soto, you are 4 recognized. 5 SENATOR SOTO: Thank you, Mr. President. 6 With regard to triggering a reelection, I understand the number part of it, but is there 7 8 any change or substantial change to a district? 9 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano, you 10 are recognized. 11 SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you, 12 Mr. President. The numbering will be based on 13 the district that has the most in common with 14 the existing district in the enacted plan. And so that is, that is how it will -- there is not 15 16 an absolute threshold that has to be met. 17 We will have to look at the maps. Some of 18 them are not going to change really at all, but 19 whatever has the most in common is going to 20 receive that number. 21 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Soto for a 22 follow up. 23 SENATOR SOTO: I understand that. And so 24 once numbers are assigned if a district 25 changes, is it any change or a substantial

change that would trigger a reelection or a new election in 2016, for that particular seat?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. Our position will be from the committee's standpoint or based on the legal research, that if you are a sitting Senator and you receive -- you remain in the district that has the number that you are in, you -- it won't matter whether it is substantial or minimal.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator of the 14th district for a follow up.

SENATOR SOTO: Thank you, Mr. President.

Who would be deemed an incumbent in this

Chamber, not individually naming them but what

would the description of the Senator be deemed

incumbent under the Fair District amendments?

Would it be someone who was elected before 2012

or before 2010? How would that work?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. If we are drawing lines now, any sitting member of this body would be deemed an incumbent.

SENATOR SOTO: Okay. Thank you,

Mr. President. With regard to Tier 1

protection for minority districts, would -- did

there have -- does there have to be a minority

district or an access seat or a coalition seat

created before 2010, before 2012, or if it was

currently a coalition or minority seat, would

that be for a protection under Tier 1?

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Galvano.

SENATOR GALVANO: Thank you,

Mr. President. If it is current, so if our process now diminishes the opportunity of a minority district to elect a candidate of its choice, then we have run afoul.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Okay, are there additional questions? Seeing none, Senator Galvano, I believe you have a series of motions.

SENATOR GALVANO: Yes. Thank you,
Mr. President. Mr. President, to allow for
sufficient time for amendments to be drafted I
move the rules be waived to establish the
amendment deadline of 6:00 p.m. each day prior
to committee meeting scheduled for Wednesday,
October 21st, and Friday, October 23rd.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there questions?

Any objection? Show the motion adopted.

Chairman Galvano, you are recognized for another motion.

SENATOR GALVANO: Mr. President, I move to waive Rule 2.10 and allow the Senate Committee on Reapportionment to continue meeting past 6:00 p.m. today until completion of the meeting.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there questions?

Are there objections? Show the motion adopted without objection.

Senators, if we could stand in informal recess for five minutes.

(Brief recess taken.)

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Okay, we have a series of motions but we have a rules report that we left pending and I know that there has been a lot of communication back and forth and I appreciate the Senators working together and getting some of the questions answered.

Senator Simmons I believe you have a thought. You are recognized.

SENATOR SIMMONS: Yes, Mr. President. I

-- the discussion has to do with the, exactly
what the seal should be. We have discussed it

and I move that the Senate accept the report in its entirety.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there questions?

Are there objections?

Seeing none, show the report adopted in its entirety.

Senator Simmons, I believe you have a series of other motions.

SENATOR SIMMONS: Yes. Mr. President, the special order calendar group will meet 15 minutes after adjournment in Room 401 of the Senate Office Building. And as a reminder, the amendment deadline for the special order calendar to be considered on Tuesday, October 27th, is 5:00 p.m. on Monday, October 26.

And then I have something that is a real reminder to all of the -- all of the Senators, and that is the -- the issue of deadlines that we have, and --

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senators, if we could, if we could go back just real quick.

The Senator of the 10th District Rules Chair,

Senator, you are recognized for a motion and the second to the motion which goes with the

adoption of the rule, Senator Simmons moves that, further moves that the Secretary be authorized to make any necessary technical or conforming changes.

Without objection show the motion adopted. I apologize. If we could go to the additional motions and then I think we are done for the day.

SENATOR SIMMONS: All right, sorry

Senators. Because the regular session convenes
on January 12th next year, the President and I
would like to remind you of the accelerated
Bill drafting deadlines.

According to Senate Rule 3.7, all Bills must be filed for introduction no later than 12:00 o'clock noon on the first day of regular session.

The President has established January the 8th, as the deadline for approving final Bill, drafts of Bills. This means that all Bills must be in final form and approved electronically to file by 5:00 p.m. that day. So I want to repeat that. In the weeks leading up to these deadlines it is extremely important that Bill drafting is able to contact your office with questions about your draft request. This year the weeks preceding opening day occurred during the holiday season. Given these deadlines and the important work --

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senators, if you could give the Rules Chair your attention, please. We are talking about timing for the regular session. As your President I am a little bit concerned that drafts are going to come in late. We are going to got close to the holidays and if you would please pay attention to Senator Simmons, we want to talk a little bit about the deadlines, and if you are not following it I hope your staff is watching, because this is going to be very important as we get closer to the holidays.

Senator Simmons, you are recognized.

SENATOR SIMMONS: Thank you,

Mr. President. In the weeks leading up to the

deadlines it is extremely important that Bill drafting is able to contact your office with questions about your draft request. Remember, your draft request must be in by January the 8th.

So this year because of the -- of the deadlines and the holidays and the weeks preceding opening day occurring during the holiday season, we are going to ask that you make sure that your staff is given the telephone numbers of Bill drafting so that Bill drafting will be able to contact them and coordinate during the holiday season.

So it is incredibly important that you get your phone numbers and your staff's phone numbers to Bill drafting so that Bill drafting can work with your staff and you during the holidays, and particularly leading up to January the 8th, for you to be able to not be caught in a bind.

So please, get your information, your contact information of yourself as well as your staff to Bill drafting.

PRESIDENT GARDINER: Senator Simmons, I

believe you have a series of motions. 1 2 SENATOR SIMMONS: Yes, Mr. President. 3 PRESIDENT GARDINER: You are recognized. 4 SENATOR SIMMONS: Again, Mr. President, 5 the special order calendar group will meet 15 6 minutes after the adjournment in Room 401, 7 Senate Office Building, and the amendment 8 deadline for special order calendar to be 9 considered on Tuesday, October 27th, is 5:00 10 p.m. on Monday, October 26th, and 11 Mr. President. 12 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Are there -- are 13 there objections? 14 Seeing none, show it adopted. 15 SENATOR SIMMONS: Mr. President. 16 PRESIDENT GARDINER: You are recognized. 17 SENATOR SIMMONS: Mr. President, I move 18 that the Senate adjourn until noon on Tuesday, 19 October 27, or upon the call of the President 20 for the purpose of holding committee meetings 21 and conducting other Senate business. 22 PRESIDENT GARDINER: Without objection the Senate is now adjourned for the day. 23 24 (Whereupon, the proceedings were 25 adjourned.)
