4. Project/Program Description

This funding will be utilized to expand a long-term mentorship program into high school years for 40 children and their families. This program utilizes evidence-based engagement to achieve the following outcomes for these youth from Hillsborough, Pinellas and Pasco counties: (1) 83% of youth graduate high school, though more than 60% have a parent who did not have the necessary support to complete high school themselves; (2) 93% avoid the juvenile justice system, though 50% have a parent impacted by the criminal justice system; and (3) 98% wait until after their teen years to become parents, though 85% were born to a teen parent. Each child is paired with a professional mentor who provides reliable, one-on-one support for 3 to 4 hours per week.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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This funding will be utilized to expand a long-term mentorship program into high school years for 40 children and their families. This program utilizes evidence-based engagement that anticipates the following outcomes for their youth: - 83% of youth graduate high school, though more than 60% have a parent who did not have the necessary support to complete high school themselves.

- 93% avoid the juvenile justice system, though 50% have a parent impacted by the criminal justice system.

- 98% wait until after their teen years to become parents, though 85% were born to a teen parent.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Each child is paired with a professional mentor who provides reliable, 1:1 support for 3-4 hours/week. Mentors help youth process trauma and cultivate developmentally appropriate skills in regulation of emotions, positive interactions with peers, healthy conflict management, etc. Goal setting and progress monitoring are a regular component of the interactions. In addition to working with children, mentors work with caregivers to develop parenting skills, meet needs for family stability. and help to access resources to support their own mental health and well-being.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The activities and services listed in 14.b above are direct services. These services meet or exceed the national, evidence-based standards for mentorship and are shown to strengthen families.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

40 children and their families will be further engaged in direct mentorship. The national standard that mirrors our data is that for every child mentored, we positively engage 5.6 family members, which includes support for approximately 225 individuals.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

We will examine the outcomes of this cohort of children compared to similarly-situated children who are not engaged in our program.

We expect the following:

1) Higher grades and better attendance/behavior (will track this information from records obtained from schools and/or caregivers).

2) Enhanced economic self-sufficiency. Youth engagement in extra-curricular activities is positively correlated to building the network, confidence, and skills required to increase likelihood of economic self-sufficiency (will measure extracurricular activities by completion of weekly mentoring sessions that model behaviors and planning - exploring interests, introducing college and career options, encouraging extra-curricular activities that enhance social skills, supporting financial literacy that optimize youth potential).

3) Diversion from the criminal justice system (will measure and report rates of criminal justice system interaction).

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

If national standards are not met, then pilot expansion should not be considered for roll-out elsewhere in Florida.
