I. Summary:

SB 212 reenacts provisions of law establishing and implementing the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (Compact) and provides for future legislative review and repeal of the Compact on July 1, 2022.

The fiscal impact of the bill is estimated to be \$2,374 in Fiscal Year 2019-2020, which the Department of Education can absorb within its annual appropriation.

The bill takes effect upon becoming law.

II. Present Situation:

Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children

Children in active-duty military families face unique educational challenges. A military child changes schools on average three times more often than a non-military child.¹ When a parent is reassigned, a military child may be impacted by:

- Record transfer issues;
- Varied course sequencing and academic placement policies;
- Varied graduation requirements;
- Exclusion from extracurricular activities;
- Redundant or missed entrance or exit testing;
- Varied kindergarten and first grade entrance ages; and
- Having a temporary guardian appointed while the child's parent is deployed.²

The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (Compact) assists member states in uniformly addressing educational transition issues faced by active-duty military families. The Compact governs member states in several areas, including school placement, enrollment, records transfer, participation in academic programs and extracurricular activities, and graduation. The Compact was developed by the Council of State Governments, in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Defense.

States join the Compact by enacting it into law, which Florida did in 2008.³ Ten states must enact the Compact before it can take effect and be binding on member states. This occurred on July 9, 2008, when Delaware became the tenth state to adopt the Compact. Currently, all 50 states and the District of Columbia are members of the Compact.⁴

Students eligible for assistance under the Compact must receive public funding through the local education agency and must be the children of:

- Active duty members of the uniformed services⁵, including members of the National Guard and Reserve on active-duty orders;
- Members or veterans of the uniformed services who are severely injured and medically discharged or retired for a period of one year following separation; and
- Members of the uniformed services who die on active duty or as a result of injuries sustained on active duty for a period of one year after death.⁶

Florida State Council

The Compact requires member states to establish a state council to coordinate implementation of the Compact.⁷ While each state may determine the membership of its own state council, membership must include, at a minimum, the following:

- State superintendent of education;
- Superintendent of a school district with a high concentration of military children;
- One representative from a military installation;
- One representative from the legislative branch of government; and
- One representative from the executive branch of government.⁸

In addition, the state must appoint or designate a military family education liaison and a compact commissioner. Each of these appointees, unless already a full voting member of the council, shall serve as an ex officio member of the state council.⁹ Florida's state council conducts meetings on a quarterly basis, typically via teleconference.¹⁰

Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission

The Compact establishes the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (Commission) to provide national-level oversight of the Compact. The Commission may adopt and enforce rules and bylaws and perform various administrative functions necessary for day-to-day operations.¹¹ The Commission is comprised of one voting representative, or compact commissioner, from each member state.¹² Each state is entitled to one vote on Compact rule adoption or other business matters.¹³ The Commission must meet at least once a year.¹⁴

The Commission is authorized to promulgate Compact rules that govern member states in the areas addressed by the Compact.¹⁵ Compact rules have the force and effect of statutory law in member states and supersede conflicting member states laws to the extent of the conflict.¹⁶ Compact rules must not exceed the scope of authority granted by the Compact. A majority of member state legislatures may invalidate a Compact rule by legislative action.¹⁷

Review of Compact Rule Adoption

Since its enactment in 2008, Florida's Compact legislation has included a repeal provision that requires automatic repeal of the Compact after a period of time, unless reauthorized by the Legislature. The repeal provision addresses concerns regarding unconstitutional delegation of legislative authority under Article II, s. 3 of the State Constitution. Because membership in the Compact entails an agreement to be bound by rules promulgated by a non-legislative entity, i.e., the Commission, the repeal provision allows the Legislature to periodically review Compact rules and determine whether it agrees with any new rules or rule amendments adopted during the intervening period.

The Legislature last reauthorized the Compact during the 2016 Regular Session¹⁸ and provided for repeal of the Compact on July 1, 2019, unless reviewed and saved from repeal by the Legislature.

Since the 2016 legislative review, the Commission approved two substantive changes to Compact rules. The amendments, which the Commission adopted during its Annual Business Meeting in October 2018,¹⁹ are discussed below.

Compact Rule 2.104 – Dues Formula

Member states pay annual dues to the Commission to fund its operations. Compact Rule 2.104 establishes the formula for assessing membership dues. The formula is based upon the number of military children eligible for transfer under the Compact. The Commission approved an amendment to Compact Rule 2.104 to adjust the state dues assessment formula. Effective Fiscal Year 2019-2020, annual dues increase from \$1.00 to \$1.15 per military child. In addition, the amendment increased the minimum and maximum dues assessments by providing that no state dues assessment may not be less than \$2,300 per year or be more than \$69,000. The prior minimum and maximum thresholds were \$2,000 and \$60,000, respectively.

As of September 7, 2018, 39,293 students from active-duty military families resided in Florida.²⁰

Under the revised rule, Florida’s estimated Compact membership dues assessment for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 is \$45,187.²¹ Florida’s membership dues for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 were \$42,813.²²

Compact Rule 2.106 – State Councils

The Commission adopted Compact Rule 2.106 to require each state council to meet at least once per fiscal year and to submit state council meeting dates, agendas, and minutes to the Interstate Commission office within 60 days following each state council meeting. Additionally, Compact Rule 1.101 was amended to define the term “state council” to correspond to the newly created Rule 2.106.²³ Florida’s state council is an active council, meeting consistently on a quarterly basis.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill amends s. 1000.40, F.S., to reauthorize Florida’s Compact legislation and provides for the repeal of the Compact statutes, ss. 1000.36, 1000.361, 1000.38, and 1000.39, F.S., on July 1, 2022, unless reviewed and reenacted by the Legislature.

The bill takes effect upon becoming law.

To address concerns regarding the delegation of legislative authority, the bill provides for automatic repeal of Florida's Compact legislation after a period of time, unless reauthorized by the Legislature.²⁴ Because membership in the Compact requires the state to agree to be bound by rules promulgated by a non-legislative entity, i.e., the Interstate Commission, the repeal provision allows the Legislature to periodically review the Compact rules and determine whether it agrees with any new rules or rule amendments adopted during the period. Reauthorization of the Compact after these reviews diminishes a claim that the Legislature has delegated its authority.²⁵

Member states pay an annual fee to the Commission that must be between \$2,300 and \$69,000. The formula is based upon the number of military children eligible for transfer under the Compact at the rate of \$1.15 per child.

Florida's estimated Compact membership dues assessment for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 is \$45,187, an increase of \$2,374, which the Department of Education can absorb within its annual appropriation.

I. Summary:

SPB 7058 creates the Administrative Trust Fund within the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) to establish a depository for funds to be used for management activities.

The Florida Constitution requires a bill creating a new trust fund to pass by a three-fifths vote of the membership of each chamber of the Legislature. State trust funds must terminate not more than four years after the initial creation of the fund unless the Legislature sets a shorter time.

In accordance with the Florida Constitution, the trust fund is terminated on July 1, 2024.¹

The bill takes effect July 1, 2020.

II. Present Situation:

Currently the costs for management activities that are departmental in nature are funded by the Highway Safety Operating Trust Fund. Section 215.32(2)(b)2.c., F.S., provides for the creation of an Administrative Fund for such purposes.

The DHSMV began receiving reimbursements from the Federal Motor Safety Administration beginning in 2012 for administrative costs. In Fiscal Year 2017-2018, the DHSMV received approximately \$1.5 million in reimbursements.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill creates the Administrative Trust Fund to establish a depository for funds to be used for management activities that are departmental in nature and funded by indirect cost earnings and assessments against trust funds.

SPB 7060 terminates the Working Capital Trust Fund within the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV).

The bill is effective July 1, 2019.

2018 Data Summary

- Statewide, from January 1, 2018 through September 30, 2018, there were 174,254 physician certifications from 1,070 physicians for 136,274 patients.
- There are 44 counties in Florida with physicians who are qualified to certify patients for medical marijuana. Registry data shows patient home addresses in all 67 Florida counties.

Low-THC Cannabis Orders

- 1,020 physicians (95%) wrote 129,127 certifications with orders that included Low-THC Cannabis.
- 104,733 patients (77%) received Low-THC Cannabis orders.
- The Average Dosage of Low-THC Cannabis ordered was 448 mgs per day.
- The total Supply of Low-THC Cannabis ordered was 34,383,285,703 mgs.

Medical Marijuana Orders

- 1,052 physicians (98%) wrote 171,331 certifications with orders that included Medical Marijuana.
- 134,405 patients (97%) received Medical Marijuana orders.
- The Average Dosage of Medical Marijuana ordered was 372 mgs per day.
- The total Supply of Medical Marijuana ordered was 38,362,788,073 mgs.

Panel Recommendations

1. As this program is new and evolving, the Panel recommends discussing subsets of the data more frequently over the course of the year.
2. The Panel recommends including explanatory information regarding the variety of methods of statewide dispensation and delivery.
3. The Panel recommends that the legislature modify the language of section 381.986(4)(g), F.S., in order for the Panel to include additional findings and recommendations in its report. The Panel provides the explanatory information in recommendation 2 above as an example.

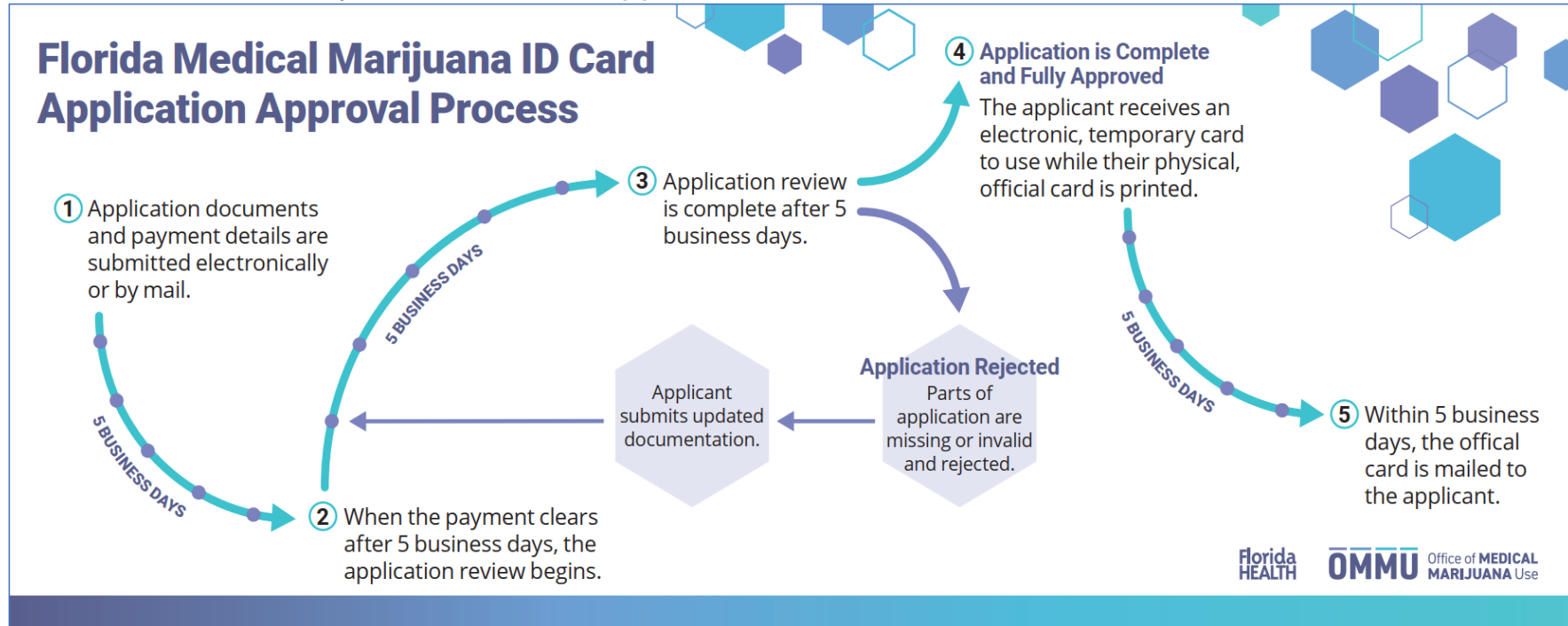

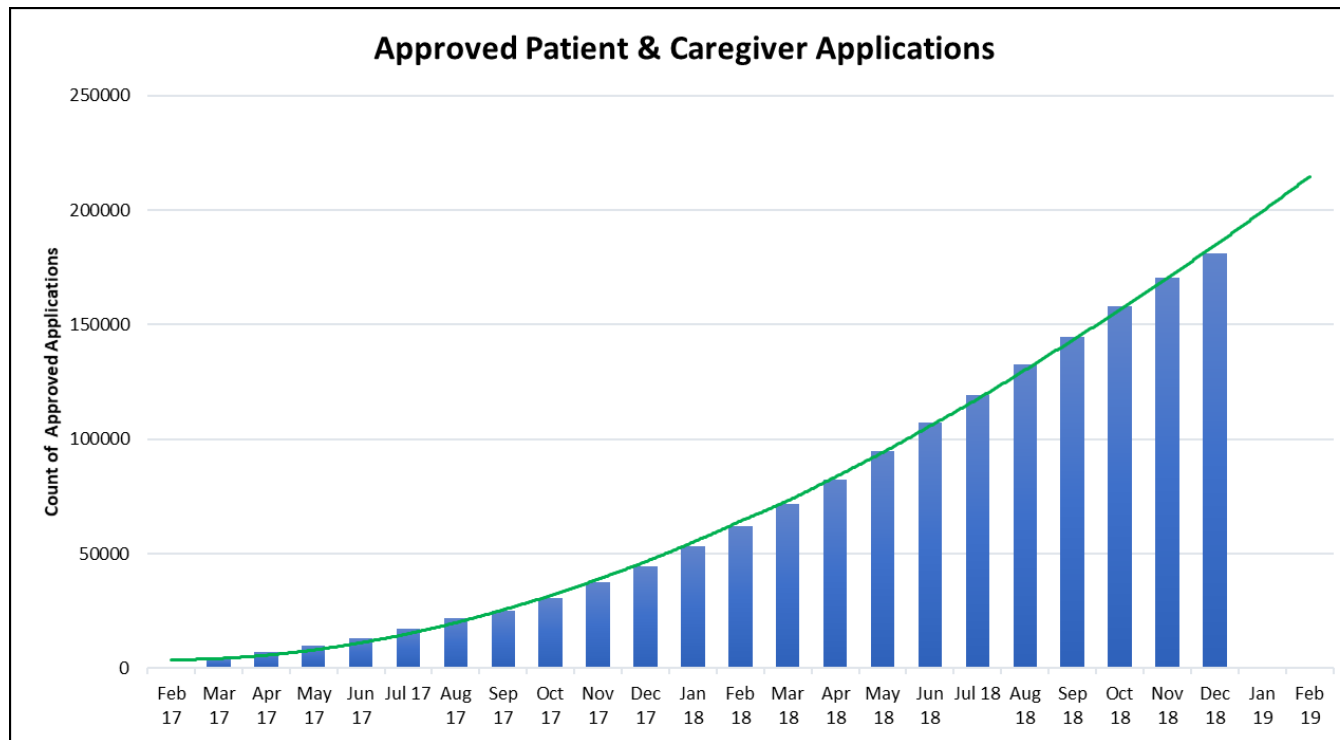

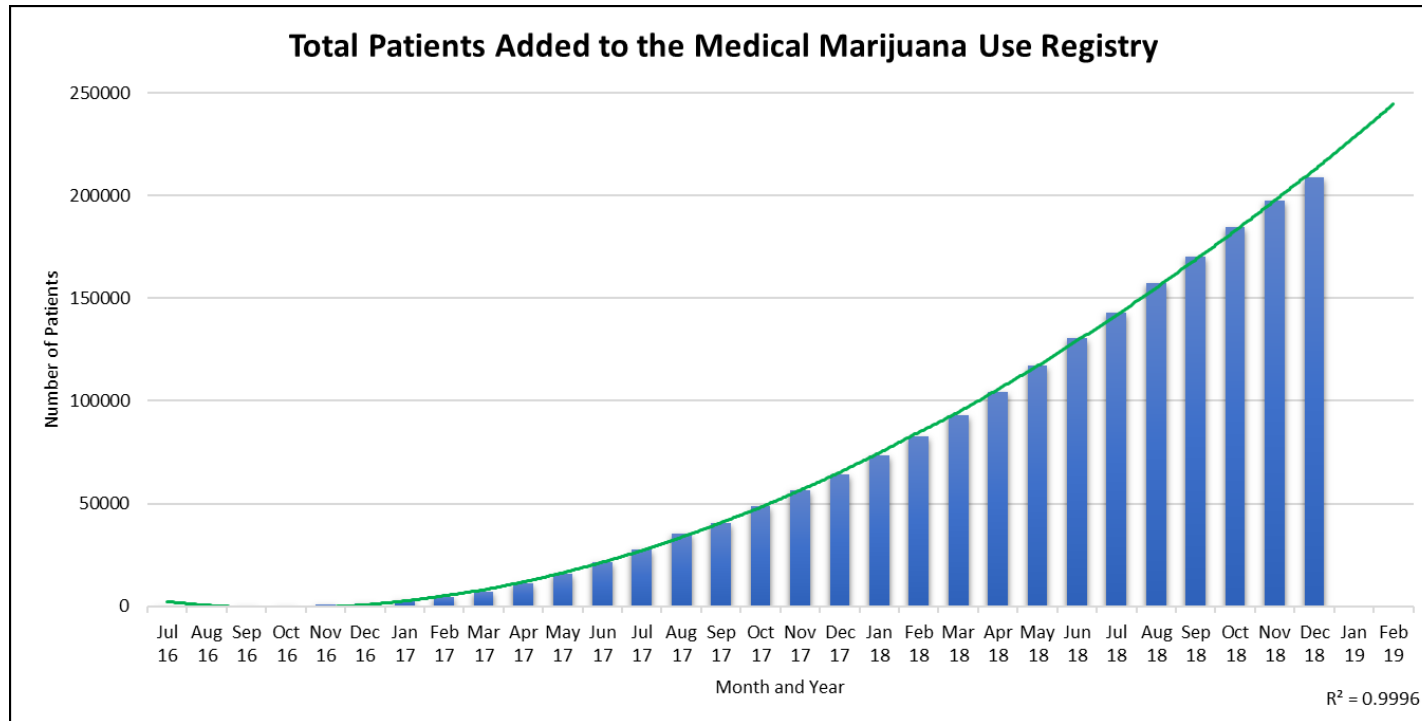

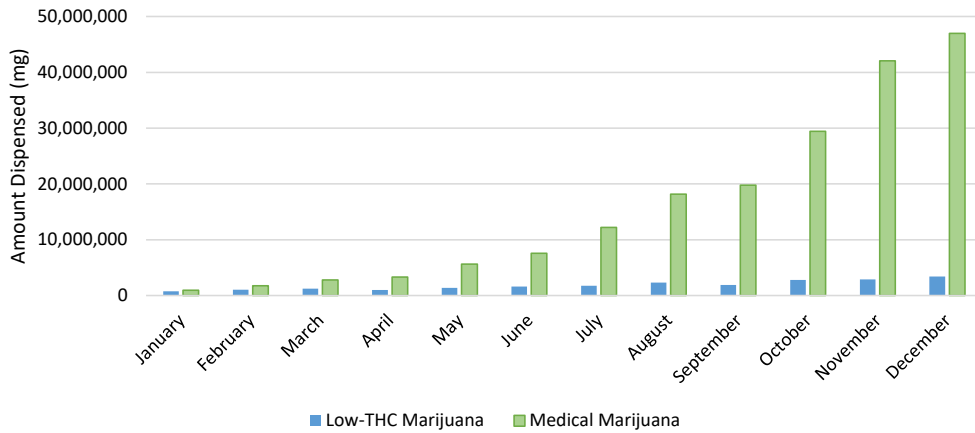

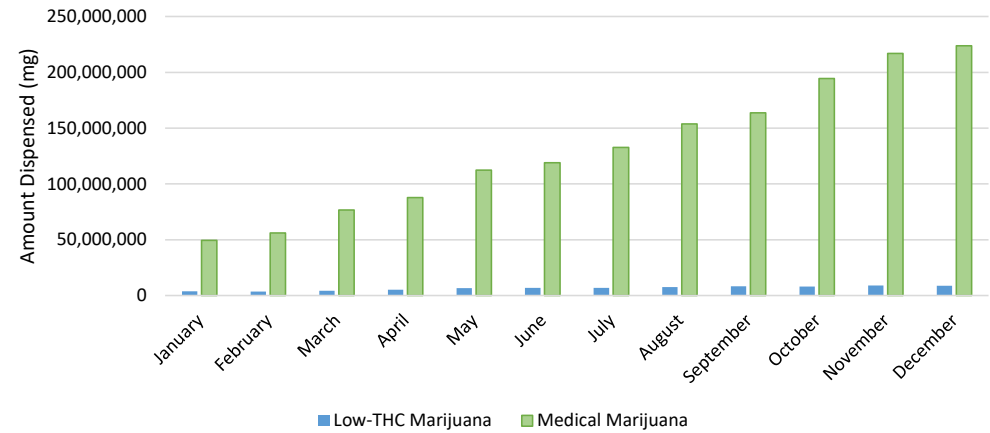

Total Milligrams Dispensed during 2017

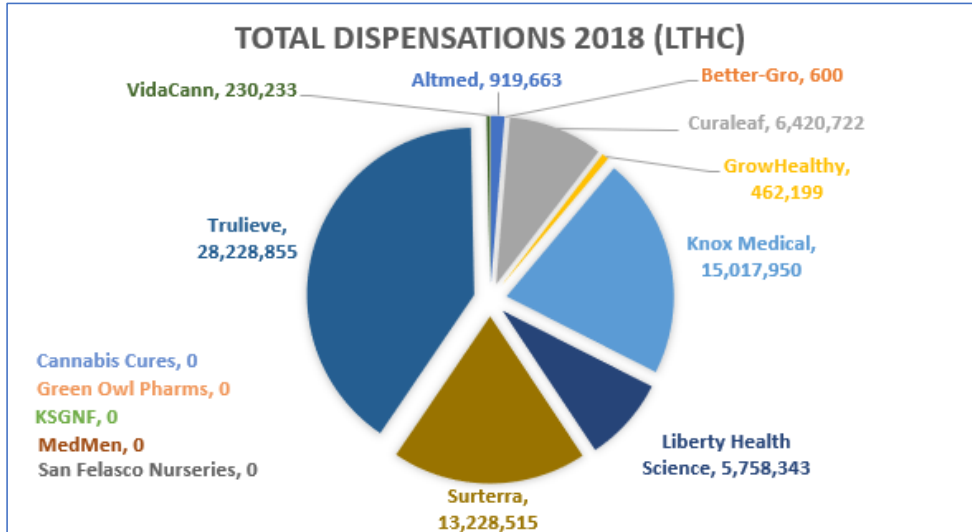


Total Milligrams Dispensed during 2018

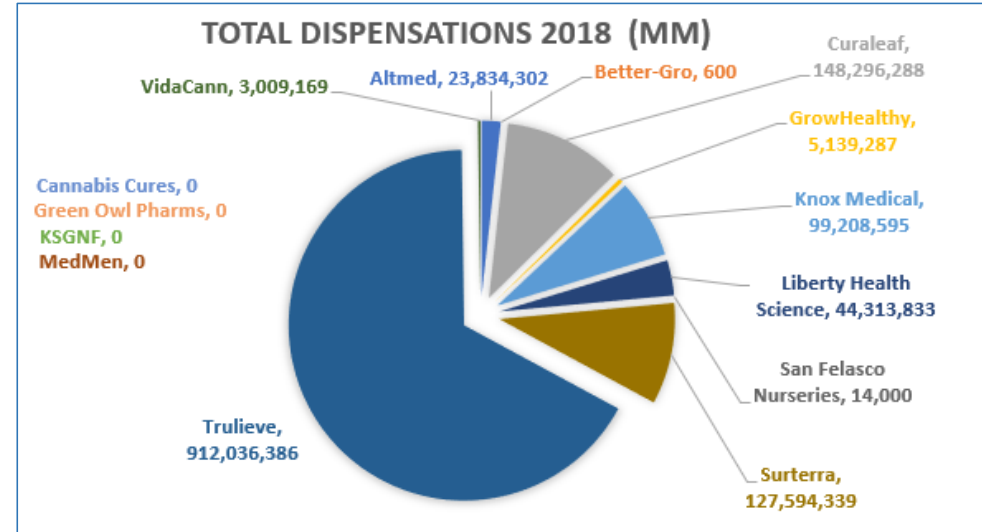


Medical Marijuana and Low-THC Dispensed by MMTc

- All MMTCs are vertically integrated, which means that each must to cultivate, process, and dispense medical marijuana and low-THC cannabis
- All MMTCs must receive authorization from the Department to begin cultivating, processing, and dispensing medical marijuana and low-THC cannabis
- Each MMTC may currently open up to 30 retail dispensing facilities
- MMTCs with dispensing authorization may deliver statewide
- DOH must initially issue 17 MMTC licenses (7 to entities previously licensed as dispensing organizations under the 2014 Compassionate Use statute and 10 new licenses)
 - Upon reaching 100,000 patients in the registry, and for each additional 100,000 patients thereafter, DOH must license 4 more MMTCs within 6 months

Phase 3: Up to 10 MMTC Licenses, Including Phase 2 MMTC Licenses

- DOH has not issued the remaining MMTC licenses for Phase 3 due to various administrative and legal challenges to application rules and the 2017 statute.
- This includes the Pigford litigant license.

Phase 4: Patient Population Greater than 100,000 Qualified Patients

- The patient population exceeded 100,000 qualified patients on April 20, 2018.
- DOH is required to issue 4 additional MMTC licenses on or before October 20, 2018.
- DOH has not issued any MMTC licenses in Phase 4 due to various administrative and legal challenges to DOH application rules and the 2017 statute.

- **Statewide Maximum** – Each MMTC was originally authorized to open 25 dispensaries statewide.
 - This increased to 30 when the patient population reached 100,000 qualified, active patients.
 - This will continue to increase by 5 dispensaries statewide each additional 100,000 qualified, active patients thereafter.

- MMTCs may purchase dispensary slots from other MMTCs.
- Limits on dispensaries sunset on April 1, 2020.

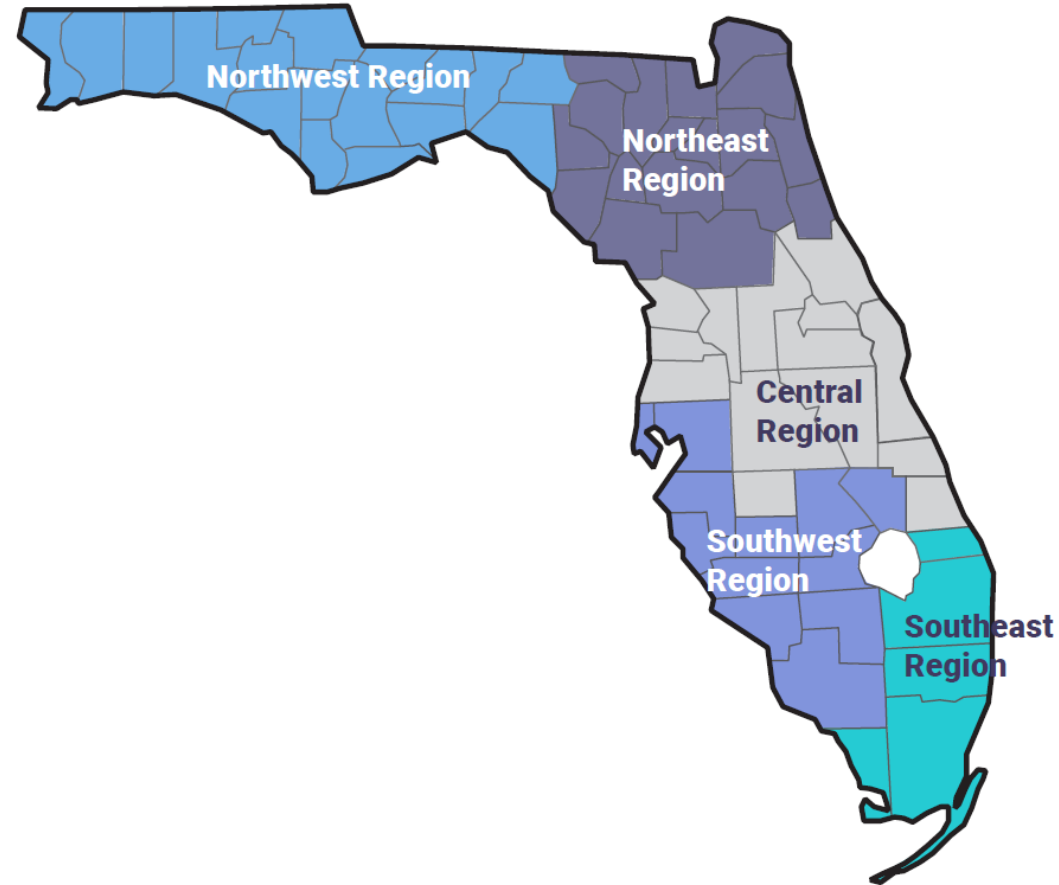

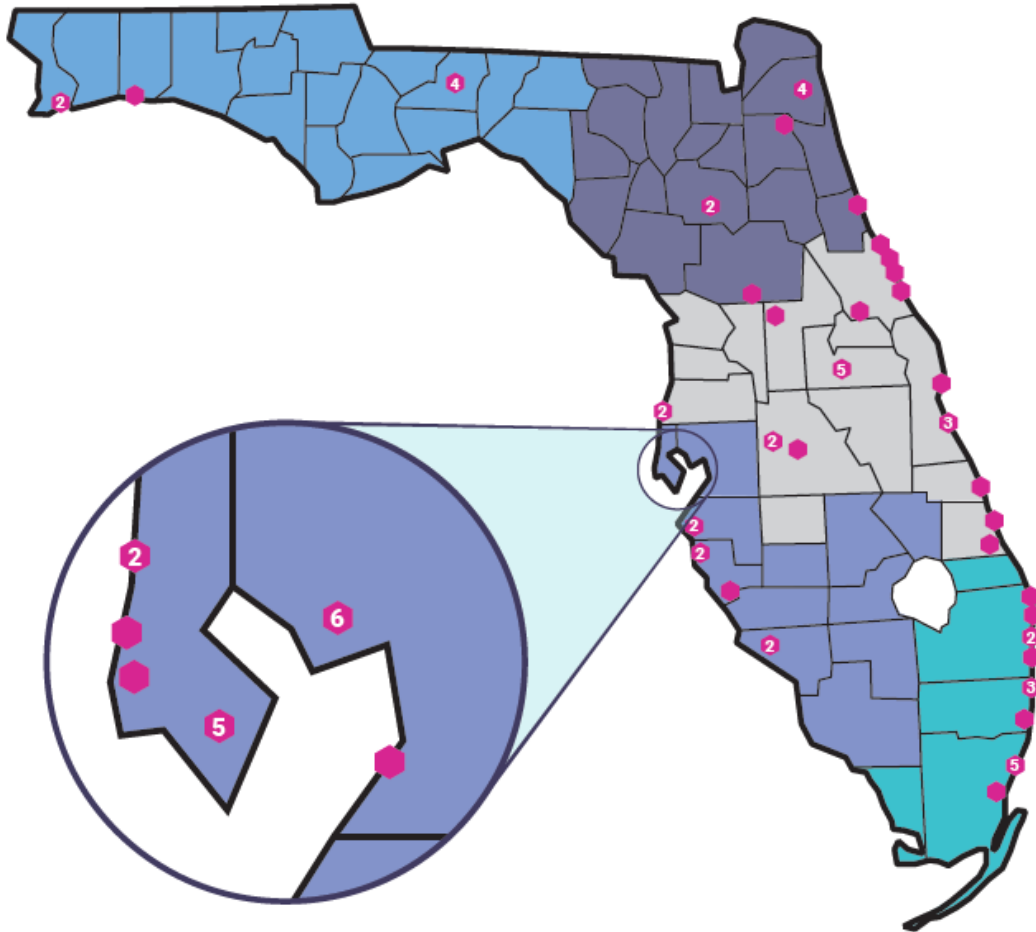

- The department shall establish, maintain, and control a computer software tracking system that traces marijuana from seed to sale and allows real-time, 24-hour access by the department to data from all medical marijuana treatment centers and marijuana testing laboratories.
- The tracking system must allow for integration of other seed-to-sale systems and, at a minimum, include notification of when: marijuana seeds are planted, when marijuana plants are harvested and destroyed, and when marijuana is transported, sold, stolen, diverted, or lost.
- Each medical marijuana treatment center currently use its own seed-to-sale system until the department establishes a seed-to-sale tracking system.

Seed to Sale Procurement:

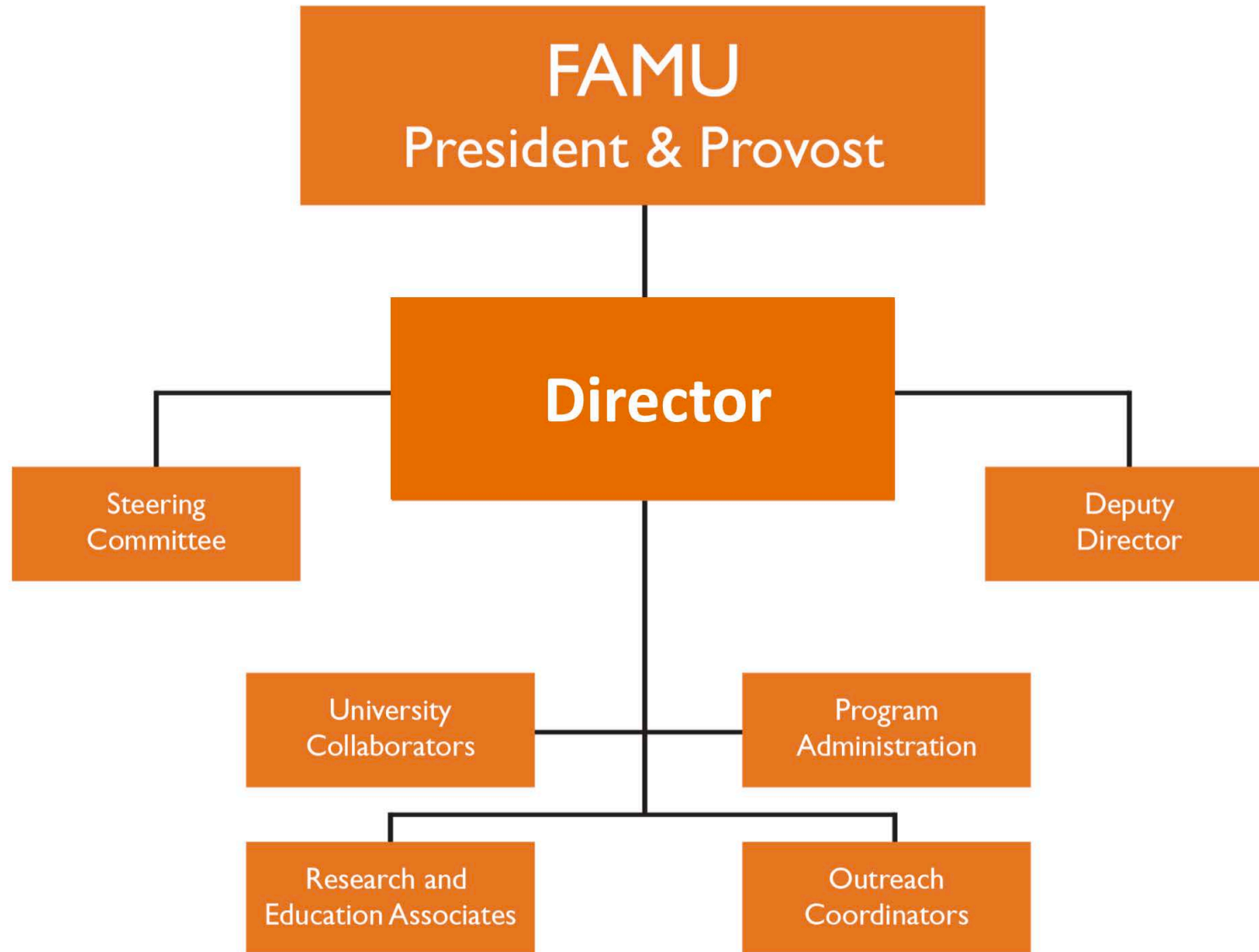

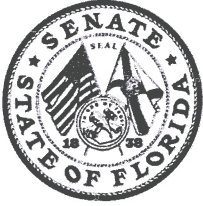
