## Project Objectives



### Establishing a pipeline to health careers.

The Live Healthy Initiative seeks to make it possible for more students at DRS to achieve post-secondary education, exposure and employment in health science fields. The District plans to partner with FAMU, Tallahassee State College (TSC), Lively College and community partners to create and implement approved Academic Pathways for students to achieve Associate of Arts (AA) or Associate of Science (AS) degrees or industry certification in health fields and concentrations Program community partners will assist in the efforts.

## O2 Hiring effective leaders to implement the program.

FAMU DRS will hire one Program Coordinator, one Program Staff Assistant, and two full-time instructors to plan and implement courses and workshops that will expose the FAMU DRS community to careers in health science.

### Project Design



### Community Partnerships

Program activities will include partnering with PAEC, the FAMU College of Education, School of Allied Health and School of Nursing, the Florida Department of Education and community organizations to provide courses in CTE and dual enrollment for students to obtain industry certification.

### Professional Workshops

The program will also host Health Science professional learning workshops with the above mentioned partners for faculty, staff (including school leaders) students, and parents.


#### Dual Enrollment

FAMU DRS will provide educational opportunities for students to attend each institution as a dual enrollment student and receive college credit or certification credit in a recommended pathway to obtain either an AA/AS degree or industry certification in a specified health field.

## Baseline Data

The program will serve at least 100 students in grades 6-12 and approximately 40 faculty and staff educators will be served.

Program staff will conduct pre, mid and post surveys to collect program data regarding career paths, interest and needs for all program participants including students, faculty and staff, parents and program partners.



## Project Goals




- Increase student, faculty and staff, parent and community awareness exposure to college and career opportunities in the health care field.
- Create and implement approved Academic Pathways for students to achieve Associate of Arts (AA)
  or Associate of Science (AS) degrees or industry certification in health fields and concentrations in
  partnership with local colleges, universities and community partners.
- Partner with FAMU College of Education, School of Allied Health and School of Nursing, the Florida
  Department of Education and community organizations to host Living Healthy workshops for
  FAMU DRS faculty, staff, students and families to provide exposures to health initiative and
  resources within the community.

## Intended Impacts or Projected Outcomes

The program will increase the number of students that are enrolled in college and university approved post-secondary education programs to obtain either an AA/AS or industry certification in a health field.

The program will increase student, faculty and staff, parent and community awareness and exposure to college and career opportunities in the health care field.

#### FLORIDA CENTER FOR READING RESEARCH

#### The Developmental English Lexicon Project Researchers: Donald Compton & FCRR Team

FCRR earned a grant from the National Institute of Health (NIH) to expand the scientific infrastructure for research on reading development and provide a much-needed, large-scale dataset of developing readers' behavior. The project obtains estimates of word reading difficulty for the 10,000 most frequent English words, with a sample of 2,500 children in first through fifth grade, to allow for analyses of both groupand individual differences in word reading development. Even for students equipped with a diverse set of decoding strategies, some words are more difficult for children to learn to read than others (e.g., suede and yacht). However, all the factors contributing to differences in children's word reading difficulty are not fully understood. The data will serve as a valuable resource for teachers, school leaders, researchers, educational publishers, and policymakers.

#### Narrative Comprehension Developmental Milestones in Early Childhood (Language Use in Storytelling)

#### Researchers: Lexi Elara & Beth Phillips

This study explores the development of comprehension in children ages five to seven. The goal is to track the developmental pattern of story elements by detecting story inconsistencies across different ages. As the students listen to the short texts, they will report if they notice these inconsistencies. It is important to develop a more sophisticated understanding of the nature of early language development so that educators and parents can develop more advanced strategies to assist children, especially those who may be acquiring language skills at a decreased pace than peers. This will enable families and educators to improve methods for supporting the school readiness of young children.

#### Reach Every Reader (RER Project), Phase 2 Researchers: Mary Walsh & Hugh Catts

In the first phase of the RER project, children's responses to assessments enabled the development of screening materials that should allow for the efficient and accurate identification of children at risk for reading disabilities. In Phase 2, researchers will follow children from the beginning of kindergarten to the end of second grade to refine predictive algorithms that are necessary to identify persistent problems in learning to read. This is a crucial step in assuring that all children have the opportunity to become proficient readers, especially those who are most at risk. Cohorts of FSUS students will be followed through this research beginning with students entering kindergarten in August

#### NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION

Exploring Methods to Reduce Math Anxiety in Children: Testing the Math Lions Intervention Researcher: Colleen Ganley

Math anxiety can start at an early age. To best prevent children from entering into a negatively reinforcing "high math anxiety-low math achievement" cycle, intervention must occur early. This study tested the effectiveness of a math anxiety intervention, titled Math Lions, for second and third-grade students who reported moderate-to-high levels of math anxiety.

E-Rebuild-Mathematical Thinking and Learning via Architectural Design and Modeling Researcher: Fengfeng Ke

This ongoing research in grades six, seven, and eight uses an integrative approach to student-led design through a simulation-based learning system featuring learning-oriented game mechanics, design-based pedagogy, data-driven learning assessment, and adaptive learner support.

Computer Science Integrated with Mathematics In Middle Schools

Researchers: Christine Andrews-Larson, Ellen Granger, Sherry Southerland, David Whalley, Xin Yuan, Megan Crombie

From 2017 to 2022, FSU, FSUS, and Leon County teachers created and piloted mathematics curricular modules to integrated computer science with mathematics standards. This inclusive approach increases access to CS for all students, opening the door to STEM-based career paths. Eight modules for grades 6-8 were published in March, 2024.
