- Average cost of a bachelor's degree is **\$270**

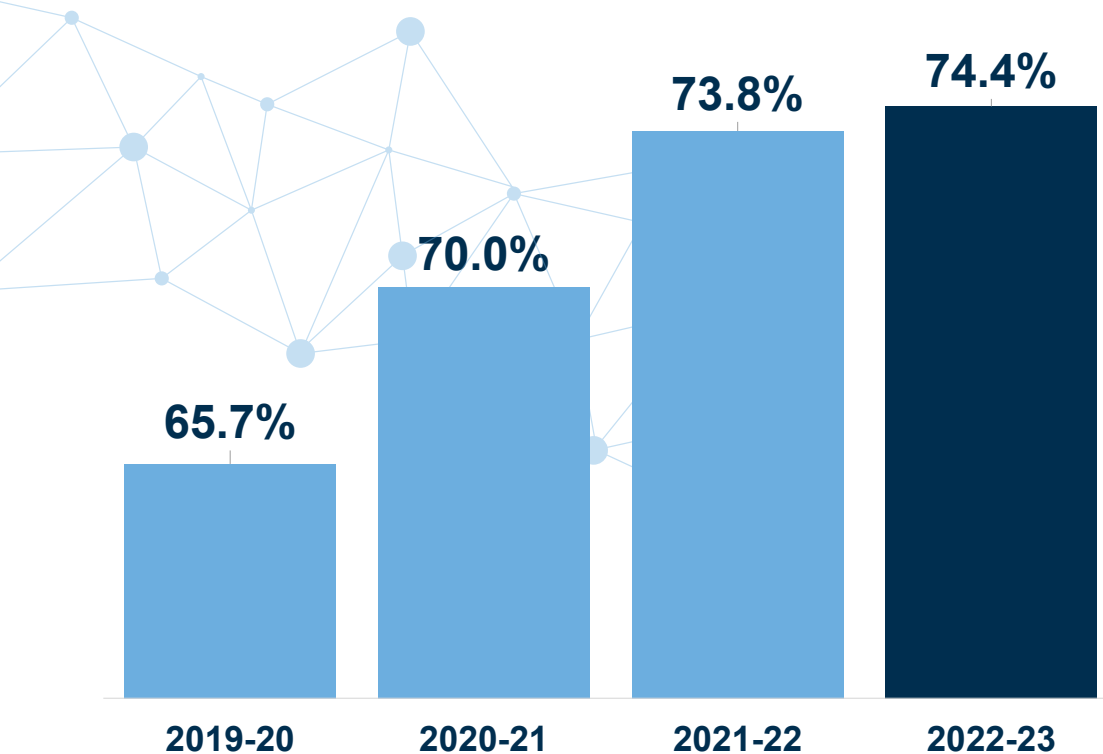

PBF 1: % of Bachelor Grads Enrolled or Employed (\$40,000+)

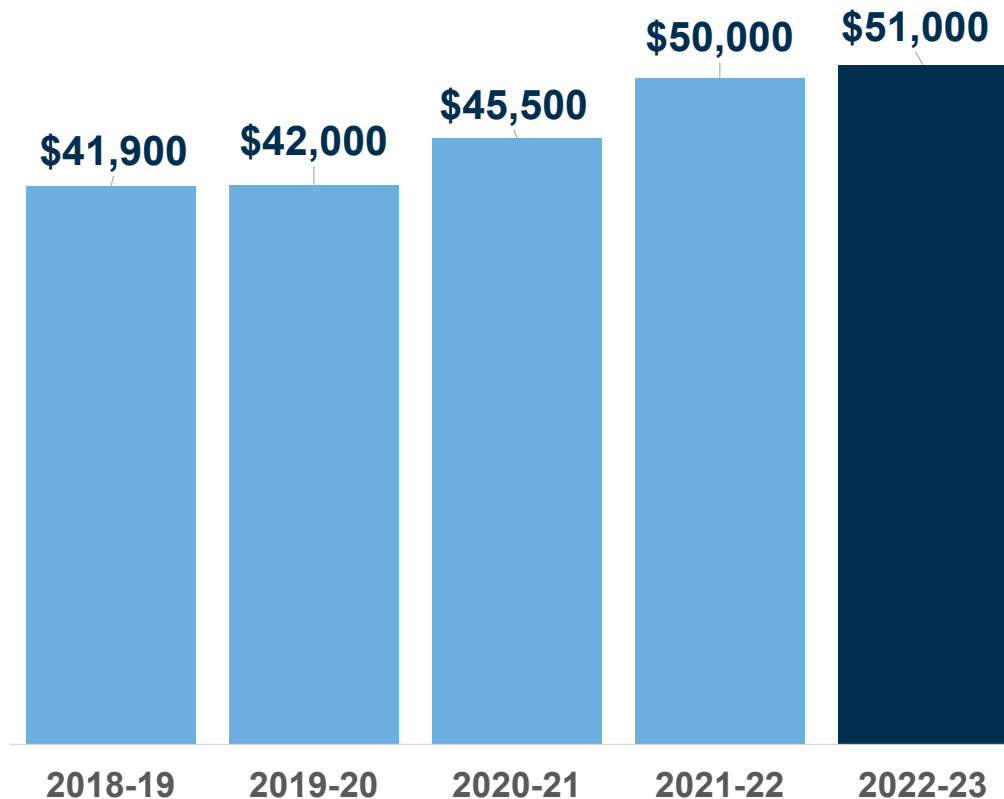


Universities have improved by nearly 10 percentage pts, to 74.4% in the last 3 years

SUS graduates are competitive in the workforce

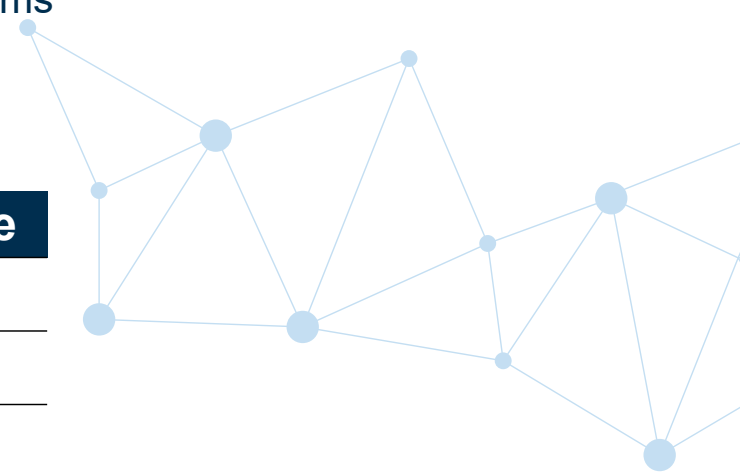
PBF 6 & 8: Programs of Strategic Emphasis

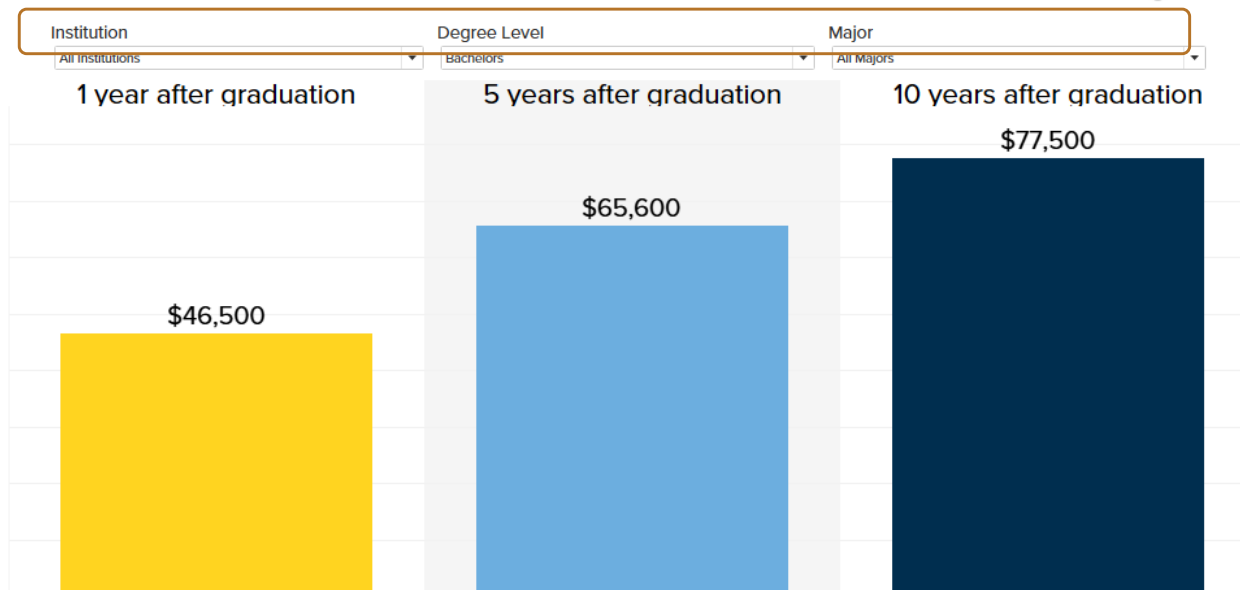

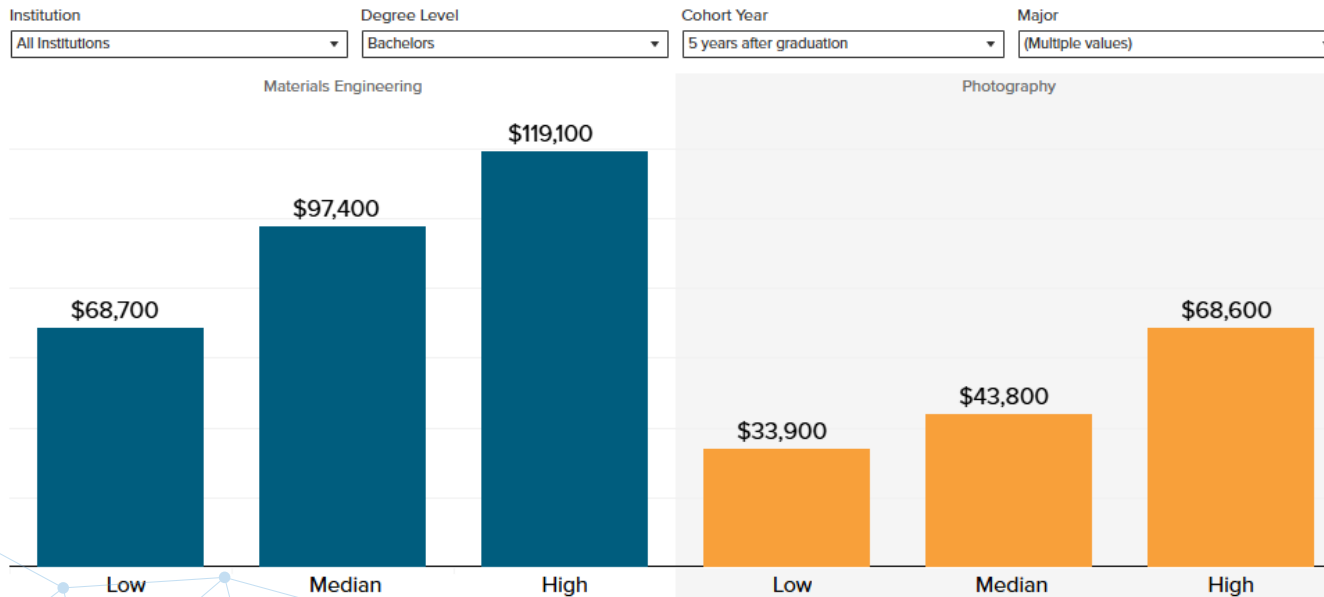

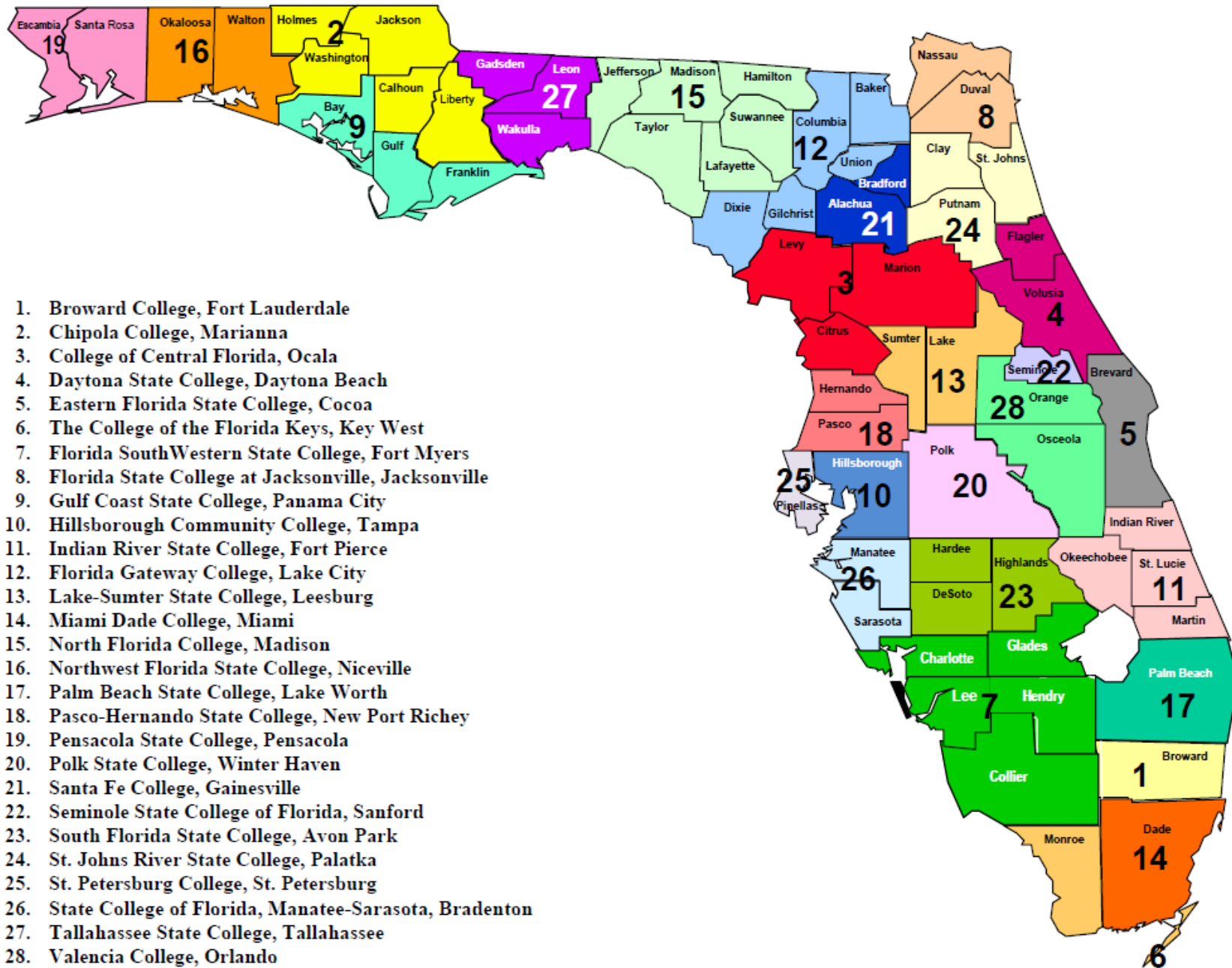

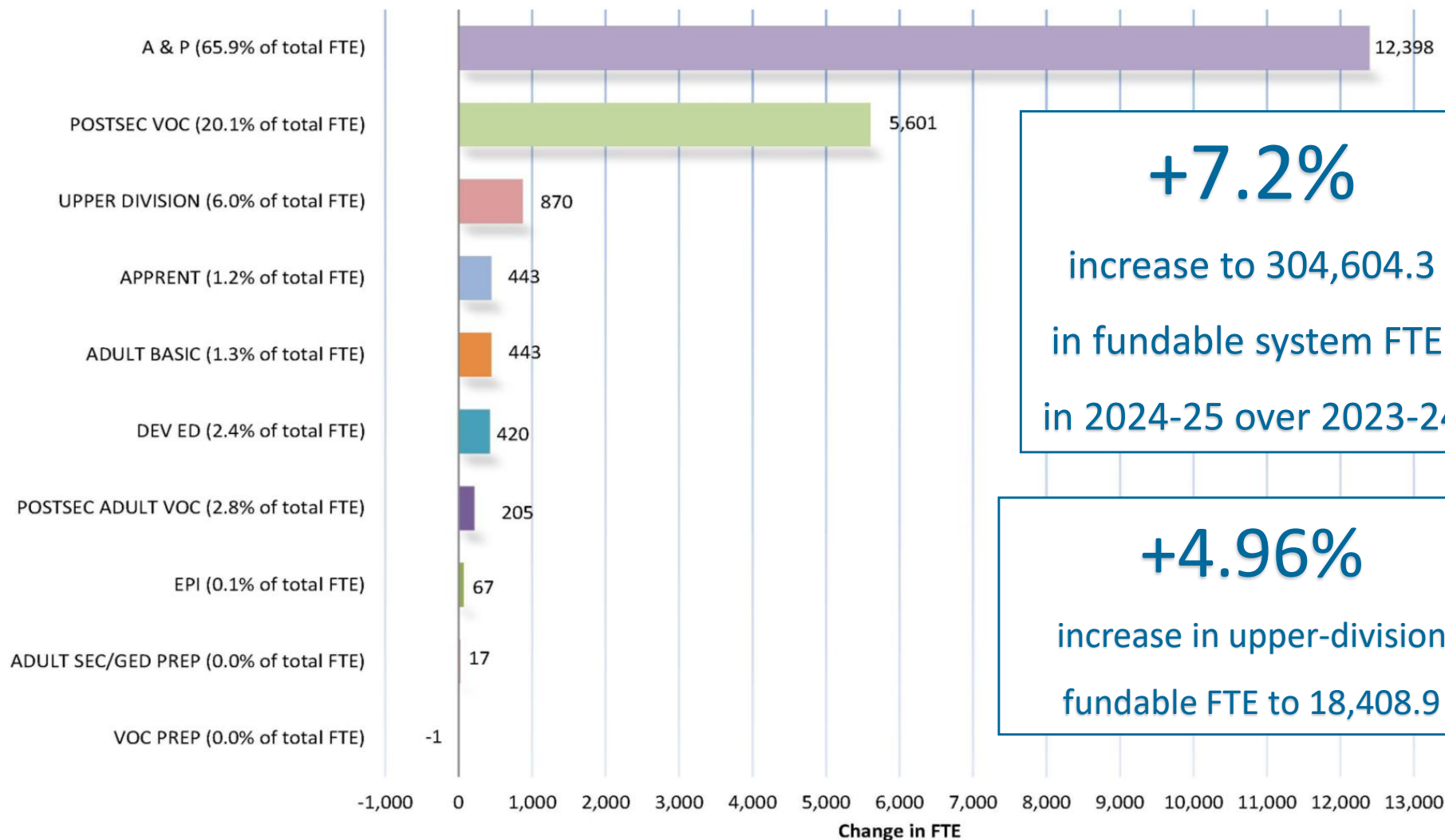

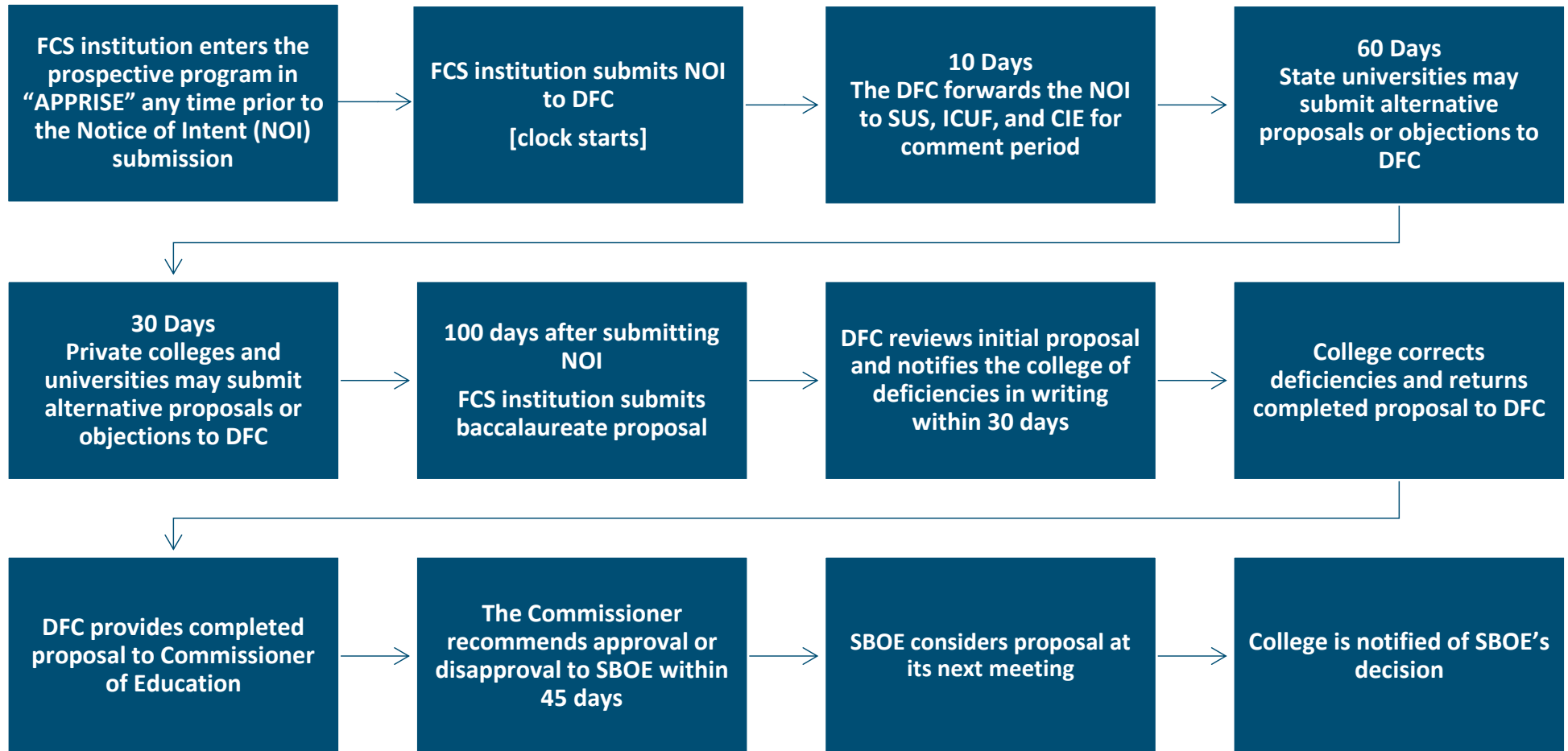

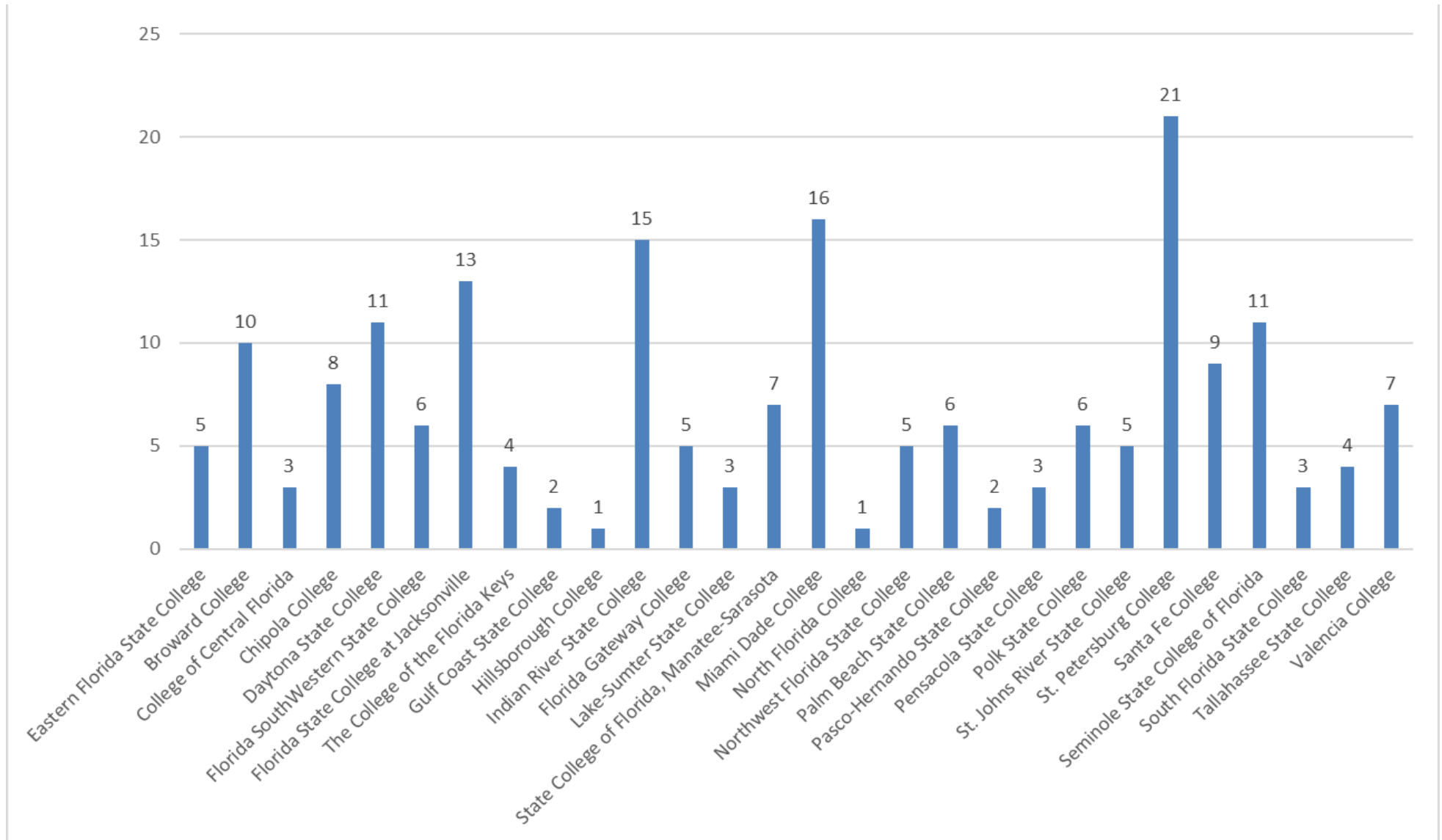

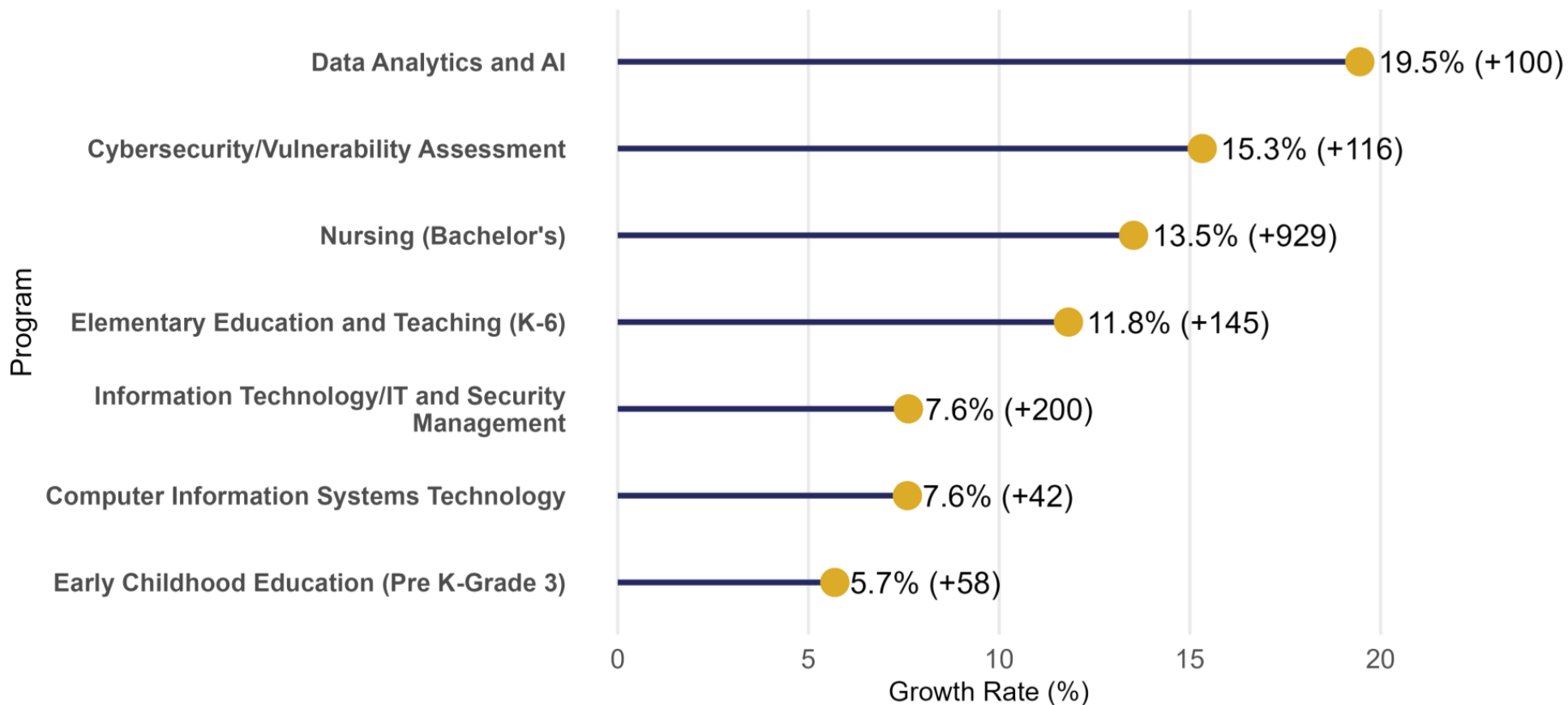

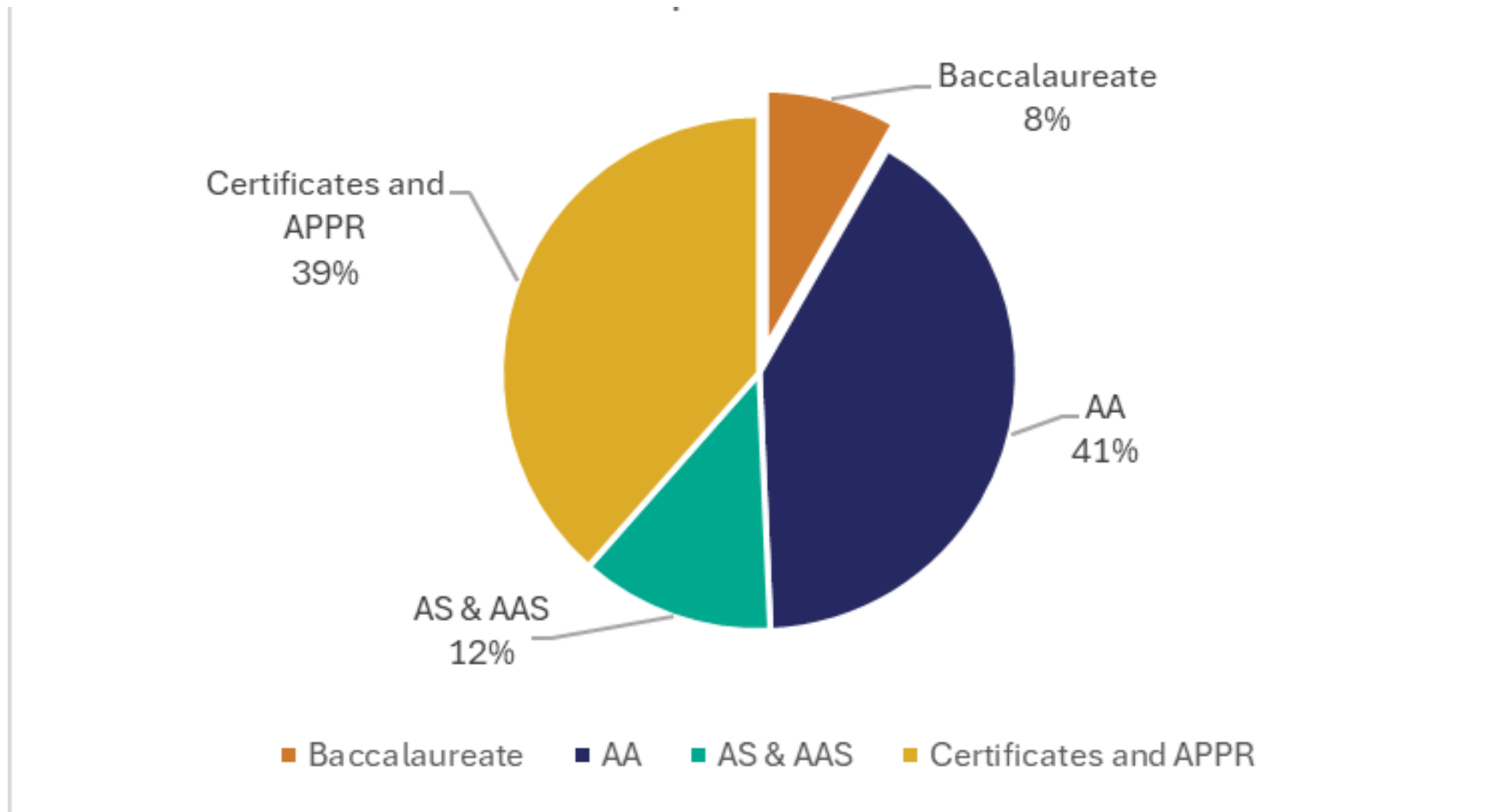
Approved Baccalaureate Programs as of 2024-25



2023-24 to 2024-25 Program Growth Rate *Upper Division Enrollments*

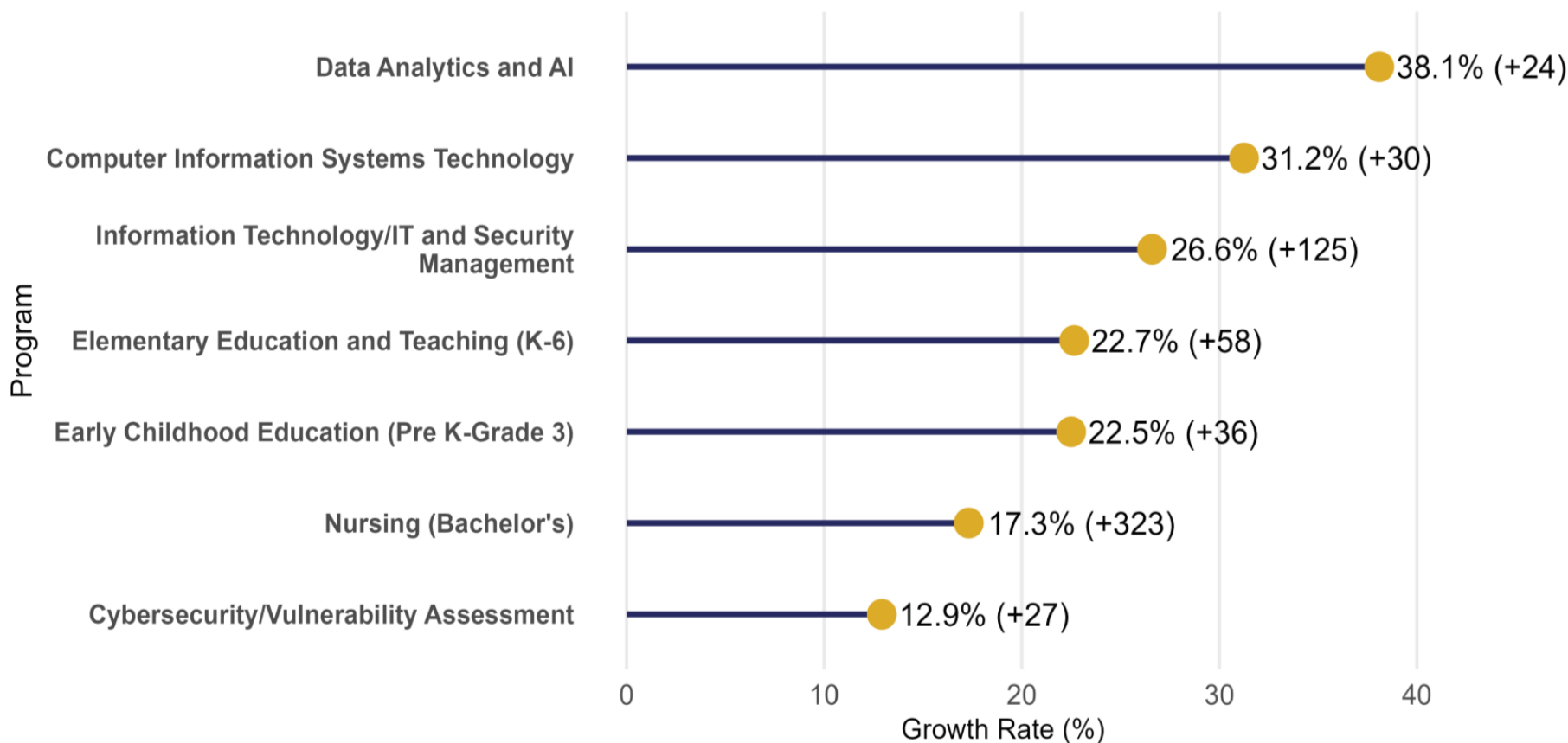

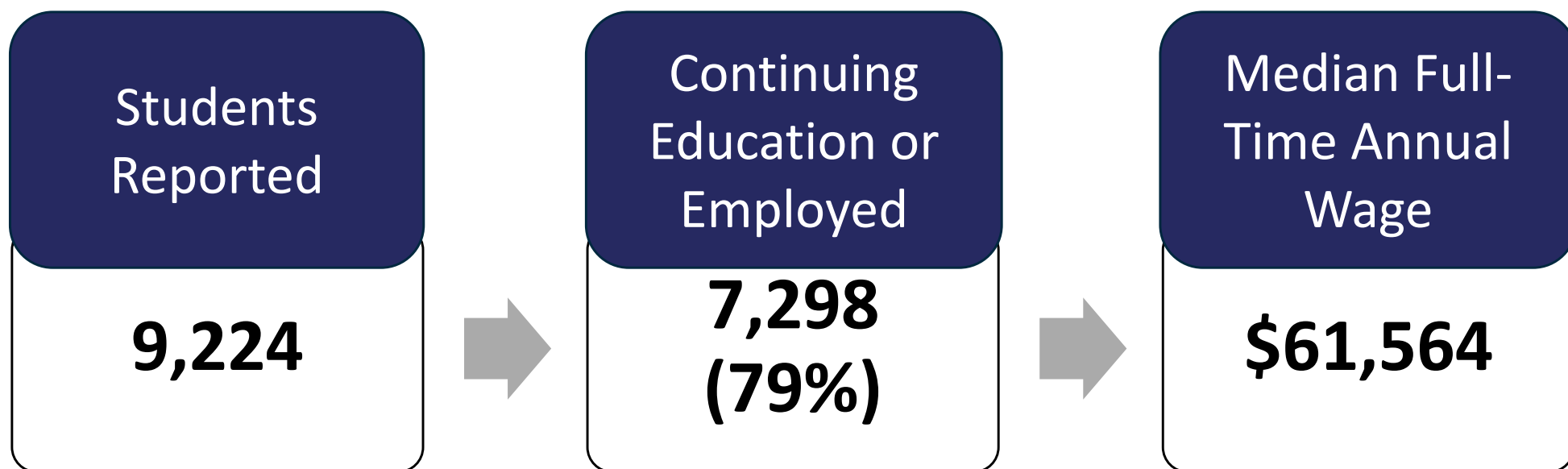

Targeted 2+2

- Allows a student guaranteed admission to a specific baccalaureate degree program at a state university within the standard 60 credit hour AA degree.
- Florida Statute requires that each FCS institution execute at least one Targeted 2+2 Pathway program with a state university

Specialized Associate in Arts Transfer Degree

- Based on an articulation agreement between an FCS and SUS institution.
- Specifies credits beyond the 60 hours required for a standard AA degree, to allow for completion of all prerequisites and guarantee admission to a specific bachelor's degree program at a state university.

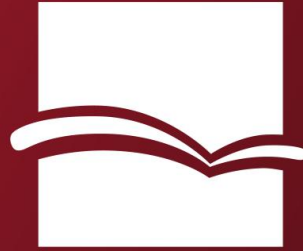

 - BAS in Project Management – *92 enrolled*
 - BAS in Management & Supervision – *148 enrolled*
