14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

State funds will build on and continue last year's support for 21st Century interactive exhibits, including digital preservation and presentation of the testimonies of Holocaust survivors and liberators. These crucial resources will support the educational, exhibition, collection, and conservation needs of the museum for the benefit of students, teachers, and visitors.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

State funds will help the museum to digitally preserve the testimonies of Holocaust survivors and liberators; support salaries for staff who are digitizing and indexing objects, testimonies, and artifacts from Holocaust survivors and liberators; fund expenses related to artifact, testimony, and art digitization and indexing; and provide conservation, care, and photography of survivor objects and art.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Through its world-class exhibitions and programs, virtual tours, AI technology allowing virtual live interviews with survivors, and ground-breaking online, participatory, and multi-media platforms, the museum spreads awareness about the Holocaust and the values of democracy in both historic and contemporary contexts.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The museum uses state-of-the-art technologies to reach more than 1,300 teachers, 180,000 students, and 23,000 individuals who are impacted through virtual educational programs, survivor talks, and commemorations each year. In addition, The FHM has trained 2,000 law enforcement officers since the program's inception.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

An estimated 1,300 teachers, 180,000 students, and 23,000 individuals will be impacted through virtual educational programs, survivor talks, and commemorations each year.
