This building once housed institutional and student support departments, a dining hall, a bookstore, faculty offices, and student meeting and recreation areas. These were relocated to the new Student Services Center. When renovated, this building will house the College's Hospitality and Tourism lab spaces and meeting rooms.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Roof replacement, renovation and sealing of the building envelope, replacement of the HVAC systems, installation of a fire suppression system.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Creation of jobs during total renovation of building to house Hospitality and Tourism lab spaces and meeting rooms. New roof and sealing of building to eliminate leaks. Upgraded HVAC system to improve indoor air quality and help airborne transmission of viruses such as SARS-CoV2. Installation of fire suppression system and other improvements to make building healthier and safer. Graduates of the Hospitality and Tourism will alleviate worker shortages in these areas critical to the local economy.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

College students, high school dual enrollment students, unemployed persons, persons with poor physical health, economically disadvantaged persons, workers returning to refresh or enhance skills, jobless persons and general population by maintaining and optimizing the use of this taxpayer-owned building. Space will be renovated to house the College's Hospitality and Tourism lab spaces and meeting areas. Meeting spaces are now used daily.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improvement of health by eliminating leaks, mold, etc. Measure by routine monitoring of air quality and inspection for leaks. Number of students enrolling in and completing the Hospitality and Tourism course requirements. Measure by course enrollment, completion and graduation rates. Employment of persons during renovation work, measured by the number of persons employed by contractors. Benefit taxpayers by extending the useful life of this state-owned asset.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Seminole State College has standard performance clauses in all of its contracts which ensure that work will be completed in accordance with the work plan and list of deliverables, including provisions relating to the payment and withholding of funds as necessary. It is not anticipated that additional penalties will be needed. Deliverables will include roof replacement, new HVAC system, new fire suppression system, etc.
