The Executive director salary is \$78,500/ annually.	45,000

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

To provide free, quality out-of-school programming and services for teenagers. We are Investing in our youth's growth and potential at EJS Project Teen Center. Our goal is to provide a year-round safe out of school space for low-income teens residing in the vulnerable footprint of our city. The organization consists of creating an environment that promotes education, empowerment, self-accountability, leadership, and creating forward-thinking teens. Working to ensure that each student enrolled in our programs are prepared and equipped to excel in life after high school graduation. We provide each of our enrolled students with the essential equipment needed to be successful.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Preparing a diverse pipeline of community-minded young students with the leadership training they need to be successful in post-secondary school and in the workforce is vital to our approach to responsible growth and helps to build thriving communities. The more our doors are open the more opportunities our youth have to take advantage of services provide to help support them towards reaching their goals. These services and programs include but are not limited to 1. Leadership development and training, college, and career support, and paid internships; 2. Daily meals and snacks; 3. Academic support, tutoring services, and mentoring; 4. Positive peer interactions; and 5. Community service opportunities.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Meaningful dialogue around race equity, leadership, and positive impact strategies while connecting and engaging with local officials and community stakeholders. Community Building Activities: Working to help increase the tree canopy by planting trees. Beautification and revitalization efforts in The Set neighborhood in Delray Beach. Civic Engagement: Youth engagement in city and county meetings and initiatives, Young Legislators Program, and a trip to the State Capital. Drop-In Services: Daily contact that promotes a relational approach to service provision. Every day our teens can EAT, LEARN, SERVE, CONNECT, HANG OUT, and EXPLORE.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

EJS Project students are between the ages of 13 and 19, low-income and primarily African American and Haitian, reside in The Set, and attend a local middle or high school. Students may be excelling in school or struggling academically/behaviorally initially but all display a desire to grow, to evolve as young change agents, and to be future leaders. Teens are the focus of the EJS Project because of the limited services provided to this population and the Director's passion for serving at-risk youth.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

By providing services to our youth daily at EJS Project Teen Center we will reduce their chances of being involved in incidents/activities that could be detrimental to their future. By creating a family atmosphere where everyone is accounted for and spoken to with intention, we expect our youth to rise to the challenges that we have set forth for them. Our methodology is by being proactive about exposing our youth to techniques and skill sets that will help them thrive in the classroom, workforce, and in their community is the difference. Outcome benchmarks will be measured by completion of tutoring sessions, graduation rates, community service hours, certificates received, attendance, and retention.
