Objectives

- 1. Preventing system contact for Florida's youth.
 - 2. Reducing recidivism.

Civil Citation

- In FY 2021-22, more than 11,000 youth received a civil citation.
- In FY 2021-22, 80% of youth successfully completed a civil citation program.
- 3% of completers committed a new law violation that was adjudicated or received adjudication withheld during the twelve month follow up period.

Prevention

- Offers voluntary prevention, intervention, and treatment service programs for youth throughout the state.
- FY 2020-21, served 25,826 youth
 - Shelter Services (Children in Need of Service/Families in Need of Services or CINS/FINS)
 - Behavioral Interventions
 - Mentoring/Tutoring Programs



Detention

- The department operates 21 secure regional detention facilities.
- Youth are held in secure detention if they are arrested and score for detention or after they have been adjudicated (found guilty) and disposed (sentenced) to residential commitment.
- Youth can also be ordered to supervised release or released to their parent/guardian.
- In FY 2020-21:
 - 8,420 youth were served in secure detention
 - 4,294 youth were released on supervised release
 - 2,809 youth were released with electronic monitoring



Probation and Community Intervention

- Every youth referred to the department is assigned a juvenile probation officer (JPO).
- JPOs provide a recommendation to the court based on comprehensive assessments and staffings.
- JPOs will oversee home visits, urinalysis screens, curfews, and other sanctions that the judge imposes.
- Probation also contracts with private providers for aftercare when youth are released from residential commitment.

Residential

- Residential youth have been deemed a risk to public safety and are placed in a rehabilitative program where they receive education, counseling, and workforce training until they complete their treatment plan.
- Education for residential youth is provided by the local school district where the program is located.
- In FY 2021-22, residential commitment programs served 2,338 youth.
- Currently, there are approximately 1,500 beds, which are 100% specialized and run by private contracted providers.

Project Anchor

- Partnership with Tallahassee Community College to focus on high-quality educational services to include career and technical education for youth in the deeper end of the system.
- Youth work with Career Navigators to map out educational success plans and match youth with credentialing programs that allow them to work toward their long term career goals.
- Career Navigators connect youth with local state colleges to continue their education and attainment of diplomas or credentials-of-value after release from commitment.



Recent Legislation

- Direct Care Staff Raises (2022)
- Workforce Education (2022):
 - \$3.7M for workforce education for residential and aftercare youth (Project Anchor)
- HB 7029 Time Limitations for Preadjudicatory Juvenile Detention Care (2022):
 - Allows for extension of detention care under specified circumstance when a judge finds good cause
 - Expansion of electronic monitoring
- HB 885 Juvenile Justice Programs and Detention (2021):
 - Created an effective response matrix and requires courts to consider additional information when a youth fails to appear

Florida Scholars Academy

- Focused on individual educational pathways:
 - High school diploma
 - High school equivalency diploma
 - Enrollment in an educational program of study at a Florida Technical College, State College or University
 - Attainment of industry recognized credentials of value
- Funded through General Revenue as part of the department's 2023-2024 Legislative Budget Request:
 - First Year Set Up Cost: \$12M
