I. Summary:

SB 286 establishes the Florida Slavery Memorial. The Capitol Complex has on its grounds various memorials and monuments; however, no memorial or monument concerning slavery currently exists within the Capitol Complex.

The bill requires the Department of Management Services (DMS) to administer the memorial. The DMS is required to develop a plan for the design, placement, and cost of the memorial. The plan must include the designation of an appropriate public area for the memorial on the premises of the Capitol Complex, not including the State Capital Circle Office Complex. The DMS must consider the recommendations of the Florida Historical Commission and must coordinate with the Division of Historical Resources in developing the plan.

Additionally, by November 1, 2018, the DMS must submit the plan to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The DMS will incur indeterminate costs to implement its responsibilities under the bill.

II. Present Situation:

Managing Agency for the Capitol Center

Section 272.03(1), F.S., provides that the Capitol Center¹ is under the general control and supervision of the DMS,² which includes the management and maintenance of both the grounds and buildings.³ Additionally, the DMS has the authority to provide for the establishment of

parks, walkways, and parkways on the grounds of the Capitol Center.⁴ This responsibility has historically included assistance in establishing and maintaining public memorials throughout the Capitol Center, including project management oversight of the design and construction of memorials.⁵ After an entity is assigned a designated space within the Capitol Center for an exhibit, the entity is the manager of the exhibit's content and display, in consultation with the DMS.

Capitol Complex Monuments

The Capitol Complex includes that portion of Tallahassee, Leon County, Florida, commonly referred to as the Capitol, the Historic Capitol, the Senate Office Building, the House Office Building, the Knott Building, the Pepper Building, the Holland Building, and the curtilage of each, including the state-owned lands and public streets adjacent thereto within an area bounded by and including Monroe Street, Jefferson Street, Duval Street, and Gaines Street. The term also includes the State Capital Circle Office Complex located in Leon County, Florida.⁶

A monument⁷ may not be constructed or placed on the premises of the Capitol Complex unless authorized by general law and unless the design and placement of the monument is approved by the DMS after considering the recommendations of the Florida Historical Commission.⁸ The DMS must coordinate with the Division of Historical Resources of the Department of State regarding a monument's design and placement.⁹ In addition, the DMS, in consultation with the Florida Historical Commission, must set aside an area of the Capitol Complex to be dedicated as a memorial garden for the placement of authorized monuments.¹⁰

Chapter 265, F.S., recognizes various memorials and monuments for placement both inside and outside at the downtown Capitol Complex. To date, the Legislature has approved the following memorials:

- Florida Women's Hall of Fame;¹¹
- Florida Medal of Honor Wall;¹²
- Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame;¹³
- POW-MIA Chair of Honor Memorial;¹⁴
- Florida Veterans' Walk of Honor and Florida Veterans' Memorial Garden;¹⁵

- Florida Tourism Hall of Fame;¹⁶
- Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame;¹⁷
- Florida Holocaust Memorial;¹⁸ and
- Arthur G. Dozier School for Boys Memorial.¹⁹

Additionally, the Legislature approved a memorial garden to house approved monuments at the downtown Capitol Complex. One of the monuments designated for placement in the memorial garden is a monument in remembrance of the 241 members of the United States Air Forces who died on October 23, 1983, in Beirut, Lebanon.²⁰

Division of Historical Resources

The Division of Historical Resources, which is established within the Department of State,²¹ in part, is responsible for:

- Developing a comprehensive statewide historic preservation plan.
- Directing and conducting a comprehensive statewide survey of historic resources and maintaining an inventory of such resources.
- Ensuring that historic resources are taken into consideration at all levels of planning and development.
- Providing public information, education, and technical assistance relating to historic preservation programs.²²

Florida Historical Commission

The Florida Historical Commission (commission) was established in 2001 to enhance public participation and involvement in the preservation and protection of the state's historic and archaeological sites and properties.²³ The commission is part of the Department of State and is tasked with advising and assisting the Division of Historical Resources in carrying out its programs, duties, and responsibilities.²⁴

The commission is composed of 11 members: seven are appointed by the Governor in consultation with the Secretary of State, two by the President of the Senate, and two by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.²⁵ The commission must include:

- A licensed architect with expertise in historic preservation and architectural history;
- A professional historian in the field of American history;
- A professional architectural historian;
- An archaeologist specializing in the field of prehistory;

- An archaeologist specializing in the historic period; and
- Representatives of the public with demonstrated interest in the preservation of Florida's historical and archaeological heritage.²⁶

The commission must provide assistance, advice, and recommendations to the Division of Historical Resources.²⁷ Current law further requires the commission to provide recommendations to the DMS on the design and placement of monuments authorized by general law to be placed on the premises of the Capitol Complex.²⁸

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

This bill establishes a Florida Slavery Memorial to recognize the fundamental injustice, cruelty, brutality, and inhumanity of slavery in the United States and the American Colonies and to honor the nameless and forgotten men, women, and children who have gone unrecognized for their undeniable and weighty contributions to the United States. It requires the DMS to administer the memorial.

The bill requires the DMS to develop a plan for the design, placement, and cost of the memorial. The plan must include the designation of an appropriate public area for the memorial on the premises of the Capitol Complex, not including the State Capital Circle Office Complex. The DMS must consider the recommendations of the commission and must coordinate with the Division of Historical Resources in developing the plan. Additionally, by November 1, 2018, the DMS must submit the plan to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2018.

IV. Constitutional Issues:

A. Municipality/County Mandates Restrictions:

The bill does not appear to require counties or municipalities to spend funds or take an action requiring the expenditure of funds, reduce the authority that counties or municipalities have to raise revenues in the aggregate, or reduce the percentage of state tax shared with counties or municipalities.

The DMS will incur indeterminate costs to develop a plan for the design, placement, and cost of the memorial. According to the DMS, costs associated with developing the plan can be handled within existing resources.²⁹

VI. Technical Deficiencies:

VII. Related Issues:

The cost to construct the memorial is indeterminate, as the design for the memorial has not been completed. As a comparison, the Legislature recently appropriated \$250,000 for the Fallen Firefighter Memorial.³⁰ In addition, several other statutorily authorized Capitol Complex memorials are administered by direct-support organizations without funding from the state.³¹

This bill creates section 265.006, Florida Statutes.

I. Summary:

SB 648 provides that participants in adult or youth work experience programs operated by the Division of Blind Services and the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, within the Department of Education, are considered state employees for workers' compensation purposes.

The Department of Financial Services (DFS) expects to incur costs of \$166,000 annually relating to workers' compensation insurance coverage for blind and vocational training participants. In addition, the Division of Risk Management (DRM) will experience an increase in litigation, primarily involving claims for benefits.¹ The DFS indicates the workload and other costs associated with the increased litigation can be absorbed within existing resources.²

The bill is effective July 1, 2018.

II. Present Situation:

Division of Blind Services

The Division of Blind Services (DBS) is housed within the Department of Education (DOE).³ The purpose of the DBS is to ensure the greatest possible efficiency and effectiveness of services to individuals who are blind.⁴ It is the intent of the Legislature to establish a coordinated program of services which are available throughout Florida to such individuals.⁵ The program must be

designed to maximize employment opportunities for individuals who are blind and to increase their independence and self-sufficiency.⁶ The DBS's program of services include blind babies program, children's program, transition services, independent living program, vocational rehabilitative program, employer services, business enterprises program, rehabilitation center for the blind and visually impaired, and braille and talking books library.⁷

The Rehabilitative Council for the Blind⁸ (RCB) is an advisory council⁹ responsible for assisting the DBS in the planning and development of statewide vocational rehabilitation programs and services pursuant to the Rehabilitative Act of 1973,¹⁰ as amended, to recommend improvements to such programs and services, and to perform specified functions.

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation

The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (division) located within the DOE¹¹ is designated as the administrative unit¹² for the purposes of complying with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973,¹³ as amended. Under Florida law, an individual with a disability¹⁴ is eligible for vocational rehabilitative (VR) services if the person requires VR services to prepare for, engage in, or retain gainful employment.¹⁵ The division is responsible for determining eligibility of an individual for VR services.¹⁶ The division is also responsible for maintaining an internal system of quality assurance and monitoring compliance with state and federal laws, rules, and regulations.¹⁷

The Florida Rehabilitation Council (council) is responsible for assisting the division in the planning and development of statewide rehabilitation programs and services, recommending improvements to such programs and services, and performing specified functions.¹⁸ The council is responsible for performing functions such as developing and reviewing state goals and priorities in accordance with federal law and evaluating VR program effectiveness.¹⁹

Worker's Compensation

Workers' compensation is a form of insurance designed to provide wage replacement and medical benefits for employees who are injured in the course of employment, in exchange for giving up the right to sue the employer for negligence. In Florida, workers' compensation is governed by ch. 440, F.S., the "Workers' Compensation Law." The law prescribes coverage requirements, medical and indemnity benefits, the rights and responsibilities of employers, injured employees, medical providers, and carriers, as well as procedures for dispute resolution.

Generally, employers are required to provide medical and indemnity benefits to a worker who is injured due to an accident arising out of and during the course of employment.²⁰ For such injuries, an employer is responsible for providing medical treatment,²¹ and compensation in the event of employee disability²² or death.²³ Specific employer coverage requirements are based on the type of industry, number of employees, and entity organization.²⁴

State Risk Management Program

The Division of Risk Management (DRM)²⁵ located within the DFS is responsible for ensuring that state agencies and universities participating in the state's self-insurance program receive quality coverage for workers' compensation, general liability, federal civil rights, auto liability, and property insurance at reasonable rates. The DRM's operations and the state's insurance coverage are funded by annual agency assessments, which are deposited into the State Risk Management Trust Fund. Agency premiums are based on loss experience, exposure, and a prorated share of the DRM's operating budget. Projected costs are derived from actuarial studies of the DRM's cash flow needs for claims and program expenses.²⁶

The DRM is comprised of three Bureaus: Risk Financing and Loss Prevention, State Employee Workers' Compensation Claims, and State Liability and Property Claims. The Bureau of Risk Financing and Loss Prevention provides administrative support to the DRM, including the cash management for the DRM's annual budget, calculation of casualty and property premiums for the state's agencies and universities, monitoring the DRM's contracts, and providing data management and IT support. The Bureau of State Employee Workers' Compensation Claims is responsible for the administration of all workers' compensation claims filed by state and university employees and volunteers who are injured on the job. The Bureau of State Liability and Property Claims is responsible for the investigation and resolution of liability and property claims involving or against state agencies and universities.²⁷

The State Risk Management Trust Fund has a projected deficit of \$18.8 million based upon the December 21, 2017 Self-Insurance Estimating Conference.²⁸ For estimating conference purposes, deficits are assumed to be dealt with during session to begin the following year with a zero balance.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Section 1 creates s. 413.015, F.S., to require participants in an adult or youth work experience activity administered under the Division of Blind Services be deemed an employee of the state for purposes of workers' compensation coverage.

Section 2 creates s. 413.209, F.S., to require participants in an adult or youth work experience activity administered under the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation be deemed an employee of the state for purposes of workers' compensation coverage.

Section 3 provides the bill is effective July 1, 2018.

IV. Constitutional Issues:

A. Municipality/County Mandates Restrictions:

The mandate restrictions do not apply because the bill does not require counties and municipalities to spend funds, reduce counties' or municipalities' ability to raise revenue, or reduce the percentage of state tax shared with counties and municipalities.

A private sector entity who employs training participants may experience cost savings as a result of not having to provide workers' compensation coverage for those participants.

C. Government Sector Impact:

According to the DFS, the DRM expects to incur additional claim costs for covering blind and vocational training participants.²⁹ The DRM currently covers participants for medical benefits only who are in the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) training programs. Based on claim costs for DEO training programs, DFS expects that annual medical claim costs of approximately \$128,000 would be incurred for covering blind and vocational training participants. This dollar amount is based on five years of claim experience in the DEO program, does not include ultimate developed costs, and is based on DOE's estimate of 966 additional participants for these programs.

DFS states that such costs do not include indemnity payments. Unlike DEO participants, the participants in the blind and vocational programs are eligible for indemnity payments. Based on the DRM's aggregate claim data, approximately eight percent of claims could result in indemnity payments.

Although injury severity will influence the duration of indemnity payments, DFS anticipates that adding 966 training participants will result in 23 additional claims per year. Based on the DRM's aggregate claim data, eight percent (two) of the anticipated claims could result in indemnity payments. The National Council on Compensation Insurance estimates the average Florida indemnity cost per indemnity claim is \$19,000. The DRM estimates \$38,000 (\$19,000 x 2) in indemnity payments will arise yearly for the life of claims. However, indemnity payments could greatly exceed \$19,000 for the life of the claim if a training participant is severely injured and the injury results in the receipt of permanent total benefits.³⁰

The DFS anticipates the DRM will experience an increase in litigation, primarily involving claims for benefits.³¹ The DFS indicates this increase can be absorbed within existing resources³² appropriated by the Legislature. The projected deficit is not affected since the anticipated cost can be absorbed within existing appropriations.

Statewide Law Enforcement Radio System (SLERS)





- SLERS is a single, unified digital radio network for state law enforcement officers and other participating agencies throughout the state
 - Consists of 219 tower sites
 - Covers over 60,000 square miles (including 25 miles offshore)
 - More than 20,500 radios worn by officers and installed in patrol cars, boats, motorcycles, and aircraft throughout the state







- SLERS provides state law enforcement personnel with a shared radio system
- Effective interagency, interoperable communications, Mission Critical Push To Talk
- Coordinated communications with local public safety entities
- A viable solution to radio frequency congestion



- The Joint Task Force on State Agency Law Enforcement Communications (JTF Board)
 - Established in section 282.709, F.S.

 - Provides advice to DMS relating to member agency needs
 - FDLE and the Division of Emergency Management consult with DMS to enhance and improve the interoperability of the network
 - In 2014, recognized a need to upgrade the current system to a nextgeneration P25 Interoperable nonproprietary radio network

FirstNet





- An independent authority within the U.S. Department of Commerce
- Authorized by Congress under the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012
- Its mission is to develop, build and operate the nationwide, broadband network with priority and preemption for first responders
- AT&T was awarded a 25-year, \$6.5 billion federal contract to build out the dedicated network



The FloridaNet Executive Committee was created to oversee the efforts involved in assessing Florida's strategy for connecting with FirstNet.

The Committee works to achieve broad participation of the public safety community and its private sector partners in Florida to plan for FirstNet implementation, including design, operation, and governance.

- Required by the FirstNet/National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP)
- Serves as a representative governance body to be responsive to the Governor
- Ensures a superior product through broad participation
- Includes participation from the private sector
- Executive meetings held beginning December 2013



Metropolitan Briefings

Metropolitan leadership briefings are provided by FirstNet and AT&T, and have held three events in Florida. The topics cover the goals and solutions offered by FirstNet and AT&T.

Three events held in the Miami-Dade, Orlando and Tampa metropolitan areas.

Stakeholder Workshops

Stakeholder workshops collected user requirements for the National Public Safety Broadband Network. Workshops were hosted by ISF, Inc., on behalf of DMS.

Workshops were held in 21 cities across Florida, with more than 540 participants, including:

- Law enforcement
- Fire
- Emergency medical services
- Private sector
- Secondary responders



- Under FirstNet's enabling legislation (47 U.S.C §1442(e)(2)), the Governor must choose whether to participate in deployment of the network as proposed in the FirstNet State Plan (Opt-In) or initiate the process to assume responsibility for deploying, maintaining, operating, and improving a Radio Access Network in Florida that interoperates with the FirstNet network (Opt-Out).
- With an Opt-In election, FirstNet and AT&T will assume all responsibility and costs for deploying, operating, maintaining, and improving the FirstNet network in Florida. Florida will incur no risk, responsibility, or cost for deploying the FirstNet network. Further, an Opt-In election does not commit Florida's public safety agencies to subscribe to the FirstNet network or buy devices.
- With an Opt-Out election, Florida assumes all responsibility and costs associated with deploying, operating, maintaining, and improving a FirstNet compatible Radio Access Network in Florida.
