### I. Summary:

CS/SB 1726 allows the University of Florida and the Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University to develop pilot projects to cultivate, process, test, and research, create, and market safe and effective commercial applications for industrial hemp in the agricultural sector of Florida. The bill also requires:

- Authorization from a university's board of trustees before the university may implement a pilot project;
- Pilot projects to comply with rules adopted by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (department);
- Universities to establish guidelines for the approval, oversight, and enforcement of pilot project rules; and
- A report to be submitted to the Governor and the Legislature within 2 years after the pilot project's creation.

### II. Present Situation:

Industrial hemp is a number of varieties of *cannabis sativa* L. that are intended for agricultural and industrial purposes. They are grown for their seed and fiber content as well as the resulting byproducts such as oil, seed cake, hurds, etc. Industrial hemp is characterized by being low in THC (delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol) and high in CBD (cannabidiol). Industrial hemp is not marijuana. Even though they both come from *Cannabis sativa* L., the varieties that are used to make industrial hemp products (seed, fiber, etc.), and those that are used to make marijuana (flowering tops and leaves) are distinctly different. They are scientifically different and are

cultivated in very different ways.<sup>1</sup> Currently, more than 30 nations grow industrial hemp as an agricultural commodity, which is sold on the world market.

In the United States, production of hemp is strictly controlled under existing drug enforcement laws. Currently there is no large-scale commercial production in the United States (U.S.), and the U.S. market depends on imports.<sup>2</sup> All cannabis varieties, including hemp used for fiber and marijuana that contain THC used as a drug, are classified as "Schedule 1 controlled substances" under the Controlled Substance Act.<sup>3</sup>

Following the enactment of the 2014 Farm Bill,<sup>4</sup> hemp cultivation is now allowed under certain circumstances by research institutions and state departments of agriculture if:

- The industrial hemp is grown or cultivated for research conducted under an agricultural pilot program or other agricultural or academic research; and
- The growing or cultivating of industrial hemp is allowed under state law where the university or state department of agriculture is located.<sup>5</sup>

At least 30 states have passed legislation related to industrial hemp. Generally, states have taken three approaches: (1) establish industrial hemp research and/or pilot programs, (2) authorize studies of the industrial hemp industry, or (3) establish commercial industrial hemp programs. Some states establishing these programs require a change in federal laws or a waiver from the DEA prior to implementation.<sup>6</sup>

At least 16 states have legalized industrial hemp production for commercial purposes and 20 states have passed laws allowing research and pilot programs. Seven states—Colorado, Kentucky, Maryland, Minnesota, North Dakota, Rhode Island, and Virginia—have approved the creation of both pilot/research and commercial programs. Many of the states that have legalized hemp cultivation for commercial purposes specify that state law does not allow for violation of federal law. States including California, Indiana, Kentucky, Minnesota, Montana, and Virginia have established a framework for regulating commercial hemp but still consider hemp illegal outside of research programs unless federal law changes.<sup>7</sup>

### III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

**Section 1** creates s. 1004.4473, F.S., to authorize the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences at the University of Florida and the Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University to develop pilot projects to cultivate, process, test, research, create, and market safe and effective commercial applications for industrial hemp in rural areas of the state. The bill:

- Provides the following definitions:
  - **Hemp material** to mean a substance containing hemp stems, leaves, fibers, seeds, extracts, oil, or any other substance derived or harvested from a species of the cannabis plant.
  - **Industrial hemp** to mean all parts and varieties of the cannabis sativa plant, cultivated or possessed by an approved grower under the pilot project, whether growing or not, which contain a tetrahydrocannabinol concentration that does not exceed 0.3 percent on a dry-weight basis.
  - **Industrial hemp pilot project** to mean a project that includes research of industrial hemp and any aspect of cultivation, harvesting, processing, market research, and sales of approved industrial hemp agricultural, industrial, and commercial products.
  - **Qualified program personnel** to mean a person who, or an employee of a company that, partners with the University of Florida or the Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University on a pilot project, is certified by the university, is 18 years of age or older, and has passed the required criminal background check.
- Requires authorization from a university's board of trustees before the university may implement a pilot project. The pilot project must be registered with the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and must comply with rules adopted by the department. It also specifies the content of those rules.
- Requires the universities to establish guidelines for the approval, oversight, and enforcement of pilot project rules. A contact person must be identified who is responsible for oversight of the pilot project. Each university research office must adopt procedures and guidelines that meet specified minimum requirements to ensure the proper operation of the pilot project, the proper handling of hemp material and products, and compliance with state and federal facilities.
- Requires each university to submit a report to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on the status of its pilot project. The report must be prepared and submitted within two years after the pilot project's creation.
- Prohibits pilot projects implemented under this section to be funded with public funds.

Section 2 provides that this act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

A producer would be required to obtain a non-native/invasive permit for a fee not to exceed \$50 and to pay quarterly \$50 inspection fees. The producer must also obtain a surety bond issued by a surety company admitted to do business in this state or a certificate of deposit, or other type of security, which provides a financial assurance of cost recovery for the removal of a planting.<sup>8</sup>

### C. Government Sector Impact:

The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has indicated that, at this time, the number of producers that will be participating in the pilot projects is unknown, so the fiscal impact of the bill and the number of FTEs needed is difficult to estimate. Industrial hemp would fall under ch. 581.083, F.S., and rule 5B-57, F.A.C., concerning non-native and invasive plant species. The department would be authorized to issue a non-native/invasive special permit and to collect a fee not to exceed \$50. The department recommends quarterly inspections for the first year and anticipates that the number could be reduced once a producer has a proven track record of passed inspections. Under rule 5B-2.010, F.A.C., Special Inspection and Certification Fees, the department would be authorized to collect a \$50 inspection fee from producers.<sup>9</sup>

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

### I. Summary:

CS/SB 600 makes several changes to the Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI), most notably to the agency and organization members who collaborate with the REDI. The bill changes the membership to include:

- The executive director of the Department of Economic Opportunity or their designee, to serve as chair;
- The Secretary of Transportation or their designee;
- The Secretary of Environmental Protection or their designee;
- The Commissioner of Agriculture or their designee;
- The State Surgeon General or their designee;
- The Commissioner of Education or their designee;
- The President of Enterprise Florida, Inc., or their designee;
- The chair of the board of CareerSource Florida, Inc., or their designee;
- Five members from the private sector, three who are appointed by the executive director of the Department of Economic Opportunity, and one each appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The bill requires that the report required of the REDI be submitted to the Department of Economic Opportunity, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by September 1<sup>st</sup> of each year and expands the information to be included in the report.

The bill makes conforming changes to address cross-references in numerous sections of the Florida Statutes.

The bill is effective upon becoming law.

### II. Present Situation:

### **Rural Economic Development Initiative**

The Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) was established in 1997 by the Legislature to encourage and facilitate the location and expansion of major economic development projects of significant scale in rural communities.<sup>1</sup> The REDI is responsible for coordinating and focusing the efforts and resources of state and regional agencies on the problems that affect the fiscal, economic, and community viability of Florida's economically distressed rural communities. The REDI works with local governments, community-based organizations, and private organizations that have an interest in the growth and development of these communities to find ways to balance environmental and growth management issues with local needs.

The REDI is administered by the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO), but is a collaborative effort facilitated by a group of agencies and organizations. Numerous state agencies and organizations are required to participate in the REDI by designating a deputy secretary or higher-level staff person to serve as a REDI representative. Any such representative is required to have comprehensive knowledge of their agency's regulatory and service functions, and the state's economic goals, policies, and programs. The representatives are required to work with the REDI in the reviewing, evaluating, and proposing impact mitigation of any statute or rule that may have an adverse effect on rural communities. Additionally, representatives are to inform their agencies and organizations about the REDI and provide assistance to the REDI throughout the agency or organization. The agencies and organizations that are statutorily required to designate a representative are:<sup>2</sup>

- The Department of Transportation;
- The Department of Environmental Protection;
- The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services;
- The Department of State;
- The Department of Health;
- The Department of Children and Families;
- The Department of Corrections;
- The Department of Education;
- The Department of Juvenile Justice;
- The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission;
- Each water management district;
- Enterprise Florida, Inc. (EFI);
- VISIT Florida;
- The Florida Regional Planning Council Association;
- The Agency for Health Care Administration; and

• The Institute for Food and Agricultural Sciences.

The REDI can recommend up to three rural areas of opportunity (RAO) to the Governor, who can designate an RAO by executive order. The Governor, acting through the REDI, can waive criteria, requirements, or any similar provisions of any state economic development incentive in RAOs.<sup>3</sup> A designation of RAO must be agreed upon by the DEO and the local governments included in the RAO.

RAOs may designate catalyst projects. These projects are to be confirmed by the DEO. All agencies and departments of the state are required to use all available tools and resource available to promote the creation and development of each catalyst project and the development of catalyst sites. For the purposes of this program, a catalyst project is a business locating or expanding in an RAO and serves as an economic generator of regional significance, and a catalyst site is one or more parcels of land in a RAO that is prioritized for economic development.

The REDI is required to submit a report to the DEO on all REDI activities to supplement the required annual report.<sup>4</sup>

### III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

CS/SB 600 makes several changes to the REDI, most notably to the agency and organization members who collaborate with the REDI. The bill changes the membership to include:

- The executive director of the DEO or their designee, to serve as chair;
- The Secretary of Transportation or their designee;
- The Secretary of Environmental Protection or their designee;
- The Commissioner of Agriculture or their designee;
- The State Surgeon General or their designee;
- The Commissioner of Education or their designee;
- The President of EFI or their designee;
- The chair of the board of CareerSource Florida, Inc., or their designee;
- Five members from the private sector, three who are appointed by the executive director of the DEO, and one each appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

In making their appointments, the executive director, the President, and the Speaker are to ensure that the diversity of the state's business community and the state's ethnic, racial, and gender diversity are reflected. Appointments are for 2-year terms, beginning on July 1 and expiring on June 30, with initial appointments beginning in July 2017. The bill provides direction for appointee vacancies and removal. The bill removes the requirement related to REDI members needing comprehensive knowledge of their agency or organization and the state's economic policies and goals.

The bill authorizes the chair of the REDI to create ad hoc committees to address issues or projects. The chair is authorized to request the head of any state agency or organization to serve on the ad hoc committees, but is directed to consider requesting:

- The executive director of FWC or their designee;
- The Secretary of State of their designee;
- The Secretary of Children and Families or their designee;
- The Secretary of Corrections or their designee;
- The Secretary of Juvenile Justice or their designee;
- The Secretary of Health Care Administration or their designee; and
- A board member of the Florida Regional Councils Association or their designee.

Additional changes to the program include:

- Clarifying the legislative intent of the REDI to include encouraging job creation, improved community infrastructure, the development and expansion of workforce, and improved access to healthcare;
- Expanding the definition of "rural area of opportunity" to include a rural community that faces competitive disadvantages including low labor force participation, low education levels, high unemployment, a district grade of "D" or "F" pursuant to s. 1008.34,<sup>5</sup> high infant mortality rates, and high rates of diabetes and obesity;
- Clarifies that the REDI is to focus its efforts on the challenges of the state's rural areas of opportunity and economically distressed rural communities, and that REDI is to work with private organizations that have an interest in the renewed prosperity and competitiveness of these communities;
- Clarifies that when undertaking outreach and capacity-building efforts, its purpose should be to improve rural communities' ability to compete in a global economy;
- Requires that the report required of the REDI be submitted to the DEO, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by September 1<sup>st</sup> of each year;
- Expands the information to be included in the report to include evaluation of organizational progress towards goals, REDI accomplishments, and issues affecting the performance of REDI programs and activities.
