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14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The 2023-24 appropriations request supports the Open Doors Outreach Network (ODON) serving victims of commercial sexual exploitation and sex trafficking ages 10-24 in 30 Florida counties, comprising approximately 72% of the state's population. Care to victims is available 24/7/365. Funding covers the operating costs of the statewide backbone organization and direct service assistance to local provider organizations for critical operational expenses not covered by Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) dollars.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Open Doors Outreach Network (ODON) provides outreach services to victims of sex trafficking, ages 10-24. Outreach teams consist of Survivor-Mentors, Clinicians, Regional Advocates and Victim Service Coordinators. Team members fill multiple gaps and provide victim-centered services to meet individual victims' needs. Voices for Florida (the backbone organization) coordinates ALL ODON program administration, training and quality assurance.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The Open Doors Outreach Network will expend services from 1,300 to more than 2,100 victims of sexual exploitation and sex trafficking, ages 10-24, and will improve available services in 30 counties in targeted regions across the state with the greatest need.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is young children and youth who are predominating aging out of foster care who are victims of sex trafficking. Florida is a hot spot for trafficking, ranking third in the nation for reports to the National Human Hot line. In 2020 there were more than 3,000 actual reports of sexual exploitation of children in Florida and an untold number of other children being trafficked. Voices of Florida has served over 1,800 children with over 219,000 direct services hours since its inception in 2017. We project that those number will increase to 2,100 during 2023-24.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Using several proven processes for tracking, monitoring, measuring and reporting performance outcomes developed by Voices for Florida (the backbone organization), the Open Doors Outreach Network will report the number of exploited and trafficked victims identified/referred, number of victims receiving services, types of services received by victims and demographic information on those being served. Primary benefits include a reduction in the number of children in the child welfare system and/or crossover into the juvenile justice system and who become long term recipients of public services.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?
