Overview of Accomplishments (1998-2009)


- Reduced juvenile arrests by 51% (from 16,532 in 1998 to 8,042 in 2009)
- Reduced the number of first time offenders that repeat each year by 80%

1998- 67% of arrested juveniles were repeat offenders 2008- 27% of arrested juveniles were repeat offenders

- Reduced juvenile detention population from 300 a day to less than 100 per day
- Generate a \$33 million dollar gross systemic savings each year, and a \$20.2 million dollar net savings each year









- 1998- 67% of first-time juveniles later repeated
- 2009- 26% of first-time juveniles later repeated



Civil Citation Initiative

Represents true systemic change

- No arrest record
- Addresses Issues
 - Assessment, service referrals, case management
- Participation from all 37 arresting agencies






RESULTS

- Over 8,000 participants since April 2007
- Reduced Arrests 21%
- 95% of participants are minorities
- 82% Successful Completion Rate
- 3% Recidivism (April 2007 July 2008)
- 29% Offsite Referrals (15% increase since inception)

Commitment rates vary significantly between counties – suggesting that where a child lives matters more than what he or she has done.

Moved to State-owned Facilities 8/17/10 at Direction of Florida Senate; Moved Using Existing Funds Saving \$800,000 over a 10 Year Period



- A Governor and Cabinet Agency Created in 1941*
- 3 Full-time Commissioners appointed by the Cabinet
- Commissioners may Serve no More Than 2 Consecutive 6 Year Terms
- Meets approximately 36 times annually
- Has 128 FTEs and a Budget of \$8.2 million for FY 10-11
- Almost 100% funded by General Revenue (Small Trust Funded VOCA Grant)
 - * Art. IV, s. 8(3), Fla. Const.; Chapter 947, F.S.




Ensures Public Safety by:

- Selecting Through Careful Consideration Persons to be Transitioned Back Into Society
- Setting Terms and Conditions of Supervision
- Holding Offenders Accountable
- Providing Accurate Information to the Clemency Board
- Locating Victims/Victims' Families to Afford Them an Opportunity to Provide Input into the Process
- Investigating Applicants for Seaport Employment



AGENCY OVERVIEW/CORE MISSION

• FOUR ACTIVITIES: (1) CONDITIONAL RELEASE/ADDICTION RECOVERY RELEASE; (2) REVOCATION SERVICES; (3) CLEMENCY SERVICES/SEAPORT INVESTIGATIONS; AND (4) PAROLE/CONDITIONAL MEDICAL RELEASE.





1st Activity: Conditional Release (CRS)& Addiction Recovery Release (ARS)

- Conditional Release Supervision (CRS) is a Mandatory *Non-Discretionary* Release Program
- Conditional Releasees are Violent, Habitual Offenders, Sexual Predators
- Conditional Releasees are Subject to Strict Conditions of Supervision Set by the Commission
- Activity Also Includes Addiction Recovery Supervision (ARS)/Offenders Having No Prior Prison Incarceration but Evidencing a Substance Abuse Issue
- If a Violation Occurs, Warrants are Issued, Quasi-Judicial Hearings are Held, and a Final Commission Action is Taken

The Florida Parole Commission 2nd Activity: OFFENDER REVOCATIONS

- Staff Investigates Violations
- Commissioners Issue Warrants for Arrests
 - Over 2,000 Issued in FY 09-10
- Examiners Hold Quasi-Judicial Hearings
- Ensure Offender is Afforded Due Process
- Commissioners Make Final Determinations
 - Number of Cases Heard/Reviewed in FY 09-10: 1,776

3rd Activity: Clemency Services

- Acts as the Administrative and Investigative Arm of the Clemency Board
- When Convicted of a Felony, Offenders Lose: the Right to Vote/Sit on a Jury/Hold Public Office/and Possess a Firearm
- Also, Falling Under the Clemency Functions:
 - Seaport Security Waiver Investigations for FDLE/1% of FPC
 Program Workload/completed 24 in FY 09-10
 - Capital Cases/Conduct Death Row Interviews/Conducted 3 in FY 09-10
- Addressing the Backlog Utilizing Qualified Interns & Volunteers

4th Activity: Parole and Conditional Medical Release (CMR)

- A Discretionary Prison Release parole is NOT a Right
- Commission sets Term and Conditions of Supervision
- Parolee may be Returned to Prison if Violation Occurs
- Abolished for Most Offenders Sentenced After October 1, 1983
- 5,526 inmates are still eligible for parole consideration/448 offenders currently are under parole supervision
- Conditional Medical Release (CMR) is for "terminally ill" or "permanently incapacitated" inmates



OTHER COMMISSION DUTIES: VICTIMS' SERVICES

- Provides Direct, Personal Assistance to Crime Victims and Their Families
- Victims Provide Input in Parole, Conditional Medical Release, Revocations, and Clemency Case Considerations
- Reduces Victimization Through Education and by Fostering an Environment of Caring Concern, Compassion, Dignity, and Respect
- In FY 09-10, Victims' Services Logged 20,559 Victim Assists

CONTROL RELEASE AUTHORITY

- Created in 1989 as a Prison Population Management Tool
- Currently Inactive/a Small Number of Inmates are Still Under Control Release Supervision
- Administered by the Commission to Keep the Prison Population between 99 and 100% of its Total Capacity

Results of the February 2011 Criminal Justice Estimating Conference

Prepared by the Florida Legislature, Office of Economic and Demographic Research for the Senate Budget Subcommittee on Criminal and Civil Justice Appropriations, February 23, 2011

CJEC met on October 19, 2010 and again on February 21, 2011.

In October, CJEC had projected that FY 10-11 admissions would decline by 3.7% from FY 09-10.

In first seven months of this fiscal year, admissions were 6.1% lower than in the same period in FY 09-10.

Going into the February CJEC, it appeared that admissions needed to be adjusted downward from the October CJEC.

February's CJEC projected prison admissions compared to October 2010 CJEC:

- 937 for FY 10-11
- 2,395 for FY 11-12
- 2,751 for FY 12-13


FY 10-11 admissions now projected to be **35,457 -- 6.2% below FY 09-10**


February's CJEC projected prison population compared to October's CJEC:

June 30th prison population:

- 718 for FY 10-11
- 2,156 for FY 11-12
- 3,230 for FY 12-13

June 30, 2011 prison population projection **102,236**





Why were projections lowered in February?

Review of criminal justice indicators suggest that trends first observed in 2008 are continuing.

These trends will result in smaller numbers of new commitments coming to prison than previously anticipated.



Supreme Court

- Building, Facilities Maintenance and Operational Upkeep: \$99,654 (Issue Code: 7000210)
 - Increases for maintenance of HVAC, access control/CCTV operating systems, fire safety system and elevators - \$73,000
 - Emergency Generator Fuel Increases \$5,000
 - Other Personal Services for custodial and preventative maintenance services \$21,654

Total Supreme Court: \$99,654 General Revenue

Office of the State Courts Administrator (OSCA)

- Innocence Commission (continuation): \$247,056 (N/R Mediation and Arbitration Trust Fund) (Issue Code: 3000600)
 - Non-recurring funding was authorized by the Legislature for Fiscal Year 2010-2011. In order for the Commission to complete its work in accordance with Supreme Court Administrative Order No. AOSC10-39, In re: Florida Innocence Commission, second year funding is needed.
- > Judicial Inquiry System: \$179,679 (N/R General Revenue) (Issue Code: 36220C0)
 - Implementation of virtualized servers necessitates replacement of 3 application servers and 2 database servers including software licenses and migration services (eliminates need to purchase 16 replacement servers currently supporting JIS)

 - HVAC Upgrade; Re-piping of chilled and condenser water lines; install new correctly sized pumps, adequate piping, insulation, etc. - \$70,000 (N/R)

 - Phone system is 15 years old and cannot be upgraded or supported due to software obsolescence

 - Implementation of new integrated audio/video interpreting systems and refresh needs in the 9th and 11th Judicial Circuits

Non-recurring funding was authorized by the Legislature for Fiscal Year 2010-11. These funds

resources in the Trial Courts and \$44,394 for oversight and tracking of the progress of the cases
in Executive Direction.
