14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The requested funds will be used to establish the FSU Institute for Pediatric Rare Diseases, which will focus on researching diseases that impact our youngest and most vulnerable. These diseases are rare in nature and therefore, the pharmaceutical industry does not have the bandwidth to invest in a cure or treatment. At Florida State University, we have the opportunity and desire to fill the gap in the research necessary to find the treatments for these ailments.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

These funds will be used to establish essential infrastructure and build a strong foundation for the institute. This includes recruiting top-tier scientists, purchasing equipment and supplies, and developing innovative research and treatment programs.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

These funds will also be used to create educational resources and support services for families and patients affected by rare pediatric conditions. The goal is to provide the best possible resources for families and to advance our understanding and treatment of these rare and complex diseases.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is the 15 million children across Florida and the United States who suffer from rare pediatric diseases.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

This project will improve the physical health of millions of children across the state and country who could benefit from critical research conducted on their rare pediatric diseases. This can be measured by rates of hospitalization for children with rare diseases, as well as the development and approval of new treatments and therapies developed at Florida State University. This project will also improve the quality of education by offering research opportunities to students at Florida State University.
