# Federal Objectives (NDAA 2024)



### **Priority 1: Growing the Florida National Guard (FLNG)**

- Although Florida is the 3<sup>rd</sup> most populous state, the FLNG is ranked 53 out of 54 when comparing Guard personnel to citizen population. The force allocation is determined by the Federal Government.
- Florida's population will grow 5M over the next 10 years, and Florida is the 4th most disaster-prone state in the nation.
- The FLNG is experiencing a sustained high activity level, with over 25,000 deployed since 9/11, and over 2M workdays total supporting disaster response.

### **Priority 2: Homestead Readiness Center**

(MILCON - \$35M)

- Focusing strategic objectives around increasing force structure to meet the rapid growth of Florida's population and moving force structure to
  the south Florida area where Florida's attractive recruiting demographics are located.
- Capitalize on the strategic location in South Florida that will enable more efficient and effective response to the State during natural disasters in the Southeast and Southwest portions of Florida.
- Better supports equipment needs and the Soldiers of the 50<sup>th</sup> RSG and A/146<sup>th</sup> ESB with a combined strength of 228 Soldiers, with 17 full-time employees.

### **Priority 3: Miramar Vehicle Maintenance Shop**

(MILCON - \$11.7M)

- The current regional vehicle maintenance shop is over 30 years old, functionally obsolete, does not comply with OSHA & ADA, and is colocated with a Readiness Center in metro Miami on a 5-acre lot that does not allow for adequate space to maintain large military vehicles.
- The facility will support 22 mechanics servicing 8 FLARNG units with 778 Soldiers, and 447 pieces of wheeled equipment.
- The proposed facility provides approximately 24,988 square feet of vehicle maintenance space, a 2,277 square foot unheated storage building, a 660 square foot flammable materials facility, a 440 square foot bulk POL building, and a 330 square foot controlled waste handling building. The project totals 28,695 square feet.

### Priority 4: Camp Blanding Joint Training Center (CBJTC) to a Level II Installation

- CBJTC is a premiere training area supporting all services and federal agencies as well as state and local municipalities.
- CBJTC is a contingency Mobilization Force Generation Installation (MFGI) but lacks some of the required facilities to retain its status as an MFGI. Funding for years 1 and 2 of a five year phased plan were included in the Governor's Recommended Budget for Fiscal Year 2023-2024, and the Department will continue to work with the Governor's Office, the Federal Government and the Legislature to address funding for the following years.
- This priority improves training areas, ranges and ability to support larger formations for both training and state / federal mobilizations.

### Priority 5: Establish the Space National Guard (SNG)

- Active-duty space units were moved out of the Air Force and placed in the new Space Force upon its establishment in 2019; however, space
  units in the Air National Guard remain orphaned in an Air Force that is no longer charged with the space mission.
- SNG provides USSF an optimized, properly aligned, Combat Reserve Component.
- Zero New Cost via ANG SNG account transfers. No unit, GO/personnel, facility growth to establish SNG; same lean overhead.
- ANG has been conducting Space missions for 25 yrs. FY24 SNG stand-up ensures no space war fight interruption for 14 current Space upits.





# **Current Recovery Operations**

- The State Emergency Response Team has been activated for 146 days in response to Hurricanes Ian and Nicole, completing over 7,000 mission requests with 354 active missions today.
- There are currently 31 open major disasters within the Division, including the following from 2022:
  - Hurricane Nicole
  - Hurricane lan
  - Chipola Fire Complex
- The Division has distributed more than **\$8 billion in critical disaster funding** during Governor DeSantis' first term in office the most the Division has ever paid out within this time period.

# **Hurricane Ian Recovery**

- To assist with resuming normal government functions, the Division has established alternate temporary sites for damaged public buildings, including tents, trailers, and the accompanying wraparound services.
- The Division is supporting debris removal efforts in multiple impacted counties including vegetative debris, construction and demolition debris, derelict vessels, and private property debris removal.
- In November, Governor DeSantis announced the launch of the Unite Florida Recovery Portal to connect Floridians impacted by Hurricane Ian to important recovery resources, including Florida's first-ever state-led sheltering and housing program.

# **Hurricane Nicole Recovery**

- Hurricane Nicole made landfall on November 10<sup>th</sup> just south of Vero Beach as a Category 1 storm.
   Nicole was a very large system with a windfield that extended almost 450 miles wide.
- Strong swells in combination with astronomical high tide caused devastating storm surge and coastal flooding along the East-Central Florida Coast, and surge impacts were most notable along Volusia County where these communities were still extremely vulnerable from Ian.
- The Division continues to explore and support the installation of Flood Control Systems to support storm surge and riverine flooding concerns.
  - Over 6,000 feet of flood control systems have been installed in and around Daytona Shores.
- Flood control systems allow residents more time to complete permanent repairs without worrying about continued damage to their homes.

### I. Summary:

CS/SM 160 is a memorial to the United States Department of State, urging the United States Secretary of State to redesignate the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Columbia (FARC) as a Foreign Terrorist Organization. The memorial attests to the Legislature's firm commitment to Columbia, and opposes the Biden Administration's removal of the FARC's designation as a Foreign Terrorist Organization.

The memorial requires the Secretary of State to dispatch copies of the memorial to the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the United States Secretary of State, and each member of the state delegation to the United States Congress.

A memorial is an official legislative document addressed to the United States Congress, the President of the United States, or some other governmental entity that expresses the will of the Legislature on a matter within the jurisdiction of the recipient. A memorial requires passage by both legislative houses but does not require the Governor's approval nor is it subject to a veto.

#### II. Present Situation:

### Measures Against Foreign Terrorists by the Presidential Administration and Congress

#### Executive Order 13224

On September 23, 2001, and in response to the attacks on September 11, 2001, the President of the United States signed Executive Order 13224 (Order), to bolster existing federal action against foreign terrorists and organizations. Specifically, the Order establishes a process to disrupt the financial support network of terrorists and terrorist organizations. The Order does this by authorizing the government to designate and block assets of foreign individuals and entities that commit, or pose a significant risk of committing acts of terrorism.<sup>2</sup>

As used in the Order<sup>3</sup>, terrorism is defined as an action that:

- Involves a violent act or an act dangerous to human life, property, or infrastructure; and
- Appears intended to intimidate or coerce a civilian population; influence government policy by intimidation or coercion; or affect government conduct by mass destruction, assassination, kidnapping, or hostage-taking.<sup>4</sup>

The Order authorizes either the United States Secretary of State (Secretary) or the Secretary of the Treasury to initiate the designation of terrorists, in concert with the United States Attorney General and each other. Once designated, the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) can block assets of the person or groups.<sup>5</sup>

#### Agency Designation of Foreign Terrorists

The authority of the Secretary to designate an individual or entity as a terrorist or foreign terrorist organization is rooted in its immigration and nationality functions. The Secretary may designate an organization as a foreign terrorist organization if the Secretary finds that:

- The organization is a foreign organization;
- The organization engages in terrorist activity or terrorism, or retains the capability and intent to engage in terrorist activity or terrorism; and
- The terrorist activity or terrorism threatens the security of United States nationals or the United States.<sup>7</sup>

If the Secretary determines that an organization has engaged in terrorist activity or terrorism, the Secretary must:

 Provide written, classified notification with findings seven days prior to making a designation to the Speaker and Minority Leader of the United States House of

Representatives, the President pro tempore, Majority Leader, and Minority Leader of the United States Senate, and members of relevant committees of the United States Congress.

Publish the designation in the Federal Register seven days after notification.<sup>8</sup>

The United States Congress may through congressional act disapprove the designation. If the designation stands, the Secretary may, after a 5-year period, review the designation of the foreign terrorist organization. In its review, the Secretary will determine whether current circumstances warrant revocation. In

Along with publication in the Federal Register, the Secretary also publishes and maintains the list of foreign terrorist organizations on its website. <sup>11</sup> Upon publication in the Federal Register, the United States Secretary of the Treasury may freeze the assets of the designated organization. <sup>12</sup>

In addition to the designation authority of the Secretary, the OFAC can designate terrorists and maintain its own list. <sup>13</sup> Specifically, the OFAC may classify an individual as a Specially Designated Global Terrorist (SDGT) and place his or her name on its list of Specially Designated Nationals (SDN). The assets of a SDGT are then blocked and the list of SDNs made publicly available, including to the international financial community. These federal actions curtail the ability of a SDN to conduct property or banking transactions in this country. <sup>14</sup>

#### **History of FARC**

### Beginnings

In 1964, Manuel Marulanda and Jacobo Arenas founded the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Columbia, otherwise known as FARC.<sup>15</sup> The group identified as its core mission social program development in rural areas and wealth redistribution. In furtherance of its mission, the FARC had as its original goal governmental overthrow, relying on the drug trade, ransom collected on kidnappings of politicians and elites, extortion, and illegal gold mining.<sup>16</sup> The FARC used guns,

bombs, and homemade mortars in its attacks. In so doing, the group caused significant and lengthy periods of nationwide destabilization and violence, despite various peace talks and agreements entered into with the government.<sup>17</sup>

### Expansion

In the 1970s, the group rapidly expanded due to significant revenues generated from narcotrafficking. Although in 1982 the group changed its name to the FARC-EP, or the People's Army, the government and media still widely referred to the group as the FARC. During an agreed to cease-fire between the FARC and the government, in 1985, the FARC co-founded the political party of the Patriotic Union (UP) with the Columbia Communist Party. The UP made advances in securing both local and national political seats. These political wins were swiftly retaliated through forced disappearances and assassinations by the Columbian army, right-wing paramilitaries, and drug gangs. In 1999, in response to more than 3,000 kidnappings perpetrated by the FARC and a significant spike in homicide rates, 25 percent of Columbia's entire population marched in a protest against the FARC. Violence continued, and during the 2002 political season, the FARC kidnapped a presidential candidate. In return, the government ended the legal status of the UP and the party could no longer participate politically. <sup>20</sup>

#### 2016 Peace Accord

The cycle of violence coinciding with intermittent attempts at peace continued until the parties finally agreed to the 2016 Peace Accord, ending 52 years of conflict since the beginnings of the FARC. On June 27, 2017, overseen by the United Nations, the FARC officially ended disarmament, relinquishing 7,132 weapons and 77 of the FARC's 900 arms stores from the countryside. Considered to have significant impact globally, then-President Juan Manuel-Santos received the Nobel Peace Prize for his role in the Accord, which concluded a 4-year negotiation.

By the date of the Accord, casualties of the long-term conflict totaled a minimum of 260,000 Columbians murdered, 80,000 missing, 20,000 kidnapped, 8.2 million displaced, 9.2 million government-registered as conflict victims, tens of thousands of recruited child soldiers, and untallied numbers of victims of torture, including sexual violence.<sup>23</sup>

#### **Combatant Groups in Columbia Currently in Operation**

Although most FARC members have participated in reintegration since the 2016 Peace Accord, some former members continue to operate as dissidents in splinter groups.<sup>24</sup> One such identified

group of FARC dissidents is the Segunda Marquetalia, organized in 2019.<sup>25</sup> Another splinter group is the FARC-EP.<sup>26</sup> This group consists of former FARC fighters and new recruits.<sup>27</sup>

Additionally, the National Liberation Army (ELN), the oldest combatant group in Columbia, currently estimated at 2,300 individuals, remains an active threat.<sup>28</sup> The Columbian government and the ELN are currently engaged in peace talks in Mexico.<sup>29</sup>

Collectively, these combatant groups continue to engage in bombings, violence against civilian populations, kidnappings, and attacks against military, police, government, and infrastructure.<sup>30</sup>

While Venezuela and its border countries have traditionally been home to the combatant group, Hezbollah, recent sightings indicate its presence in Columbia.<sup>31</sup> True to the group's clandestine nature, and having used fraudulent means to obtain Columbian citizenship, Hezbollah members in Columbia portray themselves as legitimate businesspeople.<sup>32</sup> Hezbollah's violent history in Latin America includes bomb attacks and assassinations.<sup>33</sup>

#### U.S. Response to the FARC

In 1997, the Secretary designated the FARC as a Foreign Terrorist Organization.<sup>34</sup>

In 2000, the United States funded Plan Columbia, a \$9 billion United States military aid program intended to support the Colombian government in defeating the drug trade, reestablishing authority, and increasing its authority country-wide.<sup>35</sup>

On December 1, 2021, the Secretary revoked and delisted both the designation of the FARC as a Foreign Terrorist Organization and its listing as a SDGT.<sup>36</sup> As justification for the revocation, the

Secretary provided that subsequent to the 2016 Peace Accord, the FARC formally dissolved and disarmed. As such, the FARC no longer exists as a unified organization engaging in terrorism, nor does it have capacity or intent to do so.<sup>37</sup>

Concurrent to the revocation of the FARC, the Secretary designated the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia - People's Army (FARC-EP) and Segunda Marquetalia, along with their leaders, as Foreign Terrorist Organizations and as a SDGT.<sup>38</sup> The new designations included a directive to block financial and property assets. As justification, the Secretary provided that the designation of FARC-EP and Segunda Marquetalia is directed at those who refused to demobilize and continue to engage in terrorist actions, such as killing former FARC members and kidnapping and killing political candidates.<sup>39</sup>

#### Memorial

A memorial is an official legislative document addressed to the United States Congress, the President of the United States, or some other governmental entity that expresses the will of the Legislature on a matter within the jurisdiction of the recipient. A memorial requires passage by both legislative houses but does not require the Governor's approval nor is it subject to a veto.

### III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

CS/SM 160 is a memorial to the United States Department of State, urging the Secretary to redesignate the FARC as a Foreign Terrorist Organization. The memorial attests to the Legislature's firm commitment to Columbia, and opposes the Biden Administration's removal of the FARC as a Foreign Terrorist Organization.

The memorial requires the Secretary of State to dispatch copies of the memorial to the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the United States Secretary of State, and each member of the state delegation to the United States Congress.
