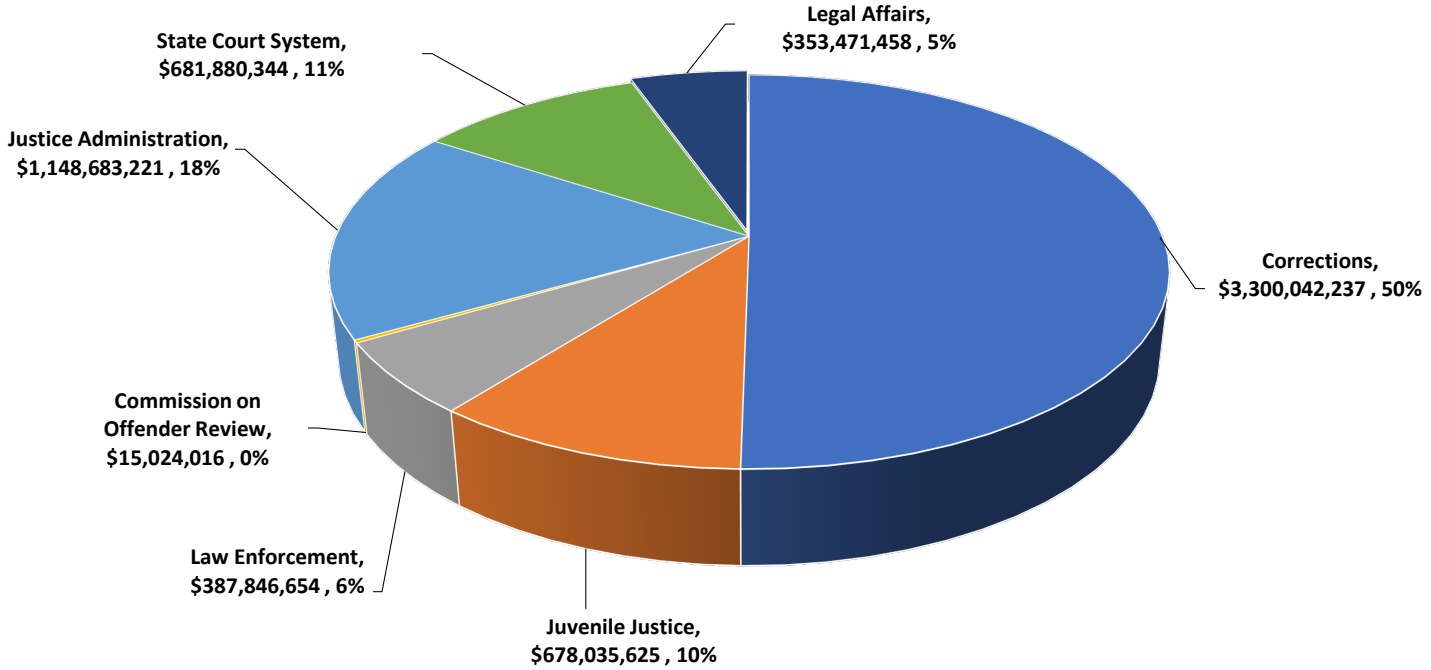

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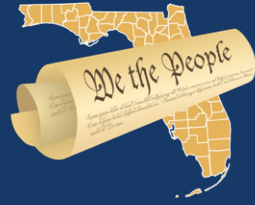

INTRODUCTION

- Funding is NOT in the General Appropriations Act (GAA)
- Main funding source is fines, fees, and court costs

ARTICLE V. REV. 7

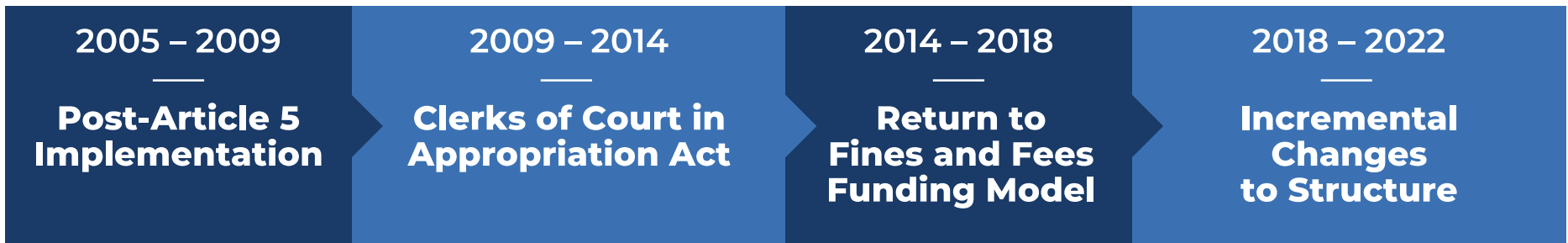
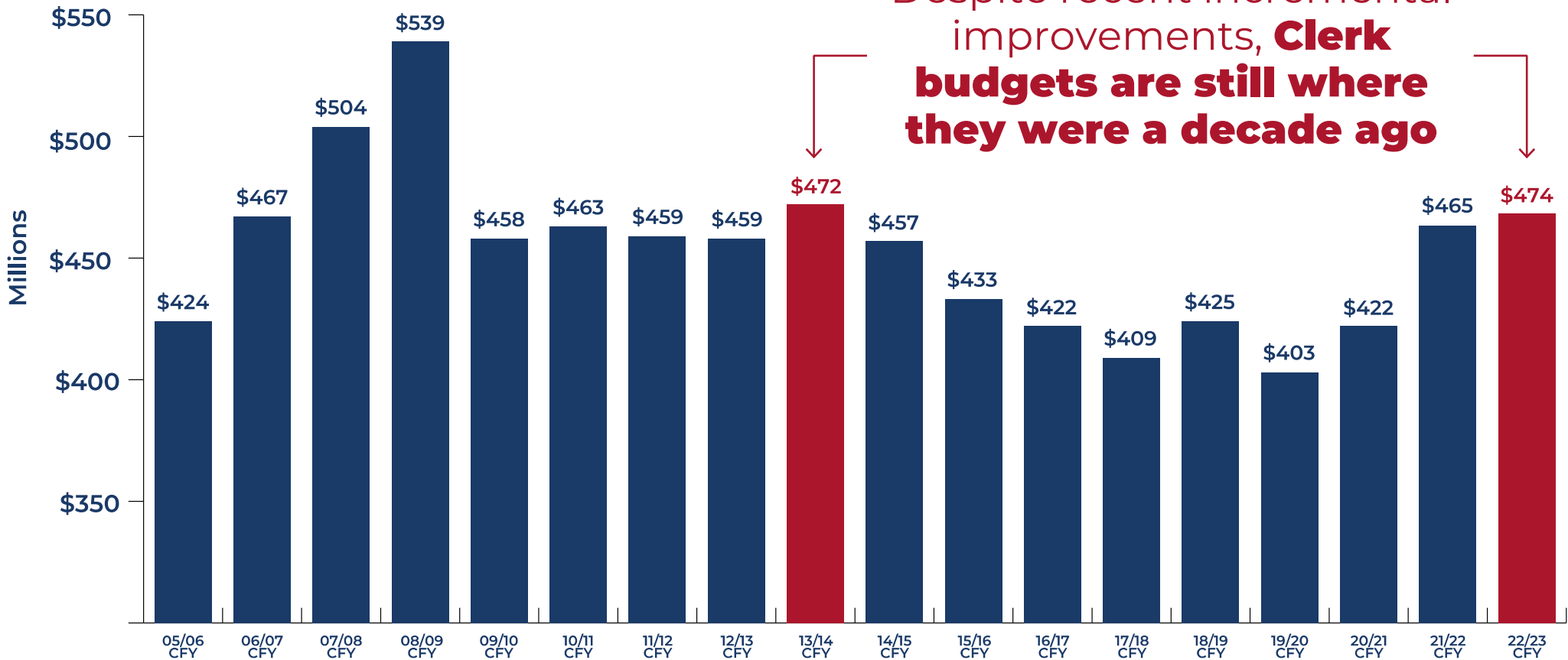
All funding for the offices of the clerks of the circuit and county courts performing court-related functions, except as otherwise provided in this subsection and subsection (c), shall be provided by adequate and appropriate filing fees for judicial proceedings and service charges and costs for performing court-related functions as required by general law. Selected salaries, costs, and expenses of the state courts system may be funded from appropriate filing fees for judicial proceedings and service charges and costs for performing court-related functions, as provided by general law. Where the requirements of either the United States Constitution or the Constitution of the State of Florida preclude the imposition of filing fees for judicial proceedings and service charges and costs for performing court-related functions sufficient to fund the court-related functions of the offices of the clerks of the circuit and county courts, the state shall provide, as determined by the legislature, adequate and appropriate supplemental funding from state revenues appropriated by general law.

INTRODUCTION

- **Florida Clerks of Court Operations Committee (CCOC)**
 - Created by the Florida Legislature in 2003
 - Performs statutory responsibility of approving the court-related budgets for all 67 Clerks of Court (s. 28.35, F.S.)
- **Clerks' Current Funding Model Has Significant Challenges**
 - Budgets are primarily funded by court-ordered fines, fees, and costs
- **Juror Management Funding (s. 40.29, F.S.)**
 - \$11.7 million recurring revenue
 - Included in the GAA
- **In recent years, legislative changes provided a foundation to address our funding model. Thank you!**

Despite recent incremental improvements, **Clerk budgets are still where they were a decade ago**

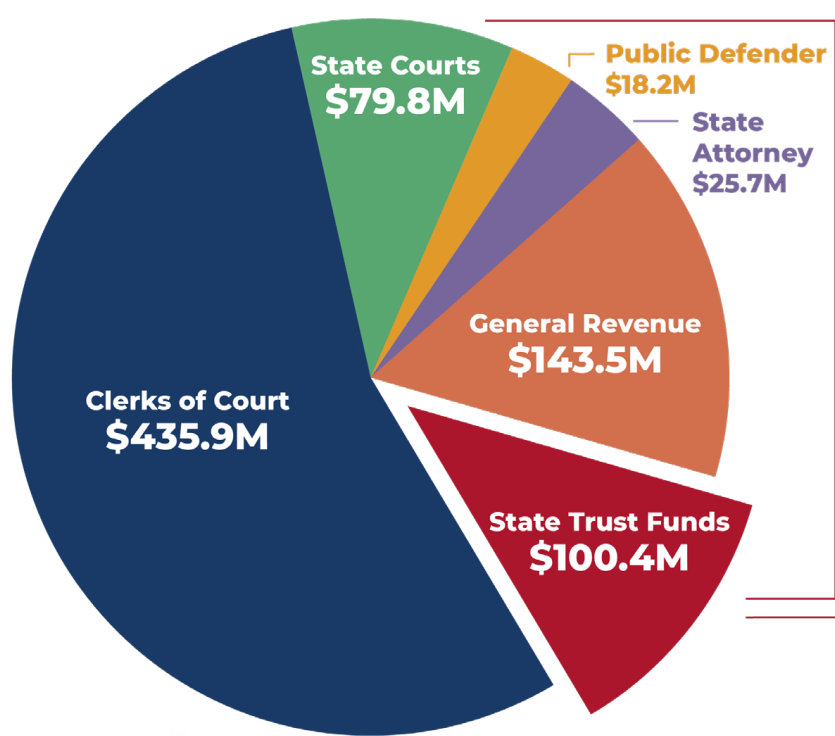

CLERK CHALLENGES



CLERKS ONLY RETAIN A PORTION OF FINES, FEES, AND COURT COSTS COLLECTED with a significant portion (46%) distributed elsewhere



CLERK BUDGETS ARE STILL LARGELY DEPENDENT ON UNSTABLE REVENUES FROM TRAFFIC CITATIONS



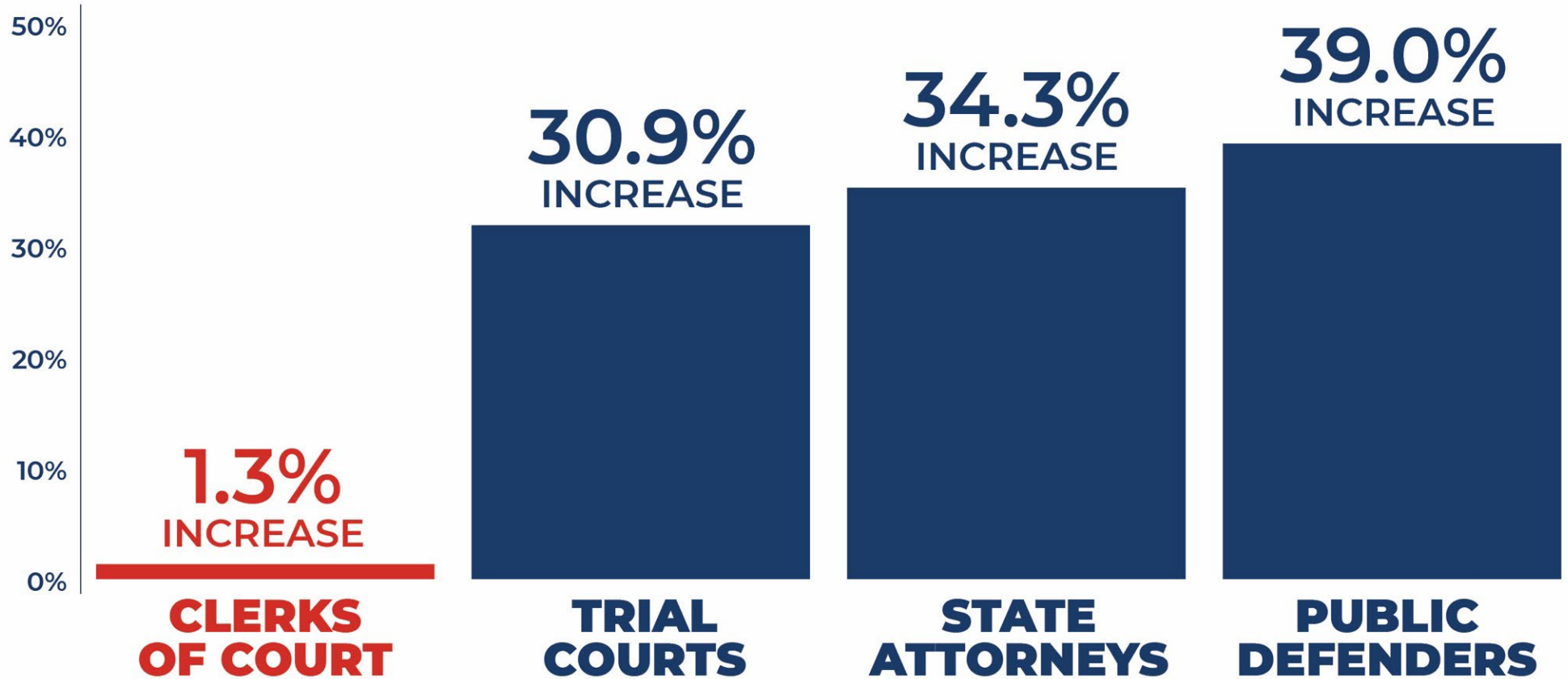
MANY CRITICAL SERVICES PROVIDED BY CLERKS ARE NOT SUPPORTED BY FILING FEES

WITHOUT ESSENTIAL FUNDING, CLERKS' OFFICES CAN NOT KEEP PACE WITH LOCAL, STATE, AND NATIONAL WAGE GROWTH

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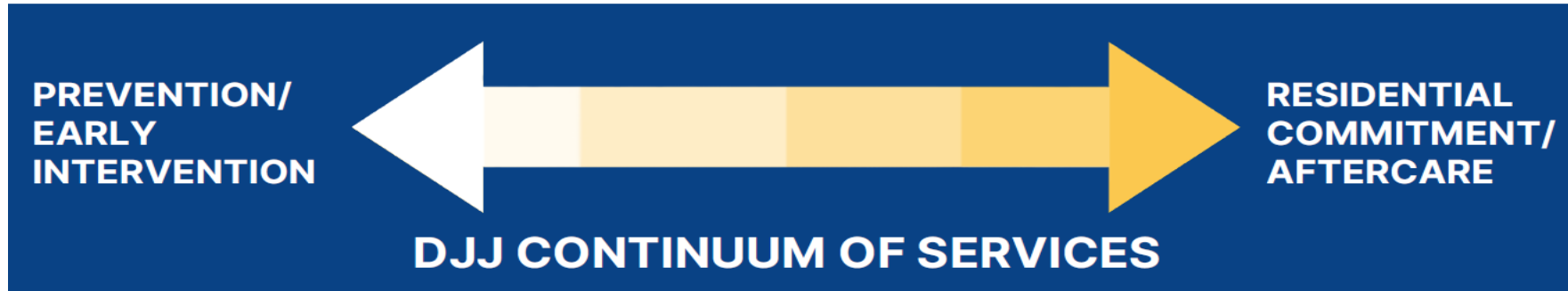

Education Across the Department



Education in Residential Programs

- In FY 2021-22, 2,338 youth were served across 44 residential programs.
- Residential facilities in 25 local school districts.
 - 14 districts directly provide educational services to students.
 - 11 districts contract with private educational providers to provide education.
- Education provided 250 days per year.



Florida Scholars Academy

A single unified education system in DJJ residential programs, with a sole focus on providing this student population with a world-class education that meets their individual needs by embracing multiple educational pathways for students to succeed.

FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF JUVENILE JUSTICE



Florida Scholars Academy

- Allows DJJ to contract with an educational provider to operate the school on a statewide basis:
 - A state college or university.
 - A charter school network.
 - An existing public school district.
 - A private educational services provider with a proven track record of success.



Embracing Individual Student Needs

- Placing a focus on educational pathways that meet the individual educational needs of students:
 - High school diploma.
 - High school equivalency diploma.
 - Enrollment in an educational program of study at a Florida technical or state college or university.
 - Attainment of industry-recognized credentials of value.



Current Funding Model

- Reliance on the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) and traditional FTE counts.
- Economies of scale challenges.
- FEFP fund limitations and restrictions.



Funding the Florida Scholars Academy

- Year One Funding: \$12 million recurring general revenue
- Year Two Funding: \$24.1 million total recurring funding
- Funding for instructional staff, special education, instructional materials and curriculum, among other educational expenses.

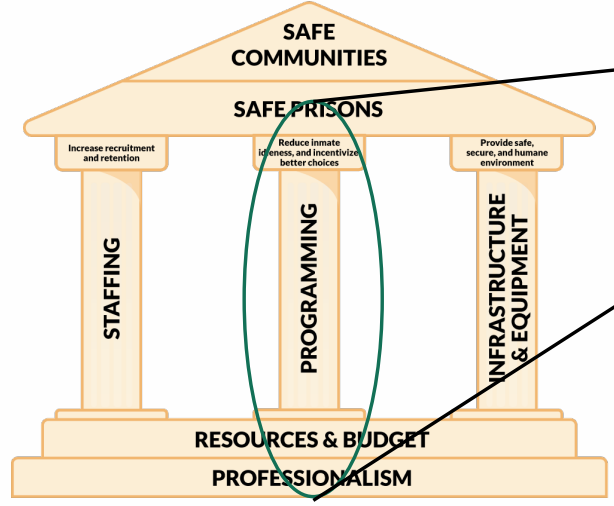

Florida's Corrections System Architecture



Correctional Programs:

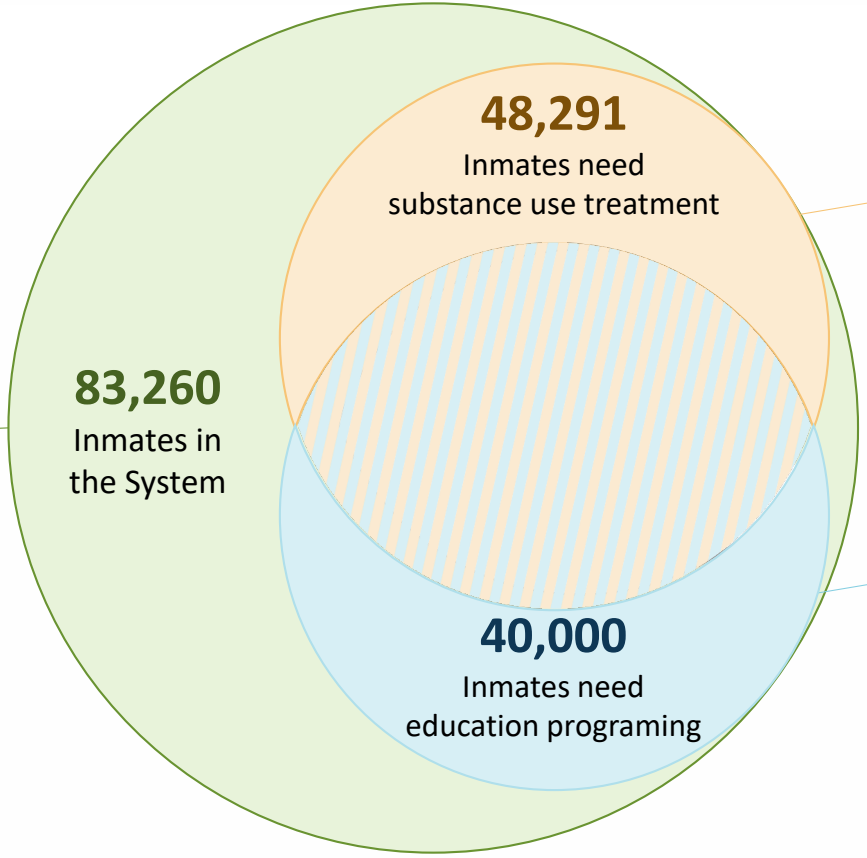
- Mandated by Florida Statute
- Reduce inmate idleness
- Reduce violence
- Address root causes of crime
- Increase successful restoration

- Education programming reduces recidivism risk by 13 percentage points
- Substance use treatment reduces recidivism risk by 5 percentage points



The Requirement

- Criminogenic Factors**
- Education
 - Substance use
 - Employment
 - Wellness
 - Family
 - Criminal associates
 - Criminal thinking
 - Social awareness



- 58% require substance use treatment
- Only 12% will receive treatment
- Most will only be placed in a program once they are within 60 months of release

- 41% require adult basic and functional literacy skills
- Nearly 50% do not have verified high school diploma or GED
- 50% lack career and technical education skills

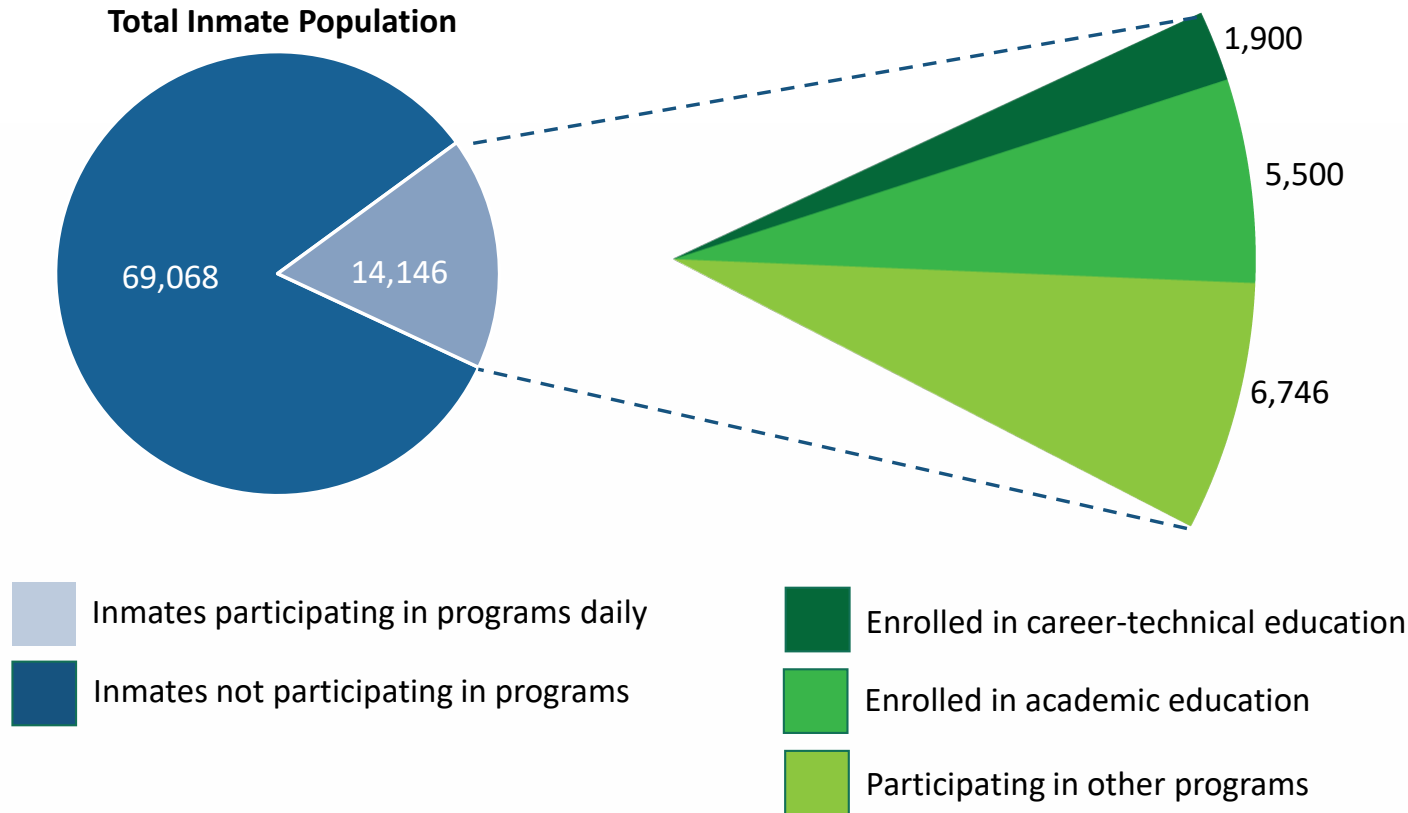

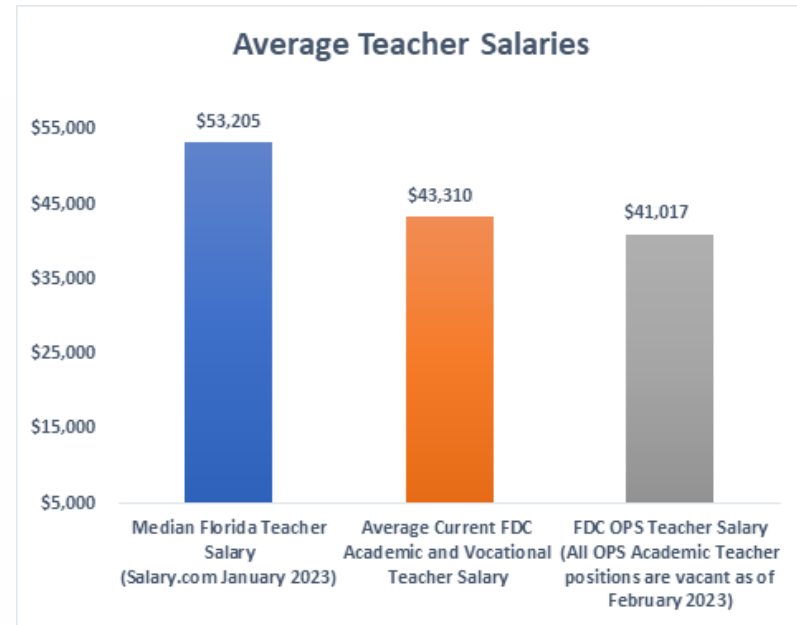
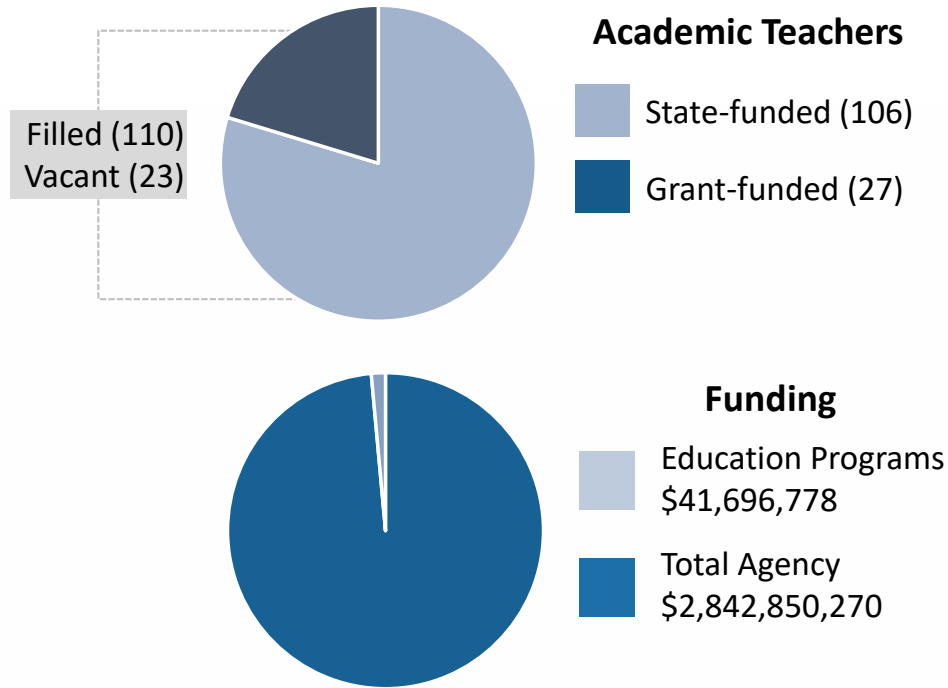
