

Nonnative Fish and Wildlife in Florida 1905 – Present FWC Database





Prevention: Risk Assessment/Screening



- Not all nonnative species are invasive
- Assessment of risk
- Level of concern may change based on location
- 239 risk screens completed since program began
 - 29 in progress




Prevention: Regulatory Approach

- Port Investigations
 - NOAA, USFWS, FWC
- Undercover Operations








Prevention: Operation Viper

- Long-term undercover operation
 - Nearly 200 venomous and prohibited snakes documented during illegal transactions
 - 24 different species endemic to seven regions around globe
- Over 600+ felony and misdemeanor charges documented
 - 8 suspects charged
 - Suspects engaged in non-wildlife crimes



- Lionfish Educational Exhibit Program










Prevention: Exotic Pet Amnesty Program




- Matches current owners with new owners
- Media campaign to enlist adopters
- 8,122 rehoming requests to date
 - Most are for lizards, snakes, and turtles
- 1,834 for Conditional & Prohibited species
 - Nonnative slider turtle placement events in April and September 2025




Control and Management: Early Detection/Rapid Response

- More than 25,000 calls since 2011
- Summary of FY 24/25:
 - 69 early detection/rapid responses coordinated for priority species
 - 50 nonnative animals removed from environment

Control and Management: Resource Protection - Python Removal

- Python Removal Contractors increased captures more than 200%
- Pilot Project with QM/Inversa Leathers May 2025
 - Management of FWC Python Removal Contractors
 - 143% increase in pythons removed compared to same time last year
- Over 25,000 total removed since 2000










Control and Management: Lionfish Removal Efforts
